Armies are Still in Close Touch

Only Twelve Miles Separate General Keller's Forces and the Japanese.

Russian Admiralty Doubt the Report of Recent Fight by Topo.

St. Petersburg, July 7, 7 p.m.—All the latest dispatches from the seat of war are to the effect that General Kurapatkin is still at the head of the Japanese forces and are stationary at Senchen and along the roads from Shyuen to Kacheng, Tachekia and Kachon, but they are maintaining their advance from Pengwangchee over the direct main roads to Liao yang, where the effect of the rains is less appreciable. There are only 12 miles between General Keller's forces and the Japanese army, and a collision between them is not regarded as unlikely.

OSPEROUS NEWFOUNDLAND. Quarter of a Million Surplus in Sight for Last Fiscal Year.

St. John's, N. F., July 5.—The revenue of Newfoundland for the fiscal year, which ended June 30th, reached \$4,400,000, an increase of nearly \$100,000 over last year. Notwithstanding the cessation of duties during the year, the surplus over the last fiscal year approaches \$250,000.

BIG SLAUGHTER OF WOMEN AND CHILDREN

Dutch Attack Rebellious Natives and Kill Many of the Innocents

Amsterdam, July 5.—A despatch from the captain of the Dutch East India ship, the commander of the expedition to North Acheh (Northern Sumatra), attacked Lika on June 20. Acheh losses were: Killed 100, including 251 women and 88 children, and 24 wounded; 17 prisoners were taken. The Dutch casualties included 20 men and 13 soldiers, two of whom were killed. The Dutch attacked Lannat 24th, when the Acheh losses were killed 654, including 188 women and 130 children, and 49 wounded; 28 prisoners. The Dutch losses were a captain, 22 soldiers and six coolies.

POPULIST CONVENTION.

Springfield, Ill., July 4.—That the future of the Populist party depends, in a great measure, upon the election of the Democratic national convention at St. Louis, is fully admitted and discussed by the delegates to the Populist national convention, which was called to order today in the state assembly.
