

One Way of Saving Money.

 There are a great many ways of saving money in this world. And according to some people all methods which accomplish this end are excellent. I beg to disagree. I know one woman who most certainly saves money, and yet I do not admire or envy her. I said I knew one woman. I thought of her because she happens to be a most flagrant example of the type. Actually I know a great many people who save money in a way I don't admire, and undoubtedly you also count them among your acquaintance. The prime necessity for conducting this kind of saving successfully is to have a purse that is not easily gotten at. One of these clever economizers happens to go to town with you. The conductor comes around for the fares and she begins to hunt for her pocket-book. She has difficulty either in finding it or opening it, and of course you have paid the conductor while she is struggling. At that her protests are as eager as her search was not. Sometimes she even backs them by trying to get you to accept a nickel, but when you refuse she gives in with a resignation which is beautiful to see. If you go shopping with this thrifty person you cannot help observing that she has no trouble whatever in locating her purse when she wishes to make some personal purchase, but the difficulty promptly re-occurs when it is a case of getting soda checks. Again, this is the type of person who economizes by not having a telephone and self-sacrificingly contents herself by borrowing yours. You grant her the use of it with all alacrity, remembering the time when you also did not have that necessity of life, but you cannot help wishing that she were not so economical as to omit to settle for her pay calls. This kind of person seldom wastes a penny buying a newspaper. She thinks it is terrible to fritter away money in things like that. So, instead, she lets her companion buy the paper and offer her half of it. Or she reads over her neighbour's shoulder, or picks up the paper which someone who could not afford to buy it half so well as she, had left in the car. If a theatre party or some other excursion is proposed, "dutch treat," this is the type of person who never offers to advance the money for the tickets. Instead she lets you advance it, and then either delays payment a few months or forgets it altogether. I have said "she" all the time because I am more familiar with the feminine economizer, but I am sure the class is not made up entirely of females. Probably any of my masculine readers could tell me of the male economizer whose tobacco pouch is always empty when it is possible to accept a smoke from someone else. Yes, economy is a grand thing, and we couldn't get along without thrifty folks. Household Notes.
 The best pieces of meat for roasting are the ribs, sirloin and pinbone. Put a piece of ice in the room in which a patient with a high fever is lying; it will prove a boon to the sufferer. Bread will cut thinner and in more even slices if you turn the loaf upside-down. Eucalyptus oil will remove grease, including machine oil, from any fabric without injury. When the enamel on gas stoves becomes discoloured, scour it with a damp flannel dipped in garden soil. When making desserts, allow one heaping tablespoonful of granulated sugar to each egg and half a pint of milk. To remove the unpleasant odor from the hands after peeling onions, rub them with salt and wash in cold water. White of an egg will clean fly specks from gilt frames or mouldings. Apply the white of egg with a camel's hair brush. A very good way to singe chickens is to hold them over a saucer of burning alcohol. There is no soot left then on the flesh. One and a half teaspoonfuls of baking powder to one pint of sifted flour is a good rule to follow for biscuits or shortcakes. One large tablespoonful of white flour and one large tablespoonful of butter, blended, will thicken half a pint of milk or water sauces. Sweet oil will remove hot water marks from Japanese trays. Rub it well until the marks disappear, then polish the tray with flour and a soft cloth. Paint can be removed from clothing by saturating the spots two or three times with salt and wash in cold water.

