# **SERMON FOR** YOUNG MEN

Rev. Mr. Rutledge Gives Excellent Advice to the Rising Generation

Service Attended by Very Large Congregation—Music Furnished by a Male Choir

The young men's service in the Park street Methodist church last night was a notable success. congregation crowded the spacious church and the singing of the young men's choir was enthusiastic. The sermon of the pastor, the Rev. W. L. Rutledge was also appropriate to the occasion. The text was I. John ii., 14, "I write unto you young men because ye are strong, etc." "I bring you to-night," said the preacher, "a message from a centenarian The apostle John was an hundred years old when he wrote this letter. Let the multitude of years show

"Like all truly great men," continued the preacher, "in the heart of the aged evangelist there was a warm place for the young. A wise German once said that the future of

wisdom."

German once said that the future of a community at any given time depended on the tastes and character of its young men under twenty-five. How important then that the tastes and character of our young men should be the very best.

What did the apostle mean when he said, "Ye are strong." In young manhood there is a three-fold nature. He is the body man, with full bodily powers. He is the mind man with will and feeling and thoughtlife. He is the spirit man with the power of receiving the communications of God and of communicating with God in his turn. And the young power of receiving the communications of God and of communicating with God in his turn. And the young man who is strong as God meanthim to be, has a strength expressing itself, as far as possible, in the completeness of physical life, as far as possible in the completeness of mental and emotional life, and as far as possible in the completeness of epiritual life. In the physical nature the young man's strength reveals itself in the lore of exercise and contests that test nerve and muscle, and in the reverent preservation of health. I confess, said the preacher, to an entire sympathy with the athletic sports of our time. The contests on the football and baseball field, on the ice, etc., and the training of the eye, the muscle and the self reliance acquired by those engaging in these contests should help to fit men for the more serious battles of life. Will the young men of to-day fulfil the hopes of their generation? Everything belongs to them. All paths to power converge at their feet. All doorways of opportunity fly open at their approach. The world grows weary of many things, but it shows an increasing fondness for young men. Let the rising generation assume the obligation of their position, and they can purchase deliverance from every social, Industrial and political evil if they will. 

NEWSPAPERS IN OUR SCHOOLS

A professor in a university in the United States evidently believes in the newspaper as an adjunct to the atudy of history. He refers to newspapers as the latest edition of history, and says that "accurate knowledge of current events as chronicled each day in the newspaper is fully as important as the daily lesson as-

signed from text books." The professor had college students in mind when he stated the value of newspapers, but the pupils of public schools also could profit much from keeping in constant touch with the daily press. It is quite possible that at no distant date a practice which exists in a few schools in regard to newspapers may be generally followed. That practice is to take a few minutes of each day for a talk between teacher and pupils about the events of the day.

The possibilities of such a course are far greater than many persons imagine. The real knowledge gained is important, but the great benefit is in training children to glean news from the printed page, to learn the habit of exact thinking, and to form a habit and desire for comparing past with present events. Too much of the present training of children gives them only rules and uninteresting facts. They learn that "Columbus discovered America in 1492" and many other facts which stand out in some respects isolated and uninteresting. With a short discussion each day of current events as told in the daily papers, the school children would find both present and past more interesting.

papers on the score of inaccuracy of news. That a certain inaccuracy exists none will deny, but it is the result of haste with which news must be gather d and not usually of the desire to mislead. When one consilers the speed with which the news of the whole world's events is gathered and placed before the eyes of the people, a certain amount of inaccuracy must be expected. # Believes Military Should Be Subordinate to Civil Authority.

Bombay, Nov. 18.—At a banquet given in his honor here last night, Lord Curzon of Kedleston, the retiring ate the situation without let rivering with the present ou let into the river. I have seen the water as high on Mr. Huft's farm before he purchased it as I have ever seen it since. He lived in the vicinity of Chatham some time previous to purchasing that farm, and must have known how the water declared on it and yet he Viceroy of India, made a frank avowal of the reasons for his resignation.

