PROMISE OF \$100,000 A YEAR FOR THE ROADS

Premier Fleming Makes This Statement

WILL FIX BAD SPOTS

Good Roads Association Receive a Portion of What They Ask For—Will Have a Good Roads Engineer in Charge of Work

(Special to Times)

While the Good Roads Association, which introduced the executive this morning in the presence of most of the members of the legislature, did not get nearly all that they asked for in the way of permanent trunk roads, yet the reply of Premier Fleming gave them a good deal of satisfaction, which was expressed loudly and cordially by Messrs Tennant and Burditt. The aims and ideas of the association, as well as the condition of the roads at present, were set forth by Messrs Tennant, Burditt and Patterson, but it would almost seem as if the nature of the trunk roads, and their demands had been thoroughly discussed in advance. From the premier's reply there was no doubt that the discussion had gone further than the Good Roads Association, and had been taken up by the members of the legislature and the government in caucus.

At any rate, as a result of agitation, the premier announced that while he did not agree with the programme of building the trunk roads, outlined in the memorial of the Good Roads Association, the government had determined to spend \$100,000 every year to fix the bad spots. It was quite evident, he said, that, no matter how good the roads were, in certain sections of the province there were always a few places which were of so bad a character that they gave a whole road an unfair reputation. It was the aim of the government to locate these spots, and it was proposed to appoint a highway engineer to take charge of the expenditure of this amount of \$100,000, to make special inspections for the repair and improvement of these bad spots, no matter where they were, so that, in a few years, the condition generally of the highways throughout the province would be improved.

In addition, Premier Fleming stated that the province expected to receive assistance from the federal government to the amount of \$200,000 provided the highway bill, which was thrown out last year, became law at this session. The intention was for New Brunswick to add an equal amount and expend the whole upon permanent road work.

At the beginning of an reply, the premier expressed his own opinion that there had been a substantial improvement in the condition of the highways in the last few years. It was unfair, however, to speak of the condition of the highways in 1912, as the weather conditions were such that no road could get fair treatment. A proper comparison would be the condition in 1912 and 1907 and, in his opinion, there had been very great improvement.

He pointed out that, estimating the cost of the mile at \$20,000 for permanent road construction, two million dollars would be required to build the trunk line asked for by the Good Roads Association, and this would entail an interest charge of \$100,000 a year. If that were done, it would mean the curtailment of other public services, and he questioned very much whether the roads referred to would serve more than 10 per cent of the people of the province. What are you going to do with the other 90 per cent of the population? He did not propose to stand for any such kind of policy, and he pointed out that the government was in the direction of permanent roads must be fairly applicable to all parts of the province. He depended too much upon the government, but they should take a greater interest in the highways, to see that all expenditures were properly economical.

DR. PUGSLEY ASSAILED AS HE STANDS FOR PEOPLE'S RIGHTS

Excited Tory Even Tries to Have Him Put Out of House

Early Morning Clash With Hazen Leads to Stormy but Unavailing Efforts by Tories Against Ex-minister—Press Comments on Outcome of Continuous Sittings

(Special to Times)

Ottawa, March 5.—Parliament is still sitting. At nine o'clock this morning it held its final session for forty-two hours. On the government side tempers are beginning to break. The Liberals continue to press for information. They want to know what Premier Borden wrote the British admiral in order to get the assistance of the Canadian navy. They want to know who told Canadian ministers that there was a war scare. They want to know where the government gets its figures of the cost of building in Canada. The government sits silent and silent, and makes no answer to an occasional snarl of refusal. This morning at five o'clock the anger of government supporters blazed out against Hon. Dr. Pugsley. He asked the government for information and the answer was an attempt to put him out of the chamber.

The early morning shift had just come on at five o'clock under the direction of Hon. Mr. Pugsley when the break occurred. Dr. Pugsley seemed pleased to find Hon. Mr. Hazen in the chamber. Coming from the same town they are accustomed to exchanging blows. Mr. Pugsley is of opinion that the government has been making figures of its own. He insists that the cost of marine construction, even to the building of Dreadnoughts, is no higher in the United States than it is in England. He also insists that building could be done in Canada at less cost than in England. He has insisted upon this often and always to the government's exasperation. That was the cause of the trouble this morning.

Smiling at the minister of marine, Dr. Pugsley said he thought Premier Borden had given him a promise that he would have cost to build in England. Dr. Pugsley had figure to show that it would be less to build in Canada. He did not do it to mislead the house.

There might have been a difference of ten or fifteen between his and Mr. Devlin's count. Mr. Devlin said he would accept the minister's statement, "but he added, 'I would advise him to turn around sooner next time.'"

