## ANNUAL REPORT.

---

The Managers have pleasure in reporting that the apparent improvement in the condition of the City Poor, referred to in their Report for 1880, has been fully maintained during the past season. The statistics herewith submitted, shew a continued diminution in the number of applicants, and also in the amount of relief granted.

This improved state of things is, no doubt, owing in great measure to the abundance of employment offered during the past season. The Managers cannot, however, flatter themselves with the idea that poverty will ever entirely disappear from among us: when one family or individual emerges from its slough, another is pretty sure to be engulfed therein,—and thus are continually verified the words of Our Lord, “The poor you have always with you.”

In view of the unusual mildness of the season thus far, the Managers wish to impress upon the Visitors and Weekly Committees, the necessity of economy in the distribution of coal. Experience shows that a mild and open Winter, such as we have hitherto enjoyed, is often followed by a cold and protracted Spring, at which time the slender savings of the poor will be entirely exhausted, and the full rigour of the climate most sensibly felt.

The Managers cheerfully recognize the benefit conferred upon many poor families by the Fuel Clubs, which, for some years, have been worked in connection with several of the City Churches; through the instrumentality of these Clubs,

many persons, once recipients of relief from the House, are now comparatively independent, and fully able to dispense with our assistance.

The influence of "better times" seems to have reached even the tramps;—those gentlemen of whom it has been written, that "their life is a wonder from day to day,—their breakfast a marvel, their dinner a miracle, their bed an intervention of Providence." Although the general question is still hedged with difficulties, none of those difficulties, fortunately require an immediate solution. Should an emergency arise, the Managers have effected, with the Police authorities, arrangements by means of which any undue pressure upon their accommodation or resources can be easily averted.

Another, perhaps more immediate cause for the local abatement of the tramp nuisance, may be found in the fact that work has been provided by the Committee of the Combined City Charities for all who are able and willing to work. A lot has been secured on James Street, where these gentry are invited to exercise their ingenuity in the breaking of stone, for which labour they receive equivalent payment. To give an idea of the operation, it may be mentioned that of twenty able-bodied men who recently applied to the House for shelter, and after receiving supper and lodging, were referred to Mr. Pell, Secretary of the Committee, seven only availed themselves of the opportunity.

The Managers sympathize deeply with their respected Chairman, the Reverend Mr. Broughall, whose ill-health has compelled him to resign a position which he has occupied for many years to the great advantage of the Institution; they sincerely hope that he will soon be able to resume his ordinary round of duty, for the benefit of his people, and the good of the community at large.
