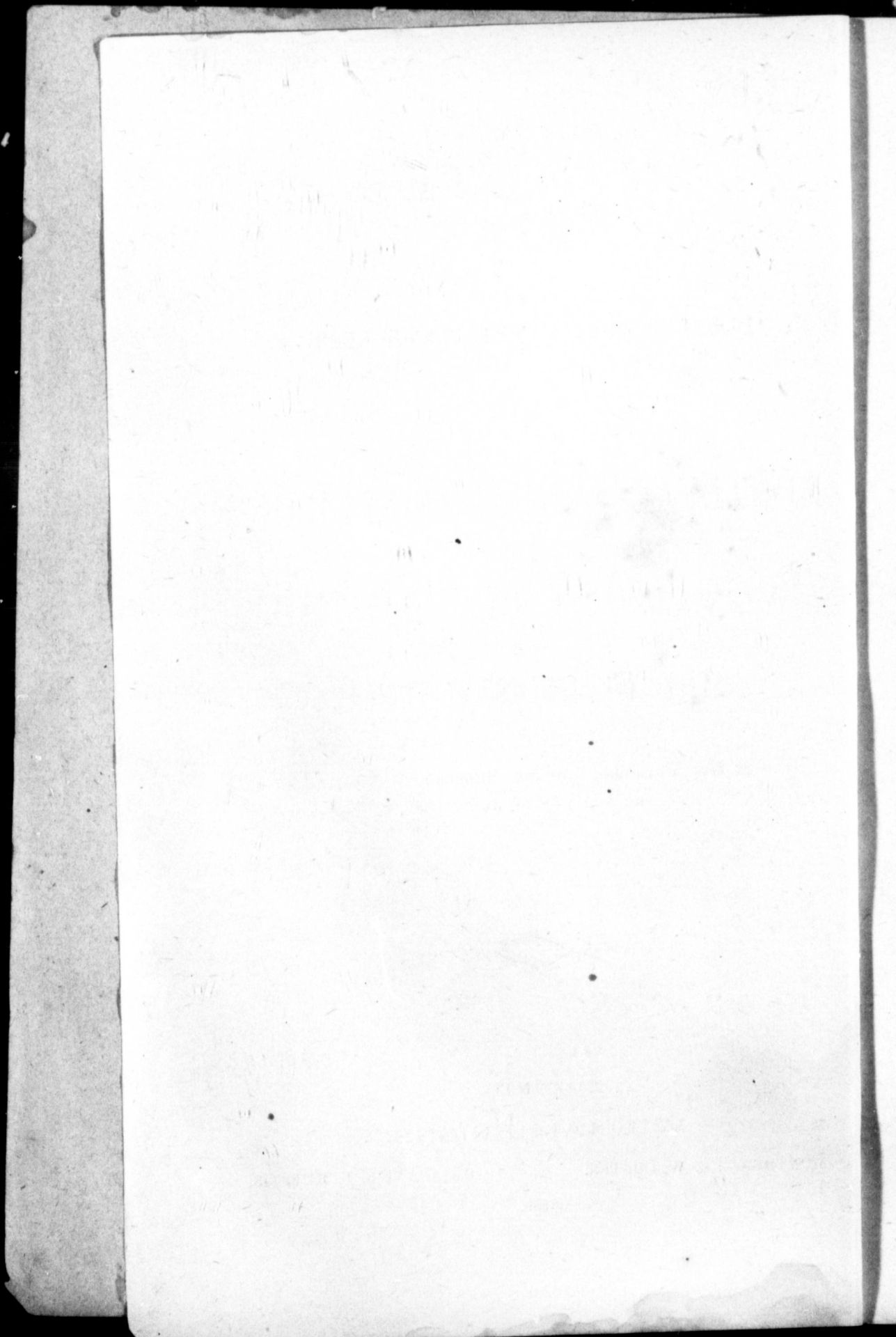

MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

HELD IN THE

METHODIST CHURCH, SHERBROOKE, QUEBEC.

Conference Organized, June 5th, 1889.

The SIXTH SESSION of the MONTREAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church assembled, according to appointment, in the Methodist Church, in the City of Sherbrooke, Quebec, on Wednesday, 5th June, 1889, at ten o'clock a.m. The Rev. J. W. SPARLING, M.A., D.D., President, in the chair.

The Conference Prayer-meeting had been previously held, from nine to ten o'clock, conducted by the President of the Conference.

The President, DR. SPARLING, gave out the 756th hymn, after which the Secretary, Rev. S. BOND, read as scriptural lessons the 10th chapter of the Gospel of St. Matthew and the 13th chapter of the First Epistle to the Corinthians, and Rev. W. H. GRAHAM and Mr. A. P. BRADLEY led in prayer.

OBITUARIES.

REV. FREDERICK B. KNOWLTON.

Rev. Frederick B. Knowlton was born in the township of Loughboro', county of Frontenac, Ontario, in the year 1813 and died in Verona, where he had been superannuated some time, on April 1st, 1889.

In early life he was the subject of religious training, his father being a local preacher in the Methodist Church, yet was not converted until after his marriage and the death of his child, when he was about twenty-four years of age. He shortly afterwards entered the ministry of the M. E. Church, and was known as a good and useful man. Much of his work lay in remote sections of the country—Camden, Kennebec, Arden, Cloyne, Denbigh, Eganville, Renfrew, Parham, Sharbot Lake and Verona, to some of which places he was appointed twice and thrice. All remember his successful evangelistic labors. Such was his success along these lines that wherever and whenever he went into work of this nature, it was a foregone conclusion that there would be a revival of religion. The year previous to his death he was in labors abundant, preaching twice and thrice every Sabbath. After some months of shadow and suffering, Bro. Knowlton heard the voice of his Master and beheld the Divine hands lifting the clouds, when he was enabled to triumphantly exclaim, "It's all right now! Jesus has come, and I am going with Him. It's all right now; it's all right!" In honor to him, six of his ministerial brethren came to bear him to his last resting-place.

REV. WILLIAM D. BROWN.

William D. Brown, son of Matthew and Isabella Davidson Brown, was born in Newcastle-on-Tyne, England, on the 26th of December, 1808, and died at Moulinette, Ont., on the 6th of December, 1888. He was the subject of early religious training, his mother being a pious and devoted Christian, whose instruction and example exerted a most salutary influence upon his subsequent life and character. He was converted to God in the year 1832, under the ministry of the Rev. Mr. Mortimer, and soon after united with the Wesleyan Methodist Society, and for forty-eight years was a herald of the cross—first as a local preacher, then to the close of his earnest and diligent life as an ordained minister of the Methodist Church. In the year 1831 he was united in marriage to Agnes Nelson Cowrie, who proved a faithful helpmeet in the toils of the itinerancy, and who still survives her beloved husband. To them were born eleven children—five sons and six daughters—six of whom preceded their father to the better land. Father Brown was a man of marked individuality and sterling integrity. Possessed of great strength and force of character, coupled with methodical habits, he made himself felt in all the walks of life. He was one of those men who mould, rather than are moulded by, their surroundings. In his home life he watched over himself with a godly jealousy. Recognizing the fact that "the sermon is the echo of the life, the pulpit but the reflex of the hour," he had stated hours for communion, both with the Word of God and the God of the Word, and, in consequence, carried with him continually such a degree of spiritual unction, that none could enter into conversation with him on the subject of personal religion without feeling that he was a man who lived near to God. In the discharge of the duties of the pastoral office he was faithful and diligent. As a preacher he was a clear, practical, forcible expositor of the plan of salvation which, coupled with systematic and painstaking visitation from house to house, secured to his ministry that fruit which is the "joy and crown of rejoicing" of every true minister of Christ. His reading was extensive, and his knowledge of theology in all its phases accurate and profound. He was an able minister of the New Testament, and one "who believed and

preached all our doctrines." Father Brown had a strong desire to "die in the harness," and often prayed that he might be permitted to do so. God heard and answered his prayer, for though superannuated for two years before his departure, yet he had charge of a small Circuit, and until the fatal stroke fell upon him which ended his useful life, he discharged faithfully the varied duties incident to the Methodist pastorate, so that he literally died at his post. As the end drew near he was perfectly conscious of his approaching departure, and took a last and fond farewell of each member of the family, and affectionately commended them to God. On being asked how the valley appeared before him, he replied: "Deep, but very, very bright." Thus, in his eightieth year, in the bosom of his family, and amid the tears of the people to whom he had so recently ministered, passed away William Davidson Brown, a devoted Christian, a faithful minister, and one of God's noblemen. Of him it may be said:

"Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past:
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last."