The arrival of Hon. Robert Rogers just before eight o'clock this morning was greeted by prolonged government cheers. Toronto, March 5.—The Liberal front bench has been carried on by Messrs. Meighan, Smythe and Bennett. "I must protest against the cheerfulness with which the government has been carried on," said Mr. Meighan. "I have never seen such a cheerfulness in any deliberative chamber."

Mr. Pugsley maintained that it was no answer, Mr. Hazen rose to a point of order. Chairman Armstrong ruled that the minister had given his answer and Dr. Pugsley must accept it.

Dr. Pugsley persisted that no answer had been offered. He extended his objections which had been urged erroneously by the government against the building of Canadian navy. These faulty estimates had been given by the government for the purpose of "inducing the Canadian people to evaluate the emergency talk and abandon its policy of Canadian built navy."

Mr. Hazen had himself admitted in the house that the work of the premier Borden was two millions out. There were more cries of order and Major Currie opening to his feet. If the member persists in disobedience to the chair, he exclaimed, "it is in the competency of yourself, Mr. Chairman, to name him."

There were further cries and commotion, after which Mr. Armstrong expressed the hope that Major Currie would not push his objection.

"When a member is named he is expected to be named," smiled Dr. Pugsley, and the tumult broke out afresh. "The parliament is entitled to this information, present at the conference in Fredericton, Laredo."

He quotes high military officials as informing him that the moment Adrianople is ceded to the allies, chastisement will be administered to the men who murdered Nazim Pasha, demoralized the army, and who, they say, are responsible for every disaster that has befallen Turkey since the revolution.

MEXICANS AGAIN FIRE ON UNITED STATES SOLDIERS

El Paso, Tex., March 4.—For the third time in three days Mexican federal soldiers yesterday fired on the Ninth United States cavalry on duty near Douglas, Ariz., and the cavalry men returned the fire with rifles and a machine gun, driving the Mexicans back. Two troops of cavalry came to the rescue of the small detachment of border guards under attack by the Mexicans and soon drove them back.

American cannot understand what the attacks mean. On Monday afternoon Mexican federal forces fired on American troops. It was denied in Agua Prieta that those firing on Monday were troops. Yesterday the officials in Agua Prieta said they were ignorant of the occurrence. The belief is growing that the rebels are carrying on the firing as a plan to bring on intervention and discredit the Herrera regime.

RAMMED BY CRUISER TODAY IN NORTH SEA

ONLY 16 ARE SAVED

Miscalculating Distance in Trying to Cut Through a Column of War Vessels, a Torpedo Boat is Struck and Sent Bottom

Hollogand, Germany, March 5.—Sixty-four of the crew of the German torpedo boat "S-173" were drowned together with their commanding officer, Lieutenant Koch, and the first officer, after the little vessel had been rammed by the cruiser York, off this island in the North Sea, last evening.

The surgeon and engineer and fifteen men of the crew were saved. The torpedo boat was one of the most modern destroyers in the German fleet. She displaced 630 tons and carried a complement of 84 officers and men.

