Cryostaso is the name of the substance discovered by a German chemist, which has the remarkable property of solidifying has the remarkable property of solidifying under the influence of heat and again becoming liquid at temperatures below freezing point. It is obtained by mixing equal parts of phenol, camphor and saponine, to which is added a rather smaller quantity of turpentine. This is the only substance at present known which possesses the property of liquiditing when sesses the property of liquefying when cold and becoming solidified when hot. for, if some substances, like albumen, harden at a slightly high temperature, they cannot be brought back again to the liquid state, even under the influence of a very low temperature.

An Antartic expedition, from which im-An Antartic expedition, from which important and interesting information is certain to result, has been arranged for next winter. It will be partly a trading and partly a scientific enterprise, and will be under the command of Captain Svend Foyn, of Christiania. Mr. W. S. Bruce, an energetic young Scotchman, of the Ben Nevis Observatory, will have charge of the scientific party, composed of himself and four other men. The scientific party will be landed on the Antarctic Continent, in Victoria Land, in January next, and the vessel will then engage in whale and seal fishing, re-turning to Australia. The following season, in January, 1893, she will return and take off the scientific party, who hope by them to be full of knowledge of the fauna, flora, geology and topography of the Antarctic region. Magnetism, of course, will receive full attention and, if found practicable, an attempt will be made to reach the south magnetic pole. Mr. Bruce and Capt. Foyen are not without hope that the expedition will be a commercial success, holding that blue whales are plentiful in the Antarctic, and the only reason why they have never been caught is that no ship has been south which has carried the right tackle.



The Michigan product of lumber last year was 2,731,029,535 feet; shingles 360,535,500. There has been a more or less steady decline since 1888, when the maximum output of lumber, 4,292,189,014 feet, was reached. Still Michigan held its own among the Northwestern States, the total product of all the mills in Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa being 7,093,-398,598 feet of lumber and 2,465,368,600 shingles. This is not a great decline from the maximum, 8,934,053,173 feet, reached in 1892. The figures show that the two Western States are slowly gaining over Michigan Michigan.







OUR EXPORT TRADE.

There is one charge that has been brought against Canadian exporters; common with our British consine we land easily examined box. hold to the belief that our own

that we are frequently content to see the trade pass into other hands rather than alter our habitual methods,

It is for this reason that the Ger. mans are absorbing so steadily the trade of countries and colonies which should be our own. It is not their low wages nor their long working hours which have brought German trade up to the second place in Europe, and the third in the world, but the push and adaptability of their manufacturers. They are careful to advertise their goods in the language of the country whose trade they are endeavoring to secure. They use the weights and measures that are in popular use, and quote prices in the local currency. They find out exactly what their prospective customers need, and the form in which they prefer it, and they are careful to comply with the local prejudices and likings, while we practically say to them, "Here are our goods, packed STEADILY INCREASING! IN our way. Take them as we offer them, or we cannot do business." As a result our export trade is not increasing. Our flour, butter, apples and fish are being ousted by similar produce, no better than our own, but put up in more convenient and tasteful form. Danish and New Zealand butter is replacing Canadian upon the breakfast tables of Great Britain, simply because it is more neatly and attractively put up, and in the size of package which suits British trade. It is the same with our apples. The barrel in which our fruit is put up is too large a package for the average British household, and thus dealers prefer the square cases containing about half the quantity, in which French and American apples go forward. It is true that one of our more progressive fruit houses has already adopted a neat case of this size, just heavy enough for a man to carry, and cleated at top and bottom so as to permit of free ventilation when stored in the hold. But they are only the exception which proves the rule; for the majority of shapers cling to the old-fashioned barrel. with all its facilities for false packing that it seems difficult to refute; and and its difficulty of examination, in that is our lack of adaptability. #### A NEW COMPETITOR.

It is evident that improved methods and greater cheapness of transportation have so increased the world's supply of cereals that an era of low prices is expected to rule for years to come. With the extension of traffic facilities has come the possibility of growing grain profitably in sections of the country where heretofore the lack of communication with the central markets formed an insuperable barrier to agriculture, and not only this, but every year the resistless progress of the steam engine opens up untouched fields only waiting for the farmer to pour their quota into the granaries of the world.