REV. WILLIAM WESLEY MILLER,

Who was brought to a saving knowledge of God in early life, was appointed to the work of the ministry in 1856. He sustained without interruption to the end of life a character consistent with his holy calling. He was affectionate and kind in his disposition and deportment. His piety, serious without moroseness and cheerful without levity, gave evidence of his personal enjoyment of the religion he recommended to others. As a minister, he was devoted to his work and faithful in the discharge of his duties. His preaching was truly evangelical, exhibiting the doctrines of the Gospel with a decided reference to their spiritual and practical design. During the period of thirty years, which his public life embraced, he was scarcely ever laid aside by affliction, though laboring under some form of physical disability. The health with which he was so generally favored, he devoted with thankful joy to his Master's service. He finished his itinerant toil near the place of its commencement—beginning at Gananoque and ending at Wolfe Island. There, two years ago he began to feel the once vigorous constitution giving way. He asked for a temporary rest, which proved to be a precursor of the everlasting rest awaiting him in heaven. After a year and three months' superannuation on the Island, he removed to Napanee with his now sorrowing widow, thinking that they would there spend the evening of life together in the fellowship of old and valued friends, and in the midst of the scenes of his happy childhood. On May 3rd, on the morning of their usual fast day preparatory to the quarterly love-feast, having commended each other to God in prayer, Brother Miller, at a moment's call, entered the heavenly chariot and passed home to God, in the sixth-fifth year of his age and the thirty-third of his ministry.

REV. MALCOLM McDONALD.

The Rev. Malcolm McDonald was born in Perthshire, Scotland, in the year 1819, and when but nine years of age, with his father's family, emigrated to Canada, which was henceforth his adopted country, and to which he was always ardently attached.

He did not enjoy in early life all the advantages which fall to the lot of the youth of to-day, but even under the unfavorable circumstances in which he was placed, he developed that taste for study and love of books which formed so marked a characteristic of his maturer years.

While a young man he resided several years in Henryville and Odelltown, and during this time was led to realize more fully the claims of God upon him, and to consecrate his whole being to the service of the Master.

His conversion was clear and all-pervading, and his new experience changed the current of his whole life. He believed himself to be divinely called to the office and work of the ministry, and the Church recognizing in him the needed gifts and graces, recommended him as a suitable candidate.

In the year 1837, when eighteen years of age, he was received upon probation and appointed to the Odelltown Circuit as colleague to the Rev. John Tomkins. For twenty years he rendered efficient service upon several of the most important Circuits in the Eastern Townships.

While stationed at Stanstead, in the year 1857, he was seized with hemorrhage of the lungs, and at the next Conference obtained a superannuated relation. For a time it was hoped his health would sufficiently recover to permit him to resume circuit labor, but in this he and his many friends were disappointed. After his superannuation he settled in Stanstead, and for thirty years enjoyed the confidence and esteem of a large circle of friends. When the state of his health permitted, he was always willing to take a service for any brother needing help, and in this way rendered valuable assistance on adjoining Circuits and to his own pastor.

Mr. McDonald possessed a strong and well-informed mind, was a great reader, a clear thinker, and an instructive preacher. He never brought unbeaten oil to the sanctuary. His sermons were always carefully prepared, and their delivery was always accompanied with unction and power. His habits of diligent and careful study, formed early in life, continued with him to the end. To his pastor he was a faithful brother; his counsels were always wise. In his retirement he cultivated personal piety, read extensively, and in all things sought to please God.


For some months before his death there were unmistakable indications of approaching dissolution, and occasional periods of great bodily suffering, but to the last his mind was clear and his faith in God unwavering. Some days before his death he said to his doctor, "I expect nothing less than eternal life through our Lord Jesus Christ." Later he said, "My feet are on the Rock." On the afternoon of June 21st, 1888, the long looked for messenger arrived, and his spirit passed peacefully away to be forever with the Lord. He rests from his labors, but his works do follow him.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

REPORT OF THE STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee are pleased to report a considerable advance in some of the Connexional Funds, notably the Educational and Missionary. We have, however, to report a slight decrease in some others, viz., the Union Church, Relief, Contingent, and General Conference Funds. We believe this is accounted for by the fact that several Circuits have not reported anything for these Funds, and would call attention to the importance of all the collections being taken up on each Circuit, and at the time stated in Discipline. We would also suggest that there be greater care, accuracy, and promptness in making out the various statistical returns from Circuits and Districts, thus avoiding much trouble and securing more satisfactory results. We would repeat the suggestion of two years ago that the Circuit schedules be duly audited at District Meeting. Present membership, 33,083; increase, 2,116.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

After a careful review of the work of the past Conference year, your Committee report encouraging progress. A net increase of 2,116 members calls for devout thankfulness to the "God of all grace."

The Sabbath-schools report 1,713 additional scholars, and increased interest is manifested in this highly important department of the Church's work.

In regard to the building of churches and parsonages, there has been gratifying success. In most of the Connexional Funds there has been an increase.

The Educational work still prospers, but not to that degree that its importance demands.

Our religious periodicals are of an increasingly high order, and we believe that with greater efforts to increase their circulation, corresponding results may be expected.

We are sorry to say that the Temperance cause has been shadowed by apparent defeat. Nevertheless, we look upon it as the augury of ultimate triumph.

It is gratifying to notice a considerable increase in the contributions to the Missionary Funds in the bounds of the Montreal Conference. We are also pleased to learn of the great success of the Woman's Missionary Society, as indicated in the Report presented to the Conference by Mrs. (Rev.) T. G. Williams.

The increased efforts put forth in the prosecution of our French educational work mark a new era of progress, and give promise of future success on a larger scale and of a more permanent character.

We note with thankfulness to God the work of the French Institute in Montreal and the Girls' School in Acton Vale, and we believe that when the building now in course of erection at Cote St. Antoine is completed, larger successes may be confidently expected in this important branch of our work.

REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows :—

Like all great moral reforms, the temperance work has met with most persistent and unscrupulous opposition.

The opposition was never more apparent than at the present. We are passing through a crisis, and if there ever was a time when the Methodist Church in particular, and temperance workers in general, should stand firmly by our temperance principles, it is now.

Your Committee, however, feel confident that, notwithstanding the recent defeats of the Canada Temperance Act in so many constituencies, there has been no decline in true temperance sentiment ; and that apparent defeats have but brought to the notice of the public more fully the men of true temperance principles, thus affording a better opportunity to the electors of choosing our representatives in office.