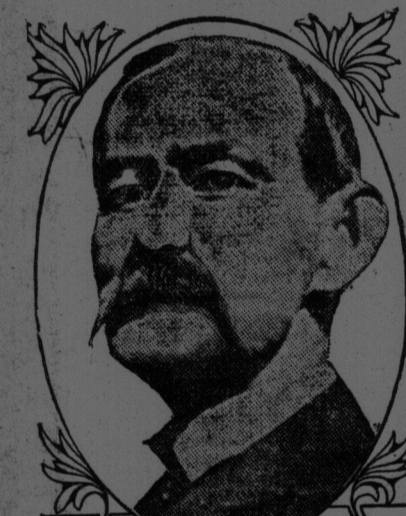

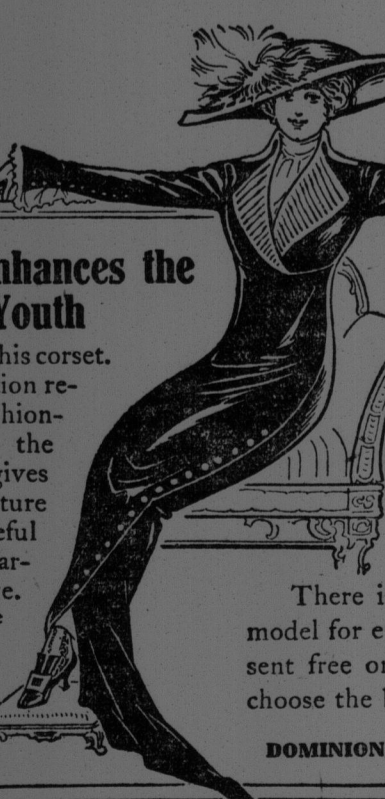

Daily Hints For the Cook

ORANGE WHIP.
Gelatin, 1/4 cup cold water, 2 1/2 cups boiling water, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup orange juice and pulp, juice of 1 lemon, 2 egg whites (or 1). Use the amount of gelatin ordinarily required for 4 cups of liquid. Soak it in the cold water until soft, add hot water and sugar, stirring until clear. Add fruit juice and mix thoroughly. Chill in pan of cold water and when quite thick beat until frothy; then add stiffly beaten egg whites and beat together thoroughly. Set away to harden and serve with whipped cream.

CHIFFONADE SALAD.
Cut celery into one-inch pieces, and pieces into straw, until one cup is obtained. Remove the pulp from grapefruit, making one cup. Remove the skin and slice four medium-sized tomatoes. Break cherry leaves into pieces for serving. Marinate all separately with French dressing. Arrange in separate mounds on a serving dish. Garnish each with chopped olives, green peppers cut in strips and parsley. Pass French and mayonnaise dressing.

