

Strange Will and Testament.

ASHES TO FERTILIZE POTATOES.
LONDON (By Canadian Press)—Many peculiar wills find their way through the Probate Court, but few of them can compare with the strange will of James Campbell Christie, an ex-schoolmaster and science teacher, of Kilmalling Street, Calcutta, Glasgow, who died recently, leaving an estate valued at \$3,440. Christie bequeathed his personal clothing and bed clothes to the Old Men and Women's Home, Glasgow, and "if not accepted" to the Charity Organization Society, or to any really ascetic or deserving persons whose circumstances were well known to any of the trustees of his estate, with a strong preference in favor of total abstainers, non-smokers and unbelievers in any religion. People who wasted or had wasted money in alcohol or tobacco did not deserve charitable assistance, his will stated. The utmost simplicity was to be observed in his funeral, Christie stipulated. No hearse was to be used, but a plain carriage, with the box underneath, "or any simpler or less expensive way" of conveying his body to the crematorium. He had paid the cremation fee several years in advance of his death. He wished no one to waste time by attending his funeral. He desired that his ashes should not be preserved, but disposed of by the crematorium management, or "used by any of my trustees or others to fertilize their potatoes."

Central American Revolution.

Nicaragua Rebels Against President Diego—Belfast Shamed by Many Crimes—Women Perished When Egypt's Boats Were Rushed.

EVOLUTION IN NICARAGUA.
MANAGUA, Nicaragua, May 22.—A revolutionary movement against President Diego has broken out here. The rebels have captured the fortress of Loma commanding the city, and it is over to American marines.

MR. FATALLY SHOT.
BELFAST, May 22.—Mr. J. Twaddell, a member of the Northern Parliament, was shot here this morning fatally.

AGAINST MACAROW DISMISSED.
MONTREAL, May 22.—The charge against Macarow of wilfully giving false evidence to the Minister of Finance was dismissed this morning. The Crown was that Macarow, General Manager of the defunct Bank, should have known that the Bank's reserve had been lost in disastrous loans which were compelled to sell out

to the Bank of Montreal. The case against Sir H. Montagu Allan, President of the Merchants Bank, who also signed the return, will be held up until a final decision by the Department of Justice in the case of Mr. Macarow is reached.

GRIFFITH EXPRESSES SYMPATHY.
DUBLIN, May 22.—Expressing horror of the assassination of W. J. Twaddell, member of the Northern Parliament, Arthur Griffith, President of Dail Eireann, said to-day "Belfast has lately been shamed by many crimes in which religion was made an excuse for political vendetta. Those who know Belfast and have been responsible for public order have not repudiated them. Mr. Twaddell's murder strikes at the foundation of representative Government. The honor of the Irish nation is concerned therein, and in its name he desired to express deepest sympathy with those who mourn."

GORTON PEW'S FISHERY LOSSES.
BOSTON, May 22.—The Gorton Pew Fisheries Company of Gloucester, one of the largest fish concerns in the United States, showed a great deficit of \$2,013,000 in 1921. No lives were lost.

Where To Go Empire Day.

NO REVOLUTION.
VIENNA, May 22.—Apparently no revolution has taken place in Bulgaria. Conflicts occurred between Communists and Wrangel soldiers, after the Communists had passed a resolution demanding the expulsion of the Wrangel soldiers.

CANADA'S NAVAL POLICY.
OTTAWA, May 22.—The Government's Naval policy providing for one destroyer and two small vessels on each coast, with the consequent laying up of the Aurora and two submarines, carried to-night without division.

THE ROY BRUCE AT HALIFAX.
HALIFAX, May 22.—The tern schooner Roy Bruce, Capt. Robert Hollett, Burn, Nfld., has arrived here eighteen days from Barbados with molasses.

COWARDLY LASCARS COST WOMEN'S LIVES.
LONDON, May 22.—"If it had not been for the Lascars rushing the boats all the women on board the Egypt would have been saved," declared Joseph Duff, a Scottish passenger on the ill-fated Egypt, sunk at sea after being rammed by the French freighter Seine in a fog.