times with equal parts of ammonia and turpentine, then wash out in soap-suds. Place new gloves between the folds of a damp towel for an hour before being worn. They are much easier to put on; the damp makes the kid more pliable. Cabbage should never be boiled longer than thirty minutes, for when the time is lengthened, the leaves lose their tender crispness and become soft and dark colored. Lamb, if fresh, should be of a bright red color, with white fat. It should be used within three days after killing. It is unwholesome if not thoroughly cooked. A good method to save fuel is to do many things with one fire. On washing days there must be of necessity a good fire, so cook as much as possible on that day. Kitchen utensils made of wood may be kept clean and white by rubbing with soap and lukewarm water to which is added a little common soda or household ammonia. After embroidered sheets and pillow cases have become worn, the monogram may be cut out in a circle and used again by neatly featherstitching it on the new material. To clean a soiled lace yoke in a silk or cloth dress, rub powdered starch into the lace; let it lie several hours and then brush it out. The starch absorbs the grease and dust. Perch, brook trout, catfish and all small fish are best fried. These small fish should swim twice, once in water and once in hot fat. The fat should be boiling hot before putting the fish in. Golfers, after a hard day outdoors, often suffer from tired feet. They will get great relief if they rub the feet with equal parts of lemon juice and alcohol well blended together.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram: WASHINGTON, Sept. 6. A letter from Foreign Secretary Grey to the Gateshead Chamber of Commerce, regarding the Government's attitude towards the Panama legislation, is looked upon as an indication that negotiations between the two countries are on a financial basis, his argument being that British shipping is to be burdened with an undue proportion of charges for the maintenance of the Canal through the now complete exemption from tolls of American coastwise shipping. Prof. Johnson, special commissioner on Panama traffic and tolls, estimates that the whole American coastwise traffic likely to pass through will be about a million tons, or 10 per cent. of the total tonnage, for 1915 and 1916. In the course of five years, it is estimated that this will increase, but foreign commerce will do so also in proportion. This would indicate that British and Foreign commerce would have to bear an additional 10 per cent. burden. It is pointed out, however, that a proportionate share must be borne by American ships in the foreign trade, which would be on an equality with British ships. Professor Johnson declares that the only possibility for the Canal to get a fair share of the world's trade is to place the tolls at a figure actually lower than the Suez Canal's. These are now \$1.25 a ton. A flat dollar rate is suggested for the first few years. Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, Sept. 6. Sir Edward Grey wrote nothing regarding the financial side of the question in the Gateshead letter. He simply said that the British Government was making representations to Washington. An official correction was published to-day, the newspapers stating that the statements were merely the comments of the Secretary of the Gateshead Chamber of Commerce. Special to Evening Telegram, LONDON, Sept. 6. A deputation of Welsh Americans promoting an international Eisteddfod at Pittsburgh next year, called on Mr. Lloyd George and invited him to attend. The Chancellor agreed to consider the matter if a more convenient date than July 4th could be arranged. He said that nothing would give him greater pleasure than to talk the Welsh tongue to his fellow-countrymen in America. Special Evening Telegram, TORONTO, Sept. 6. England's first team of Cadet riflemen carried off all the laurels in the individual match for Lord Roberts' championship medal, their men annexing the first four places on the list of prize-winners. Cadet Knight made the highest score, winning the medal. Special to Evening Telegram, CHARLESTON, Virginia, Sept. 6. Every company of the West Virginia State Militia has been ordered back to the Kanawha coal fields, where Governor Glasscock declared martial law on Tuesday. The conditions throughout the strike zone are declared to be critical. Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, Sept. 6. The Daily Express prints an attack upon Lloyd George's tax-collecting methods by giving a list of fifty millionaires of his party now untaxed. Amongst them are Lord Pirrie, Cowdray, Abercromby, St. Leger, Brassy, and De Forest. Special Evening Telegram, MEXICO CITY, Sept. 6. A rear-end collision on the Mexican Central Railway resulted in the death of twelve passengers and the injury of four. Among the dead are Division Superintendent Chritzberg, his wife, and five children. Special Evening Telegram, STEVENAGE, Sept. 6. Capt. Hamilton and Lieut. Stewart of the British Army, lost their lives to-day, while flying. The wind caused the bi-plane to collapse at an altitude of 250 feet. Special Evening Telegram, WINNIPEG, Sept. 6. Manitoba's harvest operations are at a standstill, on account of wet weather. There are fears as to the effect on the crops. Special to Evening Telegram, MUNICH, Sept. 6. A German military aviator was killed this morning. Patients Discharged. Nurse Osbourne, who was indisposed at the Signal Hill Hospital with smallpox, was released yesterday. Nurse Osbourne contracted the disease while nursing the Bennett family, who have also recovered. Constable Nugent, who had been on guard for two months at the above institution carrying out the quarantine laws his resumed duty in the city. At present there is not a single case of smallpox in the city or outposts.

People Are Disgusted.

