San Francisco, April 22.-The announcement is made that the fire is out and that only smoking embers remain. The condition of the homeless and shelterless persons encamped thruout the city is remarkably good and offers of substantial assistance are being received from cities in all sections of the United States. J. W. HUDSON DEAD.

One Estimate That 300 Lives Were Lost in Wreck of One Rooming House, and That But Few Inmates Were Rescued From Ruins of 80 Room Hotel -Two Hundred Bodies Cre. mated-No Means of Identification.

San Francisco, April 22.—That the number of dead will run into several hundred is becoming apparent now. However, eastern people need to have little solicitude for their friends who were here as tourists at the fime of the earthquake. It may be safely asserted that few, if any, such persons have been killed or injured. The casualities, with few exceptions, were confined to the occupants of cheap lodg-

South of Market-street the loss of life was mostly brought about by the collapsing of the many cheap and crowded lodging houses. Among others the caving in of the Royal, at 40th and Minna-streets, added to the horror of the situation by the shrieks of its many scores of victims embedded

The collapsing of the Portland House, 60th-street, between Mission and Mar-ket, came about in a similar manner. Fully 60 persons were entombed amidst the crash of timbers and brick. Many of these were saved before the fire reached the spot.

300 in One Building.

The large five-storey Brunswick rooming house with its 300 rooms filled with guests at 60th and Howard-streets sed and fire started amid the ruins five minutes later. It is esti-

To the north of Market-street the rooming house people fared better. The Luxemburg at Stockton and O'Farrellstreets, a three-storey affair, suffered severely from the falling of many tons of brick from an adjoining building. The falling mass crashed thru the building, killing a man and woman.

At the Sutter-street turkish baths, a brick chimney toppled over, and crash-ing thru the roof killed one of the occupants as he lay on a cot.

Cremating the Bodies. Two hundred bodies found in the Potrero district, south of Shamon-street, near the Union Iron Works were cremated at the Six Mile House yesterday by order of Coroner Walsh, So many dead were found in this limited area that cremation was deemed absolutely necessary to prevent disease. PRINCE SPENDS DAY AT FALLS GRAND SIGHT, HE SAYS BUT USEFUL ALSO

Twould Be Too Bad to Allow Sentiment to Prevent Commercial Growth, He Tells His Escort, After Seeing Sights.

THE PRINCE AND HIS PARTY.

Prince Arthur is slight of build, with a tendency to red hair. His moustache is not a vigorous one and partakes of the same color as his hair. His face is boyish in appearance and ruddy. He wore at Niagara Falls yesterday a blue serge suit and a fedora hat and carried a fight bamboo cane, rung with a number of gold bands. He wore tan shoes, The prince is lame, having suffered an accident in his youth which crippled his left foot and makes him walk with a limp

Notwithstanding that it was late and a slight rain falling, there was a goodly crowd on hand to witness the arrival of the train, but if anyone expected to see the prince or any of his party, he was disappointed, for there was no sign of life about the train, save for the appearance of one or two porters. The shades were all down and most of the party had retired for the night.

As soon as the train pulled into the yard it was surrounded by a detail of special police, in command of Chief Kimmins, who will afford protection to the prince during his stay here.

Prince Arthur ignored to some extent the plans that had been made for his entertainment to-day by the local reception committee, thereby displaying his democratic characteristics and his aversion to ostentation. The prince and his party passed a very pleasant day about Niagara, and seemingly enjoyed every hour of their stay. They did not cross to the American side.



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

It also severely criticizes Gorky for presenting excuses for his action to the country of bourgeoisle.

Next to the Gorky incident, the radical papers have been filled with attacks upon foreign countries for furnishing funds to the Russian government in the present crisis, declaring that these will only enable the government to continue the war on the liberties of the people.

PACIFIC CATASTROPHE IN CONTROL OF WALL ST.

All Other Market Matters are Derogated to This - Investment Circumspect in Canadians.

