The total subscriptions are placed by well-informed circles at thirty-three to thirty-four million dollars or barely \$8,000,000 in excess of the \$25,-000,000 taken up by a group of German banks, which, it now develops, underwrote only fifty per cent instead of the entire issue as earlier stated. The Reichsbank still is holding back the official figures while efforts are being made to whip the banks and industries into line to make good

The loan setback has had a discouraging moral effect on the Reichsbank's campaign to peg the mark at about 20,000 to the dollar. Already it is noticed in the increasing speculaagainst the mark's artificially value, which had been maintained for several weeks with practically no Reichsbank intervention. The Reichsbank is now forced to throw con-siderable amounts of foreign drafts upon the market daily to prevent a

new runaway movement.

Kemal in Latest Speeches Refers To Possibility of War.

WATCHING INDIA

Hindoo Moslems Would Send Division To Aid Kemal.

Special Cable to The London Advertiser and The Philadelphia Public Ledger. Constantinople, March 29. - The Allied decisions in London have caused great pessimism in Turkisn circles, especially in Angora, where one paper says: "It seems that peace has become a dream and war a sad reality." Kemal in his last speeches has been emphasizing the possibility of war and preparing the people for the resumption of hostilities if the Turkish terms are rejected. There are numerous indications that the Allies are making a mistake if they think the Turks are bluffing or consider that their counter-proposals are not Angora's "last price."

The Turks, however, are waiting to see what the Allied diplomats will do with the experts' report. Meanwhile they are keeping in close touch with India. Mehmed Abdul Raba, leader of the Indian revolutionists, has arrived in Trebizond from Moscow en route to Angora. In a statement given to the Turkish press, Mehmed said the Hindu and Moslems of India have combined on the fol-

lowing program:

In the event of war between the Allies and Turkey, to launch a revolution, with revolts in the army and among the native police, to prevent recruiting, boycott war loans, prevent trading with foreigners and check the export of raw materials and food. The Indian Moslems are preparing to send a division to fight under Kemal. Zinoviev, who is at Tiflis, is maintaining a sort of general headquarters for the Indian revolution. Indian revolutionists are reported numerous in the Caucasus,









DEPUTATIONS PLAN DIRECT TO DRUR

Wenige Declares Drive For Elective Commission To Continue.

CONFIDENT OF BILL

Mayor and Supporters Are Not At All Disheartened.

"Propaganda spread by the Police Chiefs' Association of Ontario will not defeat the will of the people,' asserted Mayor Wenige of London, as he returned last night from Toronto, where he led a deputation to Attorney-General Raney, to urge the inauguration of an elective form of police commission.

"We are not through yet by any means," declared his worship decis-ively, and in this he was vigorously supported by the other members of the city council who occompanied him, Ald. John Colbert, Ald. Gordon Drake and Ald. George Burdick. Mayor Wenige and his followers

are confident that the MacBride bill, which seeks this particular change in the general act, will witness a successful passage in the house, despite the frank opposition from Attorney-General Raney, the Police Chiefs' Association of Ontario, the cities of Hamilton, St. Catharines and Guelph, and crown attorneys and municipal solicitors throughout the province. "We have made arrangements to take another big deputation direct to Premier Drury when the bill comes up for its second reading, and we'll see this business through," Mayor Wenige enthusiastically declared last "Our chief opposition," he contin-

ued, "exclusive of the attorney-gen-eral, came up from the Police Chiefs' Association, who were represented by the chief of police of Toronto, while the city solicitor of Hamilton was also quite prominent in the debate.
"It was my contention that these people did not represent the people. No less than 13 of the 20 municipalities represented there yesterday are favorable to the change, standing for as many as 800,000 persons. Four others are neutral, while three are

opposed.
"The attorney-general had in his possession a pile of letters, camou-flage letters from chambers of commerce, Rotary Clubs and the like throughout the province, that had been despatched from the Police Chiefs' Association, asking them to oppose this movement.
