The Canadians Are Keeping the Enemy on the Jump

ARTILLERY FIRE STOPS ATTACK SOUTH OF FRIZE

British and French Guns Protect Troops by Barrier of Shells.

GERMANS BOMBARDED

Foe's Trenches Between Ypres and Comines Canal Heavily Shelled.

LONDON, Feb. 18.—On the British front there has been nothing but artillery actions, the war office reported here tonight. British guns bombarded German positions north of Ypres and the Comines Canal, while the batteries on both sides have generally been active about Ypres. Minor artillery firing is reported from various other points.

The French exploded two mines at points northwest of hill 140 in Artois, damaging a German trench and causing a big crater on the southern slope of the hill, which the French occupied. The Germans were forced to give up an attack which they were preparing to launch against the French lines south of Frise by barrier fire from French and British artillery. The Germans in a heavy attack that was preceded by a violent artillery action gained a footing in a French position north of Lartignen in Alsace, but they were driven out from it by a counter attack.

AUSTRIANS CAPTURED KAVAYA IN ALBANIA

Essad Pasha's Irregulars Evacuate Town and Board Allied Transport.

LONDON, Feb. 18.—The capture of Kavaya, Albania, by the Austrians, is reported tonight. The irregulars of Essad Pasha evacuated the town and were taken on board allied transport. Kavaya is eight miles southwest of Durazzo.

WAR SUMMARY

Today's Events Reviewed

TREBIZOND, the Turkish seaport on the Black Sea, is the next point for investment and capture by the Russian armies under the command of the Grand Duke Nicholas. It is northwest of Erzerum, and the Russian advance guards have already advanced to within seventy or so miles of this town. The Russians are also attacking it by the direct route along the shores of the Black Sea, and they have made considerable progress in this direction, having dislodged the Turks from three of their strong defensive positions near the coast, and having destroyed many bridges in the rear of the Turks by the fire of their warships. Trebizond is celebrated in ancient and mediaeval history, and it is an old Greek colony with a considerable population of Hellenes to this day. There appears to be a Greek irredentist movement proceeding thruout Asia Minor, for the news of any Russian success is quickly transmitted to Athens.

The capture of Trebizond, which may be reported in two or three weeks, will give the Russians important military advantages. It will open for them a base of supply by the Black Sea from Odessa to permit of an advance into Asia Minor. It is the western terminus of the main high road to Damascus and Turkey which runs thru Erzerum, follows the head waters of the Euphrates and the Tigris, and goes down from the north to Bagdad, whence it strikes eastward to Kermanshah and Teheran. Trebizond is also the eastern terminus of the main road to Constantinople, which runs southwestward to Konieh and down to Tarsus, thru the pass in the Taurus range known as the Cilician gates, and traversed by St. Paul. For persons who desire to become familiar with the ground on which the coming campaign will probably be fought, if Turkey is to be eliminated, it is recommended that they should read the New Testament and trace out on the map the journeyings of St. Paul.

Once in possession of the port of Trebizond, which is an open roadstead, the Russians would secure their right flank for a descent into Svria, or they would open up the road for an advance on Constantinople, with the prospects of receiving assistance from the allied fleets in the Mediterranean. If the allies have a sufficient force of troops stationed within call in the Levant, Asia Minor will be unten-

The Germans had got it into their heads that their carefully planned drama, Berlin to the Persian Gulf by way of Constantinople and Bagdad, was unfolding in grand style, up to a glorious stage setting in the last act. The Kaiser had even Jerusalem in his eye before the triumphal chorus was to cease. If that worthy man had found himself in the snows of Erzerum as Napoleon found himself on the way back from Moscow, he might have had an even more sobering effect.

The German Herr Professors and Military Preachers who have justified the raiding of Belgium will wonder what makes their logic start to crack at the joints. It's a kind of logic that can't stand when the facts are so unexpected.

Even President Wilson will hear of Erzerum. So will the German-Americans.

The Set Back at Washington

Next to the victory of the Russians at Erzerum, the sudden turn in the attitude of Washington on the question of raiding armed merchantmen has put the fear of God in the Kaiser and his associates. The United States have refused to agree to Berlin's policy in regard to non-belligerent passenger or trading ships. In London there is an intense feeling of satisfaction over the demand for further explanations. The New York Herald says Count Bernstorff left Secretary Lansing's office on Thursday very much downcast when the ultimatum of the States was put up to him. Germany must do some more climbing down to Uncle Sam!