STEAMERS COLLIDE.
PHILADELPHIA, May 22.—The Italian steamer Andrea, 2634 tons, collided with the steamship Alexander, 4181 tons, of the Admiral Steamship Line opposite Fort Mifflin, Pa., to-night. The Alexander struck the Andrea amidships and the latter, seriously crippled, was run aground in shallow water on the Jersey side. No lives were lost.

Improving the Mall.
BEST RESULT FROM TURFING.
Urged on by the spirit of the Llewellyn Club in improving the grounds around St. Thomas Church the Council has sent several men to improve the Mall embankment. It is the intention to have grass grow and with this end in view hay seed has been sown. As the bottom is gravel it will not likely succeed and a much better job would result from sodding.

House Adjourned.

PRONOUNCEMENT ON RAILWAY THURSDAY—REIDS WILL NOT OPERATE AGAIN.

The Prime Minister, in moving the adjournment of the House yesterday afternoon, announced that there were no further developments in the Railway situation, but intimated that he would have an announcement to make on Thursday. Negotiations for a settlement or adjustment were in progress. Sir Richard said the Government might have to operate a service temporarily, and he informed the House that Mr. R. C. Morgan had left Winnipeg on Sunday for St. John's via Montreal. Operations would certainly start after Mr. Morgan's arrival if not before. In answer to Mr. Sullivan, the Prime Minister said there were two positions. There had to be litigation, arbitration, or some settlement for the purchase of the railway. In either event, the Government would have to take over the road, as the Reids have retired absolutely from the railway. Financial difficulties prevent them from carrying on further railway operations in Newfoundland. No matter what happens the Government must take over and operate the railway.

Mr. Sullivan pointed out that the lobster fishery of Placentia Bay was interfered with because the cases of cans required for this industry are hung up on the railway line, and the fishery would be a failure if these were not delivered shortly. He thought the Supreme Court could decide whether the Reids had or had not defaulted.

The Prime Minister said such a discussion would take three weeks at least.

Mr. Bennett asked if the Attorney General had taken steps to obtain any outside legal opinion as to the Colony's position and liabilities. If the Reids' claims should be substantiated the country ought to be indemnified enough to pay them. He could not see, however, why the country should pay anything for the Reids' assets if they have defaulted.

The Prime Minister stated that outside legal advice had been obtained.

Mr. Higgins said that if the Reids expected the same treatment as other business people got, it was surely incumbent upon them to fall in line with such suggestions as have been made. He thought some arrangements could be made for a train service while negotiations were pending. If the Reids would not consider such a suggestion they deserved no sympathy from the country.

Hon. Mr. Warren agreed with Mr. Higgins. He had retained Mr. J. P. Blackwood as a legal advisor.

Mr. Sullivan thought the suggestion should be taken up at once.

The Prime Minister said the Colony had always been financing the Reids. When Mr. Morgan returned he would operate the line temporarily. Later the line would be leased out to some firm of contractors.

Sir Michael Cashin said the Prime Minister had stated the Reids would not operate under any conditions and again, that they would operate if they were not likely to lose anything. Which statement was correct? It would be best to adjust the present

Is Newfoundland at the Mercy of the Contractor?

Is there another great betrayal? Is this Colony at the mercy of the Railway Contractor? Twenty-two years ago when a crusade was preached against the Contract of 1898, Newfoundlanders without exception, irrespective of class or creed, rose in their might and denounced the authors, without consideration. To-day a far greater crisis than ever the 1898 Contract embraced faces the people of this Colony. Yet not a word of protest is heard; not a sound comes from the populace, though the country is menaced with a greater peril than ever faced it. Leaders are silent, popular opinion is apparently benumbed into lack of expression while the fate of Newfoundland is being held in the balance. The leader of the party, who in 1919 made the most serious and binding promises to put the "Reids in their place" has forgotten his fiery and convincing eloquence. He has willed like the flowers of the forest. Instead of putting the "Reids in their place" he has catered to their desires, and the curse of monopoly has descended upon the country. We are to-day in a position which is practically hopeless and helpless. We have been betrayed by the leaders in whom faith was placed and who were trusted to show fidelity to the electorate. How basely that confidence was violated may be seen in the present attitude of the Government toward the Railway Company. Not one word can be said in defence of the Administration of Richard Anderson Squires. Not one sentence can be framed in exculpation of the conduct of his Government since they were given charge of affairs. They have proven recreant to the trust reposed in them, and appear to be utterly callous to the righteous demands of the people. They stick closely to office, whereas if they possessed a grain of courage they would immediately resign and place the present issue before the electorate.