Beginning with the declaration that he considered the office of Viceroy the noblest in the gift of the British na-tion, and that it ought to be looked upon as a prize to be awarded only the water drained on it, and yet he bought it; and I should judge by the price asked for it to-day that it must to its greatest statesmen, he said it could not be supposed that he would without the strongest reasons resign a position which had been the dream rnswered.

# THE MORNING BATH.

Conditions Under Which It Should
Not Be Taken Cold.

Cold baths in the morning are undoubtedly beneficial, but only to those persons who have sufficient vital energy and nervous force to insure good reaction with no subsequent languor or lassitude. Many persons who are greatly refreshed by their morning bath feel tired or languid two or three hours after it. When this occurs it is conclusive evidence that the practice is harmful. evidence that the practice is harmful. Persons who have an abundance of blood and flesh, who are lymphatic or sluggish in temperament and whose nervous force is not depleted, can take a cold morning bath to advantage. Others who are inclined to be thin, whose hands and feet become cold and clammy on slight provocation, who digest food slowly and assimilate it with difficulty, who are nervous and who have much on their minds should avoid early morning cold bathing. For such the bath before retiring at night is recommended, as it should be followed by rest of brain and body till equable conditions of circulation are re-established. Some persons who are weak in nerve power have such excitable nerves that they get at once a perfect reaction from cold bathing, but lose in after effects more than the value of the bath. This class of individuals should not bathe too often and should always use tepid water, choosing the time preferably before retiring.


A Wonderful Memory.

Christiania, Nov. 18.—Preparations are being made to receive the new King and Queen of Norway (Prince and Princess of Denmark), whose formal election by the Norwegian Parliament to-day is a foregone conclusion.

The state entry into Christiania will occur Nov. 25. The vessel bearing King Charles V. and his consort, with its escort of Norwegian, Danish, British and German warships, will be met by a large fiotilla of steamers from all the coast towns, and will be conveyed to this port, where the first official and popular welcome of the new rulers will occur.

Norwegian Plebiscite.

Christiania, Nov. 18.—The final report of the plebiscite was that 259,563 votes were cast in favor of Prince Charles and 69,264 against him. A deputation conveying a formal offering of the throne to Prince Charles will leave to-day for Copenhagen.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 20.—After the severe reverse which they suffered early yesterday morning whell at the end of a seven-hour debate the Council of Workmen decided to abandon the in dustrial strike, the leaders of the ex-tremist Socialist factions of the St. dustrial strike, the leaders of the St. tremist Socialist factions of the St. Petersburg workmen Engaged in a hard and losing fight in defence of a resolution for an eight-hour day, which was the slogan of last week's strike, but which was abandoned at the last moment in favor of an appeal for the lives of the mutineers at Cronstadt and the liberty of Poland.

The strike, by ellenating public sympathy and opening the eyes of intelligent Liberals and Moderates, aided greatly in the reformation of the new "law and order party," which now has sprung into formidable being.

The railway strike was formally declared off Saturday, beginning at noon Monday.

Zemstvo is Meeting.

The members of the new party from all parts of the country, have gone there to make a fight in the congressional union of all the Conservative and Liberal elements to hold up the hands of Count Witte, to condemn the political strike and to

Half Vladivostock Burned.

Tokio, Nov. 20.—An eye-witness of the recent riot at Vladivostock, who has arrived at Nagasaki, reports that nearly half the city was burned and that 800 of the garrison were killed; that the jail was thrown open, and that Gen. Kappeek is missing. The damage is estimated at \$25,000,000. Soldlers from Harbin appear to have joined the rioters.

Jap Armies in China.

London, Nov. 20.—Chao Erh Heun, the Viceroy of Manchuria, has demanded information concerning the probable date of the departure of the Japanese troops from that part of the Chinese Empire, and the answer is that it is Japan's intention to recall her men with all possible expedition.

Showed Signs of Revolt.

Nagasaki, Nov. 20.—Five hundred Russian soldiers who were taken prisoners by the Japanese during the late war, and who are bound for Vladivostock on board the Russian volunteer fleet steamers Vladimir and Bornenji, have shown signs of mutiny. The Russian officers applied to the Japanese Government for troops, and a police officer and 100 constables boarded the Bornenji. Four Japanese torpedo boat destroyers surrounded the two vessels. Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky is on board the Bornenji.