Even were Europe cultivated to the limit of her capacity, there are still immense grain-growing districts in South America, Africa and Australia not yet opened, and in a very few years Asia will be sending wheat to the distributing centres of Europe. Outside of the waterways, which are naturally useful for exports only in the summer time, the Russian Government is building a railroad across Siberia. When finished, that road will cover the distance from the Ural Mountains to Vladivostock at the Pacific Ocean, 3,940 miles, the cust of which is estimated to be 480,-The road will pass 000,000 roubles. through the fertile plains, touching all points of importance, as Omsk, Mariusk, Atzchiusk, Krasnojarsk, Tonisk, Irkutsk, &c.; and, as coal is found in plenty and the road will be operated principally "for the good of the country," the freight rates will be fixed at a very low scale, thereby enabling the Siberian products to take up competition on the European markets. The road, in its full length, is expected to be finished in the beginmng of next century, and at the same time the canalization is expected to be sufficiently completed.

It is evident from this that the close of the next five years will witness the entrance of a new graingrowing competitor into the wheat markets of the world, and that con sequently any permanent advance in wheat values is unlikely. War or natural causes may reduce the yield in any one country, and this may influence them temporarily. But, with the whole world to draw from, the possibility of any scarcity arising is out of the question. As our farmers could scarcely compete with the cheap wages and frugal expenditure of the Asiatic laborer, it is probable that more attention will be paid on this continent to mixed farming, market gardening, live stock and dairy produce, and that the growing of grain will gradually pass more and more into the hands of the lower grade of agriculturalists, such as till the lands of Argentina and Asia, while the more highly educated farm er of our own country will occupy hunself exclusively in what may be Boots and shoes..... termed the higher walks of agriculture.

#### COLONIAL TRADE.

The report of the Department of Trade and Commerce for 1895 contains tables showing the principal articles of merchandise imported into and exported from Great Britain and her chief colonies. In connection with the question of preferential trade between the mother country, and her possessions the exhibit is interesting. It also shows in what articles there is an opening for the extension of Canadian exports.

The tables are too elaborate for reproduction in our columns, but the following will show some features bearing upon our own trade. It gives the total amount of several articles imported by Great Britain and the colonies and the amount of the total exports of the same article by Canada.

She has little to fear from the competition of foreign manufacturers, she needs an enormous supply of food products, and in order to secure them as cheaply as possible she has thrown her ports open freely to all producers so that the cost of living may be reduced to the lowest point, and thus the price Imports by Total ex- of labor be reduced to the level which the success of her manufacturers requires.

#### THE INVESTMENT MARKET.

The present moment is an auspicious one for the proposed conversion of \$2,000,000 of the city's temporary debt into a permanent one at a lower rate of interest. Rarely has money been so plentiful in England, and soldom has the demand for sound investments been so keen as it is at present. For over two years the bank rate has stood at its minimum of 2 per cent, and money in the open market has ranged from 1 to 1 per cent for call and at 11-16 to 15-16 for three months. Rich as Great Britain already is, she is growing steadily richer. The domestic field for capital is now almost completely occupied, and the astonishing rush for South African shares was merely the outcome of the flood of unoccupied capital seeking any chance, however vague, of profitable employment.

It must be remembered that during the past few months British trade has shown decided improvement. During the latter part of 1895 both foreign commerce and domestic industries showed a marked revival. There was a growth of £28,000,000. or nearly 5 per cent, in the value of exports and imports; bank clearings increased, for the year, over £1,250,-000,000, or close upon 20 per cent: railway traffic receipts increased more than £1,000,000, and the total tonnage of vessels launched was 1,099,-078 tens, against 1,079,479 tons in 1894. Another evidence of Britain's grow ing prosperity is shown by the inbanks deposits during the year. It is only about 21 per cent, and which ploited by British investors. has resulted in an anxious search for sound investments from the wealthier class, whose surplus income is excluded from the savings banks. This has resulted in a marked rise in the price of other high-class securities. The 31 per cent Metropolitan District debentures, which in 1890 could be bought at 113, now bring 121, and the 23s have risen from 101 to 111. Liverpool 31s have risen during the same period from 113 to 134, Notting ham 3s from 99 to 1153. Railway shares, gas shares, Suez Canal shares, New River Water stock, and the better class of industrial stocks are also selling at prices at which the income they yield is between 3 per cent and 4 per cent, while a number of perpetual i per cent first-class railway debentures are quoted at 150 and upward, and some 3 per cents at 115 and upward. The ordinary shares of Guinness's browery, which in 1890 sold at 357, sell now at 175, and Allsop & Co.'s, in the same business, are quoted at 142, after having been for a long while below par. The upshot of the matter is that in Great Britain cautious investors, and trustees, executors, and other people whose choice of investments is limited by law, can barely obtain a return of 23 per cent on money invested, while for 3 per cent more or less risk must be taken.

