College Education Valued at \$72,000; Graduate Vs The Untrained Man

Boston, Oct 20—The cash value of a college education to its possessor is \$72,000, according to a report made public by Dean Everett W. Lord of the Boston University College of Business Administration, based on a lengthy study of the earning capacity of college graduates. The cash value of a high school education is placed by the report at \$33,000.

The report gives the average maximum yearly income of the untrained man as \$1,200; that of the high school graduate as \$2,200, and of the college man as \$1,200; that of the mgh school graduate as \$2,200, and of the college graduate as \$6,000. The total earnings of each of the three types, up to the age of 60 are placed at \$45,000, \$78,000 and \$150,000, respectively. Dean Lord, in his computation, estimated also that while the untrained man at the age of 50 begins to drop toward dependence, the college man reaches

his maximum earning capacity at 60.

"The untrained man goes to work as a boy of 14 and reaches his maximum income at the age of 30," the report said. "This maximum is, on the average, less than \$1,200 a year. In view of the fact that this income is earned through manual labor, dependent on physical strength, it begins to fall off at the age of 50, or even earlier, and soon reaches a level below self-support. The figures show that more than 60 out of every 100 untrained workers are dependent upon others for support at the age of 60.

"The total earnings of the untrained man from 14 to 60 are about \$45,000. Between the ages of 14 and 18, the four years which might have been spent in high school, the young man usually earns not more than \$2,000."

"I have never seen an election where the Ministers of the Government so completely lost their tempers," declared Lloyd George last night. BROWN TROUT IN LOCH LOMOND

An English Exchange says:—"At the request of a number of public bodies of St. John, N. B., the Department of Marine and Fisheries undertook to establish the European brown trout in Loch Lomond near St. John. The first eggs for this purpose were obtained in January, 1921, from the U. S. Bureau of Fisheries. A small number of the fry from these eggs have been retained in the ponds at the hatchery, and in the autumn of 1923, when the fish were a little more than two years ald a few of the larger and better deold, a few of the larger and better developed yielded some 5,000 eggs, which are undergoing incubation.

"The eggs of the brown trout are not easily obtained in America, and in the casily obtained in America, and in the continuation of the stocking of Loch Lomond, some 200,000 Loch Leven trout eggs, a variety closely related to the brown trout, were obtained through the United States Bureau of Fisheries in each organization.

The majority pride themselves that their one good round out of fifty is really their true form, and that the remaining forty-nine rounds they were off their game. How much better it would be for all conceined if they would face the truth, as did that famous old golfer (alas: now dead) who came to the conclusion that when he played well he was off lits game!

The second critic expresses in a nutshell a world of truth. It is the player who produces his or her game forty-nine times out of fifty who deserves to win the laurels, and not the one who provides a flash of brilliance on rare occasions.

Every player, good or bad, experi-

Every player, good or bad, experiences certain days on which things go well. If this were not so the game would lose many of its followers. But no player can depend indefinitely upon favorable kicks and other forms of outside assistance, so the grand total must be taken into consideration and not merely the best rounds.

Displaying an indomitable fighting spirit that almost snatched victory from defeat in the dying moments of the game, the Trojan rugby team bowed to U. N.