We publish to-day an interesting letter from "Watchman" on the failure of the Morris Administration to keep the pledge of the Tory party to make it easier for people to live by a reduction of taxation. This promise was made in the Manifesto published nearly four years ago. It is signed "E. P. Morris," dated "St. John's, Oct. 3, 1908," and contains the following paragraphs:—

"REDUCTION OF TAXATION, so that it will bear equitably on the working classes, can be best accomplished by placing on the free list such items as tea, sugar, pork, and the other prime necessities of our people on which very heavy taxes are now imposed. That this can be easily accomplished without in any way affecting the necessary revenue required to maintain the various public services of the Colony is shown by the fact that nearly \$100,000 has been collected annually for the past eight years over and above what was required to meet the demands of the public services."

COAL AND PEAT.
"The serious situation created by the present price of coal is so far-reaching, touching as it does every fire-side in the colony, as well as every industry, that it has become a nation-

dence of the increases in taxation falls on the very articles which can bear them least.

It is notorious that prices have increased everywhere and there is an outcry on both sides of the Atlantic against the hardships of increased prices.

In Newfoundland the hardship is intensified by the addition of increased taxation to the increased invoice prices.

Under these circumstances, the Government should have given relief even if they had not pledged themselves to do so in their manifesto. But they have not done it, although pledged to do it. They have not done it, although four Budgets have been presented to the Legislature under financial conditions which were highly favourable to carrying out the policy. The Government has preferred to continue the exactions. The Government has preferred to continue the extortions of heavy taxes, and to hoard of surpluses, and to riot in wanton waste.

As to the coal situation it is much worse than it ever was before, and no means has been found for effecting a reduction in the price of coal. Sir Edward Morris solemnly promised that "if elected, we shall take steps to bring about such a result." Instead of bringing about such a result, we find the price of coal is much higher than it was when Sir Edward Morris took over the Government. People may groan about the high prices of the necessities of life, they may be cold because coal is too high to get enough to keep them warm, and they may be exasperated at the extravagant expenditure of public money, and all the comfort they get is the assurance from those who are batten- ing on public monies, that all is well and things were never so prosperous as they are to-day. People who feel the pinch of high taxes know the difference.

Four sessions of the Legislature have been held since the issue of this Manifesto, and items such as tea, sugar, pork and the other prime necessities of our people have not yet been placed on the free list, and the heavy taxes are still imposed on these articles. Nay more, as we have frequently pointed, and as is emphasized in "Watchman's" letter, the taxation on many articles is much heavier now than it used to be. On many articles the taxation is collected on the invoice value of the article imported, at some percentage of that value. If the invoice value of an article has doubled in price, the amount of taxation on that article is doubled. If the invoice value of an article has increased fifty per cent, the taxation exacted goes up fifty per cent. If the invoice value of an article has increased twenty-five per cent, then twenty-five per cent more taxation is taken by the Government. In this respect the system is most iniquitous, because the burden of the taxation is increased when it can be borne with the greatest difficulty, and the inci-

Reduction in Cable Tolls.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.
The newspapers publish an official announcement from the British Post Office, the substance of which is as follows. As a result of representations made to the Western Union Telegraph Company by the Postmaster-General of Great Britain and the Postmaster-General of Canada, the following additional reductions will be made at an early date in cable rates: (1) For telegrams in plain language, the present deferred rate of sixpence per word will be reduced to four and one-half pence, and besides these telegrams instead of being subject to a delay of 24 hours will be transmitted without any more delay than what is necessary to give priority to ordinary traffic at one shilling per word; (2) Another rate of night telegrams is inaugurated at a charge of three shillings for twelve words and two and a half pence for each additional word; (3) There is at present in existence a rate of one shilling for thirty words and one shilling for each additional group of five words for week-end cable letters, handed in up to Saturday for delivery for the following Tuesday. This arrangement is replaced by the following rate of four shillings and sixpence for 24 words and five cents for every additional word, but the time of delivery is Monday instead of Tuesday as before.

CHINAMEN ON BOARD.—The S. S. Amelia which came here yesterday from Sydney, is now discharging coal at Crosbie's. Among her crew are 9 Chinamen, firemen and sailors. They have to pay a head tax of \$300 to land here and the police are now guarding the ship.



Why Who's Who

We rise to hang a floral wreath on the bulbous brow of Thomas A. Edison, whose name will be familiar to many of our readers who buy electricity by the short watt. Mr. Edison is one of the best and most fertile inventors this country has ever produced. He formed the habit in early youth, and is now well fixed and able to take his meals out.

