Fire Breaks Out At School
Play; Panic Follows And
Seventy People Lose Lives

KRUPP SENTENCE
IS CONFIRMED

Now to French Prison. Pending Appeal—Ex-Russian Officer to be Executed.

FORTY CHILDREN, SIXTEEN MEN AND
FIFTEEN WOMEN ARE VICTIMS

Whole Families Gone in Tragedy in South Carolina Where Folks of Little Place Had Assembled to Enjoy Exercises at Closing of School—Stairs Collapse and There is Rush for Exit.

Duesseldorf, May 18.—The sentences imposed by recent court martial upon Krupp von Bohlen and the other Krupp directors tried for instigating opposition to the French at the Krupp plant at the time of the shooting on March 31, were confirmed today by the court of revision. The convicted men will be transferred to prisons in France while their counsel appeals to the court of cassation.

Camden, S. C., May 18.—Seventy-one known dead and two unaccounted for was the toll of a fire in the Cleveland school house here last night as determined at 7 a. m. today.

The fire which destroyed the frame building about nine o'clock last night apparently resulted from the explosion of an oil lamp on the stage arranged for the closing entertainment of the school. Within almost a breath the whole front of the second floor was a blaze. Scores of the audience made a concerted rush for the single entrance to the stairway despite the counsel of cooler heads.

Some unable to penetrate the jam to safety leaped from the second story window, to die of injuries or to be taken from the scene suffering from broken limbs.

Collapsing of the narrow wooden stairway caused many of the deaths, people being crushed in the debris.

The school building, a two story frame structure containing three rooms, had been virtually burned to the ground before outside aid could be summoned. All available doctors were called from Camden and other nearby towns to treat the injured.

CHARGE CHANGED FROM MURDER
OF WOMAN IN TORONTO
AND DANN PLEADS GUILTY.

Toronto, May 18.—At the conclusion of the case for the prosecution yesterday against Alfred John Dann, charged with the murder of Annie Pleida on April 14, counsel for the defence held a consultation with the crown, as a result of which the charge was changed to manslaughter, which a plea of guilty was entered, and a sentence of fifteen years in Portmouth Penitentiary passed upon the prisoner by Mr. Justice Lenoxy.

U. S. Shipping Board

The United States Shipping Board freighter West Isleta, which on her way to the harbor this morning by her docking place at the refinery wharf, struck the sand bank of the Ballast wharf and was there for about two and one-half hours. She was in tow of the tug Neptune at the time of her striking and with the help of the tug Wagon she was finally pulled clear and docked.

New York, May 18.—Demands of the Building Trades Council, which claimed 90,000 members, for a blanket increase of \$1 a day and a collective agreement for a year, were refused at a conference yesterday by the executive committee of the Building Trades Employers' Association. John B. Clarke said the refusal will result in a general strike effective on June 1.

SAN AMBROSIA DENIED BY QUAKE AND POISON GAS

American Geologist Confirms Reports of Havoc Wrought in November Uplift.

Valparaiso, Chile, May 18.—A scientific expedition headed by the American geologist, Bailey Willis, has just returned from the islands of San Ambrosia and San Felix, 300 miles west of Chanaral, having verified the conditions reported by Captain Campbell of the steamship Marlin, in March, when he encountered a great tidal wave and evidences of the havoc wrought by the November earthquake and subsequent shocks there.

The expedition, which Captain Campbell accompanied, went to the scene on the Chilean dispatch boat Aguilas. When nearing the islands a rise in temperature of the sea to three degrees Centigrade above normal was noted. San Ambrosia was almost deserted of animal life and few birds were left. The scientists found a great gap crossing the smaller island an evidence that there had been heavy emanations of sulphur gas.

