But One More Effort Will Be Made to Get Him.

GENERAL ANXIOUS TO COME

But Says That It Is Impossible For Him to Come.

Col. Little today received the followng dispatch from Lt.-Col. Septimus Denison in regard to the proposed visit to the city of Lord Roberts:

Dear Sir,-Owing to the many reorts respecting Lord Roberts' proosed visit to London, I take the libfacts before your readers. Mayor Stevely and other citizens of

ondon, who were at Quebec, did everything in their power to securevisit from his lordship, and at one time it appeared that they had succeeded, as the telegrams attached will show. Lord Roberts certainly evinced great anxiety to come to London, but hard and fast arrangements of the aboard committee in charge were too much ven for him.

After several consultations over the telephone, a very strong invitation, coupled with the offer of a special train, was wired to him and a reply received as follows: Quebec, July 27, 1908.



SKEETERS ABANDON STATEN ISLAND

Dr. Doty Tells of Gteat Battle of Explorion-Boon to Health and Comfort.

New York, July 28.-Staten Island is now so free from mosquitos that Dr. Alvah H. Doty, health officer of the port of New York, at the quarantine station there, is importing a few from Manhattan.

No end of consternation was caused among the Staten Islanders when this became known. They say they have had all they want of mosquitos.

The doctor, however, assured a porter last evening that he would keep his guests chained up and muzzled. He wants them for research purposes and will not let them loose afterward. During the invasion of Manhattan

the other evening, several hosts of the enemy attacked Bellevye Hospital. Dr. Doty got the medical men at the hospital to catch a number for him. "First of all," said Dr. Doty, "I was curious to know what sort of mos-

quitos they were, and then, I am anxious to carry on the investigation as to the disease carrying properties of these fellows. "We know that in the case of yellow fever, which is spread by the mosquite,

and in no other way, it is necessary for the insect to bite a person suffering from the disease. Then a certain number of days must pass during which the germ is generating in the mesquito.

"I do not think that the insect could carry tuberculosis, say, or other diseases it would come across in the hospital, but we do not know yet all there is to be known, and I am taking this opportunity to see if we can find any-

"We shall keep the captive mosquitos alive for the various periods of germination, and then try to ascertain whether they have any disease germs about them.

"That the swarm in Manhattan the other evening was of the striped variety-those with black and white legsproves conclusively that they were ceast born and due to sea water swamps and marshes. They certainly didn't go from Staten Island this now. They came, I fancy, from the

EFFORTS TO SAVE THE BABIES' LIVES

Figures on Pasteurization by an Expert—Why He Makes the Fight.

New York, July 28. - Nathan Strauss, of this city, delivered before the political economy class of Heidelberg University an address on milk pasteurization, in which he demonstrated by facts and figures the reduction in infant mortality brought about by the system for which he has fought for so many years. Mr. Strauss has extended his work into Europe and it has attracted such attention that he was invited by Prof. Eberhard Gothein to address the students at the university.

Mr. Strauss said that the excessive mortality of infants in their first year and the number of deaths due to consumption have been traced to the use of milk taken from tuberculous cows. A large proportion of the animals are diseased, he declared, and are kept in surroundings which give encouragement to the disease. Dairyman do not take proper precautions to prevent filth from coming in contact with the milk and it is not kept cool while in transit. thus aiding the multiplication of