MOST OF TURKS ESCAPED WHEN ERZERUM FELL

Russians Did Not Wait to Surround It, But Assaulted Forts.

ARMENIAN MASSACRE

Thousands Mercilessly Killed by Kurds Before Fleeing From City.

PETROGRAD, via London, Feb. 18, 3.30 p.m.—A semi-official news agency says:

The exact number of Turkish troops captured at Erzerum is not known, but the greater part of the garrison got away, as the fortress was not invested but was carried by assault. The number of guns captured reaches 1000.

Before the evacuation Kurds mercilessly massacred thousands of Armenians.

The city's defensive works were organized by the German commander Fosselt and are spoken of as admirable and as embodying all the resources of modern artillery and engineering.

The latest advices indicate that the heavy Turkish reinforcements which had been hastening to the aid of Erzerum failed to arrive in time.

The capture of Erzerum has aroused the greatest enthusiasm thruout Russia. Towns large and small are the scenes of demonstrations, parades and Te-Deum celebrations. The most imposing demonstration took place at Tiflis where the Grand Duke Nicholas in person announced the news of the fall of Erzerum. The whole town was lavishly decorated and the Grand Duke appeared several times in response to the acclamations of the crowd.

PROGRESS ON BLACK SEA

The Russian official statement of today reports that the Russian troops with the help of the warships succeeded in occupying a fortified position on the Vitzess River in the Armenian district region along the Black Sea. The warships ran close inshore and shelled the retreating Turks, the sailors suffering only the loss of a few wounded.

The Berlin newspapers generally concede the capture of Erzerum by the Russians, but they are trying to belittle the success of the Russians.

The Lokal Anzeiger says that the Erzerum forts were old and that they were armed with guns which were probably made 20 years ago. The Morgen Post says that the Turks were probably confronted by superior numbers and it speaks of the loss of Erzerum as regrettable, but not irreparable. The Tageblatt thinks that the political results may be more important than the military. The forts, it says, can serve the Russians for only unimportant local operations.

SEA RAID ON BRITAIN LOOKED FOR BY DERBY

He is Confident Co-operation of Army and Navy Will Foil Efforts.

CRITICS ARE CRITICIZED

Newspaper Attacks on British Aeroplanes Tend to Lower Morale.

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 18.—(11.21 p.m.)—"I have always believed," said Lord Derby, director of recruiting, at a workmen's mass meeting here tonight, "that sooner or later the Germans will attempt a great sea raid on this country, and that however well organized the navy is it will not be able to stop it, because the effect even if a raid comes will be practically insuperable, and that those who come will be sure to believe the army are not on guard because of the effect of discussing the air menace. Lord Derby appealed to the newspapers not to unduly agitate the public mind regarding air raids, because of the effect such agitation was likely to have on the British airmen."

VOTE INDICATES BRIAND IS HOLDING FIRM GRIP

Socialist Extremists Badly Worst-ed in Effort to Overthrow Ministry.

PARTY ANIMUS CLEAR

Briand's Opponents Tried to Make Nominal Issue Over War's Conduct.

PARIS, Feb. 18, 5.45 p.m.—The ministry of Aristide Briand was triumphant in the chamber of deputies today over the extreme socialists and the radical socialists, who after long preparation sought to overthrow the government on the question whether it was not delegating too much authority to the general staff.

The proposed attack on the ministry had been common talk in parliamentary quarters for a month past. It was based more on political rivalry than on real differences over the conduct of the war. M. Briand met his opponents by declining resolutely to have their interpellation discussed in the chamber and demanded a vote of confidence in the government. This was given 394 to 169.

Not all those voting against the proposed vote of confidence were considered as opposed to the ministry. Rather they believe that it is better to discuss questions of policy publicly at all times.

SWEDEN STILL TRYING TO GET U.S. INTO LINE

Count Wrangel Confers With Colonel House on Detention of Mails.

LONDON, Feb. 18, 5.41 p.m.—For some time Count Wrangel, the Swedish minister to England, has been holding a series of conferences with Col. Edward M. House, President Wilson's personal representative, on the subject of the detention of neutral mails by belligerents. Incidentally the whole question of possible joint action by neutrals to protect their rights has been discussed.

The first conference, during which Count Wrangel and Colonel House were absent for several hours, was arranged on the initiative of the Swedish minister. The controversy between Sweden and Great Britain over detentions of mail by both countries reached an impassable stage weeks ago, and neither country since then has made any concession.

