STIFFENED THE LIBERAL BAND:

Liberals Facilitate Business of Country by Passing Five Million Dollars Supply Before Easter Adjournment-Fight Next Week Likely To Be Fiercer Than Ever and Wild Scenes May Result.

Ottawa, March 20.—Parliament adjourned yesterday for Easter, and to get its breath for the contest which will be renewed when the law-makers assemble after the holiday.

To show their desire to facilitate the business of the country, the Liberals passed five million dollars supply before 6 o'clock last

Premier Borden's manifest to the country has not made much of an impression upon the Opposition. He stated that the rules were revised in 1910. So they were, and Premier Borden was on

He stated that the Liberals have already voted in favor of voting \$35,000,000 for the navy, but it is pointed out they did so on condition the money would be spent in Canada. To the claim of obstruction they point to disregard of the rules by the Speaker and chairman.

NO SURRENDER.

The ultimatum issued by Premier Borden, it now looks, would stiffen the Opposition in its determination to have the country pass upon the issue. Most of the members on both sides are going home, and when they return there will be an exchange of information in party caucus by both sides, which will guide the parties in

The Government after Easter will probably ask for more supply. The granting or refusal of this will have to be considered by the Liberals, who now seem inclined to follow the Conservative precedent and select the items which will be granted.

If the Government tries to force closure through, there will be a good deal of discussion. It will pass only after the Liberals have stated their views upon the closure plan of Speaker Sproule and the Government Saturday night. There are likely to be scenes in Parliament still before prorogation.

Amendment Sought.
Seeking to have the patent medicine act amended so that it will afford greater protection against the sale of nostrums containing cocaine to un-suspecting persons, the Baptist Men's Association of Montreal recently me-morialized the Minister of Inland Revenue in a resolution in part as follows:

Affecting Patent . Medicines. That if any revision of the patent or roprietary medicines act of 1908, be undertaken, no amendment thereof shall be passed which shall permit the sale use in Canada of any patent or proprietary medicine which contains cocaine or any of the salts of cocaine; and, further, that if any order-in-council may have been passed or departmental reguation made having the effect of permit ing the importation, sale, or use of patent or proprietary medicines containing cocaine or its salts, whether upon the prescription of a physician or otherwise, it is requested that such order-in or departmental regulation be rescinded.



HINTS AT CLOSURE BILL AS COMMONS ADJOURNS

Premier Borden Says Rules Government majority on Saturday night last. On these combined issues Will Be Amended Next Week.

STATEMENT BY THE GOVT.

Issue of Free Speech in Canadian Parliament is at Stake.

Ottawa, March 19. - "I cannot say at the present moment what we shall go on with when the House resumes on Tuesday next, but I will send an intimation to the leader of the Opposition later on," said Premier Borden at the adjournment of the Commons this evening, over the Easter recess. Then, in response to a suggestion from Hon, H. R. Emmerson ethat the Liberals would like to discuss at the reopening of the House the question as to the authority of Speaker Sproule for ordering the chairman of the committee on Saturday night last to shut off further discussion, both in regard to the limitation of debate, and in regard to the naval bill, the Premier declared that, as far as he knew at present, this would be the first order of business. The House then adjourned until Tuesday afternoon next.

Free Speech the Issue. Behind the above brief announcement there lies an interesting story present juncture in regard to the bill completely for this session. That is the struggle tion of Parliament when it reassem-On the naval issue, so far as the Liberal party is concerned, the position remains absolutely unchang-

le, in Canada and under the control of the Canadian Parliament. Behind this is the whole issue of responsible government, of Canadian nationhood and of permanent imperial unity.

Vegetables were plentiful, but there were only a few changes in the quotations. Cabbages were so plentiful that the farmers were unable to sell them, and a number of them stated that the only thing to do for the remainder of the season was to use them as fertilizers. Lettuce was scarce, and as the demand was brisk, the supply was soon sold. The price of lettuce today was from 30c to 40c per dozen bunches. Potatoes were also fairly plentiful, but the prices remained unchanged, the quotations being 90c per bag wholesale and \$1 per bag retail. Parsnips, turnips and beets were also offered in fairly large quantities, but the prices remained unchanged.

The offerings of hay, straw and grains were small, and the prices in the majority of sales were higher than on Tuesday. Hay, of which only a few loads were sold today, was quoted at prices ranging from \$11 to \$13 50 per ton. Oats advanced to \$11 to \$13 50 per ton. Oats advanced to \$10 66 and \$1 12 per cwt. Straw was not in demand, and there were no changes. Apples were very plentiful, but the supply this season exceeded the demand greatly, and many of the farmers have stopped bringing apples to the market. Although the prices were considerably lower today, the sales were few and far between.






