THE SHARON SENSATION

Mrs. Evans and Her Fellow Prisoners Committed to Stand Trial.

EVIDENCE OF THE WITNESSES
Looks Very Black Against the Accused Trio—Maggie Reid's Evidence Corroborated by Another Witness—Trial at Next Assizes.

Tonorrow, Feb. 9.—The trial of the accused trio in the case of alleged poisoning, in which an attempt was made to have made on the life of Water Evans, a hotel-keeper at Sharon, by his wife, his hostess, named Osmen, and a young man named Pegg, came up in the County Court house here yesterday.

The first witness to give evidence in the case was Maggie Reid, a servant girl. Her evidence was of a decidedly sensational nature. She had heard Pegg tell Mrs. Evans that the only way now left was to try the stuff in question. She saw a letter that Mrs. Evans had written to her, and she had also seen Pegg's reply, which stated that he could not get the stuff in the city without being found out, and that he would go to George Bradford or Mount Albert Osmen had been sent to Bradford town.

All of the girl Reid's evidence was of a most startling and damaging character as existing between Evans and his wife and the suspicious relations the young man Pegg had with Mrs. Evans.

The three prisoners were then committed to stand their trial at the next assizes.

EMPEROR AND CZAR.
They Are on Friendly Terms and Both Wish for Peace.

BELLEVILLE, Feb. 8.—The members of the Reichstag who attended the Parliamentary banquet given on Monday night by Charles Feggs and George Osmen, was most damaging to the accused trio.

After Maggie Reid had finished her story of the doings at the Evans house, Dr. Lewis H. Campbell, of Bradford, gave his testimony. His evidence corroborated the statements already published. George Osmen had purchased 30 grains of strychnine on December 26 and 20 grains on January 4, saying that he wanted to poison some foxes with it.

After a number of other witnesses were examined, all going to damage the accused, Mrs. Evans was put on the stand, after which the Crown rested its case.

The three prisoners were then committed to stand their trial at the next assizes.

THE GEORGETOWN AFFAIR.
Walter Campbell Charged With Feigning an Inquest on His Brother's Death.

GEORGETOWN, Feb. 10.—On the morning of the 10th inst. a grand jury was sworn at the residence of George Kennedy, J.P., by Alexander Campbell charging Walter Campbell with feigning an inquest on the death of his brother, Walter Campbell, who was killed by a train on the 10th inst.

A warrant was issued for Walter's arrest. So far he cannot be found, but he is believed to be in the city.

Several others, who have been mentioned in the case, will be summoned for disordered conduct. Next week will be unusually lively and the magistrates are preparing for heavy work.

The authorities are bound to stamp out all lawlessness, and those who cannot show clearness of mind in living will be driven out of the town or take the consequences.

FROM NOVA SCOTIA.
Bill Introduced to Have a Plebiscite Taken at the Coming General Elections.

HALIFAX, N.S., Feb. 8.—In the House of Assembly yesterday Premier Fielding introduced a bill for taking a plebiscite on the subject of the local general elections, which will be held in the month of June.

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DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Called for the Despatch of Business on March 15.

SEPARATE SCHOOL BALLOTS.
United Canada in Favor of a Measure to be Submitted to the Ontario Legislature—Name of the Latest Cabinet Session.

OTTAWA, Feb. 12.—Parliament has been called for despatch of business for Thursday, March 15, by which time it is expected that the sub-committee on the tariff will have finished its labors and prepared such changes as it is intended to submit to Parliament. The Government has decided that there will be no change this time in cabinet.

OTTAWA, Feb. 12.—It is being freely asserted that a bill will be introduced at the next meeting of the Ontario legislature providing for the ballot in Separate Schools elections. United Canada, the Catholic paper here, says that to deny the merits of the ballot system in school matters would be equivalent almost to denying the franchise to men who would be free, in matters of state. The subject should be the sentiment of the state, but the crown should be the guardian of the subject. It concludes by saying: "We are for the ballot."

Mr. Justice Burbridge of the Exchequer Court, has made an order for the examination of the plaintiffs in a suit entered by E. C. Gilbert & Sons, of Montreal, against the Government of Canada, for the recovery of \$300,000. Gilbert & Sons were contractors for the making of a channel in the Galopie Rapids, in the city of Montreal, and they claim to be entitled to a refund of the sum of the original contract for the work for a fourteen-foot channel, although it would, of course, be somewhat increased, because a seventeen-foot depth was afterwards called for.

La Patrie, of Montreal, says it has it from Ottawa, on pretty good authority, that Sir Charles H. Tupper will be appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba.

DR. DOUGLAS DEAD.
The Well-Known Methodist Divine Succumbs to His Illness.

MONTREAL, Feb. 12.—Rev. Dr. Douglas died on Saturday afternoon. Two weeks ago his feet were amputated and this superinduced death.

Probably the best known figure in Methodist circles in Canada was Rev. Dr. Douglas. The veteran lost his sight early in life, and he had been blind for many years. He was a devoted man, and his death is a great loss to the church.

Some two years ago Dr. Douglas created a great sensation by his adverse criticism of the selection of Sir John Thompson as Premier. The Toronto Standard, a Montreal paper, was the organ of his criticism, and he was divided as to the address regarding this matter, but the rev. doctor's delivery, although it would, of course, be somewhat increased, because a seventeen-foot depth was afterwards called for.

Dr. Douglas was a Scotchman by birth and was born in 1825. He entered the Methodist ministry in Canada in 1849 and was ordained in 1851. During his ministry he was stationed at Toronto, Hamilton and Montreal, occupying the pulpits of nearly all the leading Methodist churches.

He was elected president of the general conference of the Methodist Church in 1879, and was also for many years chairman of the Montreal conference.

FIVE THIEVES CAPTURED.
MONTREAL, Feb. 12.—Five thieves, Gross & Liberech's for store, 34 St. Henri street, was broken into on Friday night, and two men have been arrested for the crime. Mr. Moise Bastien, who lives over the store, was awakened by the noise and came down to the corresponding men in the night. He appeared with bundles under his arm.

He called the police, and Constable McGee arrested the five thieves, who were living in Herminie street, and were taken to Detective O'Keefe. The latter traced footprints in the snow from the store to the house of the thieves, who were taken to the police station.

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