World Office, Saturday Evening, April 21, The catastrophe at San Francisco has eclipsed every other matter in Wall-street since Wednesday, when the first tidings of the disastrous occurrence were known and realized. Money tightness, coal strikes, crop news and other matters which have served the purpose for the market's fluctuations during the last three or four weeks, were immediately subordinated to almost appalling loss of wealth in so few hours. The savings of the nation for a considerable period have been dispersed, and money and labor which should be used in the production of more wealth will have to be utilized to replace that which previously existed. A conservative estimate of the tual money. loss-\$250,000,000-will take time to replace. Financing the loss in the meantime will mean realizing in investments and a stringency that is not favorable to firm prices for securities

Much of the insurance will be made good by British companies, and to this extent the draft on domestic funds will be releved. No method, however, can be devised to replace the depleted wealth, save by the ordinary accumulation of capital. Admit that a sum equal to the loss now sustained could have been brought into signt in the shape of gold, and one can imagine the avidity with which Wall-street and other financial centres would struggle to absorb the amount by increases in securities and in prices. With the reverse the case, it cannot be charged that the drop in quotations in the Wall-street market made any unnecessary accounting for the situation. The slump in all probability would have been much more extended had the market not had a steady and sharp decline for the first two days of the week, and previous to the Pacific coast disaster.

Wall-street operations were endeavoring to evolve a better market when their efforts were cut short by the San Francisco epicagode. The program planned will now have to be revised, and provision made for that which so unexpectedly entered their midst. Considering that recent incidents have no favored outside accounts, it is not probable that these are at all extended. The reverse is rather proved by the smallness of the break on Wednesday and Thursday. The week's liquidation must have brought large quantities of stock back into first hands, either at the will of the holders or at the instance of the commission houses carrying the shares. And then, to make the situation more terrible in the greatest of the cities affected, a conflagration almost unparalleled in magnitude, has followed the earthquake, and wrought a destruction many times greater still." a destruction many times greater still." So said Rev. J. T. Sunderland, M. A.,

So said Rev. J. T. Sunderland, M. A., in Jarvis-street Unitarian Church yesterday morning.

"A city twice as large as Toronto, and which one week ago was full of life and hope and enterprise and prosperity, to-day is a black smoking ruin, and 300,000 of its people are homeless, while several hundreds have lost their lives." he continued

Its Lessons to Humanity. Many reflections were stirred by such sudden and staggering calamities. One was as to the duty of brotherhood, the duty of doing what we can to rethe duty of doing what we can to relieve those in distress, no matter what may be their creed or nationality, race or condition in life. Then there were other thoughts. Was God responsible for such calamities? Or, even if he allowed them, as he certainly did, was He good? The preacher argued that a great many evils and calamities that come to us in this world come thru our fellow men, or from the fact that we are dependent upon our fellows, and they upon us. He cited such in-He good? The preacher argued that a great/many evils and calamities that come to us in this world come thru our fellow men, or from the fact that we are dependent upon our fellows, and they upon us. He cited such instances as the Chicago fire, the destruction of the City of Johnstone, Pa., years ago. Passengers on board trains did not bring disasters upon themselves; these were brought on by others on whom they were dependent. Would man be better off if there were no such relationshi or dependence? Mankind on the earth could not exist without it. Cut off from one another we are cut off not only from the highest good and the highest blessings of life, but speedily from life itself. It man were to exist on earth at all, of course he had to be either subject to human relations and decendent was near at hand, and the shock experienced in San Francisco was only another evidence of approaching universal destruction.

Not a Judgment.

Strong words of warning against a disposition to draw from the San Francisco calamity the conclusion that the city was being directly punished thru Divine agency were uttered by Rev. A. B. Winchester in Knox Church last night. The speaker termed such conclusions as "most unwarranted." God's purpose in this was not a judgment against a specific civic sin, but to give a warning which applies as much to Toronto as to San Francisco, declared Rev.
