"The following night was quiet until 2 in the morning, when a fusillade began on our right flank, along the line of our outposts. The firing soon slackened. At 5:30 in the morning the Japanese artillery opened fire on our left flank. Shortly before this our cavalry discovered on our right flank the presence southward of Tafanchou of a con siderable force of the enemy. The Japanese infantry opened fire on our cavalry, occupying the heights between Tafanchou and Lan Chou, on the edge of a wood. Toward 6:30 the enemy, consisting of a regiment of infantry, with artillery, attacked from these woods. At the same time the cannonade on our left flank became heavier. At 6:30 Gen. Baron Stakelberg passed with part of his force to the attack, turning the right flank of the enemy, towards Wa Fang Tien and Hun Chow and directing the other part force against the enemy's front.