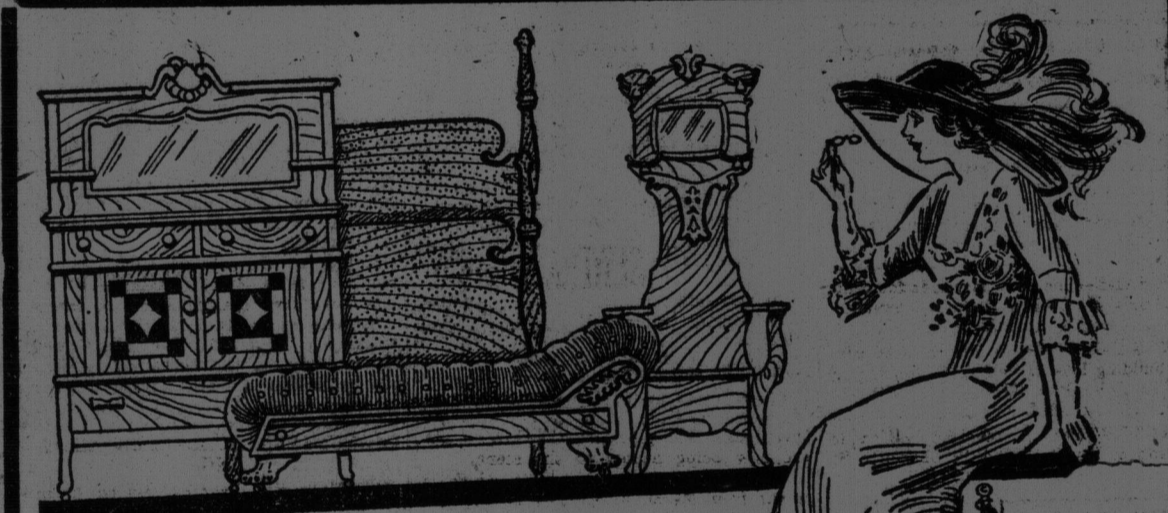

LICENSE VOTE GAINS IN VERMONT ELECTIONS

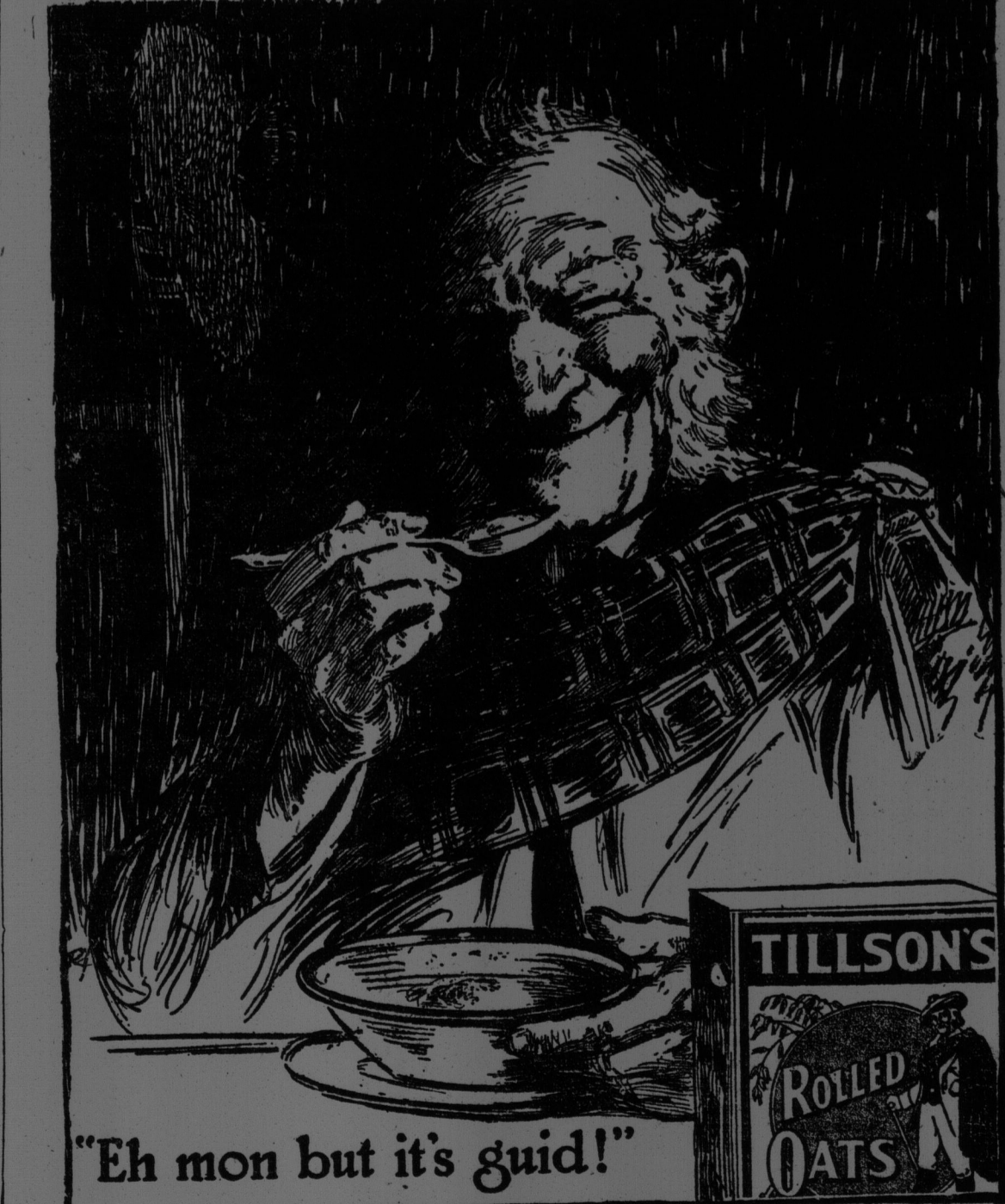
Montpelier, Vt., March 4.—A marked increase in the license vote was one of the features of the elections in the cities and towns of Vermont today. Returns from half the voting places on the eight constitutional amendments submitted to the voters indicated that all of them were carried, including the one changing the date of the state election from September 10 to November. Seven towns changed from no license to license, while only two places, including the small city of Vergennes, went from "wet" to "dry." The cities of Burlington, Rutland and St. Albans voted to remain in the license column. Montpelier and Barre continue the no-license policy by narrow margins.

THE ISSUE AT OTTAWA

The deadlock at Ottawa will serve to direct public attention throughout the country to the issue between the two parties. It is not merely a question whether \$35,000,000 or the major portion of it shall be spent in Canada to build up Canadian industry and establish a Canadian navy, or whether it shall be spent in England. There is the graver question involved in a policy of contribution, which at once raises the question of Canadian autonomy. This is a new and dangerous proposal which is made by the Borden government, and the more it is studied by the Canadian people the less it will be approved.

GETTING NEW SETTLERS

The resolution adopted by the board of trade yesterday asking that the office of provincial immigration agent be made permanent, and that the agent meet the steamers at Quebec and Montreal in summer as well as at St. John in winter, will no doubt command the confidence of the government. During January and February of this year more than three hundred and thirty immigrants were induced to locate in this province, and it seems a reasonable statement which was presented yesterday to the effect that a considerable number of persons who landed at Quebec in summer could be induced to come to New Brunswick, while the luring away to other places of persons who really had started for this province might be prevented. The expense involved would not be large, and the results that have followed the placing of an agent at West St. John this winter, through the joint action of the board of trade and the provincial immigration department, would seem to justify the confident expressions of the mover and seconder of the resolution and those who supported it. This, however, does not go to the root of the matter, and therefore another section of the resolution is even more important. It recommends that provision be made for more than one central office in the old country, where information concerning the province could be received and through which that information would be distributed in larger sections where it might be expected with confidence to find a desirable class of settlers seeking for homes in Canada. The most effective work in securing immigrants of the right sort is done before they sail.

