



#### The Origin of the Life Guards.

The resignation of Protector Richard Cromwell in 1659 was followed by a year of unrest. The Parliament had been restored by the army, but now quarrelled with it. Haselrig, one of the famous "Five Members," leading the former, and Lambert, one of Cromwell's major-generals, the latter. The Royalists took advantage of these differences to revive their schemes. and risings took place in various parts of England, which Lambert put down; he also expelled the Parliament. Monk who was in Scotland, marched into England, intending to restore the Parliament, but when he reached York in December the riots in London had led to the restoration of Parliament. At York, Monk was joined by Fairfax, who made no secret of his Royalist leanings, so on February 3, 1660, Monl entered London at the head of 5,000 men. The people waited with trembling anxiety to know his resolve, and great was their joy when he declared for a free Parliament. The Presbyterian members, who had been exnelled by Colonel Pride in 1648, returned to their seats in the Long Parliament, and that famous body, after deciding on a new Parliament, dissolved itself. Monk, being "General of the Forces." proposed and accomplished the restoration of Charles II. who was proclaimed King at the gate of Westminster Hall at the beginning of May. Later on, Monk was rewarded with the title of Duke of Albemarle, and so great was the public joy at the Restoration that no care was taken to prevent Charles from seizing absolute power. His first Parliament graned him, for life taxes amounting to £1.2000,000 a year; and a part of this money he devoted to the support of some regiments, then called "Gentlemen of the Guard," but now termed "Life Guards." These formed the nucleus of the standing army which has ever since been maintained.

#### Crude Arrangement.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir .- When the Prince's Rink Management make a specialty of any Hockey game, for the benefit of the Rink alone, and issue reserved seat (gallery) tickets at double the cost of general admission, it should be their primary object to give that freedom of entrance to ticket holders to which their advance purchases naturally and legitimately entitle them. That ticket holders last night were not treated any differently from those who sought general admission is evidenced by the crude arrangements of the management, who having accepted in advance an enhanced fee for reserved seats, left it to those who made-and paid for-reservations to be tossed to and fro amongst the crowd in a vain effort to gain admission, which in numerous cases was not secured, and in a number of instances was only obtained to find that their seats had been preempted by others. It does not speak well for the management that they should have omitted to look after ticket purchasers, by having another door opened for their convenience, but left them to force and jostle their way through the queue in order to obtain the privileges for which they had paid (doubly) in advance. It is hoped that should such again occur that some better arrangements will be made otherwise the public will not look with satisfaction or confidence upon any attempt to raise the price without giving adequate returns. A word to the wise should be sufficient. Yours truly,

#### Obituary.

ELIZABETH O'DRISCOLL.

On yesterday morning, Elizabeth O Driscoll, widow of the late Captain John O'Driscoll, passed peacefully away at her residence, Hamilton Street, at the advanced age of 85 years. Deceased was born in County Kilkenny, Ireland, and came to St John's when very young, and her passing removes one of the very few remaining of the Irish who came out here in the early Victorian days. Mrs. O'Driscoll led a very exemplary life, was a devoted Catholic, generous and sympathetic, and her death will be deeply regretted by a large circle of friends. 



CAPTAIN OF INDUSTRY PASSED AWAY.

(H. F. SHORTIS.) Newfoundland has been bereft, during the past four or five years, of not a few of her most prominent menmen noted for their eminence in the standing citizenship.

day, at the age of 70 years, Hon, Walter B. Grieve was one of the best known and most popular merchants in Newfoundland, and one who always ook the deepest interest in the affairs of the country, as well as in all matters connected with the Anglican Church of which he was one of the most prominent members, his loss being difficult to fill. As a business man he was second to none in this country. naving been practically the head of the extensive and time-honoured firm of Baine Johnston & Co., for a period of half a century. He was indeed a captain of industry, and his entire business life was conspicuous for his ndustry, ability and integrity. The fishermen, coopers, laborers, etc., recognized him as one of the kindest and most sympathetic men-generous, spirited and warm-hearted, and one who never turned a deaf ear to the cry of distress. It is only the poor and needy themselves who knew the extent of his charities, and with his numerous old employees he was always more of a friend than a master.

