An act passed at the last session of the Ontario Legislature makes it obligatory on all hotel-keepers to provide fire escapes for their buildings. To ensure progress for their guests in case of fire. The act came in force on November 1st, and all hotel-keepers would do well to observe its provisions and save consequent damage and the risk of a heavy fine, should an accident happen through the non-observance of this law.

THE CHEESE MARKETS.
Special to Reporters.]
BROCKVILLE, Nov. 27.—Since our last report there has been a continued strong enquiry for strictly fine goods, especially September make, for which there is an unusually strong market. It has been generally refused by the holders of this class of goods. Our factory men should make a careful note of this, and govern themselves so as to produce only strictly fine goods, for which there is always a good market. There is plenty of room for improvement in this direction—improvement which is imperative if we would continue to hold our present good position in the cheese markets of the world. Cables, private and public, have been containing a note in fact the whole position has a healthy look. This of course makes the gentlemen interested in the industry feel cheerful.

FARMERS INSTITUTE AT LYN.
Annual Meeting of the Brockville District Farmers Institute.
The annual meeting of the Institute will be held at Lyn on the 7th of December, when meetings will be held in the old M. E. Church at 1 p.m. and 7 p.m.
The Directors have secured the services of Prof. Robertson, of Guelph Agricultural College, who will deliver addresses at both meetings.
Discussions on interesting topics will be led by the following gentlemen: Messrs D. Nichol, Kingston; F. H. McCrea, D. Derbyshire and Howard Bissell Brockville; W. H. McNish Lyn; Jas. Miller, Spencerville; Jas. Bissell, Algonquin; F. L. Moore, Addison, and others.
The B. & W. will convey passengers to and from the meeting at one fare for the round trip.
The ladies are especially invited to be present at the evening meeting, at which music will be provided to enliven the proceedings.
MAGISTRATES' COURT.
Paying dear for Passing Through a Toll Gate.—A Wage Case.
A bench of magistrates were engaged nearly all the afternoon on Saturday last hearing and adjudging upon a couple of cases brought before them. Both cases were laid before Geo. P. Wright, J. P., who associated with him the other members of the bench, Fortune and Lovin.
The first case called was that of P. M. Munro, v. Alex Judd. Defendant was charged with passing through toll gate No. 2, on the Farmersville and Brockville road.
Mr. Munro, on being called and sworn, said that on the 24th of last month the defendant passed through his toll gate in the morning. He said he would pay the toll, but the collector would not receive his money, but would only accept a note. He gave four cents., which paid for one way only.
Mr. Munro, recalled: His wife told him that Judd would only pay for one way.
The defendant was allowed to testify in his own behalf, and said: "I think I gave Mrs. Munro ten cents, and she gave me back two cents change."
After deliberation, the court fined Judd \$4 and costs, amounting in all to \$8.25.
The next case on the docket was that of Chas. Pratt v. Wm. Shook. Mr. Pratt appeared for the plaintiff and Mr. Green for the defendant. The case was brought to recover balance of wages claimed to be due.
The plaintiff, on being sworn, deposed that he agreed to work for defendant at the rate of \$8 a month, washing, mending and making included. He worked two months and two days, when Shook told him he might leave, as he had been telling lies about him. He tried to get a settlement, but could not. He had received in "cash, clothing, tobacco, &c." the sum of \$23.50.
Shook presented a counter claim for horse hire, and for damages done to property, such as breaking an axle, a wagon tongue, horse straps, scythes, &c., the whole amounting to \$2.80.
The bench found the task of unravelling the tangled skein of evidence a difficult one, but finally decided to allow deft. \$4 for horse hire, and to throw out the other items, and to ground that plaintiff was in deft.'s employ when the breakages occurred, and as

the defence had not established to the satisfaction of the justices that the articles were broken through willful neglect, the plt. should not be obliged to pay for them. Judgment for deft. for \$12.80 and costs, or \$15.75 in all.