The Canada Temperance Act has also given a grand opportunity of presenting the subject of temperance to the public, and thus educating public sentiment, as well as restricting the traffic ; we still cling to our motto, " Total abstinence for the individual, and total prohibition for the State," therefore

Resolved,—That this Conference regards the liquor traffic as contrary to the Word of God and the spirit of the Christian religion, and fully believes that there is no cure for it but total prohibition ; and we urge upon our people throughout the whole Conference to put forth every legitimate effort to secure such legislation as will put a stop to this great iniquity—this insult to God, and disgrace to our civilization.

That, while we are gratified to believe that in our Sabbath-schools the moral and religious grounds for total abstinence are taught, we recommend that the physical evils of alcohol also be taught ; and that it be an urgent recommendation to Sunday-schools of our Conference to establish, in connection with the schools, Juvenile Temperance Societies.

That, as the ultimate power of the people to influence the Legislature is found in the ballot box, we declare our purpose by the pulpit, by the press, and by every legitimate means, to inculcate the responsibility of all Christian men and good citizens, to subordinate political party alliances to the great work of securing the abolition of the demoralizing traffic.

We deeply deplore and strongly condemn the action of the Quebec Government in the mutilation of the License law of the Province, by which, what was a fairly stringent and workable License law, has become useless for all purposes, except to furnish revenue to the Government and liberty to the traffic to destroy our youth.

In the denial of the right of private prosecution ; in allowing a specious plea to justify the selling of liquor to minors ; granting special license to pic-nics, exhibitions, and like gatherings, under the plea of controlling more perfectly the sale of intoxicants at such gatherings ; and, in the alteration of the provisions regarding the number of signatures requisite for a certificate of license, we find cause for the strongest condemnation.

We would also reaffirm our determination to oppose, by every constitutional method, any men and any measures, which propose, directly or indirectly, to foster the traffic in intoxicants, and thus to jeopardize the temporal and eternal interests of our fellow men.

That each minister of the Conference be requested to preach a sermon on Temperance at each appointment on his Circuit, on or about the second Sabbath in December, next.

That the Conference make the Temperance Committee a standing Committee, and that it be authorized to receive such moneys as may be freely contributed during the year, that the work may be more effectively carried on.

We also recommend that a committee, consisting of Dr. Antliff, Rev. F. Bland, and W. H. Lambly, be appointed to present to the Quebec Government this resolution, with such additions as they may deem advisable.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee are much gratified to report that during the past Conference year there have been more schools, more officers and teachers, more scholars, a larger average attendance, more conversions, a larger number meeting in class, more scholars learning the Catechism, and more money raised for school purposes, than during the previous year. In short, there has been improvement nearly all along the line of Sabbath-school operations.

Every true disciple of Jesus is a lover of childhood. If the world is to be taken for Christ, the children must be led to His side. It is, therefore, particularly pleasing to know that the Methodism of Canada has under its care in the Sabbath-schools more children than all other denominations combined. The intellectual environment of our times emphatically indicates the wisdom of spending a wealth of intellect and of money in the spiritual culture of the young, and we congratulate the Conference because a deep regard for childhood is a primary characteristic of our beloved Church.

District Sunday-school conventions are again heartily recommended, and it is urged that the Chairmen of Districts make report of the same to the Conference.

We draw special attention to the importance and necessity of bridging the period between boyhood and manhood by carefully arranged schemes of work to elicit the sympathy and energetic co-operation of the senior scholars in the enterprises of the Church.

As a means of securing a working alliance between the Church and school, the ministers of the Conference are requested to give special heed to the needs of the children in the services of the sanctuary, either by special sermons for them at frequent intervals, or by specially adapting a part of each service to their mental capacity.

In view of carrying out the design just indicated, your Committee express the earnest hope that parents will secure the attendance of their children at the services of the church.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

The Committee on Church property beg leave to report :—

MONTREAL DISTRICT.

Montreal Fifth.—We recommend the Conference to grant the Trustee Board of Montreal Fifth permission to sell their present church property, and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new church in another locality.

Montreal Eighth.—That the permission of the Conference be granted to the Trustee Board of Montreal Eighth to sell a portion of their church property, and apply the proceeds to pay for property already purchased.

Point St. Charles.—With respect to the request of the Trustee Board of Point St. Charles to sell their new church site, we recommend that the resolution of the Montreal District Meeting, which is as follows, be adopted :—

Moved by Rev. J. C. Antliff, seconded by Rev. W. Jackson, That, as in the opinion of this District Meeting it would be decidedly preferable, in the interests of the Point St. Charles Church, to build a new church, rather than extend the present building, we think it advisable that the new site should be retained for the present; but, if during the ensuing year it should still be considered necessary, by the trustees, to sell the new site, we pledge ourselves to endeavor to secure permission of the Conference of 1890 for the sale of said site.—Carried.

KINGSTON DISTRICT.

Wolfe Island.—We recommend that the request of the Quarterly Board of Wolfe Island, asking that the permission of the Conference be granted to the Trustee Board of the church property, at Big Bay, to sell the said church, and apply the proceeds in the interests of our church property at the Ferry, be granted.

Seeley's Bay.—Also, that permission be granted to dispose of the building and property known as the Eatonville Church, on the Seeley's Bay Circuit, subject to the approval of the trustees of said property.

BROCKVILLE DISTRICT.

Farmersville Circuit.—We recommend that the request of the trustees of Farmersville parsonage, asking permission of the Conference to sell their old parsonage, and apply the proceeds in the following manner, viz :—\$500 to cancel the mortgage on said property; \$200 to cancel the indebtedness on the new parsonage premises, arising from building a new barn, and the balance to be applied to cancelling the loan of the said parsonage Board from the Trustee Board of Farmersville to aid in payment of the new parsonage.

Bishop's Mills.—That permission be granted to the trustees of Bishop's Mills parsonage to sell the old parsonage, and apply the proceeds to purchase a new one.

PERTH DISTRICT.

Merrickville.—We recommend that the trustees of the Merrickville Church be granted permission to sell their church and lot, and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new church.

PEMBROKE DISTRICT.

Clarendon Circuit.—We recommend that the request of the trustees of the parsonage property of the Clarendon Circuit, asking permission to sell one-half of one of their village lots on the front street, to receive in lieu thereof, one-half of an adjoining lot on the back street, so that their five lots may become a square block.

Locksley Mission.—That permission be granted to the trustees of the Rankin Church property to sell said property, proceeds to be applied to to the parsonage and church property in Micksburg.

NIPISSING DISTRICT.

North Bay.—We recommend that permission be granted to the trustees of the parsonage of North Bay to sell said parsonage, and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new one on a more eligible site.

Himsworth Township.—That permission be granted to the trustees of North Bay to sell the Church property which they hold in Himsworth township, proceeds to be applied to the erection of a new church in another place.

OTTAWA DISTRICT.

Dominion Church.—We recommend that the trustees of the Dominion Church be permitted to sell the Cemetery property, in the eastern part of the city, the proceeds to be equally divided between the three Methodist churches of Ottawa, viz.:—Dominion Church, West End Church, and East End Church.

Bearbrook.—That permission be given to the trustees of Bearbrook parsonage to sell their old parsonage, and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new parsonage at Bearbrook Crossing.

Richmond.—That permission be given to the trustees of the Richmond parsonage to sell the parsonage, and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new parsonage in the village of Richmond.

QUEBEC DISTRICT.

