The Board of Trade will hold a Citizen's Meeting in the Pastime Hall on Tuesday, April 9th at 8 P. M. when the names of the successful competitors in the essay competition on "How to Care For Our Trees" will be announced and the prizes awarded.

At the same meeting, the final report of the Agricultural Section of the Board of Trade will be made in reference to the land allotment and labor inventory for Kentville and the surrounding district.

The very wide spread and deep interest manifested by the pupils of Kentville School in the preparation of the essay "How to Care For Our Trees" has been most gratifying. There have been upward of forty submitted and many are of a very high order. The members of the Committee are now busily engaged in a carefully scrutiny of the various contributions in order that the prizes offered may be fairly awarded.

The members of the Agricultural Section of the Board of Trade have been applying themselves very strenuously to the task of securing a labor inventory of the Town and in obtaining particulars of vacant land suitable for increased production purposes. A great deal of most valuable information has been compiled, the details of which should prove intensely interesting to every citizen.

The fact cannot be disputed that the ultimate success of our armies and those of our allies in the present great struggle is dependant agricultural on an abundant agricultural crop in North America in 1918, and every individual must, therefore, labor to the utmost, to save, and produce.

LATEST WAR DISPATCHES.

News Now Coming is Assuring of Final Victory for Allies.

The Easter season has passed with some of the dark cloud lifted from the scenes of the great conflict at arms. Heavy fighting still goes on along a wide western front and the Germans are still throwing all their might into the impact, but the British and French line now holds.

CANADIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY.

The War Charities Act As it Applies To The Work Of The Canadian Red Cross Society.

1. Under this Act no appeal for funds may be made nor entertainment given to raise funds or materials for any kind of war relief except by organization which are (a) incorporated under either the Federal or a Provincial Government and also registered under the War Charities Act of 1917 or (b) by such unregistered societies as have received written permission from some registered war charity to raise funds.

2. The Canadian Red Cross Society is an incorporated and registered War Charity under the Act, and it is not necessary for either Provincial or Local Branches of the Society to register under the new Act, nor to submit any statements of accounts other than those called for by the Constitution of the Red Cross Society, but it is now absolutely essential that each Local Branch wishing to register under the new Act, should carry out the following regulations demanded by the new Act:—

(1). Keep careful accounts with receipts and vouchers for all expenditures;

(2). Have these accounts audited;

(3). Furnish this audited financial statement to the Provincial Branch, as requested once a year. This is essential in order that the Society's Annual Statement to the Government may be based upon a complete return from each Branch.

(4). Keep Minutes of all meetings;

3. Organizations which are not themselves incorporated and registered or are not Branches of such registered societies may only collect or hold entertainments for war relief purposes if they have obtained the written permission of each registered war relief society for which they desire to raise funds or material.

The right to grant such permits for the Red Cross rests with each Local Chartered Branch of the Red Cross Society within the area covered by its Charter. In areas not covered by Local Branches, the Provincial Branch has the power to give permits, and in a Province where there is no Provincial Branch, the Central Executive Committee of the Society, shall exercise this right. Only Chartered Branches of the Red Cross Society (Local and Provincial) or the Central Executive can grant permits. No auxiliaries or other societies have the right to grant permits in the name of the Red Cross Society.

In order to understand the workings of the War Charities Act, a careful study should be made of the Act with the Regulations and Forms and Foreword. The Society is printing a Form of Permit to be issued by Chartered Branches to unregistered Societies desiring to raise funds for the Red Cross. A duplicate copy of each Permit issued by a Branch should be lodged with the Local Chief of Police to guide the Police in the enforcement of the Act.

Although this Act was not passed at the instance of the Red Cross Society, there is no doubt that its action will tend to protect the public from appeals in the name of the Society which result in no benefit accruing to the Society's work.