Mr. Edison was born in Milan, Ohio, which had been invented only a short time before and is still where he left it. He began life as a train boy, and sold unexpurgated literature and the plastic gum drop with great success. But he was not satisfied. Something within him, which has been bothering him ever since, impelled him on and led him to become a telegraph operator, when he first came in contact with the kind of electricity which creates head-end collisions.

After Mr. Edison had learned the Morse alphabet so that he could tell a dash from a semi-colon, his inventive genius began to break out faster than a fat boy with the measles. Whenever he wanted something that nobody else had thought of, he would invent it and then cry "Eureka" after having it patented in several different languages. Most of Mr. Edison's patents are still doing business at the old stand.

Mr. Edison gets along on less sleep than any of our inventors except those who are being sued for infringement. Some days he won't do any inventing at all, to speak of, and then again Genius will seize him by the neck hair and cause him to throw off a new storage battery or a self-dumping coffee mill. He sleeps with a pencil over his left ear and a tablet under the pillow, thus making it impossible for any meritorious invention to get away.

Leave the People Burdened With Heavy Taxation.

Dear Sir,—Three years have passed and the country looks in vain for the promised blessings which were to come to its people under the Tory rule. Three years have passed and the people find that it is impossible to bear up against the heavy taxation of food and clothing. Three years have passed and although we as a people have worked incessantly, have toiled day after day and economized in every conceivable way, and yet none of us working people can feel the touch of independence that was promised us under the People's Party rule. Their extravagance has made it impossible to reduce taxation, and although the cost of the bare necessities of life has increased, yet the Tories drag from us the high ad valorem duty on the clothing we wear and the food we consume. Our public debt is accumulating in leaps and bounds and our credit in England has been so impaired that we find Sir Edward Morris having to pay an abnormal interest on the money raised to go ahead with his lasso of railway building, most of which is of a nature that is entirely useless and nothing more than a rain-bow to attract the people for a time to the subject of having to seek Confederation on whatever terms are offered.

Morris's wet nurse in the Chronicle is out night after night trying to boost his Tory masters, but his writing lacks the enthusiasm of a man who believes in what he is doing out to the people, for everyone knows that McGrath believes the present pack of graballs to be the worst gang that ever assumed control of the Government of this Colony. Morrison and Piccott, Crosbie and other members of the Tory Party stand to-day in an unenviable position in the public view and this being the case one cannot but feel indignant that such men should have the impertinence to again appeal to the people and ask for a renewal of confidence.

Run the game for all it is worth seems to be the watchword of Morris. Go ahead with the reckless extravagance and throw dust in the eyes of the electorate is the game that is being played. But every man who looks at the matter coolly and calculatingly has Morris sized up; his bluffing day is passed and his boast of being able to haul the wool over the eyes of the people is now at its end. Where are the new markets for fish which Morris promised? Where is the coal he was going to bring to our doors, where

is the duty free table that he promised the working man? Morris has no use for any but the highly paid official under the Government. He can find a way to raise the salaries of those, while three years have passed and yet he refuses to give the policeman more than one dollar a day. Is this the man who calls himself the People's Premier? Is this the man who glories in getting people to say that he mixes with the men of toil? Cheap notoriety is what he is hankering after, but the people have the weight of him and he knows it, but is playing the farce to the finish, knowing as he does that it is too late to haul back. He must certainly believe that the fishermen are very green, if he imagines that his racing around the country is going to gain them. We have a lot of men in his Government that evidently think that one of them people justify for pay them a visit, and Sir Edward is the biggest item in the exhibition, but the outport people have the weight of these over-estimated circus performers and know exactly how serious to take them.

The fishermen of the north taught him a freezing out lesson at the seafishers' meeting last spring and Morris got such a rude awakening to his exact position that he is running around the outports ever since trying to coax the fishermen back. But the tide of Public Opinion is too strong against him. The people have discovered that he is an autocrat of the worst kind, for he gives the welcome hand in order to use the fishermen but fails to use it in any manner but that which will bring crisis to his own mill. McGrath is writing again, but we should know this individual by this time and remember that he is doing so in order that he may get another four years of hauling thousands of dollars out of the chest.

Mr. Borden admitted that there were two phases of the question, an emergency contribution and a permanent naval policy. He said he had not changed his attitude from last year, on the question of going to the country on the naval issue.

Keough lost a considerable quantity of blood and it will be several days before he can resume work.