CANADIANS FIND KEEN VIGILANCE ON FOE'S LINES

Aerial Activity Marked, Sentries Alert and Patrols More Numerous.

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—Major-General Sir Sam Hughes has received the following official communique from the Canadian general representative:

Canadian General Headquarters in France, Feb. 18.—(Via London).—During the week of Feb. 9-16 the German forces attacked at various points along the French and British fronts on the Canadian front there was a marked increase in the enemy's aerial activity. Enemy airmen persistently endeavored to reconnoitre our positions, and our airmen were constantly engaged in driving back the hostile planes. A few bombs were dropped close to our works and trenches, but no damage was done.

ASQUITH TO CALL FOR TWO BILLION DOLLARS

Britain's Total War Expenditures Will Then Exceed Ten Billion Dollars.

LONDON, Feb. 18.—(12.45 p.m.)—New votes of credit amounting to approximately £400,000,000 (about \$2,000,000,000) will be asked by Premier Asquith in the house of commons on Monday.

ROUMANIA TO JOIN WAR ON ALLIES' SIDE SOON

Russian Success at Erzerum Crystallizing Decision of Bucharest.

LONDON, Feb. 18.—A Bucharest despatch received by way of Rome says that the capture of Erzerum by the Russians is crystallizing the decision of Roumania to intervene at an early date. Roumanian circles in sympathy with the entente allies say that there will be a concentration of Russian troops in Bessarabia in March for the purpose of enabling Roumania to transfer troops to the Bulgarian frontier. That shifting of men has already begun. The allies are speeding up the carriage of the Serbian, Montenegrin and Albanian armies to Saeniki so as to be able to make a simultaneous offensive movement with the Anglo-French forces into the Balkans.

ENORMOUS BOOTY LOST BY TURKS AT ERZERUM

Town Converted Into Main Provisioning Centre in Asia Minor.

Immediate Result of Russian Victory Will Be Occupation of Trebizond.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 17, via London, Feb. 18, 12.08 a.m. (Delayed).—The latest reports received here from Erzerum say that the amount of booty, including provisions and ammunition, captured in the city by the Russians is enormous. The Turks, evidently had prepared for a long struggle and had turned Erzerum into the main provisioning centre in Asia Minor. In addition the city contained countless art treasures of all descriptions which were bequeathed by the ancient civilization thru which it has passed.

The number of guns taken at Erzerum is now estimated at 1000 most of which were abandoned in the forts or along the roads during the panic flight of the Turkish garrison.

The Russian press believes that the collapse of the Turkish defence in Armenia will put an end to Germany's efforts to inspire a Mussulman fanatic war against Russia, and will tend to turn them against their German allies.

It is pointed out also by the newspapers that the fall of Erzerum may bring about the collapse of the proposed German campaign against the Suez Canal and Egypt.

The evacuation of Trebizond, according to the newspapers, will be one of the immediate results of the Russian victories. Trebizond is regarded as being no longer tenable as the Turkish Black Sea base.

CANADA GIVES UNIQUE HONOR TO PREMIER OF AUSTRALIA

Hon. W. M. Hughes Attended Cabinet Meeting After Being Made Member of Privy Council of Canada.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 18.—Hon. W. M. Hughes, premier of Australia, who is in Ottawa on his way to England, was sworn in today as a member of the privy council of Canada by His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught. Immediately after the ceremony he was invited by Sir Robert Borden to attend a meeting of the cabinet.

This is the first time that such a thing has taken place in Canada and the honoring of Premier Hughes in such a signal manner will show to the world that the sister nations of the empire are united with the mother country in the inflexible determination to prosecute the war to a successful conclusion.

The event is doubtless prophetic of the future also, as showing how the bonds of the empire have been closer drawn and will remain closer drawn as a result of the great conflict, the aggressor in which counted so much on disunion in the empire.

PARTY LEADERS IN CLASH OVER WAR "SCANDAL"

Macdonald of Pictou Started Tilt by Reference to Fallis Case.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 18.—There was another clash in the house of commons today between Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier over the shell commission. It grew out of a triangular discussion in which E. M. Macdonald (Pictou), Sir Sam Hughes and Judge Doherty participated.