Windsor Mills.—We recommend that the request of the trustees of Windsor Mills, asking Conference for permission to sell their parsonage property, and apply the proceeds to procuring a new one near the church, be granted.

East Sherbrooke.—That permission be given to the trustees of the French Methodist Church, in East Sherbrooke, to dispose of their property, and apply the proceeds in harmony with the Missionary Board arrangement.

Marbleton.—That permission be given to the trustees of Marbleton parsonage to sell said parsonage, and apply the proceeds to erecting a more suitable building.

Island Brook.—That permission be given to the trustees of Island Brook to sell a piece of land recently obtained by will, in that place.

WATERLOO DISTRICT.

Cowansville.—The Quarterly Board asks that Conference grant the trustees of the Cowansville Church permission to sell their old church, and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new church, now in process of building.

Granby.—We recommend that the trustees of Granby parsonage be permitted to sell the parsonage property, and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new parsonage, now in course of building.

West Brome.—We recommend that the trustees of East Dunham be permitted to sell one or both of their churches in said place, and apply the proceeds toward securing a place of worship for both congregations at an intervening point; or if one church only be sold, to apply the proceeds to repair the other.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF STANSTEAD WESLEYAN COLLEGE.

In presenting their Annual Report the Trustees beg to submit to the Conference the following statistics, reported by the Principal:—

Attendance:—Lady boarders, 26; lady day students, 38; male students, 42; total enrolment, 106.

The degree of Mistress of English Literature will this year be conferred upon two young ladies, they having completed the collegiate course.

The Music Department has been well sustained during the year, and will present a graduating class of nine, of whom eight will receive diplomas in instrumenta, one in vocal, and two in both instrumental and vocal music.

In the Commercial Department there have been in all ten pupils, including three young ladies. The larger number of these will complete the course and receive their diplomas.

Thirty-six of our students are this year taking the government grade examinations including a class of four in the University A. A. course.

The Art Department is growing in favor and importance. At the last convocation there was, for the first time, an Art exhibit, and the work of the pupils from the studio was much admired.

The Bible-classes during the year have been of interest, and the prayer and class-meetings seasons of blessing.

The attendance, though not so large as last year, has been more regular and steady, and the educational and financial results are consequently proportionally greater. As far as can be judged at present, the outlook for next year is encouraging.

As the scholastic year does not close until the 19th of June, it is impossible to present any financial statement that will embody the final results of the financial operations of the year. From an estimate of the assets and liabilities up to the present time, it is, however, fully expected that all the financial obligations of the year will be fully met by the current income.

From the foregoing statements submitted by the Principal, the Conference will be glad to recognize that, so far as the ordinary and legitimate work of the College is concerned, the year's results are most gratifying—educationally, financially, and spiritually.

It is a matter of very deep regret to the Board that, owing to domestic circumstances, the Principal has found it necessary to sever his connection

with this Institution. We very much regret that Dr. Henderson's valuable services have been so soon terminated and at a time when the prospects of the Institution have become increasingly bright and encouraging.

With reference to Dr. Henderson's successor, we find that in this very important matter our nomination of a Principal should be determined by the policy to be pursued with reference to the educational status of the College. On this question we hereby recommend that the Conference give its approval to the affiliation of the Stanstead Wesleyan College with McGill University, and authorize the Board to conduct such negotiations as may be necessary to secure such affiliation. The Trustees are convinced that the time has come for elevating the standing of the College by aiming at a higher character of work, while at the same time the present courses of study as demanded by the now general wants of the community should be continued. A Committee has been appointed by the Trustees to select a Principal of superior recognized standing. We recommend that the Conference hereby authorize the Trustees to appoint the Principal whom, with this object, they may select.

Concerning the financial statement, which must be clearly distinguished from the ordinary College working account, the Trustees view with some degree of alarm the disproportion between the expenditure on the Debt Fund account and the income available for the purposes of the same. The Interest Guarantee Fund has served an admirable purpose; but the original subscriptions have lapsed with the last June payment, and a large number of the balance lapsed with the present June payment, so that we are now partially without any guarantee, and unless provided for, the debt must annually increase in the large sum of the interest charges and the incidental expenses, a result which simply means financial disaster. Hitherto we have, by the aid of a few timely subscriptions, been able to provide for our annual deficits, and in this way prevent the debt from becoming annually larger, but this year we have not yet been able to maintain this equilibrium, and our debt has increased during the year, as shown by the statement, in the sum of \$716.48.

The Trustees, therefore, respectfully request the Conference to take immediate steps, either to secure the liquidation of the principal of the debt, or by an annual collection in all the Churches, or by special agency, canvass, or other wise, make full and ample provision for the total amount of our annual Debt Fund requirements. The Conference will be the more encouraged to do this because the expectations cherished, at the time the Guarantee Fund was inaugurated, viz.: that in three years the College would be self-sustaining, and be able out of its ordinary income to set apart a sum of money toward the Debt Fund charges, either as a contribution to the Interest Guarantee Fund, or by way of an annual sinking fund, looking to the liquidation of the principal of the debt, have been fully met. The College has been not only self-sustaining, but has earned a surplus each year for the last three years, and this fact ought, in the opinion of the Board, to effectually remove any fear or suspicion of failure, and to establish the fact that the College is not a failure, but a success.

In conclusion, the Trustees express the conviction that although we have many difficulties, yet that with patient perseverance and generous sympathy, the College will long live and continue to do splendid work.

MODE OF EXAMINATION FOR THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

Candidates for our Ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his studies and general reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The examination of Candidates shall be held in each District, under the supervision of the Chairman and the Examiners resident on the District, on the third Wednesday in April in each year, and at such place as the Chairman shall appoint. All papers shall be sent by the Examiners to the Chairman not later than the second Wednesday in April in each year. The answers to the papers shall be sent by the Chairman to the respective Examiners, who shall forward to the Secretary of the Board the valuation. The Secretary shall prepare the certificates, and forward them to the Chairman of the District, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting. The Secretary of the Board shall send the Chairman of each District the name of any Candidate or Probationer who may have taken part of the subjects in any given course, and the standing he has attained, but shall not issue the certificate in any year's course until the

Candidate or Probationer has completed it; and further, the standard qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conference as Probationers shall not be lower than fifty per cent. of the marks on the preliminary course of study in the aggregate, and thirty-three and one-third per cent. in each subject. Also a standing of thirty-three and one-third per cent. shall be required in order to pass in each subject of the subsequent course, and the Conference directs that existing regulations relating to the time and manner of examinations be imperatively observed, and more especially that it be deemed absolutely peremptory that the examinations be held on the same day throughout the whole Conference, and that all the young men in any District writing on any given subject, write at the same hour. The maximum time for each paper shall be two hours. No supplementary examination shall be allowed between the regular time of Examinations and the close of Conference. Each Examiner is expected to send at least one copy of each examination paper to the Chairman of Districts.

REPORT OF THE FRENCH METHODIST INSTITUTE, MONTREAL.

In presenting this Report of the Ninth Session of the French Methodist Institute, it may be well to refer to a few facts connected with our French educational work generally. Although the Methodist Church was the pioneer in the French-Canadian evangelization, having sent the Rev. John de Putron, of the Channel Isles, to Canada, in the year 1815; he was, after three or four years, induced to take up English work, and for nearly forty years nothing was attempted in this department of Christian effort.

During the long parenthesis, other Churches commenced operations, and wisely combined educational with the other means of evangelization. Hence, Grande Ligne, Pointe aux Trembles and Sabrevois Mission Schools rose to importance.

