SPEED LODGE A. F. & A. M.—An Emergency Meeting of this Lodge will be held this (Tuesday) evening in the Lodge Room, old Post office block, at half past seven o'clock.

Mr. Kenneth McKenzie, of the township of Culross, has recently lost two cows by hydrophobia. They are supposed to have been bitten by a rabid dog or fox—most probably by the latter.

John Graham, eldest son of Mr. Alex. Graham, of Culross, whilst feeding a threshing machine, near Teeswater, on Thursday last, had one of his arms drawn out of the socket at the shoulder, and the other one torn off at the wrist, by being accidentally caught in the machine.

The Bruce Review talks of a very violent storm of wind and rain which they had in that neighborhood a week ago, accompanied with vivid and almost incessant flashes of lightning and deafening peals of thunder. It lasted half an hour.

The Snider-Enfield Rifles for the whole Wellington Battalion have arrived and will be distributed this week. Considerable time will thus be afforded for intending competitors at the District Rifle Match, which takes place on the 5th proximo, to practice with the new arm.

DIPHTHERIA.—The fatal disease which goes by the name of diphtheria, but which is more properly called putrid sore throat is very prevalent about the village of Teeswater. There have been eleven or twelve deaths in one school section, and the school was closed by the trustees for three weeks.

ARTS EXHIBITION.—As stated in a previous issue of the Mercury the Arts Exhibition in connection with the Mechanics' Institute will commence on Monday evening, Nov. 4th, and continue open during certain hours both evening and night. An opportunity will thus be afforded our country friends of seeing the exhibition, and the opportunity should be embraced by them. In the evening it is proposed to have revueons, and such other entertainments as will afford general amusement. The price of admission is put down at the low figure of 10c. The Drill Shed is to be fitted up in a handsome style and to be brilliantly lighted at night. Parties who have not been waited upon are kindly requested to leave a list of whatever they may wish to contribute with Mr. S. Hooken, the Librarian, at once, as those collecting the articles are already at work, and request the intended articles to be ready for them. The Directors will superintend the fixing up and arrangement of the hall.

COURT OF CHANCERY.
The Court re-opened on Monday morning before Vice-Chancellor Mowat. The following case occupied the whole day.

McINTYRE vs THE ATTORNEY GENERAL.—Bill filed to set aside Patent. The plaintiff claimed as having made first improvements, and therefore was entitled to the land. The lot was originally taken up by one Campbell, who afterwards sold to the defendant Walker. Campbell made no improvements. Walker claimed that he had purchased from plaintiff another piece of land in Brant, and for this land paid part in cash and gave Plaintiff 60 acres of the land in question, but that afterwards Plaintiff had sold back to Walker the 60 acres for which he gave \$300 in three notes. The land in question is now worth \$1000. The case was argued, and stands for judgement. Mr. Moss and Mr. A. Hoskin for plaintiff; Mr. Crooks for Attorney General; and Mr. Hamilton for Jackson and Walker.

Board of School Trustees.
The Board met last night. Present Mr. Jones, Chairman pro tem. Messrs. Pirie, Newton, Harvey, McNeil, Howard, Watson and Fraser.
The Secretary read a communication from the Canada Company in reference to the lease rent of a lot in town, and he was instructed to ascertain the amount due the Company at the next term of payment.

A memorial, signed by Messrs. Grafty, Ferguson and Martin, teachers in the primary schools, was presented, asking the Board to change the school hours during the winter months from 9 a. m. to 3 or 3:15 p. m., with an interval of half an hour at mid day, as such an arrangement would tend more to the comfort of teachers and pupils.—Referred to the School Management Committee.

An account from Mrs. Foley for \$6.00 for cleaning the schools was presented, and referred to the School Property Committee.

A communication was read from Miss Grafty in reference to her salary—whether she should be paid for the whole term of three months, or from the date she began to teach.

Moved by Mr. McNeil, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that Miss Grafty's engagement be accounted to have commenced immediately after the close of the midsummer holidays, and that her salary be paid from that date.—Carried.

Mr. Newton presented the report of the Finance Committee recommending the following accounts to be paid—Harold office \$5.42, Mr. D. Savage \$5.50, Mr. Hart \$2.75. The report was adopted.

Mr. Pirie presented the report of the School Management Committee, recommending that \$6 be granted for purchasing sheet lessons for the North and West Ward Primary Schools. The report was adopted.

The Board then adjourned.

