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**Two Hundred  
Different Cheeses.**

(John o' London's Weekly.)  
Seeing that an interest most of us take in food, it is startling to realize how many sorts of food there are of which the average man knows nothing.

Take cheese as an instance in point. Some little time ago the United States Department of Agriculture set to work to find out all about cheese, and has issued a report which shows that the countries of the world make more than two hundred different kinds. If this statement sounds a trifle startling, I might remind you that here in our own islands we make some thirty different varieties, ranging all the way from Exeter cream cheese to Double Gloucester.

The best known of English cheeses and the one most copied abroad is probably Cheddar; the best from the spicure's point of view is Stilton, followed closely by Wensleydale.  
The Wiltshire, Derby, Gloucester, Leicester, and York are counties which each produce a well-known variety of cheese, while Wiltshire produces two sorts, "North Wiltshire" and "Little Wiltshire," to say nothing of its cream cheese.

With regard to English cheeses it is an interesting point that different parts of the country have very strongly-marked tastes as to the texture and colour of cheeses.  
Norfolk people, for instance, prefer a cheese of a brick-red colour; Lancashire must have "Manchester White," while farther north a pale yellow or golden tinted cheese is in demand. So well is this fact known that the Canadian cheese makers colour their cheeses specially for the various markets.

France and Switzerland between them produce as many varieties of cheese as England. Of these Gruyere is probably the most popular in this country. Good Gruyere is elastic in texture, light yellow in tint, and

should melt in the mouth. Interior Gruyere has a greyish tint, is dry, full of holes, and rapidly acquires an offensive odour. It is made from the milk of goats, Camembert, delicious when well made and well kept, is repulsive if over ripe.  
French.  
Roquefort and Brie are French cheeses well known in England. Post Brie is too oily for some people. Roquefort, by the way, is made from sheep's milk and is richly veined with blue marblings. Mont d'Or is of goat's milk mixed with that of cows, is golden yellow in colour, and luscious in taste; one of the oddest of Swiss cheeses is Schapsigler, which is green in colour and so strong in flavour that it is merely used for grating on bread and butter. It is supposed to be valuable as a digestive.  
Italians are expert cheese makers, and Gorgonzola, named from a village in Northern Italy, comes to England by the ton. It is ripened in the limestone caves of Ballabie, where the cheeses are kept on shelves until fit for use. Parmesan takes longer to make than any other cheese, for it must ripen for four whole years before it is fit for market. Gex cheese, made in the south of France, has a great reputation locally. The oddest cheese of all is perhaps the potato cheese, which comes from Thüringen, and which is flavoured with caraway seeds.

### Women Who Fight for an Empty Throne.

"Kaiserin" and the Crown Princess—  
"At Daggers Drawn"—Hatred, Plot and Counter-Plot.

Sensational Story of Intrigues.

No sooner does the threat of revolution and the overthrow of the Republican Government alarm Germany than two women, each continually keeping an eye on the throne, begin intriguing against each other. Finally, the ex-Kaiser insisted that Herminie be addressed "Your Majesty," and, obeying his energetic orders, his children gave in. But not so Cecilie. Cecilie refuses all contact with the ex-Kaiser and Herminie, telling me she does so "in the interests of my husband and my sons." The feeling of hatred is mutual. I have just spoken with both the persons in this fight for a throne, and, to use the commonplace expression, there is no love lost between them.

What the "Kaiserin" Says.

When I spoke to the "Kaiserin" about the hopes of the "Crown Princess" for her family she replied: "The Crown Princess and I are not on a friendly footing. She does not want to recognize me as Kaiserin. She probably believes that through that she might harm the interests of the Crown Prince and her children. You may publish throughout the world that as the legal wife of the Kaiser I represent all his rights. Who will be the Kaiser's successor will be decided, I hope, in the most distant future. The Kaiser waits—ready to go back when Germany calls."