For years after the Methodists recommenced evangelistic work there was nothing done in the direction of education. At length, an attempt was made to establish a school near the city of Sherbrooke. The site proved to be unfortunate, and the effort was finally terminated through the burning of the building in 1883.

The children of the (Methodist) converts from Romanism have of necessity been largely reared in the educational institutions of other denominations, and prominent among the most useful workers in these other denominations are the sons of these French-Canadian Methodists.

At length, it began to dawn upon some minds that if we were ever, as a denomination, to make any substantial progress among the French-Canadians, it must be largely through educational work. Accordingly, the French Institute was originated under the superintendency of the late lamented Rev. John Borland, in the year 1880.

This, the ninth session of the French Methodist Institute has been very prosperous. The average attendance has been about thirty per cent. greater than that of the previous year.

The day school has done well under Rev. L. Massicotte, who has rendered excellent service in the Institute proper. Madame Cauchon, the matron, resigned early in the Session, and was succeeded by Mrs. E. Squibb, under whom the domestic arrangements were well conducted to the end of the session.

Twenty-four students, with an average age of sixteen years, have been received in the Institute as boarders, of whom twenty were of French origin.

The progress made by the students has been very gratifying, especially those studying higher branches.

The conversion of one young man in particular deserves notice. This young French-Canadian came to study university matriculation work. He already held the Model School diploma of the Jacques Cartier Normal School, where he was a distinguished prize man.

He came to us a Roman Catholic. He now takes active part in our prayer-meetings. He rendered great service, during the session, as pupil teacher.

We are thankful to our Father that there has been no serious illness among the students through the entire session.

Thanks are due to the Revs. Dr. Shaw, W. Hall, M.A., E. DeGruchy and W. Howitt, B.A., for their assistance as examiners at the sessional examination.

The Rev. James Henderson and a Methodist layman have, this year, given some suitable prizes, which have been bestowed upon those taking the highest number of marks in the written examination.

The classes in vocal music, under the instruction of Mr. L. E. Rivard, have done well, although the railway accident of mid-winter, from which Mr. Rivard suffered, took him from his work for several weeks.

Dr. J. B. McConnell has continued, gratuitously, to minister to the medical wants of the members of the Institute during the session.

Over fifty applications have been received this year. Some of these we have been exceedingly sorry to turn away, having no vacancies for them.

The beautiful new buildings at Côte St. Antoine, will afford ample accommodation for deserving applicants in the immediate future.

Applications are even now coming in rapidly, and the outlook is cheering.

In retiring from the Institute, I do not give up my interest in its welfare. I am glad to be succeeded by a gentleman possessed of the admirable qualities known to exist in my successor, the Rev. Wm. Hall, M.A. May the abundant blessing of the All-giver rest upon his family and him in their new work.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JESUITS' ESTATES BILL.

The Committee appointed to consider the Jesuits' Estates Bill met according to announcement.

On motion, Rev. Alex. Campbell was elected Chairman, and Rev. W. J. Crothers was elected Secretary.

The following resolutions were formulated:—

Whereas an Act was passed by the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, in 1888, entitled "An Act respecting the settlement of the Jesuits' Estates," in the preamble of which Act there are statements which accord to the Bishop of Rome, viz., the Pope, a foreign potentate, rights and privileges which are an invasion of Her Majesty's supremacy; whereas the sum of \$400,000 has been placed at the unconditional disposal of the Pope, save that it must be spent in the Province of Quebec; and whereas he has acceded to the illegal and unjust claims of the Jesuits, by donating to them a large sum; and, inasmuch as the Order of the Jesuits in the past has been subversive of civil and religious liberty, in all countries where it has obtained any considerable foothold; and, whereas the Dominion Parliament, by an overwhelming majority, refused to take any action to secure the disallowance of said Act, despite petitions praying for such disallowance; therefore, this Conference, animated by feelings of brotherly kindness, and desiring to secure religious equality and the peace and prosperity of our country, determinately protests (1) against the endowment in any form of any religious bodies from the public funds, as being a violation of the principle of religious equality; (2) against the recognition of the authority of any foreign power in the civil affairs of a British Province;

(3) against the action of the Quebec Legislature in passing the Jesuits' Estates, Bill and the Dominion Parliament in failing to recommend the disallowance of said Act. And, further, while desiring to live in peace with our fellow-citizens, irrespective of nationality or religion, we join hands with our friends of civil and religious liberty who aim at equal rights and privileges, and the extirpation of the last vestige of State churchism from our fair land.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OKA INDIANS.

The Committee appointed at the Annual Session held in the city of Montreal, in the month of April, 1888, to investigate the matters set forth in a petition addressed to the Conference by the Chiefs of the Iroquois Indians at Oka, dated 1st September, 1887, beg leave to report as follows:—

1. That while we are of opinion that the title to the Seigniorship of Two Mountains was originally vested in the Seminary of St. Sulpice in a fiduciary capacity, and that the Seminary is not possessed of any absolute title to the said Seigniorship, a very large sum of money would be required in order to obtain a decision on this subject from the highest Court in the realm.

2. That it is evident, and we understand is conceded even by the Seminary, that the Indians possess substantial rights in the Seigniorship, and

even if the title to the land were vested absolutely in the Seminary, which we deny, the Indians would still be entitled to compensation for improvements made by them.

3. That we hereby assure our Indian brethren of our continued sympathy with them in the trials through which they have to pass, and we renew our counsel and admonition that they be so guarded in their conduct as to give their enemies no ground for accusation, but that they patiently bear whatever sufferings may befall them; and further, that they be prepared to give at least reasonable consideration to whatever proposals may be made for the settlement of existing difficulties.

4. That terms of negotiations have been proposed by the Seminary, whereby the rights of the Indians might be purchased, and they should receive compensation for the surrender of such interests as they possess in the Seigniory.

5. That the Dominion Government appointed in 1887 a Special Commissioner to treat with representatives of the Seminary and Indians respectively, permission being given to Rev. Dr. Shaw, the President of the Montreal Conference, and R. C. Smith, B.C.L., of the Montreal *Advocate*, as friends of the Indians, to be present, and advise in the conduct of negotiations with reference to the compensation above proposed, and in defence of the interests of the Indians.

6. That the Indians, although they appointed their Chiefs to represent them as just mentioned, yet otherwise steadily maintain the position of refusing to listen to any proposals which may be made with reference to compensation for their interests.

7. That your Committee has made inquiry from various missionary authorities as to the condition of the Indians who some years ago removed from Oka to a reserve in the township of Gibson, Ontario, and we find that their position is, for the most part, one of contentment and prosperity, in further evidence of which the testimony is herewith annexed of several of the Indians to the Department of Indian Affairs, Ottawa.

8. That, under the foregoing circumstances, we would regard it as imprudent to reject, without fair and careful consideration, any proposals which may be made for an amicable and permanent settlement of existing difficulties; and we would strongly advise the Indians of Oka to consider, with the assistance of their friends above mentioned, or any others the Conference may appoint, any such reasonable proposals; and, at the same time, we respectfully request the Department of Indian Affairs to exercise its authority, as legal guardian of the Indians, to protect their rights to the utmost, whether they remove from Oka or remain.

9. That substantially the same counsel as the foregoing was given to the Indians at Oka by the Missionary Board of the Methodist Church at its Annual Session in the month of October, 1887.