Garafraxa Ploughing Match.
The annual ploughing match in connection with the Township Agricultural Society was held on Wednesday the 23rd on the farm of Mr. Andrew Richardson. There were 15 entries, five in each of the three classes. A large number of spectators were present, and manifested much interest in the proceedings. The field was suitable for the purpose, and though the ground was dry, the ploughmen did good work. During the day the judges, ploughmen—in fact everybody—were hospitably entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Richardson. The judges were—Messrs. John Cunningham, Forbes, Mair and G. S. Shaw. The Papal Zouaves.
The Zouaves in the Papal army are justly looked upon as its elite, and were originally organized, if we remember rightly, by the celebrated General de Lamoriciere. They fought well at the battle of Castle Fidar, but were eventually obliged to lay down their arms and surrender to the overwhelming numbers brought against the Papals by the Italian commanders. They comprise representatives from some of the oldest families in France and Belgium, and some Canadians. We have a letter from one of these dated the very town threatened by the insurgents—Viterbo. The pontifical Zouaves was then 3,000 strong, divided into two battalions, and a depot company, which was stationed at Rome. The Colonel in Chief M. d. Aleth, a Swiss, and the Lieutenants Colonels, chefs de bataillons all French. Our friend speaks in the highest terms of the food provided, and says that it is even better than that furnished by the French army; but on the other hand he is not so enthusiastic about the pay. The Papal Zouaves only receive "nine coppers every five days." [What do you say to that corporal Tim of the British line?] but finds consolation in the fact that wine is only "two coppers a pint." Our Zouave further says that the Canadians and Irish in the corps are "very good soldiers," and that unfortunately there are not enough of them. The Papal army was raised in 1860 to 25,000 men, but this number has since been largely reduced. It may now comprise 12,000 to 15,000 effective men.

DISRESPECT TO THE QUEEN OF SPAIN.—A Madrid correspondent describes the disrespectful treatment which the Queen of Spain continues to receive at the hands of large bodies of her subjects. On Her Majesty's return to Madrid an announcement was made in the Gaceta that she would on a day named, proceed to one of the sacred shrines in that city to pay her devotions to the Virgin, and a hope was expressed that the inhabitants would give her a cordial greeting. The notice, however, produced just the contrary effect, for, with the exception of a few stragglers, the streets were empty; even these turned aside immediately as the royal procession drew near.

THE COMMERCIAL BANK.—The Hamilton Times says:—The Commercial Bank of Canada and the Home District Savings Bank have ceased to pay out their own paper to depositors. The Directors of the Bank will hold a meeting at Kingston on the 6th of November, when the whole affairs of the Commercial will be fully discussed and considered, and the course to be pursued with reference to the creditors of the Bank determined on. As the time is but short, we would advise holders of Commercial bills to keep them until after the meeting of the Board of Directors, as the probability is they will be taken at their discount when in payment of any claims for discounted paper it may hold. The whole community will look with intense interest, and many with profound anxiety, for the action of the Bank Directors on Thursday the 6th of November next.

Mademoiselle Wilson, the celebrated cantatrice, who receives now a salary of one hundred thousand francs, and is the great rival of Adelina Patti, was five years ago a little Swedish girl, wearing a coarse homespun dress and wooden shoes. Her parents employed her to carry milk from their dairy farm to the neighbours. One day in the winter time, her merry warblings, her beautiful voice, and her intelligent face attracted the attention of a distinguished musician from Stockholm, who prevailed on her parents to send her to the Conservatory at Stockholm where her teachers discovered at once her surpassing talents, and stated that that another Jenny Lind had been found.

COMMERCIAL BANK.—An important preliminary meeting of stockholders in the Commercial Bank takes place to-day at Allan's office Montreal to decide on some course to recommend at the public meeting at Kingston on the 6th prox.

THE MEXICAN ELECTION.—Reports from Mexico state that Juarez has been elected President of the Republic by a very large majority, but that this result was brought about mainly, in several of the departments, by military intimidation.

DETROIT vs. HAMILTON.—An interesting game of Base Ball is being played to-day on the grounds of the Hamilton Cricket Club, between nine players from Detroit and the Maple Leaf Base Ball Club of that city.

THE UPRISING IN ITALY.

Two Desperate Battles NEAR ROME.

The Garibaldians Victorious!

ROME HEMMED IN BY THE GARIBALDIANS.

Great Consternation in the City.

INTENSE EXCITEMENT THROUGHOUT ITALY.

NO MINISTRY YET FORMED
(To-day's Despatches.)

London, Oct. 26th, midnight.—The following important despatches have been received here: Paris, Oct. 26.—A fleet of war steamers left Toulon this morning under orders to proceed direct to Civita Vecchia. The embarkation of troops on transports at Toulon has been completed, and a despatch announcing their departure for Italy is momentarily expected.

Florence, Oct. 26.—The soldiers of King Victor Emmanuel refuse to fight against Garibaldi. The Councils of the King's government is gaining ground, and it is now considered that a thoroughly radical ministry will be formed, whose policy will be devoted to making Rome the capital of Italy.