If this constant lidding of capitalists against one another for what sound securities are now available continues, it is evident that the prices of these coveted investments must shortly reach a point at which the returns they can make will yield only a fraction of interest, and the owners of money will be compelled in sheer desperation to invest in risks which they now shun, in order to find emplayment for it. #### WOOD PULP SHIPMENTS.

Inquiries among importers of wood pulp suggest that in the development of this intact at \$125,000,000, but there will be trade Canadians will do well to pay greater attention to the methods of shipment. The quality of the Canadian mechanical wood pulp is spoken of as, generally speaking, superior to candinavian makes, and consumers are not unwilling to pay higher prices for it than for other grades, but the condition in which it arrives abroad is distinctly bad. Ground pulp, with 50 per cent. of moisture, instead of being packed in canvon, as is Scandinavian pulp, comes in loose bundles without any covering at all, and so arrives in a thoroughly dirty state. It gathers all the coal-dust and dirt that comes near it on rail, steamship, and waggons. The chemical pulp should also come in bales, and not in awkward rolls as now. This is probably one reason why Canadian pulp is handicapped by higher steamship freights. The industry has a great future before it if care be only taken in such matters as these. Canada certainly should have no difficulty, seeing her lumber wealth and water-power, in standing well in British markets.





#### STYLES IN LACES.

Lace has now taken its place as an accessory for all costumes, and become as it were a part of the garment itself. This season the newest designs are marvels of beauty, not only in pattern, but in texture. These delicate fabrics seem to rival even the ages when lace work ranked with all its splendor for vestments and formed with silk or satin its chief adornment. This season the most fashionable is known as the Venetian. Its pattern is in the form of a circle of discs, each disc being padded like that of the true French embroidery. In each centre is a series of knots and threads. It has a well finished top and bettom, is of fine cotton, washable, and is an exquisite trimming for any material. Next in style is the Mechlin. Its decided pattern is of a thick combination of laces and conventional designs ending in a deep point. This lace is peculiarly adapted for the popular dressy bodice and so splendid in its effects that it could be worn for any season-even long after it has ceased to be in fashion. Among the new trimmings is the lace Batiste. It is a sort of appliqued cream-colored cotton affair, in which a chain-stitch forms the edges and holds together the leaves and flowers of this claborate design. .. a centre scheme there is a ring in which tints of cream cotton thickly button-holed form an excellent stay. #### CALIFORNIA'S DRIED FRUITS.

During the past two weeks there has been a decided improvement in the movement of California dried fruits from first hands. The orders have been almost entirely for small lots, but in the aggregate a considerable quantity of stock has been placed. The improvement in trade is attributed chiefly to the enlargement of consuming demands of late, but it has been assisted in no small degree by the statistical position, which under more favorable general industrial and commercial conditions would, it is held, have admitted long si..co of much higher prices than those represented by the bulk of the recent transactions. While there has been no actual improvement in quotations, sellers seem to find less difficulty in getting buyers to come up to their views that they experienced a week or two ago.

Raisins, which have dragged more than any other article on the list for a long time past, are participating to an extent in the general improvement, yet holders find it hard to enthuse buyers, notwithstanding the statistical showing, as the impression still seems to prevail with the latter that the bottom of the market has not yet been reached; this impression seeming to be based on the demoralization into which the trade was thrown a while ago by the indiscriminate consignment of stock from the Coast to small interior markets. Consequently, while it is shown that stocks in California are not now much more than 50 per cent of the average quantity carried there at this season, efforts to get prices up in this market make little progress.