10. We recommend that copies of this Report, when adopted, be sent to the Indian Chief at Oka, and to the Department of Indian Affairs at Ottawa, and to the Methodist Mission Rooms, Toronto.

Memorial from the Woman's Missionary Society, through its Committee of Management in Montreal, to the Montreal Conference in session:—

Deeply realizing the urgent necessity for more aggressive missionary work in French Districts within the bounds of the Montreal Conference, and fearing that these Districts may not be directly reached by the educational work of our French Institute in Montreal, this Committee would respectfully ask your consideration of the following scheme, with any suggestions you may be pleased to offer.

1st. That mission schools be established wherever practicable, even should the number of pupils which might be guaranteed in the beginning be few, provided the permanent establishment of such a school be secured.

2nd. That, if possible, the aid and co-operation of our English and French ministers on the same or adjacent Circuits be secured in the establishment of such permanent mission schools.

3rd. That in places where a dissentient school may be already established, our ministers endeavor to have it placed under the control of our Woman's Missionary Society, which could, in all cases, strive to place over the work carefully selected and well trained teachers.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND REPORT.

In the years preceding the General Conference of 1886 the salaries of the General Superintendents were paid in part by the Missionary and Educational Funds, on the ground that the advocacy of the chief officers of the Church did very materially benefit these departments of our Church work.

According to the then existing law, the Fund paid only \$2,000 annually for the above purpose, or at the rate of \$8,000 for the full quadrennium. The legislation of the General Conference of 1886 (I think, unwisely) enacted that the whole amount required for the above purpose should be paid by the Fund, which amount during the quadrennium is \$18,400, an increase of \$10,400 during the four years on this one item

The General Conference, through the Financial Committee, provided for meeting this increased claim by apportioning to the several Annual Conferences, on what they considered an equitable basis, such sums as they deemed necessary to meet these claims, and the Conferences, through their representatives, accepted such apportionments. (See Journal, page 251.)

I consider the estimates made by the Financial Committee of the General Conference to be moderate and approximately correct, and I think the whole of these apportionments will be required to meet the claims against the Fund during the quadrennium.

The following tabulated statement will show how far the several Conferences have been successful, up till the 1st of September, 1888, in raising the amounts required from them respectively. According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference, I would just say here, in addition, that one-half of the quadrennium is now past, and one-half of the estimated amount should be in the Treasurer's hands.

From the above facts and figures it will be seen that less than one-half of the amount estimated as necessary has been paid in the past two years by the Conferences: \$15,080 required, say \$7,150 paid, and \$7,930 still deficient on the two years. These figures speak more eloquently than anything I could say. What is to be done? This is a question properly belonging to the several Annual Conferences. That something should be done, and done generally and promptly, I think all will admit. The next meeting of the Annual Conferences should not be allowed to pass without very decided action. All the Conferences might not be disposed to take the same action; some might be disposed to adopt an additional collection to make up the balance, while others might prefer to do it by a private subscription among the friends of the Church. The amount should be raised in some way by each of the Conferences.

To prevent misunderstandings, it may be necessary to say that as our year closes on the 31st of August, and the year in the Annual Conferences closes about June, it will be in vain to expect that our figures will agree with those returned in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences.

Your Excellency will allow us to say, that the appointment of Your Excellency as Governor-General of Canada is taken by us as sufficient proof of the high estimation in which our country is held by the Crown and Government of Great Britain. We are not ignorant of the fact that eminent services have been rendered to the State for many generations by

successive members of your noble family, and that Your Excellency has earned the gratitude and esteem of the Sovereign by the honorable fulfilment of important official duties.

The Conference, therefore, with great cordiality welcomes Your Excellency as Governor-General of Canada, and will continue to offer sincere prayer to Almighty God that the life and health of Your Excellency, of Lady Stanley, and of your family, may be preserved, and that all necessary wisdom and strength may be granted to Your Excellency by the Giver of all grace and goodness, to the end that our beloved country may continue its career of unity, peace and prosperity.

HIS EXCELLENCY'S ORAL REPLY.

His Excellency in reply assured the deputation that it was with no ordinary feelings of gratification he received the Address of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church. The good wishes and kindly feeling conveyed in the Address were in accord with the sentiments of goodwill he had everywhere met with on his advent to Canada. Throughout the Dominion he had found that there existed an unwavering expression of loyalty to the Throne, and attachment to the Constitution, which, combined with the utmost individual freedom, was the surest guarantee of law and order. In more troublous times than these, no small part of difficulties devolving on the Methodist body was to show that individual rights, and the assertion of individual freedom, were entirely consistent with devotion to the best interests of the State, combined with deep responsibility to the Author and Dispenser of all personal and national good.

His Excellency was pleased to observe that the earlier part of his life was spent in the most populous portion of the Mother-country, where very much had to be done in the cause of religion, and he had learned there a lesson, not everywhere acknowledged at the time, that it was possible to be an earnest, aggressive Christian, and at the same time exercise the utmost tolerance and charity toward those who differed from us. The Church to which he belonged differed somewhat from that whose representatives he was addressing, but it recognized the great principles which the Methodist body advocated, and the great work it carried on in advancing the material, social and moral condition of the whole people. All earnest Christians enter by the one gate, even though they might not travel by the same road, yet all were engaged in pushing onward the conquests of Christianity. He recognized that the Methodist community, side by side with other communities, was pressing forward in its great and noble work, not only for the material, but especially for the moral, progress of Canada. Here also, as elsewhere, the Methodists enjoined loyalty to the Throne and obedience to the laws, and he was glad to receive assurances of continued fidelity and zeal.

His Excellency was pleased to say that the reference to his family, predecessors, and his own official services, he felt sure was not an idle

compliment, but was expressed in all sincerity, and he hoped his future conduct might be guided by it. He desired that his period of service in Canada, whether long or short, should be along the pathway of impartiality and justice, exercising the duties devolving upon him with a due sense of responsibility.

On behalf of Lady Stanley, His Excellency thanked the deputation for their kind welcome, and for the good wishes of the Conference. Both Lady Stanley and himse'f felt deeply the warm-hearted welcome which had met them on every side. They would ever treasure this cordial welcome among the most agreeable and the most valuable recollections of their stay in Canada.

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

Moved by S. E. Mitchell, seconded by Rev. Dr. Saunders,

That, whereas the General Board of Missions is making, in the aggregate, increasingly large annual grants to its missionaries and agents in the Foreign and French departments of its work, as also to those on the Pacific Coast, both for salaries and rents, the same being paid in full without deduction or discount, irrespective of the amount of aggregate income of the Missionary Society or its requirements for the Domestic Missions;

And whereas the appropriations for the maintenance of the Missionaries engaged on our Domestic Missions are smaller than are the others, yet, because of the aforesaid method of distribution of the funds, the whole burden of any deficiency in the Society's income is made to fall upon our men in the Domestic work, who are consequently allowed only twenty per cent. of their rentals, and are also paid only about sixty-five or seventy per cent. of the aforesaid small appropriations, which often results in serious embarrassment to the recipient;

And whereas it is the opinion of this Committee that the method pursued by the Central Board in regard to these grants tends to an undue exaltation of the Foreign and French over our Domestic Missions, to the very serious detriment of the latter, whose importance is certainly not transcended by the former, to the Methodist Church of Canada; therefore be it

Resolved,—That this Montreal Conference Missionary Committee views with considerable alarm the possible effects upon the contributors to the income of our beloved Missionary Society from seeing, what we feel to be so grave an injustice done to the missionaries engaged in our Domestic work by the unequal and disproportionate manner in which the funds are distributed which they have so nobly supplied, and therefore prays that the General Board may see it to be in the interests of the Church as a whole to place all grants for the prosecution of its missionary operations upon an equal basis, payable in like proportion to all concerned, as the funds of the Society will allow.