Mr. Macdonald drew attention to the report that Mr. Fallis at the Peel County nominations yesterday had quoted Mr. John Thompson, K.C., as saying that Mr. Fallis had incurred no legal liability by the part he played in the purchase of horses for the militia department, altho in view of the fact that he was a member of the legislature his conduct was probably injudicious. Mr. Macdonald thought the minister to whom Mr. Thompson was responsible should make some inquiry on the subject.

Sir Sam Hughes said it probably came in his department, but he did not propose to criticize Mr. Thompson. Then Mr. Macdonald appealed to Judge Doherty without obtaining any satisfactory reply.

Laurier's sarcasm. "There seem to be a good many commissions in this country," Sir Wilfrid remarked, "that are responsible to nobody. There are the old shell commission and the Charles Davidson commission. If this government can exercise no control over any of these commissions it had better resign."

"Perhaps the right hon. gentleman desires the government to resign," the prime minister retorted, "altho his action a few days ago in this house indicated that he had considerable confidence in the government. The shell committee and the imperial board of munitions are not irresponsible bodies."

MANITOBA TO CUT OUT BILINGUAL TEACHING

New Bill Provides for Teaching Only of English in All Schools.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 18.—Bilingualism will be cut out of the school system of Manitoba under the terms of a bill amending the Public Schools Act, which the Hon. R. S. Thornton, minister of education, introduced in the legislature today. It provides for the repeal of the clause by which ten non-English-speaking children in any school were entitled to instruction in their own language.

Clause 255 of the Public Schools Act recited that "when ten of the pupils in any school speak the French language, or any language other than English as their native language, the teaching of such pupils shall be conducted in French, or such other language and English, upon the bilingual system."

This provision was identical with clause 10 of the memorandum, generally known as the Laurier-Green settlement of Nov. 18, 1896. It was signed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, representing the Dominion Government, and Clifford Sifton, representing Manitoba. Other features of the memorandum provided for religious teaching and the employment of Roman Catholic teachers in the schools in these provisions will be left intact by the new bill, which deals only with the bilingual clause.

Book Review

"BETWEEN THE LINES."

By Boyd Cable. Toronto: McClelland, Goodchild and Stewart. \$1.35. A book written at the front and within sound of the German guns, has an immediate appeal for English-speaking readers. "Between the Lines," by Boyd Cable (McClelland, Goodchild and Stewart, Toronto), is such a book, and a personal of it furnishes a series of thrills such as were felt in the early weeks of the war and have recurred but rarely since. One grows hardened reading one account after another, but Mr. Cable revivifies the first impressions, and presents such clear pictures with such amusing detail and unflinching humor that even the grimmest war of history becomes a vehicle for comedy. There is a gripping interest in the episodes described and snap and vigor in the style which makes "Between the Lines" stand out as one of the literary achievements of the war. There is not a paragraph which is not illuminating, and the fourteen chapters are just so many vignettes of a fine view of the experience of a raw battalion for the first time in the trenches, coupled with the pictures of utter indifference presented by British trench mortars and the gallantry and coolness of the men who had to use them. It is difficult to believe that such inadequate weapons are supplied, but there has been abundant evidence from other sources to corroborate this narrative. No wonder the British public feels nervous about having any Germans in the advance department. In the chapter called "The Advance" such a picture is given of the work of attack on the enemy's trenches as might stand for a universal summary of all similar warfare. Always there is the unrelenting courage and heroism and always the inadequate means, the heartbreaking advance and the unrelenting courage. No real advance can be made till such supplies are amassed in overwhelming quantities. ANNUAL HEALTH REPORT SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

Reduction in Every Disease Except Measles, Which Practically Doubled.

LESS TUBERCULOSIS

Death Rate Checked Thru Understanding of Importance of Registering.

The annual health report, just completed by the provincial health department, shows a decided improvement in 1915 over the previous year. A reduction in the number of every disease with the exception of measles was reported, and that disease practically doubles in number of people infected.

By far the biggest increase was reported from Toronto. In 1915 there were noted as many cases of scarlet fever as in 1914 and the number of cases of diphtheria was also cut away down. And the provincial department says the death rate was checked primarily because physicians are beginning to realize the importance of registering the cases they find.

In 1914 less than 85 per cent. of the deaths from tuberculosis were registered.

WILLS PROBATED

Orth, a son, receives his father's farm which is valued at \$6,000, subject to a legacy of \$1,000 to be paid in three annual instalments to his sister Mary Card, and an annuity of \$200 to be paid to his mother as long as she remains a widow.

