

SAN AMBROSIA DENUDED BY QUAKE AND POISON GAS American Geologist Confirms Reports of Havoc Wrought in November Up-heaval.

Valparaiso, Chile, May 18.—A scientific expedition headed by the American geologist, Bailey Willis, has just returned from the islands of San Ambrosia and San Felix, 300 miles west of Chanaral, having verified the conditions reported by Captain Campbell of the steamship Marthe, in March, when he encountered a great tidal wave and evidences of the havoc wrought by the November earthquake and subsequent shocks there.

The expedition, which Captain Campbell accompanied, went to the scene on the Chilean dispatch boat Aguila. When nearing the islands a rise in temperature of the sea to three degrees Centigrade above normal was noted. San Ambrosia was almost denuded of animal life and few birds were left. The scientists found a great gap crossing the smaller island and evidences that there had been heavy emanations of sulphur gas. Valparaiso, Chile, May 18 .- A scien-



STAINLESS SILVER TO BRING

Sheffield, England, April 24.—(By Mail to The Associated Press)—A new tarnish-resisting alloy, 'stainless silver,' has been discovered as the result of research in the laboratory of a local firm. In making this announcement at a meeting of the Institute of Metals, Hardolf Truner said experiments had been in progress for two years for the discovery of an alloy resistant to ordinary atmospheric corrosion. Articles made of the new silver alloy exposed to the atmosphere for many months had retained their luster and showed no signs of tarnishing. The new metal is technically silver and carries the hallmark.



London, May 2.—(A. P., by mail.)—
What happens to the people in England who do not pay their income-tax has been told by an official of the Inland Revenue, who declares there are about 1,000 such delinquents now in jail compared with 1,162 two years ago.

Plenty of time is given by the authorities for payment, said this official, and in cases where it can be shown that funds are not available, easy methods are devised. In other cases, after a certain interval, a notice is sent to the defaulter that the tax must be remitted by a certain date—usually ten days' time. If that is disregarded a more urgent notice is sent, and three days' grace given. After that a distress warrant against the defaulter's goods is obtained. Those who are imprisoned for default are generally single, or have no seizable property of their own.

New York, May 18.—Discovery that the city spent \$181,000 last year carting away dead animals today led to the appointment by the board of estimate of a special committee to evolve some means of cutting the cost.

American cotton, now threatens to become an active menace to growers of Indian cotton.

In past years the importation of American cotton has been as high as 100,000 bales a year, although the normal amount was less than one-tenth of this. Fortunately there are practically no imports of American cotton at present, nor are any expected during the coming few months. The total prohibition of the importation of American cotton is barred by the fact that in certain years Indian mills need this cotton.

The Illinois Central Cotton Committee members point out that once introduced the boll weevil will be as deadly in India as it has been in America. It has been ascertained that fumigation with hydrocyanic gas will kill the weevil, and that a simple and safe fumigation plant can be erected at no great cost. On the other hand, correspondence with commercial bodies, including the Mill-owners' Association and the Chamber of Commerce, have shown that, for the present at any rate, it is quite feasible to restrict the importation of cotton from the United States to a single Indian port, and thus simplify the fumigation arrangements