Moved by Rev. J. T. Pitcher, seconded by Rev. W. J. Hewitt, and

Resolved,—That in view of the embarrassing uncertainty as to the law and forms of Registration of Acts of Civil Status in the Province of Quebec, we request that Rev. W. I. Shaw, LL.D., and R. C. Smith, B.C.L., of the *Advocate*, be requested to act as a Committee to publish, for the information of the ministers of this Conference, a pamphlet containing a digest of the law and forms relating to such registration.

Moved by Rev. W. Wellington Carson, seconded by Rev. G. H. Porter, B.A., and

Resolved,—That the Report of the College Confederation Fund, as forwarded by Rev. Dr. Potts, be received, and that this Conference express its pleasure at the satisfactory condition of the Fund; and that we further congratulate the Secretary of Education upon the results of his efforts in the interest of the educational policy of the Church.

Moved by Rev. R. Whiting, seconded by Rev. Dr. Shaw, and

Resolved,—That we express our great satisfaction in hearing the statements concerning our publishing interests, showing enterprise in management, remarkable advance in business, and very valuable material aid given to the Superannuation Fund, we hereby record our confident expectation of the further growth of these great religious and educational agencies of our Church, and the prosperity of our Montreal Department.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Shaw, seconded by Rev. Dr. Antliff, and

Resolved,—That we rejoice in the success of the Ontario Ladies' College, observing with pleasure in the report presented to Conference most gratifying evidences of thoroughness as well as of a very high standard of work in this very flourishing institution, and that we hereby record our hope and desire for its continued prosperity.

Moved by Wm. Blair, seconded by E. M. Taylor, and

Resolved,—That, having heard the communication of President Dyer, giving an account of the work in Albert College for the year now closing, (1) we rejoice in the continued prosperity and encouraging prospects of that institution; (2) we trust that with Victoria federated that the usefulness of Albert as a source of supply will increase more and more; (3) confident that it will be true to its past record, we heartily commend it to the continued sympathy and patronage of the public.

Moved by Rev. W. Scott, seconded by Rev. W. Hansford, and

Resolved,—That this Conference has heard with unalloyed satisfaction the statement made in respect to the Hamilton Ladies' College, Ontario. Its history as the first of such useful institutions in Canada is most encouraging, and its influence throughout many sections of the country most beneficial. Although far removed from some portions of our Conference, we cherish for the Hamilton Ladies' College the highest esteem, and wish for it continued and increased prosperity.

Moved by Rev. G. G. Huxtable, seconded by Rev. W. J. Hewitt, and

Resolved,—That the resolution of the Conference in reference to the Jesuits' Estates Bill be forwarded to His Excellency the Governor-General, signed by the President and Secretary.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Antliff, seconded by Rev. J. J. Pitcher, and

Resolved,—That the Report of the Editor of the *Christian Guardian* be received. We hope that the circulation will be largely increased during the ensuing year, and to this end we will use our best endeavors. We are gratified that such wholesome reading is provided for the families of our people, and we express our approval of the Editor's able defence of Methodist teaching and institutions.

Moved by Rev. W. Jackson, seconded by Rev. G. McRitchie, and
Resolved,—That this Conference misses from its present session, with regret, the familiar face and voice of our dearly beloved brother, the Rev. J. Elliott, D.D., and desires to convey to him its profound sympathy with him in his continued affliction, and prays that the smile of our Heavenly Father may brighten and beautify his remaining days, until the infirmities of earth shall give place to the perfection of heaven; and that the Secretary of Conference be instructed to forward a copy of this Resolution to Dr. Elliott.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Douglas, seconded by Rev. W. Hansford, and
Resolved,—That this Montreal Conference hereby expresses its unabated confidence in the integrity, fidelity, and ability of the Treasurer of the Superannuation Fund of our Church, the Rev. James Gray, whose statements before the Conference, and well-known sympathy with his brethren in the more trying portions of our work, we heartily appreciate.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Shaw, seconded by Rev. T. G. Williams, and
Resolved,—That we very much regret that our association in this Conference with our beloved brother, the Rev. J. W. Sparling, D.D., has now to be severed, owing to his transfer to the Manitoba Conference; that we will always remember with greatest pleasure his urbanity and the genial brotherly spirit he has ever shown to all members of this Conference without exception, and that we hereby express our most earnest wish for the success of the very important educational enterprise the Church has laid upon him in the furtherance of the interests of Wesley College, Winnipeg.

It was moved by Wm. Hansford, seconded by Dr. Antiff, and
Resolved,—That this Conference expresses its deep sympathy with our afflicted and esteemed brother R. Eason, and hereby continues his superannuation relation, and grants him such certificates of character and standing as a minister of our Church as will leave him entirely free to render elsewhere such services as his enfeebled health will permit.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Douglas, seconded by John Torrance, Esq., and
Resolved,—That, whereas Sabbath desecration is alarmingly on the increase, as seen in the Dominion Government having taken nine hours of the day of rest from those working on the canals; as seen in the ever-increasing railroad traffic, especially in the passenger department; as seen in the opening of cigar, candy and other stores, by the sanction of the corporation of Montreal and other cities; as seen in the frequent chartering of steamers for purposes of pleasure; as seen in professedly Christian men, and even ministers, taking advantage of Sabbath trains under circumstances which do not admit of the plea of necessity; as seen in the Sabbath abuse of liveries; and especially as seen in a perceptible lowering of the tone of responsibility to keep holy the Sabbath day; therefore, be it resolved, that we, the members of the Montreal Conference, reaffirm our conviction that the very life of Christianity and the Church, as well as the moral condition of society, are inseparably connected with a just interpretation and loyal fulfilment of the Fourth Commandment, and that we employ every means within our power, especially by the agency of the pulpit, to resist all encroachments on the sanctity, and promote the better observance, of the Sabbath.

Moved by Rev. J. Scanlon, seconded by Rev. J. Lawson, and
Resolved,—That we, the members of this Conference, pledge ourselves to co-operate with the Lord's Day Alliance of the Dominion of Canada in circulating petitions among our people, to be presented to the Senate and House of Commons of the Dominion of Canada, asking legislation for the better observance of the Lord's day.

Moved by Rev. W. Jackson, seconded by Rev. J. C. Antliff, D.D.,
Whereas the Transfer Committee has departed from the usual practice, by decreeing that brethren coming into this Conference are not members thereof until the close of its sessions, and brethren going out of this Conference continue to be members thereof until said close;

Whereas, in the judgment of this Conference, this is inconvenient alike to the brethren who are transferred and the Conferences from which they are transferred;

Resolved,—That this Conference respectfully request the Transfer Committee to so arrange transfers to and from the Montreal Conference that they shall in future take effect at noon on the day of the opening of the said Conference.

Resolved,—That the distribution of the Sustentation Fund in each District be given, as last year, to a Committee consisting of the Chairman of the District, the Financial Secretary, and the District members of the Sustentation Committee.

Whereas many Circuits have made no returns for the Sustentation Fund, and whereas some of the Western Conferences have no Sustentation Fund, and whereas the Superannuation Fund assessment is based on the amounts paid for salary, board and fuel, with the amount raised for Connexional Funds, we hereby instruct the Secretary to omit from the Connexional Funds Report the amount raised for the Sustentation Fund;

Resolved,—That the Statistical Committee be requested to publish in the Minutes of the Conference the contribution of each Circuit to the Sustentation Fund.

