London, Oct. 21st.—A despatch from Spain says that the negotiations for the surrender of the Carlist battalion commanded by Bernaola Gorodo, have apparently failed. 66Oliver Goldsmith, the Good-Natured Man. 37

"Oliver Goldsmith, the Good-Natured Man."

This was the title of a lecture delivered by Mr. James Fahey, of the Herald, on Tuesday evening, on behalf of the St. Vincent de Paul Society. The Town Hall was crowded on the occasion, and the lecture was in every sense a success. The lecturer sketched in a very entertaining way the life of the Good-Natured Man who "wrote like an angel, but spoke like poor Poll," drawing instructions, and entertainment from the mistakes which were so characteristic of the poet. His life at school, where he was like other eminent inen—a cultural; his companionship with Barke, Garrick, and Dr. Johnston; his wanderings in search of nothing, and his success in generally finding nothing; his career, commenced without money and closed with £1,000 to the credit of his creditors; were sketched with a facility of expression which was rendered very pleasurable by the interspersion of aneedotes and humorous illustrations. In credit Valley Railway.—Wages on the C. V. R. have been refuced to one dollar per day. In Caledon at present, working on grading, are eleven gangs, composed of 156 men, and 56 horses; amongst these are eight Italians, sixteen Swedes, and fourteen English emigrants lately arrived. On the Erin branch there are eight forem, 70 mer, and 26 horses.