Meanwhile, the Kaiser is not a sick man, as reported. He sees the reality with clear eyes, and the Kaiser is waiting for a moment when his people shall cry out to him from their deep misery. Then the hour will come when he and I shall return to Berlin, he as Kaiser, I as Kaiserin at his side, and we will show the German people their monarchs in their true form. It is not ambition which dictates my actions but true love, which compels me to do my hard duty, and no dark intrigues of our adversaries will prevent me from doing it."

Princess Herminie is an extremely talented and ambitious woman, and her influence with the ex-Kaiser is great. It is she who has enlisted the support of many Monarchists, who confirm the ex-Kaiser's hopes in himself. Here in Silesia Princess Herminie has her own newspaper. She has had journalistic experience, she writes well, and she does not hesitate in using the Press for systematic large-scale propaganda for her throne ambitions. On the other hand, Princess Cecilie insists that she represents both her husband and her sons, and claims that the ex-Kaiser by his second wedding, lost her last bonds of sympathy with him.

Against the Crown Prince.

Cecilie is administering her own household with wonderful energy, supervising the education of four sons and two daughters. But the power radiates through Germany from Doorn. Since Herminie took over the ex-Kaiser's affairs, she has organized sentiment. She stresses the fact that the people of Germany never liked the ex-Crown Prince, and many think she hopes not only to make herself Kaiserin, but to have her Royal-born sons by her first marriage declared the legal inheritors of the German Imperial Throne. So she concentrates upon everything to defeat Cecilie's pretensions.

Insanity Rumours—"Why Don't They Say the Kaiser Has Gone Crazy?"

She received me in her castle of Sanbor, Silesia, and said:—"There is talk abroad that the Kaiser's mind is clouded. Why don't they go a step further and say the Kaiser has gone crazy? Where do these calumnies come from? I give you authority to state that the Kaiser has fully recovered from his ear disease, and that his brain is more active than ever. We are sharing our work reading the same German and foreign newspapers. We clip the papers, and every evening the Kaiser holds a conference with his closest friends.

"Naturally sometimes he takes the liberty of criticizing the situation as his empire, and I want to stress the fact that his opinions on government and German feeling toward the spirit of monarchy are entirely different from those the Crown Prince holds. I regret that father and son disagree, but they will probably never come to an understanding. The German people should ask themselves now what the present democracy—the so-called—has given them, and whether politically or economically Germany's position is better now than it was when the Kaiser governed the world from Berlin."

Crown Princess and Poverty—"The Young Princess Sole Their Own Boots."

I asked the "Kaiserin" to introduce me to the "Crown Princess," but she refused, laughingly saying, "Impossible! The Crown Princess and I never see each other. She refused to attend my wedding. She hates the Press, and I am a Journalist. We shall never be friends." I went to the Crown Princess's home, and asked her why she was not visiting Doorn this year. "The present family situation keeps us back," she answered. "I hope that the time will come when the German people will allow my husband, the Crown Prince, to return to Germany, so that he may breathe German air again and act as a father to his children. But we do not complain, we do not cry out; we only demand our rights as human." The ex-Crown Princess told me that she is very poor. "Financially we are distressed," she said. "We must live a very retired life, avoiding all contact with Potsdam. We must restrict ourselves to the simplest ways of living, and when necessary the young princesses sole their own boots. I am educating our children so that they can earn their own living. Work never was shameful, and they shall all have trades or professions. I hope they won't take Castle Gels away from us."

#### "DON'T TRY TO ANSWER"

When you do anyone a kindness you do not mean to lay a burden on his or her shoulders, do you?  
Yet there are people who make their kindnesses such a burden, and complain if those who have received them are not willing to accept the burden.  
This is the sort of thing I mean. I heard a neighbor of mine criticizing a mutual friend of ours for rudeness. And the rudeness consisted in the fact that she had not answered a letter of sympathy sent to her at a time when she was very ill.  
A Burden For A Convalescent.  
Now I happen to know that this friend had had a long and slow convalescence. Like the rest of us she has a part to play in the routine of family life and she has tried to take up her household duties as soon as possible in order that the burden imposed on other shoulders by her illness should not rest there any longer than necessary. And that is the strength that she could summon.  
If, in addition to that, she had tried to acknowledge all the kind letters her friends sent her at the time of her illness she would have placed a very heavy burden on herself. And so she has let the letters go for the present.