The residue of the estate is willed to the widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Orth, and she is to pay her daughter \$500 within a year of the testator's death.

Ephraim A. Bradshaw, who died on February 2, left his entire estate valued at \$4,320 to his sister, Mary Jane Dunfield.

An estate of \$2782 left by Joseph McDonnell, who died on February 7, will be divided equally between two sons, Frederick Joseph and Thomas Joseph McDonnell.

The Union Trust Company has applied for administration on behalf of the husband, William Henry Figary, who will receive one-third of the estate, Helen Figary, a third daughter, and the remaining two-thirds to her daughter, inheriting the remaining two-thirds.

Two Statutes for Prohibitionists to Think Over

Extract from the London "Lancet" Highest Medical Authority in the World

THE Prohibitionists are very fond of asserting that all great physicians are united in opposing the use of alcoholic beverages. In view of this it may not be out of place to state that there appeared recently in the London "Lancet" the following manifesto put forth by a large number of the most prominent members of the medical profession in the United Kingdom, including Dr. F. McCall, Regius Professor of Medicine in the University of Glasgow; Sir James Crichton-Browne; Sir Dyce Duckworth; Sir Thomas Fraser; Sir W. Gowers, and Sir W. Bennett.

"In view of the statements frequently made as to the present medical opinion regarding alcoholic beverages we the undersigned, think it desirable to issue the following statement, which we believe represents the opinion of the leading clinical teachers as well as the great majority of medical practitioners.

"Recognizing that in prescribing alcohol, the requirements of the individual must be the governing rule, we are convinced of the correctness of the opinion so long and generally held, that in disease alcohol is a rapid and trustworthy restorative. In many cases it may be truly described as life-preserving, owing to its power to sustain cardiac and nervous energy, while protecting the wasting nitrogenous wastes.

"As an article of diet, we hold the universal belief of mankind that the moderate use of alcoholic beverages is, for adults, usually beneficial and amply justified.

"We deplore the evils arising from the abuse of alcoholic beverages. But it is obvious that there is nothing, however beneficial, which does not, by excess, become injurious."

LECTURE ON OUTDOOR CULTIVATION OF ROSES

James R. Bryson Gave Interesting Talk at Annual Meeting of Rose Society.

James R. Bryson, formerly with J. T. Moore of Moore Park, gave a very interesting lecture on outdoor cultivation of roses on Thursday night at the annual meeting of the Rose Society of Ontario, held at the Margaret Eaton School, North street.

"Operations upon the ground itself are of necessity the first steps in outdoor rose culture," said Mr. Bryson. "Inferior soil conditions will very often make the growing of roses a losing proposition, altho skill and perseverance and energy can get wonderful results. The best soil for outdoor roses is without doubt a strong holding argillaceous loam, so tenacious as to almost touch clay in some of its more inviting forces. To understand this fully the world might find that a few soils that are called brick clay when wet turn into strong, stiff soils when dry. But remember that I have seen prize roses grown in soil so light that it could be drifted like sand in dry weather."

Mr. Bryson described at length the manner in which roses should be planted, and how they should be fed. He concluded his lecture by giving a formula for feeding roses, which consisted of eight parts water, four parts molasses and one part ammonia and a shovel full of soot. He explained that altho he had used the formula very successfully, an amateur might not find it so successful.

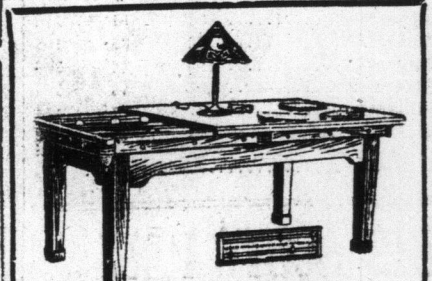

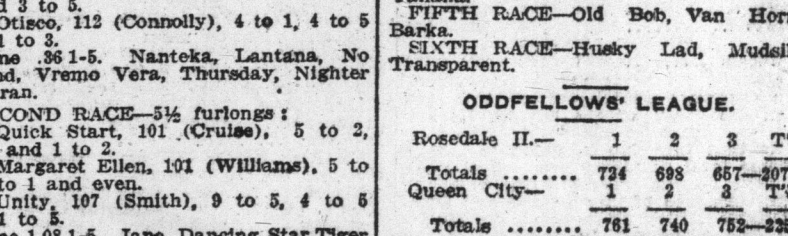
