Fatal Paule. WARSAW, Sept. 29 .- A false alarm of fire ras given to-day in the synagogue at Kalwarya near Suwalki. The build-Kalwarya near Suwalki. The building was crowded with Jews at worship. A panic followed and after a struggle of 10 minutes two thirds of the congregation were still in the synagogue. Nine dead bedies were found near the exit and 20 persons lay unconscious and bleeding where they had been trampled. Fully 100 persons were injured in the rush. Fifteen are suffering from wounds likely to cause death. There was no fire.

LONDON, Sept. 28 .-- Great interest has been aroused by the speech at Plymouth of Mr. Arnold-Forster, Liberal-Unionist member for Wess Belfast, who declared that in the present condition of the British havy the protection afforded to the mercantile marine was utterly insufficient, and that in time of war the great daugers of the situation would be demonstrated. When Mr. Gladstone had been introduced to the representatives of Midlothian and was able to commence his speech (the cheering lasted for some minutes after he had bowed to the assemblage), he began his remarks in a low but firm voice, which was the respect shown to the aged Premier that no sooner was it evident that he had commenced epeaking than the most death-like stillness fell over the Albert Hall audience and the fell over the Albert Hall audience and the drop of a pin could have been heard almost

The president of the company has virtually made a new agreement with the town, which also includes Point Edward. It is a fair business transaction. On condition that the people of Sarnia pass a bylaw voting the company a bonus of \$100,000, the company agrees to locate the shops at Point The Sarnia Canadian has the following pany agrees to locate the shops at Point Edward, and the roundhouse in the south end of the town. This, in a few words, is the proposed contract. Like all contracts the two parties to it must be intelligently consenting, otherwise it must be what is know in law as a nudum pactum—that is, a naked bargain. The Grand Trunk Company will receive \$100,000 in cash—a large sum of money. There is no contingency in the matter, and discount on our money; the company's quid pro quo is assured. Now, what does Sarnia get? The company's car shops, now partly located in Brantford, Hamilton and London, are to be concentrated at Point Edward, which is to unite itself with Sarnia, and both become one municipality in order to secure the prize for which so many places have been struggling with tempting offers, but which offers the company's offer. We do not believe that any of our rate-payers will, after mature consideration, he heitate to accept the company's offer. Sarnia and Point Edward united, will with the addition of the influx of people attached to the shops, become a city. Mr. Gladstone in his speech at Edinburgh Wednesday proved himself once more the Grand Old Man, Had he been a weak and ir-

resolute man, the British Premier might have felt disposed to succumb to the apparently overwhelming verdict given against him recently by the majority of the occupants of seats in the hereditary chamber, and indorsed, as some seem to think, by the privat influence of the Court. But instead of weakly collapsing, Mr. Gladstone faces the situation in a straightforward manner, dealing the House of Lords the most vigorous blow between the eyes to which it has for many a year been subjected. The Liberal leader refused to take any stock in the nonsensical contention that a dissolution of the House elected by and enjoying the confidence of the people should be decreed because of an adverse vote in the House of Lords, a collection of individuals responsible to no one but themselves. He regards such a contention as a gross, a monstrous innovation, an odious newfangled doctrine to which he will never

ubmit-no, not for one hour. Mr. Gladstone plainly states that the Lords have acted in a manner which now involves the question of their own independent and responsible existence. He points out, as has often been shown, that of the many reforms passed by Parliament for the betterment of the people in recent years not one of them originated in the House of Lords, but had been opposed by it. "For my part," exclaimed Mr. Gladstone, "if the nation is determined it will not be baffiled by a phalanx of 500 peers. We have the will of the country to execute and cannot submit to the House of Lords, although they bear high-sounding

titles and sit in a gilded chamber." Gladstone's bugle blast will echo and re-echo, not only throughout the United Kingdom, but throughout the world.

HITHERTO the process in brush making of bunching the bristles and drawing them into the holes has been performed by hand. A machine of peculiar ingenuity has just been invented for this purpose, the bristles beeing contained in a hopper, where they rest horizontally at right angles on the top of a dick, which, by means of a treadle, is caused to partially rotate, first in one direction and then in the other. The disk has a notch formed in its periphery, and, as the notch passes under the bristles, some of them enter into the notch; before the disk returns, a plate joined to the disk some of them enter into the notch; before the disk returns, a plate joined to the disk is moved and closes the mouth of the notch, the disk then comes back and carries away the tuit of bristle retained in the notch to a position from which it can readily be taken by the fingers of the operative. The whole arrangement is that of a pecker or gripper, and can be regulated according to the quantity of the material required to fill the hole, the operative passing the wire through the hole by means of a special needle filted to a clamp which is held in the needle fitted to a clamp which is held in the right hand, the loop being automatically formed. Into this loop the operator passes the tuft of bristles, pulls the wire, and thus draws the bristles into the hole.