Paris, Oct. 26, evg.—Bourse better and Renten stronger.

Rome, Oct. 26.—The Pope, in a letter to the Roman Catholic Bishops throughout the world, says that the patrimony of the church has been assailed by revolutionists, and asks them to order prayers in all the churches for the Holy See. The police, on Friday, in searching a house, with resistance, they then attacked the house with bayonets, killed 15 Garibaldians, took 36 prisoners and a quantity of arms.

There has been fighting to-day half a mile from the city. Great excitement prevails within the walls of Rome. The revolutionists are making preparations for a second uprising. A proclamation has been issued for preventing assemblages of over four persons together at the same time. All persons are to retire within their houses, and shops are to be closed when the signal of alarm is given. 1,000 Garibaldians, it is reported attacked Viterbo yesterday, and were repulsed with heavy loss. Citizens of Rome have been armed and patrol the streets nightly.

Florence, Oct. 26.—It is reported a desperate battle was fought near Monte Rotundo on Friday. Garibaldi won the victory with four battalions. He put to flight and pursued the Papal forces, taking one hundred prisoners and three guns. Many were killed and wounded on both sides. Gen. C. Idini has been unable to complete the formation of a new ministry and has abandoned the effort. Both Rattazzi and Gen. D'Adda are trying to reconstruct the Cabinet.

Turin, Oct. 26.—There was a great popular demonstration in this city yesterday in favour of making Rome the capital of the nation, and an address to the King of Italy to that effect was adopted.

Paris, Oct. 27.—Garibaldi's force is said to be from 10,000 to 12,000 strong. All the Papal troops have been concentrated before Rome, with orders to act upon the defensive. The troops have sailed from Toulon, and it is expected they will reach Civita Vecchia this afternoon. He put to flight and pursued the Papal forces, taking one hundred prisoners and three guns. Many were killed and wounded on both sides. Gen. C. Idini has been unable to complete the formation of a new ministry and has abandoned the effort. Both Rattazzi and Gen. 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Florence, Oct. 27.—The young men of Italy are swarming over the papal frontier to join Garibaldi. It is reported that Garibaldi received a check at Monte Rotundo from the papal troops, who were suddenly reinforced.

Paris, Oct. 27.—The *Moniteur* of to-day says the fleet at Toulon had been kept back at the request of the King of Italy, but it has now sailed for the Italian coast. No Cabinet has been formed at Florence, and Garibaldi is menacing Rome. The action of France is declared not aggressive. Both Italy and France are interested in the preservation of order and the vindication of the law. The *Moniteur* hopes that the cordiality between the two nations will not be disturbed.

A banquet was given yesterday by the Foreign Ministers of the Imperial Commission of the Exposition Universelle to the French Members. Many speeches were made, and a very cordial state of feeling was manifested. Mon. Rouleau, minister of foreign affairs, made an important and interesting speech. He alluded directly to the present crisis in the Italian peninsula, and said he hoped Italy would get under the influence of bad passions, but he would embark in war with France, but that she would emerge from this great national trial purified and a friend to all.

It is expected the first division of the naval expedition for the relief of Rome, which left Toulon on Saturday morning, will reach Civita Vecchia to-night.

PARIS, Oct. 28.—The wildest rumours in regard to Italy are circulated here. It is reported that the Italian Crown Prince has put himself at the head of an army to restrict the French. Another rumour is that Victor Emmanuel will abandon his throne.

BERLIN, Oct. 27.—The King of Prussia has returned from his tour through the South German States. REDUCTION OF POSTAGE.

It is generally believed that one of the first attempts at practical reform by the new Parliament when it shall assemble for legislation, will be to reduce the postage on the half-ounce letter from five to three cents.

But as to postage throughout the Dominion, the Montreal Gazette, in referring to the Postmaster-General's Report for 1865, the last issued by the Department, finds that after deducting one-third of the revenue—the probable amount it will fall short on the reduction from five to three cents—and one-third of the unpaid postage on dead letters, and adding the amount now incurred for printing blank forms—no longer required on account of pre-payment by postage stamps—the revenue on the basis of 1865, would amount to \$555,852.

TRANSFER OF SECURITIES.—The London Prototype says: The question as to whether the Commercial Bank can legally transfer its securities to other bondholders is one of vital interest to those having notes maturing. At present the Bank is bankrupt, and can make no preferential assignments, and we think that those indebted to the bank have good legal grounds to refuse to pay the amount of their indebtedness, even although transferred to other Banks, in anything but Commercial Bank currency.

THE SOUTHERN RAILWAY.—The London Advertiser says:—A bill is to be brought into Parliament at the next session to obtain a charter to build the extension of the Erie and Niagara Railway, from a point on the present (most likely Fort Erie) to a point on the Detroit River.