GETTING NEW INDUSTRIES

Live industries do not seek a location in dead towns. The advantages of a city in relation to raw material, power, labor, and transportation are of course carefully considered by those who propose to establish an industry, but there is another important consideration, and it relates to the people who live in the place where it is proposed to establish an industry. Are they progressive? Do they pull together? Are there evidences of general progress? What is the condition of their streets and other public services? Have they a housing problem? Do they hold progressive views with regard to education? These and other questions are considered by the shrewd investor, for they all have a bearing upon the success of industrial undertakings. St. John is about to make a more vigorous bid for new industries than it has ever done in the past. Fortunately it is able to point out that a new spirit of enterprise actuates the citizens, and that there are evidences of substantial progress in every direction. The city has a large number of successful industries. Some of these have lately been greatly enlarged. Some new industries have been added, and are being successfully conducted. Others are coming. All the conditions are favorable to industrial growth, and ought to appeal to those who are looking for desirable locations for manufacturing industries of many kinds. It will be necessary, however, for the city itself to make its advantages widely known, because competition is very keen and other enterprising centres are reaching out and putting forth claims which are by no means to be despised. St. John has special advantages in regard to transportation, and it has a very much larger population than any other city in the lower provinces, with one exception. This is an advantage. It has also a central location for the distribution of products throughout these provinces, and has unsurpassed facilities for shipping goods throughout Western Canada.

All these considerations will appeal to those who are looking for new fields of investment. No doubt one of the first steps taken by the board of trade and the industrial commissioner will be to make a detailed survey of the situation, with special reference to those industries, large or small, which would have the best chance to succeed here. WEDNESDAY, MARCH FIFTH This is the natal day of Hon. L. A. Taschereau, minister of public works and labor in Quebec, who was born in 1847, at Quebec. He is a member of the famous Taschereau family, one uncle being the late Cardinal Taschereau, and his father a judge of the Supreme Court of Canada. He is also a lawyer and has been a partner of the present Chief Justice, Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, and of Hon. S. N. Parment. He has been a member of the legislature for Montserrat since 1900 and minister of public works since 1907.

His Honor Judge Madden, county court judge for Lennox and Addington, Ont., was born on January 5, 1830, at a graduate of the University of Toronto and of Osgoode Hall, and started the practice of law in Nanaimo in 1878. He received his appointment to the bench in 1903. Lawrence J. Burpee, secretary of the Canadian section of the International Waterways Commission, and previously chief librarian of the Carnegie Library, Ottawa, was born on this date in 1873, in Halifax, N. S. He served as private secretary successively to Hon. Arthur Dugas, Hon. David Mills and Sir Oliver Mowat. He was appointed librarian in Ottawa in 1903, and took up his present work in 1912. He is an indefatigable worker and has several books of an historical character to his credit.

NAME BOWSER NEXT LEADER
New Brunswick For Premier of British Columbia
McBRIDE WOULD SOAR
Place in Ottawa or London Said to be Ambition—Some of The Legislation at Session Just Ended

Vancouver, B.C., March 5.—One hundred measures were passed during the session of the British Columbia Legislature. One of the most important of these was the plan to make a new one, while another was to make the term of succeeding legislators five years instead of four. Some think there is an election in sight, but this is hardly likely in view of the fact that only a year ago the McBride government was returned without a Liberal election.

It seems pretty generally understood that Sir Richard McBride will hardly lead his party through another election in British Columbia. Every one knows that Sir Richard is ambitious and several years ago he attained everything that British Columbia has to offer and his friends expect to see him either join the Ottawa government or go to London in some representative Canadian capacity. Next time the Hon. W. J. Bowser is likely to lead the party.

The most important acts of the present legislature was granting free lands for settlers and another creating a public park of the district around Mount Robertson. A measure was presented recommending the government taxation on timber and also to increase the natural resources.

The most important railway legislation was an act to guarantee the Canadian Northern Railway bonds for terminals in the west coast cities of Port Mann, Vancouver, Westminster and Victoria, for \$10,000,000 at 4 1/2 per cent. The terminals with buildings, property and lines are to cost \$22,000,000.

Acts were also passed regarding moving picture shows and increasing the number of judges for all superior courts of the province.

Mr. Bowser, named as likely to be next premier, is a New Brunswicker.


