


CAPT. JAMES LYNCK. H. F. SHORTIS.

In Memoriam

On Christmas Day, the newly-opened grave in the family plot in Belvedere was closed over the mortal emains of the octogenarian mariner, Capt. James Lynch, who, full of hope and love, and fortified by all the rites of the Catholic Church, entered that mysterious port, on Tuesday 23rd inst. which opens into eternity.

The deceased mariner was the son of Capt. James Lynch of the South Side, a famous sealkiller and master mariner in the fifties and sixtles of the past century, owner and master of the brigantine "Kirkland." After he lost that ship he purchased the brigantine "Spangle," which was em. ployed in the foreign service of our country, and was afterwards lost inside the North Head of Petty Har. bor, in the latter part of May, 1861, on a passage from Sydney to St. John's. Old Capt. Lynch then purchased the large brigantine "Tiger," and during the time she was running, the deceased and his brother Richard went with their father to the sealfishery and on foreign voyages. After the death of their father, the two brothers, ran her to England where she was sold-the deceased being mate at the time. On returning to Newfoundland, the deceased want mate with Capt, John Brien, in 'the "Bertha." owned by the famous sealkiller, Capt. Edward White, grandfather of the popular and capable Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Mines, G. E. Turner, I.S.O. Capt. Lynch sailed for many years with the veteran and successful master mariner. Capt, Richard Kearney, in the brig "Maria." out of the employ of Messra. P. and L. Tessier. His first voyage to sea was in 1859. His brother Richard was master of the Scotch brigautine "Cora," owned by the enterprising firm of Messrs. Baine Johnston & Co. and was lost with all hands in the fall of 1870-John Delahunty bying mate, and as hardy and capable a crew as ever sailed through the Narrows of St. John's. Getting up in years he received the appointment of warden in H. M. Penitentiary, during the time John A. McCowan was Governor of that Institution, and after # few years was appointed to a posttion in the Day Boat, of H. M. Customs, under the late Mr. John Preston, and his successor, Capt. Charles Nicholls, one of the most capable and successful master mariners that ever took charge of a ship in our mercautile marine, having made records in the Petunia, Mary Lizzie and Emelina. Some ten years ago, Capt. Lynch having passed his seventieth year, was retired from H. M. Customs, with a pension. He came from a well known family of seafaring men of the South Side, St. John's West, and hig father was contemporary of such pioneers in our country's history as Captains Edward White, Barrow, Halleran, Graham, Duff, Mealey, Hickey, Butler and those hardy mariners of


