It may be interesting to know that P. A. Writing from Swift Current Private R. A. Smith of the 7th Fusiliers says: "We have lots of sport here all the while. We are in for it in right good style. Besides the game and drill three times a day, we have football, quoits and boxing with gloves, and just the right kind of work to build up the boys. All the camp are in splendid health, and boxing is now in good for us all, and makes a man feel any duty they may give us to do." Since the rebellion the price of meat at all kinds has gone up fully 50 cents per pound. This is owing to the fact that a great number of the cattle owned by the men engaged in the rebellion, but which they will now have to buy either in England or in the States, and it is not likely that present prices will keep up until the late of August, at which time there will be a decline in the price of grain and beef and prices will then come down. Pork is worth 70 cents per bushel—Winnipeg and Jack Hunter, of the Grenadiers, has sent a letter from Clarke's Crossing to his mother in Hamilton, from which the following extracts are taken: "I have just sold four houses in nine days. Tell father the Northwest is all right for a man that owns a house. We went to a house to get a lot of lumber and they charged 40 cents for a pound and a half load of very dear! Coal oil is \$1.50 per gallon and very dear. Pork is delivered where we are now. We killed a lot of rabbits the other day with skis. There are hunters here for muskrat, coon and ducks, lot too. I don't know how long we will be out here, but it is a better life than at home. I am getting stouter already."

Notwithstanding the hardships of soldiering on the prairie, the Toronto troops, as well as all others, appear to be bearing it bravely, and are by no means ill-spirited, if the letter appended may be taken as an indication. They are expected to reach the city to-morrow for burial. The Governor-General's Body Guards are stationed at Humboldt for the present. The men are well and the horses in fine condition. The scouting parties sent out fifteen miles were being thrown up about the camp, and will be completed to-morrow. Col. Denison sent a detachment of twelve men to-day to escort four hundred loads of ammunition up to Humboldt. Supplies are moving forward in better shape under the new arrangements. News from Qu'Appelle reports everything quiet, and the troops performing themselves in drill and in the use of the rifle at target. Rev. Mr. Lawson, who has just returned from the Northwest, reports that the Indians and half-breeds of that place trouble in a few days. Several settlers have left their places. A despatch from Calgary announces that two companies of the 9th Battalion, Quebec, left for Fort McLeod on Friday evening. Another company goes to Gibeau, and two companies of the 92nd Battalion thus relieved will join their command under Col. Governor Smith at Edmonton. A despatch from Moosejaw announces the arrival there yesterday of 90 transport wagons brought from Fargo, Dak., by Major Bell.