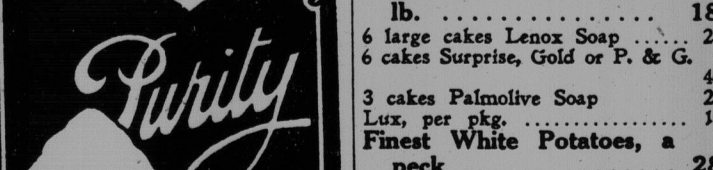
STAINLESS SILVER TO BRING JOY TO THE HOUSEWIVES

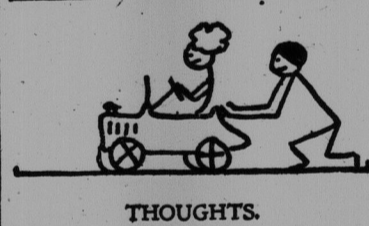


Swiss immigrants on the Canadian Pacific tender at Cherbourg.

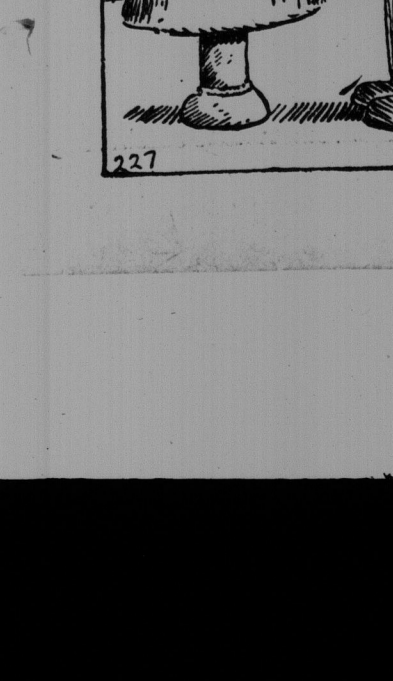
HARD FOR THE LAWYERS



TO ENCOURAGE BETTER HOMES

Washington, May 18.—(Associated Press)—There are two sides to a ten dollar bill. One side is the effort that goes to earn it; the other is the care and intelligence which go to the spending of it. One side is the man's contribution, the other side is the woman's. The whole question of wages is affected by the home-maker's ability to get value for her money.

In such manner Secretary of Labor Davis sets forth the significance of the Better Homes in America campaign to be conducted during the week of June 4 to 10. Secretary Davis is a member of the National Council for Better Homes in America. Other members are Vice-president Coolidge, Secretary Hoover and Wallace and Mrs. T. G. Winter, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

"The campaign is a woman's campaign," says Secretary Davis. "They are taking stock of themselves to see how they fill their side of the bill; they are taking inventory of home values to determine on standards. "The best American wage earners know that the pay check at the end of the week belongs to the family. They know also that a forty-five dollar a week wage does not do as well in some families as a thirty-five dollar a week wage does in others.

"The demonstration houses prepared for the Better Homes week in June are concrete educational means of emphasizing the importance of attention to the study of the things that make for a better home, with architects, builders, interior decorators, electricians, plumbers, educators and spiritual advisors joining in a definition of home."

The Better Homes campaign began last year in a comparatively small way. The result of the first effort is shown in the preparations this year of many communities to have demonstration homes during the campaign week in June, according to those interested in the movement. Many of these have been started by chambers of commerce, others by groups of women or women's clubs.

Besides fitting out the demonstration homes for public view, the movement includes arrangement of lectures, musical, movie and radio programmes, essay and poster contests in schools, and other means to draw attention to the home. Many thousands of dollars in prizes will be given locally and nationally in connection with the campaign. An interesting side issue is the preparation of an ideal list of books and musical selections for the home.

In Washington the national headquarters of the Generation Federation of Women's Clubs sponsored the construction of a replica of the Long Island home of John Howard Payne that inspired him to write "Home Sweet Home." This house will follow every line of the original, but it will be built of the best standard modern materials. It is within a short distance of the White House. Ultimately it will be moved to a permanent location where it will be maintained as a better homes demonstration.

NERVOUS SHOCK RESTORES ENGLISH WAR HERO'S SIGHT
Works Self Into Frenzy Reciting Strange Poetry on Shipboard.

