

Resources of the Allies

In a recent speech Mr. Lloyd George expressing his confidence in the success of the allies said: "The natural resources of the Allied countries are overwhelmingly greater than those of their enemies (1) in men capable of bearing arms, (2) in the financial and economic resources of these countries, and (3) in their accessibility to the markets of the world through the command of the sea for obtaining material and munitions." The proof of the first statement is to be seen in the powerful army which has enabled Russia to put herself on the offensive from the Baltic to Roumania, the millions of men for Kitchener's army, and the millions of Frenchmen under arms in France. The proof of the second statement is the case with which Britain has raised loans for the war, and in the fact that for the past twelve months, nine of which are war months, the revenue received by Lloyd George is \$142,500,000 greater than the revenue for the previous year. It is also to be seen in the fact that the Canadian loan of \$25,000,000, floated with the assent of the British Exchequer, for the purpose of payments of national indebtedness for the carrying on of works under construction and contract in Canada has been oversubscribed in London. The proof of the third statement is that there is no regular warships at large on any of the oceans and that there is only one converted German cruiser loose in the South Atlantic and that in spite of the losses of a number of small steamers in British and French waters, sea traffic is going on without interruption. Of the threatened raid by an overwhelming fleet of airship of London and other cities, which has been postponed many times the past 9 months, and which was declared eventually to be an Easter Sunday fixture, there is no news so far to hand of even an attempt at a raid being made yesterday. So much then for our material resources and German threats, but as Lloyd George puts it, there is a greater reason than these for full reliance on a successful outcome of the war for our arms, and "that is the moral strength of our cause that consists in a struggle which involves sacrifices, suffering and privation for all those engaged in it. A nation cannot endure to the end that has on its soul the crime of Belgium."

ITALY FILLS GRANARIES.

New York, March 28.—Italy took more than one-third of the total amount of wheat exported from New York—1,003,430 bushels—in the ten days from March 11 to 20. The total exports were greater than for the corresponding ten days of February, the figures being 3,091,526 bushels, 2,577,886. Italy's taking of wheat were next to the largest of any nation that bought here. She took 105,368 bags out of a total of 575,000. In the corresponding ten days of February Italy took only 1,550 bags. Next to Italy the Netherlands was the largest taker of wheat, the amount being 838,698 bushels. The Netherlands took the largest amount of flour, 263,440 bags; Denmark was the largest taker of corn and barley.

LATEST From the Front.

TURKISH CRUISER SUNK.

LONDON, To-Day. Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent says: "A Berlin despatch received here states the Turkish headquarters reports that the Turkish fleet yesterday was near Odessa and that the cruiser Medjidieh, while pursuing the enemy with mine sweepers in the vicinity of the fortress of Ochatchon, struck a drifting mine and sank. The crew were saved by Turkish warships. The cruiser Medjidieh, before the ship sank, removed the breech locks of guns and the torpedoes. The cruiser Prenuthier is being refloated by the Russians."

JAP-CHINESE TROUBLE SETTLED.

PARIS, To-Day. A despatch to the Temps from Petrograd says: "The China-Japanese negotiations, according to reliable information, have been concluded. The Chinese Government agrees to extend the Port Arthur lease for 99 years. It recognizes also that Japan has all the rights in Shantung previously belonging to Germany, and conditions are laid down that Germany shall never have the right to acquire colonies or spheres of influence in China."

AUSTRIANS LOSE AMMUNITION SHIP.

LONDON, To-Day. A despatch from Malmo, Sweden, asserts that two German coasting steamers during the last few days have struck floating mines and been sunk in the Baltic Sea. An official communication issued here says the Austrian ammunition ship Belgrade sank in the Danube, opposite Ritopek, on March 30. An explosion was caused aboard the Belgrade by Serbian gun fire. Out of a crew of forty only two were saved.

FEARED LOST WITH ALL ABOARD.