MEXICAN GOVERNMENT TO PAY FOR DAMAGE BY BOMBARDMENT

REDMOND REPLIES TO BONAR LAW'S SPEECH
Scores Him For Suggestion That King's Veto Would Be Revived to Prevent Home Rule

London, March 5.—John E. Redmond, Irish leader, addressing a large public meeting at Coventry, said that by twelve months next May, home rule for Ireland would be automatically the law of the land. At Edinburgh, he continued, Bonar Law suggested that the veto of the king would be revived in order to prevent the passing of the bill. The veto of the crown had not been invoked for more than 200 years in order to thwart the will of the people. A more disgraceful suggestion had never been made than that of the king should avail himself of the veto and override his coronation oath and vote was an insult to the throne which had preceded from him (Redmond), would have been described as the final and convincing proof of his opposition.

Dealing with his objection to the measure on religious grounds, he declared his belief that all religious difficulties would be settled by the general common sense of the people. Another far entertained was that the granting of home rule would lead to separation from the empire; but that

Taft Quits Washington
Crowds Bid Farewell to The President as He Leaves For a Holiday in Georgia

Washington, March 4.—William H. Taft, public servant since he was twenty-one, bid farewell to public life today and became a citizen of the republic that he has served over the seas and throughout the world for so many years that he has almost forgotten when he enlisted. His goodbye was a smile, a handshake for the members of his cabinet, a courtesy bow to the women friends who braved the inauguration discomforts to bid him and Mrs. Taft God-speed in the Union station; a wave of the hand and another smile for the people who stood in the train, and he watched his train pull slowly out for the south.

The lag that Washington saw of the twenty-seventh president was the dim outline of a big, smiling figure in a frock coat, with hair a little awry, standing on the rear platform of a private car as it was swallowed in the curling smoke of the tunnel that leads under the city to Dixie. Tomorrow he expects to be in Georgia to rest and play as the guest of the city of Augusta for three weeks. On March 10 he plans to go north again to New Haven to settle down under the elms of Yale to the peace and quiet of life as a professor of law.

At the station most of the members of the Taft cabinet and their wives and several close friends of Mrs. Taft were waiting. Miss Helen Taft wept gently as the farewells were said and the eyes of some of the others were far from dry. With all the ceremony that has attended his departure on other occasions, the rope in the passageway across the broad concourse, the scores of station police, the secret service men and his former aide, Major Thomas L. Rhoades, with his spurs clinking on the stone, Mr. Taft marched through a cheering throng to his train. He stood for a few minutes by the side of his car, shook hands once more with his friends, and then stepped aboard.

BIRTH RATE MUCH LOWER
Vienna And Other Parts of Austria Show Marked Decline

Vienna, March 5.—Some interesting figures are published regarding the birth and death rates in Vienna, which show that the law of progressive decrease in the size of families prevails here as in all other centres of high civilization in Europe. One hundred thousand fewer children were born in the last decade than in the preceding one, and this despite the fact that the population of the city, owing to immigration and the extension of its boundaries, is 300,000 greater than it was at the beginning of the century. In the last ten years the birthrate has fallen from about 27 to about 20 per 1,000.

Fortunately, the death-rate also shows a considerable, though not so great, decline, having fallen from about 18 to 14.3 per 1,000 in the same period. Vienna would appear to be one of the healthier capitals of Europe, as far as figures go, but the decline in the death-rate is chiefly a consequence of the smaller number of babies born, since mortality is far higher in the first year of life than at any other time. In 1903, 9,000 infants died, as against 7,000 persons over sixty; in 1912 the corresponding figures were 6,000 and 10,000. The decrease in births is accompanied by an increase in average longevity, there being nearly 30 per cent more octogenarian deaths now than there were ten years ago.

ENGAGEMENTS YEARS AHEAD

King George Has Many Calls On His Time

ALL CAREFULLY NOTED

Private Invitations, When Accepted, Always Subject to Urgent Public Matters That May Arise—Twenty Cancelled in Recent Political Crisis

(Pearson's Weekly)

There is no one of his subjects, not even the prime minister, who has at all more than public and private engagements to keep as the sovereign.

Many of these are made two or three years in advance. Minute details of each engagement which the king enters into are kept in a large volume which is in the keeping of His Majesty's private secretary.

The word "Engagements" is printed in gold letters on the cover, and on the back are the letters "G.R." surmounted by a royal crown.

The book is indexed like an ordinary ledger, and there are a hundred double pages to each letter.

There are four columns to each double page headed as follows: "Name," "Place," "Date and Hour," "Observations."

Supposing the king entered into an engagement to dine with a friend—say, with Lord Knollys, in London—the engagement is entered up as follows: "The Lord Knollys—P.M. St. James' Palace—November 24th 1912, at 8.30 p.m."

The names of all other members of the royal family who were to accompany him are also entered up in the same column.

When the king enters into a public engagement such as the opening of a public building, an inspection of troops at Aldershot, or a visit to a provincial town, full particulars of the engagements are recorded in the observation column. Sometimes there may be two or three pages of notes in this column for one engagement in others.

