



LOST IN ATLAS LOAN CO

Effort to Conceal Old Loss in

Losing Venture In Atlas Loan Debentures Resulted In Odd Agreement and Peculiar Transactions Afterwards-Manager Woods Rebuked by Commissioner For Unsatisfactory Replies-A Little Speculation.

Toronto, June 23.—From the evidence taken in connection with the affairs of the Continental Life before the Insurance Commission yesterday merning, it appears that the company lost over \$20,000 through the failure of the Atlas Loan Co. Mr. Wallace, manager of the St. Thomas concern, was a director of the insurance company, and got the other members of the management to purchase debentures and make describe with the Atlas Loan At the leposits with the Atlas Loan. At the deposits with the Atlas Loan. At the time of the failure, these amounted to about \$45,000, of which a deposit of \$15,000 was secured by Metropolitan Bank stock furnished by Mr. Ames. The Continental Life has received 37 per cent, of the remainder in dividends.

Does Not Show On Books. Part of this loss does not show on the books, however, as Mr. Somers, now vice-president, took over the debentures and paid for them, but the company agreed to make good any amount he might lose on the transaction.

At 10.30 o'clock Mr. Geo. B. Wood, general madager of the Continental Life Insurance Co., went into the witness-box. Mr. Tilley took up the his-

ness-box. Mr. Tilley took up the history of the company since it took over the Farmers' and Traders' Life Insurance Co. The amalgamation took place in 1900; both companies had done business for several years previously.

Candid About Rebating.

Mr. Wood was very candid in his evidence regarding rebates. He said that many agents gave rebates amounting to 40 or 50 per cent. of the premiums. As their commission was 65 per cent. they had about 15 to 25 per cent. of the commission left. The per cent. of the commission left. The agents were giving away as much as 77 per cent. of their commissions. The witness declared that the giving of such rebates was a very common prac-

Mr. Tilley wanted to know if rebates Mr. Tilley wanted to know it rebates were ever given at head office. The witness said if business could be secured by rebating, the head office did not refuse the offer.

Mr. Wood said that the business of

the Continental Life cost 120 per cent. of the first year's premiums.

A Speculation.

The examination of Mr. Wood was continued at the afternoon session.

The Continental Life wrote a twenty-car and example of the specific spec year endowment policy for \$30,000 on the life of W. H. Murch, president of the Atlas Loan, St. Thomas. The beneficiary was the Atlas Loan Co., and the premium was \$1,347.50, to be paid by debentures of Atlas Loan Co. so long

as they were worth par on the bond market. market.
Witness said that the whole transaction was a little speculation on the part of Mr. Wallace, who received 40 per cent on the first premium. The liquidator of the Atlas Loan afterwards surrendered the policy and it was paid in Atlas debentures, that is, the company surrendered it to themselves.

Mr. Wood admitted that the transaction was a species of rebating. All the company got was the interest.

The Somers transaction of Atlas debentures was then dissected.

The Salary Liet.

Mr. Tilley then took up the salary lists. Mr. Wood had a contract. In 1901 he received \$2,000, in 1903 \$2,250, in 1904 \$2,500, in 1905 \$2,750, in 1906 \$3,000, and he has also a contract for next five years at an average of \$5,000 per year. The city council has unanimously declared that the massacre was not the result of race hatred, but was due to provocation, and the troops and police participated in the outrages. The reports that Jews and revolution attacked the inhabitants are false."