But their thoughts are not in that direction. Their designs are altogether different. What care they if there has been a gross surrender of the people's rights, a palpable betrayal of the popular interest. Place and pay is all they care about. Both people and country can go to the bow-wows so long as they are comfortably settled in office, with salaries and seasonal indemnities far beyond anything ever they dreamed. Statesmen forsooth! Rather barnacles that will adhere to the hull of the Ship of state so long as it can be kept afloat. Railways and transportation are not bothering the small minds of Newfoundland's very small legislators. On the contrary the only prob-

lem that is puzzling them is how long they can stick ere the indignation of an outraged public hurl them from their place into an oblivion from which they will never again emerge. The country at present is suffering from—as Sir Robert Bond put it in his letter to the citizens of St. John's—political cancer. The remedy is the knife, but who is the surgeon to dig down to the roots of the disease and cut them out? The answer is in the possession of the people. They and only they can authorize political specialists to apply the scalpel. It is not too late, though time is speeding. The people must awake to their peril and arouse themselves to the threatening danger. Apathy must give place to energy and lethargy to action. The time of political hypnosis has passed. Newfoundland must assert herself if she desires to retain her autonomy. It is not an enviable position for a dominion to be placed in under control and subject to a public contractor, and if Newfoundland is not willing to be bound by the shackles and chains of the Railway Company, an upheaval must inevitably ensue. The betrayers of the Colony have to be brought to book by the people themselves. Newfoundland will be on her knees if the psychological moment is permitted to slip by without anything being accomplished. All power is in the hands of the people. Will they not use it in an effort to prevent the utter and absolute ruin of their most precious belongings?

Roundabout Voyage All Over the Bay.

Captain Josiah Gosse arrived in the city from Spaniard's Bay this forenoon. Capt. Gosse's itinerary to reach town was a rather roundabout one. Leaving home at 4 o'clock this morning, passage was taken by motor boat to Bell Island, and from thence by another motor propelled craft to Fortugal Cove, from which place a motor car was engaged to bring him to town, arriving at 11.30, the journey taking seven and a half hours. The tie-up of the railway is greatly embarrassing to Conception Bay dealers who have been obliged to purchase small stocks at the various points, being handicapped for lack of transport. Numerous people now require to come to St. John's to transact their spring business, but the suspension of railway traffic has handicapped their activities and they scarcely know where to turn for a remedy.

News for Salmon Anglers

A private cable from Newfoundland says that guides on the West Coast rivers are preparing for an influx of salmon fishers this year. Great falls of snow on the mountains and pleasant give promise of ideal water during the season, which starts next month, and the outlook for good sports never was better. The license fee of \$10 a rod for foreign anglers remains unchanged.—Sydney Post.

AVAILABLE OF FREE SEED.—Up to the present some 400 people from the districts of St. John's East and West have availed of the offer of free seed potatoes. The distribution of the seed will begin on Thursday on the arrival of a schooner load of potatoes from Bonavista Bay. So far there are no returns of the number of barrels distributed in the outports.



Absolution for Babe Ruth.

PRODIGAL TAKES UP THE CLUB AGAIN.

