COST \$2 A LINE TO PRAISE McCURDY. Puff for Mutual's President Was Expensive, "but It Was Worth It," Says a Witness.

New York, Oct. 24.—At the session today of the legislative committee investigating the life insurance companies, the affairs of the Mutual Life Insurance Company were under consideration, and it was brought out that this company was paying for the dissemination throughout the country of reports of this investigation that were favorable to the company.

Mr. Cunningham, who kept a general store, assigned on the 10th inst., and the meeting was the first since the assignment. He submitted a statement, showing merchandise to the amount of \$5,400, and \$8,400 book debts. Of the latter, one-half were considered bad, for those owing are not living in the province. It is thought the other half can be collected. The debtors are principally small farmers and lumbermen.

AN IMPERIAL COUNCIL

Noted British Visitors Urge the Formation of an Imperial Advisory Council, Coupled With an Intelligence Department.

On Saturday afternoon at Ottawa Sir Frederick Pollock and Geoffrey Drage, an member of the Imperial parliament, who have been travelling through Canada in search of ideas, were the guests of the Canadian Club at luncheon, and both spoke in advocacy of an Imperial Advisory Council of the Empire. Mr. Drage dealt with the business aspects of the question and the latter's scheme for an Imperial Advisory Council has been explained in a recent article by Richard Jobb, Sir Frederick did not add much to the speech already made, but Mr. Drage brought out a number of points of interest to the business community.

Mr. Drage, who is a pleasing speaker, has evidently made a thorough study of the subject. He expressed the belief that the establishment of a Department of Information of the Empire would be a great boon. None of the schemes for the consolidation of the Empire, and all of which had so far failed, had included a suitable business proposition and the idea of an Advisory Council coupled with an Intelligence Department would prove a safe first step in the direction of any more comprehensive plan. This proposal would not rest on the autonomy of any of the component states of the Empire. The whole object of the Imperial Council would be to decentralize and such a plan as proposed would in no sense conflict with this idea.

As to a general Department of Information it would have a wide field of usefulness. There are a large number of currently important questions pressing for solution and in reference to these information from all parts of the Empire could be collected and in the settlement of the interests of all the different states concerned. One of these questions was the matter of closer relations between the West Indies and Canada. In this the whole Empire is interested in view of its dependence on strategic position, owing to the probable completion of the Panama canal at no very distant date. Such a body as proposed would do away with great deal of friction in dealing with these matters. Even the great legal question will ultimately have to be settled in some such body as the one proposed.

Another useful service which a Department of Information could render is the part with knowledge regarding the engagements of England guaranteeing the interests of other countries. All these details should be made public in a way that the public can understand. This would lead to a continuity of policy and prevent such disasters as had occurred in the past and which were caused by a vacillating policy.

Coming to purely business questions, Mr. Drage mentioned the nationalization and insolvency laws as matters which should be dealt with. It was ridiculous that an American who had taken out naturalization papers in Canada should be a British subject when he went to Great Britain or any of the other British colonies. In regard to insolvency law, the situation is even worse, for it was told that there were different laws for Ottawa and Hull. Then there is the question of the nationalization of the Empire, and the representation of all portions of the Empire on the supreme court of the nation, a yearbook covering the Empire, and the general unification and levelling of the cable and freight rates in a manner to be dealt with.

Mr. Drage expressed the hope that something could be done to rehabilitate Great Britain's declining merchant navy service, which was something in which the Canadian maritime provinces, east and west, would do a share. Mr. Drage, in conclusion, ridiculed the idea that Great Britain would be left in the rear for commercial supremacy. ONE VIEW OF IT

Glasgow Herald Takes Advantage of Nelson Centennial to Point Out Canada's Duty to the Motherland.
Montreal, Oct. 24.—(Special)—A special London cable says: Commenting on the colonial celebrations of Nelson's centennial the Glasgow Herald says: "Their patriotic challenge may be nothing better than a coincidence of the moment and mood. One can only regret that the part the navy plays, as the very history of the empire, is so slightly, almost insignificantly, acknowledged."
"It is, no doubt, natural for Canadians to assert that they, who pay nothing, would prefer to build and maintain their own navy, but they cannot have the least illusion that a Canadian fleet would be equal to any the United States could send up the St. Lawrence. It is in the present circumstances as remote as Sirius."
"The British navy is a fact and whether the colonies drop down into the hat with an air of willing philanthropy or make very few over giving nothing they are indebted for that protection which they cannot provide themselves."
"The nineteenth century signal is that Britain expects her colonies to do their duty, and has for some time been ready for hosting by the British taxpayer."