London, May 1.—(By mail.)—Hilbert Gilson, who was blinded during the war, was led sightless on board the Aberdeen liner Diogenes at Durban, and the other day walked ashore at Southampton with his sight miraculously restored, declares The London Daily Express.

The recovery of sight was due to the nervous strain which Mr. Gibson suffered when performing at a concert in the liner.

"He insisted on performing," said one of the passengers to a Daily Express representative, "and was led in with a white sheet over his head. "He recited some strange poetry, and worked himself into such a frenzy that he had to be carried away to hospital." Mr. Gibson lay unconscious and delirious for many days, and when he recovered found that his lost sight had come back. He was on his way to London to consult a specialist.

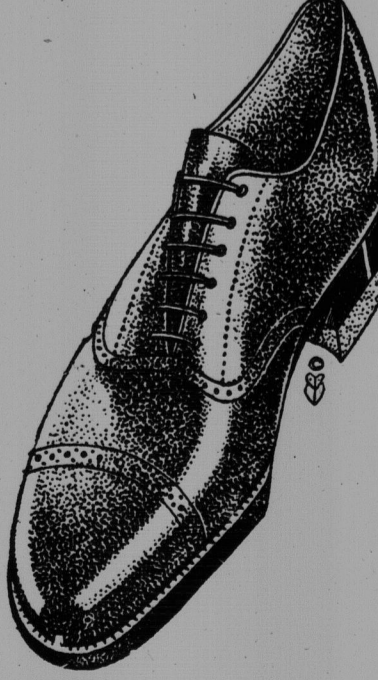

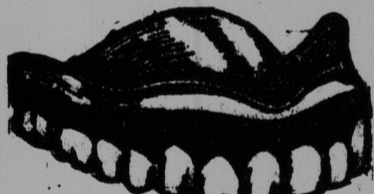

A valuable collection of twenty-two English plays that were originally staged in London between 1660 and 1780 has been edited from the original editions with general and biographical notes, by David Harrison Stevens, Assistant Professor of English in the University of Chicago. The volume, "Types of English Drama, 1660-1780," of over nine hundred pages, is dedicated to John Matthews Manly, under whom Professor Stevens received his Doctor's degree at Chicago.
This remarkably interesting collection of plays produced during the hundred and twenty years following the Restoration of Charles II. includes Dryden's "All for Love" or "The World Well Lost"; Addison's "Cato"; Gay's "The Beggar's Opera"; Goldsmith's "She Swoops to Conquer"; and Sheridan's "The Rivals" and "The School for Scandal."
All the plays have literary or dramatic merit and constitute satisfactory material for a course in drama following the work of the Elizabethans.

SAYS HEALING CULTS INDICATE LOSS OF ESTEEM FOR DOCTORS

Washington, May 18.—The success of mushroom healing cults, devised by "zealous half-wits," testifies the medical profession has lost its high place in public esteem, Dr. Arthur T. McCormack of Louisville, Ky., declares at the annual conference of state and provincial health authorities of North America.

Dr. McCormack, who is president of the organization, said that perhaps the "sub-conscious mind" of the profession had been overburdened by the amount of science to be learned, and as a result had devoted itself too much to the use of science, leaving the humanitarian side of healing to fakirs.

The convention devoted much time to the problem of physicians for rural districts, a survey having shown a universal tendency of doctors to go to the cities. Medical care in hundreds of rural districts, a committee report said, is inadequate or altogether lacking.

A programme for handling the drug problem was considered by the conference, including a recommendation that the states enact laws to supplement the Harrison act.

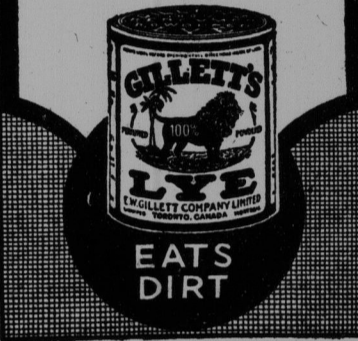