New York, May 19 (Associated Press)—His penance all performed, Babe Ruth the prodigal son of sport, takes up his bludgeon again tomorrow, weather permitting, as the New York Yankees open a long home series at the Polo Grounds with Kenneth Williams, the Ruthless Lochmivar from out of the west, trying to make his 1920 Metropolitan debut the beginning of a fade-out for George Herman. Since he has heard of the ball-slumping prowess of Williams, since he has been shown, that the Yankees are more than a "one-man" club, since he has found that Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis means to enforce the rules and since he has discovered what it means to be allowed to play, it is reported that Ruth's uniform, including his cap, fits better. But regardless of the intrepidity of Mr. Williams, who seems intent upon galloping past the Babe's high-water mark of 59 home runs for last season; regardless of the fact that Ruth has a "record" as a baseball Sherlock, if one there was, would term it, the Crowned King of Klonters is still the pride of the Harlem and the biggest baseball drawing card the world has ever known.

WILL PLAY THE GAME.

In the view of many fans the attitude that Ruth has displayed since receiving his "penance" from Commissioner Landis, the quiet manner in which he has conducted himself, his willingness to "play the game" and his apparent determination to make up for lost time—all of this will bring as many people to the ball yards to see him this year as did last. According to those who have the Babe's confidence he has been alerted over the first pace over the Yankees have set without him in the line-up and now that he knows that he is still a trifle more valuable as a magnet to the box-office than as a counter to the total scoring he will attempt more than ever to be more of a first-class baseball player and a more diligent purveyor of satisfaction to fandom in general. Ruth's appearance in the line-up tomorrow, will mark his first appearance in a league game this year, 38 days after the opening of the season, and with one-fourth of the season gone, necessitates Ruth slugging out at least one homerun at least every other day and three on one day to surpass his record of last year.

BANISHED LAST FALL.

The Babe was banished last fall by Commissioner Landis together with Bob Meusel, another Yank whose achievement of getting 24 homeruns last year is seldom thought of, for playing an exhibition game with the Buffalo International League team after the World Series had ended, in violation of the rule that prohibits World Series players from indulging in such exhibitions. Not only did Ruth and Meusel violate the rule but they did it after Commissioner Landis had personally talked with Ruth and told him what would happen in case the rule was violated. After the conversation Ruth expressed his determination to stout the Commissioner, and Landis, meeting the most severe test of his baseball career, foreshadowed what his decision would be by saying: "It will be a personal issue between Ruth and me to determine which man is bigger in baseball." With the 38 days suspension over it looks to baseball fandom as if Landis is convinced that Landis is the bigger and that Ruth also is convinced. As soon as he had flouted Landis he was sorry, but he "had gone and done it." Full of remorse and forebodings, Ruth hopped back to New York, swore repentance and took a rest. Soon the Landis decision came along and Babe became quiet until Colonel Huston, part of the Yankees, found him at Hot Springs, and got the Babe to sign a five-year contract calling for between \$75,000 and \$100,000 a year, net salary.

THE GREATEST HITTER OF ALL TIMES.

Babe went to the training camp with the club and played in the exhibition games against home and at home, but when the Club opened in Washington Ruth sat on the grandstand, like President Harding. Ruth, unquestionably the greatest hitter of all time, has batted out 75 homeruns in the last six years. He scored four in 1915, three in 1916, two in 1917, 11 in 1918, 29 in 1919—breaking the then world's record, 54 in 1920, and 59 last year—a total of 133. Paper Read by Mrs. M. J. Campbell to Social Workers.

"God help us! So the grogshops can show us how, eh! Warmth, sociability, smiles, comradeship, brotherly kindness can meet us on the road down-hill. The writer can remember bustle days, and when as a silly little fool who wanted to be in the fashion she donned one; her father remarked to her that if she needed to make it larger he would send for one of his men to bring a cartload of sawdust to help fill it. Timely sarcasm! To what lengths do we get? When will we learn sense? What do we do it for? To find favor with our men folk? If so let's dress to please them. We are not pleasing them, that is the worth while men. We are disgusting them and catering to the depraved tastes and desires of men who should be classed as outcasts with our fallen sisters. Oh when will we awaken and when will we reach the place where we will put all same degree sinners on the same level. We seem to go to such extremes with everything. Jazz bands, crazy dancing, late hours, playing cards to excess, disrespect for elders, scoffing at clergymen and religion, insolence and impudence. USE DISCRETION.