166 of Them to Stand by Each Other in Trade Secrecy.

How the Public Were Bled-Rake-Off on Contracts, Same of Them as High as \$200, Paid to Members of the Association - Claiming a Customer-Hard to Get Supplies Under the Rules.

Toronto, Nov. 18.—At the opening of the trial of the Central Supply Co. of Canada, Limited, and the Master Plumbers' Association of Toronto, before Mr. Justice Clute, in the Criminal Assizes, yesterday, without a jury, on the indictment for conspiracy in restraining trade in plumbers' supplies, it was brought out that the master plumbers were bound by oath to pre-serve the secrecy of the doings of their association. The document was signed by 166 master plumbers.

The Understanding.

Thomas A. Stevens, manager of the Empire Manufacturing Co. of London, admitted that he was a member of the Supply Association and had been since its incorporation, and of the Central Supply Co., which was not incorporat-ed, and before that the Plumbers' Sup-ply Association. The books for these three associations were produced as having been found in the offices of

having been found in the offices of the present supply company's offices. "What was the written agreement between the Master Plumbers and the Supply Co.?" asked Mr. DuVernet. "There was no agreement of that kind that I know of," answered the witness. "Will you say there was no under-standing?"

standing?

"What was the understanding then?" "It was that if we supplied non-association master plumbers we were likely to lose the trade of the Master Plumbers. Our name would be struck off their list and they would buy sup-plies elsewhere."

Joseph Harrison, one of the dissent-

ing master plumbers, said that his joining the association caused a reduction in his business from \$121,000 in 1902 to \$82,000 in 1903. In the first year 35 per cent. of his work came from outside points, which was prevented by rules of the association.

Rake-Off System.

Harrison gave some instances of the Harrison gave some instances of the rake-off system practiced by the association. In the contract for the Clark Lithographing Co., all those tendering received "I.O.U.'s" for \$110; for the Guelph Sanitarium, four plumbers received "I.O.U.'s" for \$200; on the Isolation Hospital, fourteen plumbers got rake-offs of \$25; on the Annesley contract, ten plumbers got \$25 each; on the Nerlic's house fourteen men got \$15. Nerlick house fourteen men got \$15 each; plumber got \$150 on the Dignum, Moneypenny building. These were only a few of the instances cited.

In describing the customer claims,

The whole outfit was completely demolished, and Hooker himself thrown into the disch. When picked up he was unconscious.

It appeared that he had been shot in the heart with a shotgun and that death had been instantaneous.



# 100 LIVES WERE LOST

Marine Disaster Off French Coast Sunday Morning.

Steamer Hilda Struck a Rock During Storm and Foundered Near St. Malo-First Word Said the Passen gers Were All Frenchmen, But Later Despatches Includes Several English People in List of Victims.

London, Nov. 20 .- The Southwestern London, Nov. 20.—The Southwestern R. R. s cross channel steamer Hilda foundered off the French coast yesterdey morning with a loss of more than 100 persons on board. The Hilda left Southampton Friday night for St. Malo on the north coast of France. The crew numbered 26, and there were about 100 passengers all Frenchmen, the major ity being onion dealers from St. Bria

Few Available Particulars.

A telegram from St. Servin, adjoining the town of St. Malo, gives the few par-leulars yet available. The Hilda par leulars yet available. The Hilda was near St. Malo Saturday morning delayed by a fog and bad weather. She struck the rocks at 4 o'clock Sun-day morning in the roadstead off the

Island of Cezambre. Island of Cezambre.

The majority of the crew and passengers were asleep at the time. Two boats were lowered, one of which, containing five men, arrived at St. Servin. The second boat was picked up empty at St. Cast, where 13 bodies were washed ashore. The top of the Hilde's funnel and her mast are visible at low tide according to a telegram from St. tide according to a telegram from St

The Hilda was built at Glasgow in 1882, and registered 848 tons. She was a screw steamer of iron construction, and was 235 feet in length

and was 235 feet in length.

English People Drown.