During the Great War no man took greater interest in the contest than W. B. Grieve, being identified with all the Patriotic Associations, whch, during the years of the Titanic struggle. were formed, and which contributed! so much to the comfort of our Royal Newfoundland Regiment, both at home and on the field of battle. Never was it known that he failed to respond to any call in the interest of our country or the Empire. The good he has done will live after him, and his patriotic efforts were recognized by His Majesty King George, by his being invested with the Order of the British Empire; and no man amongst us more







#### Women Who Love Superstition.

Would it be going too far to say that, all women are superstitious? Well, it depends in the first place on what we mean by superstiton.

Women are generally supposed to be more superstitious than men; and we notice many things which go far towards proving that the supposition is correct. With some women superstition is a fetish, and even enters into their household duffies

In olden days people were much more superstitious than at the present time. St. Valentine's Day and All-Hallows E'en were held in great regard. Our grandmothers were absolute martyrs to superstition. All-Hallows E'en was a time when superstition ran riot; but few women now go to the length of eating an apple before the looking-glass at midnight, whilst brushing their hair; neither do they go to the church-porch at that time in the hope of seeing their future husbands. Such practices are relics of the past.

Intuitive Apprehension.

There is another side to the question. Women, being specially psychic, often have intuitions which are perfectly true, but which are often called superstitions by those who have no belief in them. This is one of the chief reasons why women are called superstitious. Who has not heard during the war of mothers who have known at the moment when their sons have been wounded or killed, and so on? And how often will a woman feel depressed when some trouble is near, or think of a friend when a letter from him or her is on its way by post? Incidents of this kind are numberless, and we have all heard

But there are numerous women who are superstitious in real earnest, and that with neither rhyme nor reason. They belong mainly to two classes-those who are rather glad of an opportunity to have little eccentricities, and those who are on the way to being neurotic-and the two classes are rather close together.

Actresses are notably superstitious. Certain lucky days, lucky months, lucky names, and so on, make a kind of actresses' calendar, and lucky mascots and various charms are all-important to many of them. From what one gathers, French actresses are specially prone to be superstitious: but superstition is rather a Latin fail-

Surely, you say, our women are altogether too sensible and "British" to indulge in such foibles? Not they! It has been said that there is not a woman who is not over-ridden by one favourite superstition, even if she is ashamed to own it. You may scorn such an accusation, but think! Is there nothing of a superstitious nature in your mind? Are you sure that you would be quite pleased to be married on a Friday? Sure that you would bring hawthorn blossom into the house; that you do not look out for trouble when a picture falls: that you would not be rather pleased to welcome an unexpected guest when you are about to sit down thirteen to dinner? If you are not sure, you need not be dispirited, for certainly you are not alone in your foible, even in this enlightened twentieth century.

Royalty and Superstition.

Nor are you in plebeian company, for many royal ladies have their superstitions. One of the princesses of our own Royal Family had a favourite superstition regarding pins. She could not see one lying on the ground without picking it up, and so fearful was she of losing one from her dressing-table that she had a special pin-cushion decorated with a special pattern of pins so that, if one should be removed, she would know and search for it till it could be replaced. Most of the superstitions which are not due to ignorance are harmless or meaningless. Who would grudge the school-girl the monkey or Teddybear mascot which brightens her cycle, or jeer at the little black cat which hangs on so many women's neckchains?

There are, however, superstitions which are caused by a neurotic mind. We have all heard of Dr. Samuel Johnson's superstition that he must touch with his stick every lamppost he passed. Many women have like superstitions-such as always treading on a certain paving-stone, and so on. It is not wise to let such an attitude grow on you. Indeed, it is a vast mistake, and should be resolutely discouraged. To some women life is made a burden by their allowing such ideas to take a hold upon their minds.

So if you find that any superstition you may hold is getting the better of you, promptly get the better of it at once and for all, by defying it, and then and there forgetting it.-Glasgow Weekly Herald.