And some one else responds with tilted nose. "Don't ask respectable people to do such work. Perhaps not! But listen: 'Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these ye did it unto me.' Our commendation or our condemnation. Which do we choose?"

Protection of Rivers.

A NECESSITY.

Editor Evening Telegram
Dear Sir—It was with great satisfaction I noted that the Evening Telegram has taken up the matter of protection of our salmon rivers. I had read the admirable article by His Honor Judge Morris in the Veteran on "Salmon and Salmon Fishing in Newfoundland" and felt at the time that such information as he supplied would open the eyes of the "powers that be" to the importance of such rivers not alone as a means for attracting the tourist, but as producing a commodity of such commercial value to this country.
Newfoundland has always been advertised as a great resort for tourists. The outside world generally is told of the great salmon and trout rivers that abound in this country. This propaganda is distributed everywhere and all the while the "powers that be" are doing their best everywhere to destroy the value of these rivers, to render them valueless for the purposes for which they have been so well advertised. For years tourists have come here (and left much money) just for the pleasure of a fishing trip. But they will soon cease coming unless something is done to protect our rivers. I heard of two gentlemen who came last year, as they had done for years, to a well-known salmon river and who found that this river was useless for fishing purposes, so well had it been netted and salmon fished. They said they would come no more. The sin of omission is almost as bad as the sin of commission and those in authority are guilty of a great blunder in withdrawing wardens from our rivers. For years wardens have patrolled and guarded the rivers, so that there were many real good salmon rivers. Last year they were withdrawn and there resulted wholesale netting and jigging.
I noted in the article in your paper that the grant for the game wardens has been revived but that so far no appointments have been made. No delay should be allowed in such appointments. Salmon next month will be rising for the rivers. Then is the

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


great time for netting and jigging. And now is the time to act. The blunder of appointing wardens too late is as bad as not appointing them at all. Too late is it to lock the stable door, when the steed is stolen and too late and as foolish to appoint anyone to protect salmon that have already been killed.
I was certainly surprised to learn from Judge Morris's article that salmon are of such commercial value to Newfoundland. This fact, as I fear, been overlooked, and but for his remarks would have been unknown to almost everyone here. That the salmon industry is worth to this country nearly \$600,000 shows how important it is and how valuable it can be made if properly developed. And when coupled with this is the knowledge that tourists come here in large numbers to catch salmon for pleasure—a source of much money to us—we realize what a blunder was made last summer in withdrawing the grant for game wardens, and what a blunder is being made in not appointing wardens immediately, now that the grant has been revived.



Aviation in Newfoundland.

(By J. P. TUPPER.)

This afternoon your correspondent had a chat with Capt. Roy Stanley Grandy, a native of Bay L'Anse-au-Fort, Fortune Bay, who went to Gallipoli with "C" Company of the Nfld. Regiment, and afterwards served with the 43rd Squadron of the Royal Flying Corps in France. At present he is a Flight Commander and one of the Instructors in the Canadian Air Force at Camp Borden. Your readers will be interested to know that with such a long and distinguished career in the flying service the point that Capt. Grandy emphasized most while talking about the possibilities of an Air Service in his native dominion of Newfoundland is that no pilot should be allowed to carry passengers who has not obtained a license to do so. In order to make this the rule, it must be arranged that a Board of Examiners be appointed competent to test those desiring to carry on Commercial Aviation. This is a very simple matter. Furthermore he was of the opinion that no machine should be allowed to fly unless it has been certified as airworthy by some authorized person. These regulations would be in keeping with what is at present required of sea captains and their craft. They

are also imperative in countries where Air Service is in common use.