Most of the king's engagements necessitate, of course, His Majesty travelling somewhere, and in the observation column the details of the arrangements made for the journey are most fully and carefully recorded.

All the king's engagements from the opening of parliament to dining with a friend are entered in the official engagement book, but the details of certain very important engagements, such as a great court function or the opening of parliament, are entered in a separate book, which is referred to by a note in the ordinary engagement book.

"Can See You in Three Years."
When the king cancels an engagement the whole entry is ruled out in red ink, and the word "Cancelled" is stamped across the notes in the observation column.

Every week the engagement book is gone through by the clerks of the private secretary's department and a list made of the king's future engagements for the coming four weeks, a copy of which is given to the private secretary and His Majesty.

It may give some idea of the extent of the calls on the king's time when it is stated that only a short time ago His Majesty, when entering into an arrangement to stay at the house of one of his oldest friends, had to fix a date over three years ahead.

It is scarcely necessary to say, by the way, that neither the king nor queen, nor indeed, any member of the royal family, are ever invited by any of their subjects in the ordinary way, either to dinner or to become their guests at their houses.

Royalty, even minor royalty, always intimate to their friends either personally or through a secretary when they desire to become their guests.

As soon as an engagement has been fulfilled the entry is stamped across with the letters "G. R." in black.

The future private plans and arrangements of the sovereign are rarely announced with official sanction to the press more than a few days in advance for the reason. The king has so many public engagements to keep that there is always the possibility of his having to cancel a private engagement at the last moment in order to keep a more important public engagement. King George, as a matter of fact, when entering into a private engagement always always stipulates that he does so subject to no urgent public call on his time preventing him from keeping it.

Everything is Entered Up
During a recent political crisis His Majesty cancelled at least twenty private engagements, so that he might be free to his ministers at a moment's notice.

The most minute appointments are entered in the engagement book. For example, when a tailor comes to the palace to fit His Majesty for a suit, the appointment would probably be made several weeks ahead, and duly entered up in the engagement book. Often a host of fifty or sixty such minor appointments figure in the engagement book for one day, and though each may only occupy five or six minutes, they take up a good deal of His Majesty's time.

Some names mentioned in the observation column in connection with some future engagements of the king are ruled out with three black lines, which signifies that the bearers of the name have died since the original entry of the engagement was made.

JAIL OR FINE AND JAIL WITHOUT FINE IS BRADY SENTENCE

Charges Included Striking Policeman—Shannon Says Guilty to Taking Liquor From Uncle's Saloon

Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning imposed sentence in the case of Fred Thomas Brady, finding him 88 or thirty days for drunkenness, \$32 or four months for resisting the police and two months in jail without the option of a fine for striking Policeman O'Leary in the guard room. The policeman told the judge seeing Brady in Charlotte street, and after the prisoner refusing to go home, took him in charge on drunkenness charges. On the way to the police station, he said, Brady violently resisted, but with the assistance of Sergeant Finlay two citizens Brady was handcuffed and taken to the lock-up. After the handcuffs were removed the witness said that Brady struck him in the face with his fist.

George Gillis, given in charge by Captain Finlay of the steamer Ramore Head for refusing duty, was remanded. William Shannon, arrested on the charge of breaking and entering the saloon of Matthew Harding, Paradise row, on the night of March 3 or the morning of the 4th, pleaded guilty. Mr. Harding told of finding his place of business open on Tuesday morning and the lock on the back door broken and a window smashed. The broken lock was found on the floor and a large bar of iron was found outside the broken window. He told of seeing the defendant, who is his nephew in the street near his store on the night before his discovery of the break. Detective Killen testified that he was notified of the robbery and went to the defendant's house, where the defendant told him that it was he who had broken into his uncle's store. The witness obtained two bottles of liquor at the house and was told by the prisoner that he had also taken a third bottle, which was drunk by him and another man who, he said, had nothing to do with the break. He then locked the prisoner up. Shannon was remanded.

The case of John Jeffrey, charged with stealing an overcoat from 10 Charlotte street on last Friday, was taken up. He pleaded guilty. Leve Williams, dealer in second-hand clothes in Dock street, told of the defendant being in his store on Friday and selling him an overcoat, and signing an entry in a book kept for the purpose. The witness identified the coat as the one sold him and also identified the entry in the book. This, however, was signed D. Wilkins, 20 Bookbind road. The prisoner was remanded for three days. Two men were fined \$8 or thirty days for drunkenness. The case of assault against Hum One, Hum Xuen and Hum Wing was finished this morning, the magistrate fining each of them \$20.