On report of Committee on Evangelistic labors, it was

Resolved,—That we desire in the clearest way to affirm our conviction that all evangelists in our Church must be subject to the authorities of the Church and conform to our usual custom, and that no evangelist of the Methodist Church shall conduct evangelistic services on any Circuit or Mission in the Montreal Conference without an invitation or the expressed concurrence of the Superintendent of such charge.

Resolved,—That two thousand copies of the Minutes be printed, and that ten copies be sent to the Superintendent of each Circuit and Mission, except those engaged in the French work.

Resolved,—That ten cents be charged for each copy of Minutes of Conference, and that balance of expense of printing be charged to the Contingent Fund.

Resolved,—Whereas, by the omission of Schedule E from the Minutes of Conference, the Circuits do not get credit for all amounts raised, we hereby instruct the Secretary of Conference to insert said schedule in the Minutes of Conference.

On motion it was resolved,—

That this Conference respectfully request the Book Committee to

appoint a member of this Conference as Correspondent of the *Christian Guardian* for the Montreal Conference. The question of remuneration to be left to the judgment of the Book Committee.

That the Conference be respectfully requested to give practical effect to the Resolution of last Conference, p. 59, on the employment of nurses and evangelistic workers.

That the Secretary of Conference be instructed to inform the Chairman of the Citizens' Committee, Toronto, that the Rev. Geo. Douglas, LL.D., has been appointed to represent this Conference at the ensuing meeting.

That permission be given to the Minister at Valleyfield to canvass throughout the Conference in order to raise the sum of \$300, specially needed on that field.

PASTORAL ADDRESS

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH WITHIN THE
BOUNDS OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

DEARLY BELOVED,—“Grace be with you, mercy and peace, from God the Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of the Father, in truth and love.”

In again addressing you, we would first of all call upon you to unite with us in thanksgiving to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who always causeth us to triumph, for the varied and numberless mercies of the past year. We are thankful to be able to report that, with few exceptions, your ministers have been sustained in health and strength through a year of much earnest toil, and though four of the superannuated ministers have passed away to the everlasting rest, there has been no breach by death in the ranks of those engaged in the active work of the ministry. Though we learn from the Circuit Reports that the angel of death has visited the homes of some of you and called away your loved ones, we rejoice in the grace that enabled them to overcome through the blood of the Lamb; for the words of our sainted founder are still true, “Our people die well.”

The past year has been marked by peace in our borders, and our increase of members—2,116—is larger than that vouchsafed to any of our sister conferences, though we are glad to learn that all have had prosperity. We trust that there is a deepening of the spiritual life in the hearts of many of you, and that the coming year may be one of more abundant blessing to all our Missions and Circuits.

As it may interest you to be informed of some of the connexional institutions, we will briefly set forth the position and prospects of some of the more important :—

The *French Institute*.—This for several years has been struggling with the disadvantage of incommodious buildings, but the General Missionary Committee, with the assistance of the Woman's Missionary Society, has taken an important step forward by erecting a large and convenient building at Côte St. Antoine that will provide accommodation for upwards of a hundred students. The Institute, we believe, under the charge of the Rev. William Hall, M.A., as its Principal, will become a centre of light and influence in the important work of French Evangelization.

The *Stanstead College* has had a good year, but arrangements are being made which are likely to render it of still greater efficiency in the work of higher education, and we bespeak for it the patronage of those who have young people seeking a first-class education. The institution, unfortunately, has been crippled by a debt of some \$18,000, but at this Conference upwards of \$3,000 has been subscribed, chiefly by the ministers, and the

Rev. J. T. Pitcher has been appointed to seek further aid, in order that the whole debt may be liquidated. Are there not many of our friends who could render aid to this college, which is the property of the Montreal Conference?

The *Wesleyan Theological College* in Montreal has had a year of much prosperity, and as the number of its students is increasing, additional help is being secured for its staff of instructors.

We may also report that outside the bounds of this Conference our Collegiate Institutions are doing a noble work, and the College at Belleville and the University at Cobourg are manifesting the union of knowledge and vital piety. In regard to the latter, there has been much anxiety on the part of its friends in reference to the question of federation with the Provincial University in Toronto, but we trust that the present distress will soon pass away, and that a loyal and generous support will be accorded to those entrusted with carrying out the decision of the General Conference.

It is a pleasue to acknowledge the increasing support given by you to the several connexional funds. The Missionary Society and the Educational Society have especially been favored. There is, however, need that the Sustentation Fund should be more liberally sustained. This fund has for its special object the assistance of Ministers whose income is below \$600 a year. In order to pay the minimum salaries allowed by the Discipline this fund required upwards of \$7,000 this year, but only some \$2,400 was contributed; we need not say that this means much privation in the parsonages of some of the most worthy and earnest of your pastors. The Conference kindly asks that not less than an average of twenty cents a member be contributed next year. There are few objects more worthy the consideration and assistance of our people than this fund. Pray lend it your aid. In order that all our funds may be well supported, we urge the adoption of systematic and proportionate giving. "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

Turning from denominational matters to those of more general interest, we mark with concern some of the events of the past year. The aggressiveness of the Romish Church has become so open that the Protestant sentiment has been startled and shocked. The Jesuits' Estates Act, which interferes with the fund for superior education in the Province of Quebec, and hands over a large sum of the public money to the Roman Catholic Church, to be disposed of as the Pope of Rome may direct, has caused wide-spread alarm, and we, in Conference assembled, have felt it a duty, with other Conferences and the Church Courts of other denominations, to solemnly protest against an Act that injuriously affects both the dignity of the Crown and the interests of the Commonwealth. The Conference also regards with alarm the recent alterations of the license law in the Province of Quebec, by which those engaged in the liquor traffic are granted privileges favorable to their trade. It is with pain that we notice that the representatives of the several Churches and temperance organizations have their requests for improvements in the

license law refused, and that the trade which is spreading misery and death, and thwarting the efforts of the best elements of the community, seems to be the special favorite of those in high places. We need to be more diligent in spreading temperance principles, and it becomes those who are electors to vote as they pray. In the language of Scripture, we exclaim: "Shall the throne of iniquity have fellowship with thee, which frameth mischief by a law?" The repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in so many counties and towns causes us humiliation, but our hope is that the ultimate triumph of Prohibition may not be seriously delayed by this temporary defeat.

The Conference is glad to note that the Evangelical Churches are taking steps to guard the sanctity of the Lord's Day, and we exhort you to assist, by petitions and otherwise, in influencing the Dominion Parliament to withstand public companies and private persons who for gain would rob their employees of this God-given day of rest.

And now, in conclusion, dearly beloved, suffer the word of exhortation: "Thus saith the Lord, stand ye in the ways and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls." Be true to the peculiar doctrines and institutions of the Methodist Church. Let the doctrine of justification by faith be conjoined with the highest type of morality. Let the doctrine of holiness be translated from a mere creed into a vigorous life and a glad experience. Prize the love-feast and the class-meeting, as well as the more public services of the sanctuary. Read the connexional papers and magazine, and as you learn what noble Christian characters have been nurtured by the doctrines and institutions of Methodism, emulate their fervent piety and useful lives. If our people be but consecrated to God, there need be no misgivings as to the future of our beloved Church in this land, for "God, even our own God, shall bless us. God shall bless us; and all the ends of the earth shall fear Him."