When asked concerning the possibilities of "Aerial Mail Service," Capt. Grandy stated that if properly organized such a service could be easily conducted because of so many harbors along the coast and natural waterways through the interior, and would be very beneficial. He suggested a machine that could alight either on water or land for this purpose. His idea concerning the use of aircraft to locate seals is that one machine might be used in conjunction with about four vessels—a small machine similar to the one used by the late Sir E. Shackleton on his Antarctic Expedition. This would keep down expenses and in the event of a forced landing it would be an easy matter to get the crew. During the Great War men from Newfoundland distinguished themselves in the Air Service as well as in other branches and with such strides being made in aviation by foreign countries and throughout the British Empire it is a Science that should play an important part in life in Newfoundland.



Our Trade With Brazil
Why Newfoundland Should Reclaim It.

(H. F. SHORTIS.)

The question of our trade with Brazil is receiving very serious consideration from our principal exporting firms. I have been asked to continue my articles on this subject. Further statistics have come to hand, which show a terrible falling off, and this fact cannot be too widely known. It shows that our competitors are cutting right into our vitals in the most alarming manner. The following is a comparison of the total imports from all countries into Brazil for the first nine months of each year since and including 1913:

The total importation into Brazil for the whole year, 1920, was 590,760 quintals. This quantity was made up as follows:

The largest importations into Brazil in recent years was during 1913, when for the whole twelve month the total of that year was 880,000 qts. This shows that Brazil purchases more codfish than any other country in the world. Of this amount Newfoundland shipped 506,000.

In the year 1918 Nfd. had 30 per cent of the value imported; in the year 1919 Nfd. had 78 per cent. of the value imported; in the year 1920 Nfd. had 42 per cent. of the value imported; in the year 1921 Nfd. had 30 per cent. of the value imported.

REGULATIONS KILLED TRADE.
 A little careful comparison of these figures will show what a splendid customer Brazil has been for Newfoundland. There must be something seriously wrong for such a falling off in shipments and value during the year 1920, and it is not very difficult to find the reason when we remember that was the year when the Regulations were put into force. It is as clear as daylight that Canada and the United States shippers just walked round us, and we have not yet recovered from its effects. What a calamity that year must have been to our country. I remember how my old friend, Hon. W. B. Grieve, fought to have those Regulations, as he called them, removed. I could only sympathize with him then, but it goes to my heart now to see what he must have suffered. But to

go back to my subject—these figures show that the quantity of codfish shipped to Brazil last year (1921) was slightly less than one half of what was shipped in the year 1913, which was the year before the war started. I had no idea when writing my recent article to the Evening Telegram that I would have the opportunity so quickly to verify my arguments that our exporters are neglecting this valuable trade with Brazil. Our exporters have been inducing the fishermen of the Straits of Bell Isle and the French Shore to make their fish "soft cure" so that they could ship it to the Mediterranean. They do not seem to realize that the war is over, and that the Mediterranean countries do not want such large quantities of "soft cure" fish. If the exporters do not see the mistake they are making, surely the fishermen are not so blind as to continue to make their splendid Shore Fish into an imitation of Labrador cure.

GASPE CATERERS TO BRAZIL.
 Last year Labrador fish, sold for \$4.00 (four dollars) per quintal, and "hard dried" shore fish was worth \$8.00 (eight dollars) per quintal. If they continue flooding the European markets it will be the same, or perhaps worse, this year. The Gaspé merchants and their fishermen, for one hundred years or more, made a specialty of catering for their Brazil customers. Their brands of fish will ever be remembered as standards of excellence, and should be an inspiration to all of us in Newfoundland. I have been consulting some friends, who knew these Gaspé shippers well, and they confirm the statements I have given that the bulk of their fish was all caught in the Straits of Bell Isle, and that it is the "real thing" for the Brazil trade. These old Gaspé merchants studied the quality of the fish thoroughly. The fish caught in the Straits is a different quality of fish altogether from that caught on the Labrador coast. The Straits fish, for some reason or other, has a fatness or grease that is not found in the fish caught North of the Straits of Bell Isle. The grease cannot be cured properly with salt in the same way that the Labrador codfish can be cured. This rich quality of fish needs to be "fried hard" to cure it properly. When it is cured with salt alone this grease quickly comes to the surface when the shipments reach the warm countries of Southern Europe, and the buyers at once complain. I have been told that cargo after cargo of this French Shore fish, in imitation of Labrador, was rejected and condemned in almost every market of the Mediterranean last year.