DIED IN MONTREAL. Lemuel Craig Schurman, well known in railway circles as an employee of the Grand Trunk Railway mechanical department of Montreal, died in Montreal, P. E. I., in 1947. Mr. Schurman later removed to Montreal. He was the cousin of the late G. Schurman, president of Cornell University. He is survived by his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Robert E. Matthews and Mrs. T. G. Hodge. Two brothers also remain, John D. Schurman, of Springfield, N. S., and James Schurman, of Wakefield, Mass.

MANY NEW HOUSES AND BUSINESS HOMES TO GO UP THIS SPRING

Architects Report Many Orders and it Promises Busy Building Year

According to the local architects this will be one of the busiest building seasons in the history of St. John. There are several large buildings to be erected here, including the post office, the Bank of Montreal, North America building, and the warehouses for Vassie & Co., Ltd., and the McClary Co., Ltd. The Merchants' Bank of Canada, The Quebec Bank, and Armstrong & Bruce are remodeling buildings in Prince William street for modern office buildings. A large amount of other work is projected, and for some of it the plans are already complete, and in other cases they are under consideration.

The erection of dwelling houses is being undertaken this spring on a larger scale than usual in order to meet the demand for increased accommodation. F. Neil Brodie is at present at work on plans for six North America building, and the Douglas avenue, Mount Pleasant and the south end, with two in Rothersey, Garnett W. Wilson has in hand plans for about ten new dwellings, including four in Claridon street and others in various parts of the city.

Messrs. Mott also reports an unusually busy spring and the other city architects give the same news. It is unusual to find building plans as far advanced at this time of the year, as they are this spring and this is taken as a sign of an unusually large season's work in order to plans which are already under way.

SEEK MISSING NORTH END MAN HEIR TO FORTUNE

Share of a New York Estate Awaits Thomas Bradley—Last Here Four Years Ago

For Thomas Bradley of North End, blacksmith, aged sixty-five, who has not been heard from by relatives in the last four years, there is a fortune waiting in New York. Definite word of him is also necessary in order that distribution of a large estate there be made. Other St. John members of the family also are to share. For these reasons a search that will cover all possible places where his work might take him was started today by his nephew, Thomas Bradley, who came from New York a few days ago for this specific purpose. The nephew is a son of Charles Bradley of North End, and will direct his search from his father's house, 129 Main street.

The estate is that of Daniel Cunningham, who died in New York on October 8, 1911, at the age of ninety-four. He was a native of Ireland, who had crossed to the United States as his younger days and for forty-five years resided in a residential business. From time to time he invested his savings in real estate and at the time of his death was possessed of more than a score of parcels of property in sections of the city that made it very valuable. Some years ago Thomas Bradley, Jr., a grand nephew, left here for New York, and he has since been business agent for the estate.

Following the death of Mr. Cunningham and the usual court procedure, the property has been gradually disposed of and the proceeds now are ready for distribution, as soon as there is word from the missing St. John heir. Thomas Bradley, for whom search is made, is a blacksmith and devoted himself chiefly to railway work. This took him all over the maritime provinces and Maine, and often a long time would elapse before he would return or before there would be any word of him. As stated, it is four years now since he was here. His nephew will travel through the provinces, tracing his movements and meanwhile hoping that word of the search will reach the missing man or any who know of him and that his mission will thus be accomplished.

BRUSSELS STREET AND ROTHERSAY DEALS IN REAL ESTATE

British Columbia Man Buys in City—Upper Canadians in Suburb

Brussels street continues to attract the attention of real estate investors. Several additional transfers in this street have been reported during the last week or two and another is announced today. The latest is the sale of a freshhold property, 296 Brussels street, 105 25 by 100 feet, with wooden building, used as a dwelling. The property is located on the eastern side of the street between Clarence and Brunswick streets. It was sold by Allison & Thomas to a British Columbia investor.

Rothersey is the latest district to attract the attention of sub-dividers. It is reported that a block of land containing about seventy acres situated on the outskirts of the village, has been purchased by an Upper Canadian syndicate, who are planning to put it on the market in building lots to meet the demand for building sites in this attractive suburb.

EXPLORER MAWSON SENDS A MESSAGE

Sydney, N. S. W., March 4—Another wireless message has been received from Dr. Douglas Mawson, the Antarctic explorer, who is now in Adelieid. It announces that he is expecting the arrival of the steamer Aurora daily, and will attempt to embark, although he is not hopeful that he will succeed owing to the heavy winds. The dispatch throws no further light on the death of Lieut. Nimmo and other members of the Mawson expedition, who perished early in 1912.