#### A Four-Hour Day.

"O Dream of Rapture!" sing the lovers in "Tristan and Isolde." But without either their impulse or their ecstasy we can sing the same words with equal enthusiasm—If Dr. Chad B. Steinmetz is correct in his recent little message to the world, Dr. Steinmetz is an electrical expert of international renown. He believes the time is coming very shortly when there will be no long, backbreaking drudgery, and when nobody will be working more than four hours a day. Electricity will do the rest.

It is a great and glorious prospect, and it causes a great and glorious feeling to creep over us and to make our blood go singing merrily through our veins. No longer shall we have to labor at that which wears without satisfying. For instance furniture will be shifted by merely connecting up the electrical furniture mover with the nearest socket. The dishes will wash themselves up in an automatically rotating dishpan, heated by wire coils. Floors will clean themselves when the violet rays are turned upon them, and similar treatment will remove all footprints from Persian rugs. Potatoes will rub their skins off through rubbing against each other in an electric rocking bath. Cabbage will shake its own leaves loose. Beds will revert to their original condition of inviting and immaculate smoothness, and pyjamas will fold themselves up, when the radio ironer sends invisible waves of

electricity through the bedroom air from the wall socket.  
But will it be entirely an unmitigated blessing, the relief from all work that worries? Will automatically cooked meals taste just as nice as those prepared by some devoted housewife? Will a room set to rights by the manipulation of self-regulating wave measures from an electric straightener or leave the same impression of the detestable touch, that marks the perfect housekeeper? Will a drive in an automatically driven automobile be as pleasurable or as comfortable or as free from nerve strain as one which the knight of the road labors strenuously at the wheel?  
We fear just there be an embarrassment of relief from labor. Let us be free once and for all from all toil that degrades, debases or crushes humanity, in whatever form. But let us retain our right to do that work which is inspiring, which enables us to realize the dignity of labor and gives us at the day's long ending that quiet, calm, supreme satisfaction of a task well done and rest well earned—the peace that Healey realized so well.—Montreal Star.