SUPPLY THE DEMAND.
 You must give your customers what they want, or you cannot expect satisfaction in business. Surely it is time for our shippers and fishermen to wake up to the serious mistake they are making in this matter. If they do not there can be nothing else but disaster facing them. I intended to give some interesting records of the quick passages of some of our vessels employed in the Brazil trade fifty years ago, but this article is already too long, and I must keep that information for another time.

Occasionally he will work an entire day trying to get from some player a bit of business but when that bit of business is on the screen it makes up for all the effort involved.

Cabanne's latest production for Robertson-Cole is called "Live and Let Live" and is now being shown at The Majestic Theatre. It is said to be the most powerful of all his stories. TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

ONE HUNDRED AND TWO MISSING.

BREST, France, May 23. The British Vice-Consul here today announced that 102 of those on board the British steamer Egypt, sunk off the Island of Ushant, Saturday night, are missing, of whom sixteen were passengers and eighty-six of the steamer's crew. Twenty-eight passengers were saved together with 204 members of the crew.

ROUND THE GLOBE BY AIR.

LONDON, May 23. Two British aviators who plan to start on a round the world airplane flight, Wednesday, will begin their flight from Croyden flying field. The aviators are Major W. T. Blane and Captain Norman McMillan, and expect to complete the flight in two months. Their route lies through France, Italy, Greece, Egypt, Mesopotamia, India, Eastern China, Japan, and thence via the Aleutian Islands to Alaska through United States to New York, thence to Newfoundland and across the Atlantic via Greenland and Iceland to Scotland. This record making trip was first visualized by Sir Ross Smith and Sir Keith Smith of Australia, but the latter abandoned his plans when his brother was killed in a preparatory flight.

ULSTER'S OBLIGATION.

BELFAST, May 23. The Ulster Government is taking immediate stringent steps to suppress in Northern Ireland the Irish Republican Army, Irish Republican Brotherhoods, Irish volunteers, Sinn Fein Girl Guides and Boy Scouts. The members of these organizations are liable to arrest and prosecution.

A BIG ROUND UP.

BELFAST, May 23. It is reported that two hundred officers of the Irish Republican Army were arrested by the Ulster authorities early this morning in a general roundup, which covered the entire six counties. The big encircling movement was commenced about four o'clock, and the work of visiting the various houses in the town and country was rapidly and efficiently carried out. Several hundred men of the constabulary and a large staff of officers were on duty from midnight completing the arrangements. The majority of those wanted were completely surprised, and in nearly every instance aroused from their sleep by the police, demanding admission. In Belfast fifty-two were arrested, but those did not include any well known party leaders, while the Falls Road section with its big Republican population was entirely unrepresented. Absence of the Republicans from their homes is ascribed to the anticipation of reprisals for assassination of W. J. Truitt, Member of the Ulster Parliament.

Shipping Notes.

S.S. Alconida is expected to leave Sydney to-morrow. The ship was off here last Wednesday on the way to Botwood, but owing to ice conditions could not make there. The ship was then ordered on to North Sydney to load coal.

S.S. Silvia, the new Red Cross boat, leaves the other side about the end of June. The alterations to the ship are nearing completion and a first class boat for the service is assured. The Silvia has accommodation for 150 first class and 100 second class passengers. Three cabins de luxe are on the promenade deck, as is also a social hall and music room.

S.S. Manoa will leave Montreal on June 24th, beginning the Montreal-Charlottetown-St. John's route. The ship has been extensively altered and has been fitted with increased accommodation. She will now carry 150 first class passengers instead of 70 as heretofore.

S.S. Sable I. leaving Halifax to-morrow, called at Lunenburg. The ship is due here on Friday. She will leave Halifax on the next trip, on June 1st, calling at North Sydney. The weekly service between here and that port begins on June 3rd. Schr. Roy Bruce, which arrived at Halifax yesterday proceeds to North Sydney on Wednesday to discharge part cargo of molasses.