St. Malo, France, Nov. 20.—The exact number of lives lost on the Hilda is unknown here. It is understood that there are about twenty first-class passengers, including several English people. Among the latter were Hon. Mrs Butler, sister of Lord Lanesborough and Col. Follet. Though it is not cer and Col. Foliet. Though it is not cer-tain that these actually were on board, they were expected to travel by the Hida, and it is known that all the first-class passengers were drowned. These passengers were English officers and others who were coming to rejoin their

families or to spend the season at St. Malo and Dinard (opposite St. Malo.)

It appears to be certain that only six were saved, these being five onion sellers and an English seaman named Grinter, belonging to Guernsey, and that the total on board, including the crew, numbered 105.

A Treacherous Reef.

The disaster was first suspected through the washing ashore of a body, and the port authorities immediately sent out a tug. It was then learned that the Hilda was wrecked an a treach-erous reef close to the Island of Cezam-bre, called Les Porte,
She apparently had struck, broken

her back, and immediately sunk, leaving no time to launch the boats. The Jardin light is quite close to the spot. It cannot yet be explained at what time, or how, the disaster occurred. The entrance to St. Malo is dangerous, the currents and rocks needing the exercise of considerable caution at all times.

AWFUL LOSS OF LIFE.

39 Men In Glasgow Imprisoned by Flames and Suffocated.

Glasgow, Nov. 20.—The most terrible fire that has occurred in Great Britain for many years broke out here yesterday morning in a cheap lodging-house for men in Watson street, and resulted in the loss of thirty-nine lives and the severe injury of many others. The flames were first noticed at 6

o'clock in the morning on the fourth floor of the building, which was occu-pied by 330 men. An alarm was raised and the firemen were speedily in attendance, but flames and smoke were

tendance, but names and showe were then issuing from most of the windows on the fourth floor. An extraordinary scene was created by a procession of almost naked men issuing from the door of the building, and against their frantic efforts to es-cape the firemen had actually to fight

for admission. Reaching the upper floors the fire men found that the narrow passages were becoming congested with men who dropped to the floor overcome by

Fire on One Floor Only. Fortunately the fire was confined to the fourth floor, and as soon as the firemen were able to get to work it was speedily extinguished. The flames had been fed by the wooden partition of the cubicles, which threw off vol-umes of smoke, resulting in the suffo-cation of the immates. Many being brought to the street, rallied in a few minutes, but others had to be taken to

the hospitals.

The dead were mostly workmen in the prime of life. They presented a horrible spectacle, their blackened faces bearing evidence of terrible strug

gles to escape.

By 10 o'clock a search of the building was made, and a complete list of the victims obtained, which showed that thirty-nine were dead and thirty two injured.

Child's Awful Death.

Amherstburg, Nov. 20.—During the absence from the house of her mother, six-year-old Corine Martin in some way set her clothing on fire, there being no one in the house except smaller children. Assis ance was not given the child until she was so terribly burn-ed that the fiesh literally fell from the bones. She died two hours later.

SUNK IN SHAM FIGHT.

German Torpedo Boat Goes Down Before Cruiser With One Officer and Thirty-Two Men.

Kiel, Nov. 20.—The torpedo boat "S"-126 was in collision Friday night near Buelk with the small German cruises Undine. The torpedo boat sank, and one officer and thirty-two of her sea-men are missing. The disaster occur-red during the manoeuvres in the Kiel

Helmsman Confused. A torpedo division was makin attack upon the Undine, which

blinded her lights. Later she suddenbinded her lights. Later she sudden yused her searchlight, which confused the helmsman of the "S"-126, and the torpedo boat got under the Undine's bow and was struck amidships, causing her boiler to explode. The suddenness

bow and was struck amidships, causing her boiler to explode. The suddenness of the catastrophe explains the great number of victims.

All Killed or Drowned.

It is believed that all the missing members of the crew were killed or drowned. Several wounded officers were rescued. The accident occurred in the midst of a blinding snowstorm, and the night was very dark. The torpedo boat sank in four minutes.

Two Men Were Killed.

Belleville, Nov. 20.—A double fatality occurred in the station yard here about 7 o'clock Saturday. Both men were instantly killed, Dick's head being completely severed from his body. Dick was a married man and leaves a widow and three children. Wrennick was single.