HEADSTONES AND MONUMENTS.  
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**Raymond Poincare.**  
THE MAN WHO KNOWS HIS OWN MIND.  
By SIR NEVILLE PEARSON, Bart. in John o' London's Weekly.  
"Failure," said M. Poincare, "should never come. It usually means want of preparation. There is no difficulty in getting what you want either for yourself or for your country, if you take time and trouble."  
That little sentence gives us clearly as anything can the key to the character of the French Prime Minister, on whom at the moment all eyes in Europe are turned.  
Whether we agree or not with Poincare the politician, we are bound to have some admiration for Poincare the man. Strength, courage, and patriotism are the keystones to his existence. Born sixty-three years ago at Bar-le-Duc (Meuse), in the much-disputed province of Lorraine, he was old enough in 1870 for the events of that tragic period to have left a considerable impression upon his character. He comes of a strong, virile stock, belonging to that upper middle class which is the backbone of French influence to-day. In his early days his ambition was to write, and his work even came under the notice of the great Daudet, who criticized it for him; but his parents did not feel that the pen was a sufficiently secure occupation for a young man, and acting upon their advice he began studying for the Bar.  
Clemenceau's Epigram.  
In the legal profession he had a most distinguished career, and the law in its turn had no small influence on his politics. He has always shown the legal quality of being unable to see any arguments except those of his brief. Clemenceau, with whom he was, until the war, almost continuously at loggerheads, in making a comparison between him and Briand, is reported to have said: "Poincare knows everything and understands nothing; Briand understands everything, and knows nothing."  
M. Poincare is of medium build, with a high, smooth forehead and penetrating eyes. Work is the only thing that matters to him, and he gives his whole life to it. No form of games or sport appeals to him, and even when, as President of the French Republic, he was entertaining the King of Spain at Rambouillet, he declined to take part in the shooting party which had been organized for the amusement of the Spanish sovereign because he did not like to participate in the slaughter of birds, which he loved. Similarly, when he returned the visit by going to Spain, where he had a considerable political success, he would not attend a bull-fight which had been arranged in his honour. He has a great love of animals, and history says that two days before he was elected President of France he paid a special visit to his brother, Luden, because his pet goldfish was ill. I am glad to say that he managed to diagnose and cure the fish's illness.  
Winning a Case and a Wife.  
He had many interesting experiences during the time that he was practising at the Bar. He was the favourite advocate of all who were in any way connected with literature, and on one occasion he defended Jules Verne, the famous author of "Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea." However, so far as he was concerned, I suppose the greatest case that he was ever engaged upon was the one in which he was acting for a lady client, when he marshalled his arguments with such skill that he not only won the case but the lady's heart into the bargain. His charming wife free his imagination with just as much zest to-day as she did when he fought for her and won in the battle in the Law Courts.  
A Great Reader.  
He is a great reader and a great thinker, and when he talks he talks perhaps not so volubly as is the way of many of his compatriots but with great force and directness. In 1914 he was made Lord Rector of the Glasgow University, an honour which he greatly appreciated, and when he visited America a few years later he was made a member of the Society of Philosophy at Philadelphia. No subject is too deep or too complicated for him. He delights to find interest in

everything with which he comes in contact.  
"Poincare Poincare."  
He is well known in France as a great lover of the table, at which he is not a large but rather discriminating eater. When he was elected President of the French Republic a friend of his complimented him upon his assumption of the office, and told him that he, in company with the other great men of his country, had now achieved immortality. He replied that he would be much more likely to be handed down to history as the inspiration of the great cook Escottier, who had just composed a wonderful new dish of chicken which he had named "Poincarde Poincare."  
Albert Capus, the French litterateur, once described his personality as being based upon temperament dominated by mind. As far back as 1782, when an ancestor of his was defending a certain town against the Duke of Brunswick, he caused a wooden horse, with a box of hay in front of it, to be erected upon the ramparts of the town. He then sent a message to the enemy that he would surrender when he horse had eaten all the hay in the box. It is in the same spirit which dominates M. Poincare's personality to-day.

**Authors Who Never Wrote.**  
MASTERPIECES OF FICTION THAT WERE DICTATED.  
The man who walks about his study or lounges in an easy chair whilst his secretary takes down a dictated novel or article for the Press is sometimes regarded as a product of these modern days of haste.  
Yet there are great precedents for both "Paraliss Lost" and "Paradise Regained" were dictated. Milton was blind and unable to transcribe his own works. His method was to compose a number of lines in his mind, and then dictate them to anyone who happened to be handy.  
Wordsworth, the great interpreter of nature, used to ramble over hill and dale composing poems. When, after his death, an inquirer asked an old village if he knew him, the aged fellow said: "Aye, sure, I've oft seen him goo bumm'n' past." He was referring to the poet's habit of murmuring his lines as he walked.  
Stored in the Memory.  
In this way he could compose and memorize a couple of hundred lines. When he returned home he would call his sister or his wife to his side, and dictate the whole to them whilst they wrote.  
Sir Walter Scott is another example. The whole of "Ivanhoe" and "Guy Rannering" was dictated to secretaries, who took turns in striving to keep pace with him. But it was not Scott's usual habit to dictate. He was unwell at the time and unable to write.  
It is certain that the Iliad of Homer, as well as most of the ballad literature of the world, were spoken or sung for years, perhaps for ages, before they were committed to writing.
