

#### Two Hundred Different Cheeses.

(John o' London's Weekly.) Seeing what an interest most of us take in food, it is startling to realize low many sorts of food there are of

Department of Agriculture set to work to find out all about cheese and has issued a report which shows that asks, involuntarily stopping short on the countries of the world make more than two hundred different kinds.

If this statement sounds a triffe startling, I might remind you that here in our own islands we make some thirty different varieties, ranging all the way from Exeter cream cheese to Double Gloucester

The best known of English cheeses and the one most copied abroad is probably Cheddar; the best from the picure's point of view is Stilton, followed closely by Wensleydale. The Wilts.

Cheshire, Derby, Gloucester, Leicester, and York are counties which each produce a .well-known variety of cheese, while Wiltshire produces two sorts, "North Wilts" and Little Wilts," to say nothing of its cream cheese.

With regard to English cheeses it is an interesting point that different parts of the country have very strongly-marked tastes as to the texture and colour of cheeses.

Norfolk people, for instance, prefer cashire must have "Manchester White," while farther north a pale vellow or golden tinted cheese is in demand. So well is this fact known that the Canadian cheese makers colour their cheeses specially for the various markets.



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

Among Eskimos.

Explorers Slain as Evil Spirits. Christian Leden, the well-known Norwegian explorer, is back in Norway, after an absence of ten years.

His wanderings took him among the wild and little-known Eskimo tribes of the inland territory north and west of Hudson Bay. Some of these tribes had never seen a white man before, and were very primitive and superstitious in their beliefs.

A short time before Mr. Leden came among them they had killed two Americans, who they considered were evil spirits, and a month or two later a Canadian and a French mission priest suffered the same fate, the Eskimos believing them to have come from the underworld to avenge the

death of the Americans. In 1919 Mr. Leden started for anther expedition to the Canadian Arctic to collect for an American useum. His ship became a wreck between Hudson Bay and Repulse Bay, and he and his crew had to row 120 miles in an open boat to Chester-

field Inlet Music in Arctic Regions. Soon the explorer is to journey to he south-east region of Greenland. and next summer his third expedition to the Canadian Arctic is to be-

This expedition will be of an elaborate nature. To finance it, a string of trapping stations is to be spread north of Hudson Bay, in districts that are rich in fur-bearing animals and beyond the zone of the Hudson Bay Company's activities.

Excavations are to be made among a large number of very ancient dwelling sites along the east coast of Hudson Bay and results of great ethnological interest are expected.

Several scientists of different nationalities are to accompany the expedition which is expected to last about three years.

Eskimo music is also to be studied, and any relations between their folk melodies and those of other primitive tribes are to be investigated. From his collection of Eskimo songs.

Mr. Leden has shown that there are many points of similarity between the folk tales of the Eskimos and those of many North American Indian tribes, and in one instance a North Greenland Eskimo song has its almost exact counterpart in one from Southern

When a man has a ship to insure r a cargo which he wishes carried,

ne generally goes to a broker, and laces the matter in his hands. Ships fulls are usually insured for yearly periods by their owners and only the cargoes are covered for the voyage. But special circumstances as for instance in the case of a ship bound to seas in which she is no cover must be taken.

The broker furnishes himself with all the details that can possibly influence an underwriter in quoting a rate of premium and, arming himself with a long slip of paper, he starts

The Art of the Broker. The art of the broker is to know there to begin, for the underwriter who puts his name down first with a certain rate against it will probably influence a dozen others. So the broker, having made up his mind which under-writer to tackle, goes to him and mentions that he has such-

The broker's experience tells him that this man, Mr. Jones, did very well out of similar risks a year or so ago, underwriting several without getting, a single claim, and taking a special personal interest in that type of business. For instance, the cargo may be worth a hundred thousand pounds, nd Mr. Jones may be willing, on behalf of his syndicate, to cover a tenth of it at twenty shillings per cent.

Perhaps the whole sum to be insured will be covered at the rate fixed by the man who gave the lead or perhaps the premium will double itself. Mr. Smith may object to the ship, Mr. Brown to the owner, Mr. Robinson to the captain, while others may object to the broker and the class of risk which he usually brings

Thus it will be seen that the business calls for a combination of a huge general knowledge, a cylopaedic memory, and a cool judgment.