NEW YORK, To-Day. Fears that the steamer Prinz Mauritz, Royal Dutch West Indies Company, had come down, possibly with all on board, were expressed last night in a wireless message received from the steamer Algonquin, which yesterday went to the aid of the Prinz Mauritz, reported in distress off Cape Hatteras.

BULGARIAN IRREGULARS ATTACK GREEK TOWN.

LONDON, To-Day. A despatch from Salonika says the Bulgarian irregulars, who were driven back from the Serbian border, later descended upon the Greek town of Potran, about thirty-five miles north of Salonika, and Greece is rushing reinforcements thither and to other frontier points, preparing for any event. Another band of Bulgarian irregular troops which tried to cross the Greek front were dispersed with the aid of machine guns. They left a number of dead and wounded on the field. It is alleged that in the Serbian villages through which they yesterday went, the Bulgarians committed atrocities. The Serbian frontier guards have now been armed with field guns and machine guns.

DAMAGE DONE BY BRITISH AVIATORS.

LONDON, To-Day. A French official communication this afternoon says: "The military authorities have received precise information regarding the results of the bombardment carried on by English aviators in Belgium, on the 28th March last. The results are as follows: The dirigible hangar at Berghem, Stagathe, was seriously damaged as well as the dirigible which it sheltered. At Hoboken, Antwerp, the naval construction shipyard was gutted, two German submarines damaged, forty Ger-

man workmen killed and sixty-two wounded.

GOEBEN STRUCK MINE.

LONDON, To-day. A Salonika despatch says: "Refugees from Constantinople confirm the report that the cruiser Goeben, formerly of the German navy, but now a Turkish warship, was badly damaged by striking a mine in the Bosphorus and returned to her dock with a seventeen foot hole, which the German workmen have not been able to repair properly, on account of lack of steel plates. They filled the hole with 250 tons of concrete but this cracked on the first trial. Refugees deny the story that the Goeben's guns have been dismantled."

There was only one Name in that hour could summon men to peace and it is our wonder if we shall read the same concerning Good Friday and Easter. No one questions the relative importance of Xmas and Easter. The Epistles as well as the faith of the church have settled it. The birth of Christ is only mentioned by the Apostle Paul from a doctrinal standpoint on occasion, the death and crucifixion of Jesus Christ are ever before his vision. Why then did hostilities cease at Xmas? Because the soldier thought of the past, his home-like children and the Babe of Bethlehem. We can appreciate a babe. Why then will we probably not cease on Good Friday, because the world does not understand the meaning of "reconciliation by the Cross." If we did, out of this struggle would come lasting peace, the peace of submission to God through the atoning blood. We could be assured this was "war against war." We would know a new righteousness was coming to men and we would not look for another treaty at Berlin or Paris or London, but a peace in the name above every name.

What is this a strain on our faith in the present, still we have hope that this Easter will come with new meaning to us all. Bishop Brooks, in one of his incomparable sermons, says: "I think that men who could not help hesitating if you asked them whether they really believed in the historical fact of Christ's arising from the dead, and men whose whole habit of thought is material, bound up with forces that the eye and hand can measure, still feel a certain sense of exaltation, the feeling of some unknown spiritual possibility, when Easter morning opens on the earth." To unnumbered millions this Easter will mean something more than of yore. The Easter festival may be almost forgotten. We can afford for once to let it pass if only the heart cries out for the resurrection life.

We are called anew as we look over the world of death, the world's dead men in unnumbered and unmarked graves on land and sea, to think of Jesus. The record is He arose from the dead and remained for some time intermittently visible to his friends, holding conversation with them, even eating in their presence before He ascended out of their sight. This scriptural narrative is absolutely without parallel in the world's records. It transcends in interest and significance any series of facts known to man. Failing this it is the most speaking exploit of human hopes and leaves the future in a darkness unveiled to the world still.