Good Prospects.

Squid are reported to be exceptionally plentiful around Bay de Verde and fishermen there are getting all they want. Several banking vessels have baited there and gone to resume operations on the Grand Banks. If the bait supply continues good the voyage at Bay de Verde, which thus far is practically a failure, will be an average one.

Poor Fishery.

According to one of the veterans at that place the codfishery at Bay Bulls this year is one of the worst on record. Apart from the small catch a great many have met with disaster, such as losing traps and other property, in consequence of the many terrible storms that prevailed during the fishing season.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. Lucien Wolfe, of the Daily Graphic, shows the American case in the Panama Canal dispute reads on an illusion. He says the States has no sovereignty in the Canal Zone whatever. It has only a perpetual easement, and the sovereignty remains in the Republic of Panama. What is granted by the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty is the use, occupation and control of canal zone, and although this is in effect as wide a sovereignty of the territory, in law the Panama is still sovereign of the Canal Zone. The consequence of this limited tenure is that in the Canal Zone, the States is legally just as much a foreign state as any other foreign state and that if it exercises sovereignty in Panama, it can do so only within the limits as defined by the treaty. The British commercial treaty with Columbia of 1866, the obligations of which has been inherited by Panama, guarantees the most favoured nation treatment to Britain. It overlooks another important point where he talks of the States granting privileges to other nations in her own territory. He forgets when the Hay-Pauncefote treaty was signed, the States had no tenure whatever in Canal Zone. Consequently the relationship of that treaty was not one of guarantee, but precisely the same as that of the signatures in the Clayton Bulwer treaty. This treaty did not deal with the question of an American Municipality, but of a project in which both parties had an equal right.

HONOLULU, To-day. Bryce, the British Ambassador to the States, is here on his way to Washington from Australia. He was officially welcomed to the island outside the harbor, by a launch, loaded with dignitaries. Secretary Fisher, of the Department of the Interior, has also arrived. He was met by Governor Friar, charges against whom, the Secretary will investigate.

DUNDEE, To-day. Sir William White, the naval expert, was elected President of the British Association for the Advancement of Science. The next meeting will be held at Birmingham.

Mr. Green Still Missing.

Brigades will Join in Search.

Much anxiety is felt for Mr. John W. Green, who is missing and so far there is no tidings of his whereabouts. His absence is causing much uneasiness to his friends, family and relatives, all of whom express the hope that he will be found alive. His disappearance is most mysterious. Conflicting stories are afloat to the effect that he has left the country, but unfortunately, none are true. The few facts ascertained in connection with the case are: Mr. Green left his home on Power Street early last Monday morning. He went up Patrick Street and continued on to Mundy Pond Road. He had just passed the dam which leads to Bennett's Brewery when he was spoken of by a tradesman named Cave, who went down Cornwall Avenue on his way to work at Littledale. Cave did not surmise anything was wrong as it was customary for Greene to take a walk in that direction at early morn. No one seems to have seen or heard anything of the missing man afterwards. He may have continued on the Blackmarsh Road or he may not. The Royal Stores employees and friends of Green scoured that section of the country yesterday and last night but failed to locate him. The Scouts were out this morning in quest of the missing man and made a thorough search of the woods and houses in the direction of the country referred to. To-day at noon the commanding officers of the four brigades met and made arrangements for all morning and afternoon of the C. L. B. Armoury to-morrow to look for Mr. Green. The management of the Royal Stores, in which employ Mr. Green was engaged, are especially interesting themselves and the heads of the firm and several of the employees are at present scouring the country roads.

Black Eye For the Hudson Bay Scheme.

Ottawa, Sept. 3.—Preliminary reports from the Hudson Bay survey parties on board the Government steamers investigating the ice and navigation conditions in Hudson Bay and Straits this summer in connection with the Hudson Bay Railway Project are not very encouraging as to the safety and feasibility of the route. The ice conditions, especially in the Straits, have been found to be unusually severe, exposing vessels to both serious danger and delay. The Government is naturally anxious not to have any "alarmist reports made public," but it is certain that the conditions as found are sufficient to give the Minister of Railways pause for serious consideration as to the dependability of the route and its feasibility as a cheap outlet for Western export products.





Rockefeller, Jr.'s two young children, who are ill with measles at a nursery on the estate, have also been received, it is said.


