John C. Emery Has Been Living in Toronto.

IS WELL KNOWN AROUND TOWN

It Was Here That the Plot Was Hatched.

Emery, Who Was a Fugitive From Justire, Had Paid the Buffalo Attorney \$17,000 to Secure a Pardon and tae Latter Mad Failed to Give a Satisfactory Accounting-\$5000 Paid Over to Emery Before the Barrister Was Re

The man who planned and successfully carried out the astounding abduction of the Buffalo attorney, Octavius O. Cottle, the facts in connection with which were published in The World of yesterday, has for two or three years past been a resident of Toronto. His name is John C. Emery. He is a son-in-law of an ex-postmaster of Cincinnati, and a fugitive from Ohio justice for violation of the postal laws, and resided until two weeks ago in a furnished room in Churchstreet. His room is still being kept for

It was in Toronto that the scheme to abduct Cottle was concocted, and it was here that he met George Allen, the companion who assisted him in executing the daring and successful kidnapping.

His Life in Toronto. Emery came from Cincinnati. He was conducting an electric belt business there and he became involved in serious trouble through a wiolation of the United States postal laws and was indicted by the Federal grand jury, and locked sup. Friends went on his bonds. Emery, who saw prison staring hin in the face, for he felt incapable of putting up a good defence, fled to Toronto.

As his offence was not extraditable, he made no secret as to who he was. He rented apartments in Queen-street west and speedily became acquainted with the men-about-town. A. few months after his arrival here his wife followed him to Toronto. They had a lively meet-







received their passports. Steady Improvement in Trade. New York, June 28 .- Bradstreet's says:

New York, June 28.—Bradstreet's says: General trade prospects in the Canadian Dominion remain as favorable as heretofore, a steady improvement being reported from Montreal in drygoods, groceries and liquors, which is in contrast with the advices from Toronto, where trade is quiet, as usual at this season; But crop prospects in Ontario are fair, and a large volume of business is expected in the autumn. Bank clearances at Winnipeg; Hamilton, Toronto, Montreal and Halifax amount to \$19,661,000 this week, as compared with \$22,332,000 last week, and \$16,175,000 in a like week last year.

The total number of business failures in the Dominion reported to Bradstreet's for six months of 1895, is 934, or 20 fewer than the total in the first half of last year. Ontario reports four more this year than last, and Quebec 25 fewer.