There is no need of argument for the authenticity of the witness of the Resurrection on this occasion, save to note, men of most subtle intellectual genius have tried to explain it away. The very blossoming of their mind lies exposed amongst the living thinking of men, and their very purpose has been, ultimately, a stain on their thought if not their character. Dr. Grenfell bases his belief in immortality on the thought of his desire for it. Prof. James, of Harvard, used the same idea for the same purpose by telling us men longed for life everywhere, even in China. That to him at least was a proof of immortality. "Easter" gives us all we can ever know here, and the experience of the Easter faith has left "human kind" with a conviction of certainty that has brought peace. The intimations of a future life are an integral part of the equipment of universal man. In our highest moral moments we are conscious of our relationship to a higher and fuller life. We are conscious of it now as we look into the faces of the finest sons of our Empire who have so freely and so splendidly if not gladly, laid down their lives for us all. They loved life as we do, they left their homes and their lovers, the tales and tragedies of their last moments have stirred us to the depths. What an utterly inexplicable thing is life if there be not a moral and spiritual universe. They are helping to redeem the world even though we may not see it. The Resurrection of Christ seals it all. It is a revelation of a wider life than is possible here, not wider perhaps than we have the longing for, or than we sometimes conceive as the completion of our imperfect lives. Those who have gone from us claiming the mercy of Jesus have only entered on that life the sooner.

In Jesus we have more than the case of one being brought back to life who had lain in the grave three days. That would not be unique in the world's record. Jesus, however, is unique. He did not return to the former life. He was raised in glory. He came in bodily form but he was altered utterly. A study of the narrative will reveal what was a miracle to the natural body was of ordinary occurrence to the spiritual body. There were no limitations of matter and space. He is an occasional visitor to His disciples not an abiding companion. He is no ghost. He eats as a guest but acts the part of host and in a higher sense than if He were human. In Christ we have one who is human in His love and interest, "Go tell Peter," "lovest thou Me more than these," yet the Christ we think of now is superhuman in His power and the extent of His interests.

It is our duty to attend our churches for the spirit of a stranger faith: "if ye then be risen with Christ seek those things which are above." If we have not done so before let us regard death and life in a new way. Life here is but a stage in growth, into the new life will go what is worthy in this, our passing is but a change not an ending. What purifying hopes we have in Christ! Easter we must remember does not supersede Good Friday. "Christ died for us the first for the unjust to bring us to God." "He was raised again for our justification," not merely theological but a justification for our present order of being. "Once in the end of the world Christ has put away sin by the sacrifice of Himself." May all your readers be happy in the Easter faith of hope.

Four months ago to-day I went to the place which was to be my home for the winter.


Homelessness, The Seasickness of the Heart.

In the second place my new home presented several unexpected problems which the homesickness helped make me feel physically and mentally unable to face.

I was on the verge of tears about half the time and over the verge about a quarter.

I didn't see why I ever came and I never would have stayed if I hadn't had to. Five months looked like an eternity to me. I used to turn over the leaves on the calendar and look longingly at the month marked April and wonder if it would ever come, and positively ache with longing to have the power to tear the intervening months off the calendar and out of my life. I would certainly have

given a year of my life for that power. Just Between You and Me.

That was four months ago. To-day I am getting ready to leave my winter home. Am I as wildly happy as I thought I would be when I looked ahead on the calendar? No, reader friend, I'll confess to you something I wouldn't tell to any of my personal friends. I'm actually rather sorry.

It all came about very gradually, the disappearance of the homesickness, the adjustment of the problems, the forgetting of the calendar, and the growth of happiness. I scarcely realized it had happened until I found myself looking forward to what I once longed for and looking forward to it without zest.

Four months ago if anyone had told me I would feel this way I would have laughed at him. Yet it would have been true.

Perhaps you, reader friend, would laugh at anyone who told you you would gradually come to find happiness in the conditions that now depress you. Your case is different, you say? Ah, my friend, I once thought mine was.