Prunes are doing much better, but they, too, are not bringing the prices which many holders think they are worth. The market has been depressed for some time by offerings of poorly cured and otherwise inferior stock but it is now said that the think, with him, that a serious obstacle to

While apricots are comparatively cheap they are still too high, according to the views of most buyers, in contrast with the cost of other dried fruits which may be substituted for them, such as peaches and apples. They have been going out a little more freely of late, but any attempt to put up prices checks demand. This also applies to peaches. Both of these fruits, however, were stronger on reports of frost and snow in the Santa Clara Valley where the trees were so far advanced that frost would be likely to do serious damage. If these reports are confirmed it is expected that prices will advance.

#### COLLISIONS AT SEA.

A STATE OF THE PROPERTY OF THE

"How to Minimize the Effect of Collisions at Sea" was the subject of an address recently delivered before the Hong Kong Chamber of Commerce by Admiral Makaroff, of the Russian Navy. The subject is one of great importance in these days of swift steamers with knife-edge bows, as the Admiral showed by several instances. among them the sinking of the big ocean steamer Elbe by the diminutive Crathie. when the latter was going at a very moderate speed. Premising that circumstances are bound to arise in which collisions are unavoidable, but that in almost every instance the speed of both vessels is greatly reduced before they come together, Admirable Makaroff suggested that it would be perfertly feansible to fit the bow of every steamer with a "false nose," of material strong enough to resist the action of the waves, and shapely enough to preserve both the speed and the beauty of the craft, but weak enough to crumble up on coming in contact with such a solid object as another ship, and so strike her with a broadened surface of comparatively soft material, which might dent but would not penetrate her fragile plates, instead of cutting them down from the bulwarks to below the water line, which is the almost inevitable result of the slightest touch with the sharp steel bow of a modern vessel. The experts who listened to Admiral Makaroff's address agreed with him as to both his statements and his conclusions; but they seemed to the general adoption of his suggestion would be found in the fact that the proposed false nose would weigh about two tons and cost \$1000. Still, it scarcely seems that these considerations should be permitted to outweigh the additional accurity to life and property provided by his novel but apparently perfectly feasible fender.

#### THE NICARAGUA CANAL.

The success of a chimera ofitimes depends upon the adroit use of some alluring phrase. Recourse has been had to such expedient in the advocacy of the Nicaragua project. It has been proclaimed from one end of this land to the other that the Nicaragua canal would form an ayenue for "the commerce of the globe," just as the Suez canal is assumed to be an avenue for "the commerce of the globe," This is transparent nonsense. The tennage of merchandise transported on the railroads of the United States during the year 1893 amounted to 757,464,480 tons; the tonnage of vessels which passed through the Detroit river during the year 1894 amounted to 23,091,030 tons, and the tonnage of the Suez canal during the year 1894 amounted to 8,039,105 tons. But the traffic of the railroads of the United States constitutes only a part of the "commerce of the globe," the traffic of the Detroit river is a much smaller part; the traffic of the Suez canal is a still smaller fraction, and the commerce of the Nicaragua canal would be only a small fraction of this small fraction of the "commerce of the globe." And yet this phrase has been and is to-day employed to foist upon the government of the United States the enormous expense of constructing the Nicaragua canal-one of the flimsiest chimeras that ever gained human credence and patronage.

Mr. W. B. Evans, of the firm of Evans & McGregor, managers of the Canadian branch of the Commercial Union Assurance Co., has resigned his position. His action is understood to be the result of the company's withdrawal of their marine business from Montreal. Mr. Jas. Mc-Gregor continues as manager alone.

It is rumoured that a resignation will shortly take place from one of our large insurance offices which will be in the nature of a surprise both to the public and the insurance world.

#### FINANCIAL.

What trading has been done on the Stock Exchange during the past week JOHN JAMES BROWNE & SON has been purely professional, and at prices that varied only fractionally either way. Investors are not buy ing, in face of the fact that prices are comparatively high; and there is no chance for any "bear" movement because the amount of stock available for speculative purposes is so small that a "squeeze" would be almost inevitable except in the remote contingency of the operators for a fall being able to frighten holders out of some of their stock. In the United States the antics of Congress check any legitimate business on the Stock Exchange, and there is no prospect of Standard Building, MONTREAL any revival in trade until that mischievous body finally adjourns.
