



Flying Rumours.

It is regrettable that rumour is so persistently multiplied, particularly that of the absurdly impossible type. A ridiculous story is started and it spreads like wildfire, gaining in volume and details as it passes from mouth to mouth, until what merely was a manifest untruth, is tabricated into a mass of sensational report, calculated to create panic and bring about a chaotic condition of local affairs. There appears to be no way whatever to prevent flying rumours from gaining credence. It is a poor tribute to our analytical powers, that we accept as gospel any and every wild story that may have its origin in some stray intelligence filtering through a hundred mediums ere it reaches us. With half of the yarns that are being circulated, and with the most of the other half as well, it needs only to put our wits to work and reason backwards, to find that they are contrary to and against all possibility or likelihood. Within the past few days the city has been deluged with rumours of a certain nature, and all sorts of imaginary evils are being anticipated by the fearful, which fear is in danger of being communicated to others, thus causing alarm needlessly The present is no time for panic. Any contingency that may arise must be met cooly and calmly, and the strong must show the weak and direct them should there be danger. Cassandra prophecies are more of evil onen than the evil itself. Preparedness should be the key-word of everything we do, and not only the key-word, but the note of all our actions. By the adoption and use of that motto we will be making ready for the time (if it comes) when we shall need all our coolness, all our resources, all our courage and all our endurance to withstand and combat the peril. But don't let us get into a despondent. atalistic state. "What is to be, will be" if we let it happen. The Anglo Saxon does not sit down and wait for trouble to come. His inherent optimism will not permit him to live in that state, and Newfoundlanders, the descendants of the best blood of three kingdoms. are not going to accept whatever Fate may have in store for us, sitting down. Rather will we gird ourselves and prepare to overcome the peril which may be lurking in concealed places. Being in a state of war, we must be. at all times, willing to accept the fortunes of war, but it will never do to worry ourselves into a state of panic because rumour is so prolific. There is one suggestion that we would make on this point and that is that when anything of a nature calculated



Real Producers.

(From Toronto Saturday Night.) Publishers of Canada, those who use newsprint, have freely handled the visible weapon of their publicity, and have more energtically employed their concealed club of gentlemanly intimidation, to have the price of newsprint sliced down to suit their own platform in these war times. When it gets down to bedrock, and we try to think like economists and talk as bankers are supposed to talk, by the uninitiated, who is the greatest national producer just now, the publisher or the pulp and paper man? A ittle card that comes floating through the mails tells us that Canada's pulp and paper industry turns out about \$80,000,000 worth per annum, and \$60,000,000 worth of this product is exported to the United States. The pulp people by keeping their plants going strong, can cancel \$60,000,000 out of an adverse trade balance to Canada. These manfacturers can also expand and bolster up a business employing the natural resources of Canada, and with a market just across the border eager for the stuff, they can sell in time a quarter of a billion dollars worth, instead of \$80,000,000 worth. They can produce large surplus profits for all Canada from a foreign source, which means a net gain to the country to enable us to pay off our war bills. This the publisher cannot do. The publisher deals in brains, white paper and ink, but he does not produce much else than sensations. The Dominion Government appointed Commissioner Pringle to set the price of newsprint, and after his finding, which set the price too low, according to the pulp and paper men, the publishers joined hands and called the Commissioner names. The pulp men wanted an increase of fifty per cent. over the old price. The Commissioner set the price for newsprint at \$2.85 per hundred pounds, this figure to terminate in May. Almost as a unit the pulp and paper men contended that the figure so set was not far from the level of cost of production, and some maintained they would have to sell to Canadian publishers at a loss in neeting the figure. However, the price was set, and then the publishers ade demand that this figure should not terminate in May, but remain in force until June, and apparently so until that figure becomes established in concrete. 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
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
