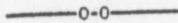

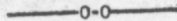

ECLIPSES.

In the year 1848 there will be *four* Eclipses of the Sun, and *two* Eclipses of the Moon; with a Transit of Mercury.

I.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, on Sunday, March the 5th, invisible in Nova Scotia.

II.—A total Eclipse of the Moon, on Sunday, March the 19th, invisible here; as it ends just before the rising of the Moon.

III.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, on Monday, April the 3rd, visible only in the Southern Hemisphere.

IV.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, on Monday, August the 28th, visible only in the Southern Hemisphere.

V.—A total Eclipse of the Moon, on Wednesday, September the 13th, visible as follows at Halifax:—Time,

SAVING OF SEED.—In an article in the *Weekly Journal* it is stated that a grain being divided in two, both portions are reproductive; and experiments on a small scale are recommended to test the fact.—The idea occurred some years ago to an ingenious Italian named Pamboni, who, having observed that the cultivators of Tuscany were in the habit of dividing the seeds of leguminous plants into two and three portions, and thus obtaining luxuriant crops, determined on trying the experiment in grain. Having taken a quantity of good seed (barley, the Editor believes), he coarsely pounded them and placed them in water, then, selecting those fragments which sank, he planted them, and found them produce a healthy crop, many of them starting more freely than whole seeds put into the ground at the same time.

CHARCOAL.—Pounded charcoal, on the refuse of the heap, should be thickly strewed over every place where filth is allowed to accumulate. It absorbs the bad smell, and makes an excellent manure of what otherwise would not only be useless but offensive. It also prevents the larvæ of insects from becoming flies or moth. Pigs like to eat charcoal, and are thought to fatten on it; and in course of the summer months I frequently have a bushel or so at a time thrown over the pen. It makes the manure so much more valuable that I find it worth while to buy it for the purpose; and in so doing the pens are never offensive.

A RECEIPT TO MAKE EXCELLENT WHITE BREAD.—Take 1½ lb. of rice and boil it gently over a slow fire, in three quarts of water, for about five hours, stirring it, and afterwards beating it into a smooth paste; mix while warm into two gallons (or 14 lb.) of flour, adding the usual quantity of yeast; allow the dough to work a certain time (half-

you will have another crop of potatoes, all the small tubers having grown to fine roots. I have known, in very fine weather, three crops taken from the same plant. Adding a little good manure at the time of replanting is generally a good plan. Those who practise this, must not be discouraged by seeing the tops wither and even die; the roots will grow without the tops. The adoption of this plan, which the

that his wheat next the rye field was apparently unharmed by the insect, while the remaining part of it was mostly eaten up by the weevil.

weevil, and turned to pasture. He is a firm believer that the small quantity of rye (mixed in sowing) with his wheat, saved his crop. We have seen something of this kind mentioned in the Cultivator, and are glad our farmers are testing the result. If the weevil will not touch wheat when rye is growing with it, the mixture should be made until the insect is exterminated.



Chronological Summary.

The Events recorded under this Head, have been brought down to the end of 1843. We continue our Summary from that Period.

1844.—*January*.—Richard Nugent, proprietor of the Nova-Scotian Newspaper, committed to Jail for an alleged Libel. An opposition Stage Coach was started to run between Halifax and Windsor,—the Fare of the Western Stage Coach reduced, in consequence, to half price. 28th.—A violent Snow storm occurred in Halifax, the like had not taken place for twenty years before. An election Scrutiny was commenced in the Supreme Court Room, between Andrew M. Uniacke, Esq., the returned Member for the Township of Halifax, and William Stairs, Esq., the defeated Candidate in the contest; after many days of tedious discussion, the Scrutiny was discontinued, and A. M. Uniacke, Esq., kept his seat in the Assembly.

February 8th.—The Provincial Parliament met for Dispatch of business. Hon. William Young, was elected Speaker. His Excellency Viscount Falkland, addressed both Branches of the Legislature. 9th.—A discussion commenced in the House of Assembly, on an Amendment upon the answer to the Governor's Address, which was moved by Herbert Huntingdon, Esq., on behalf of the opposition. The Debate was continued for fourteen days, and resulted in testing the strength of the two parties. When the division took place, a majority of one was found for the Government; Hon. Jas. W. Johnston, H. M. Attorney General, for Nova Scotia being the Leader of the Administration. 19th.—Hon. Mather B. Almon, and Hon. Edward Kenny—for whose appointments Writs of Mandamus had been received from Her Majesty—were duly sworn in, and took their seats as Members of the Legislative Council. Several changes in the Public Offices, occurred about this period, in consequence of the change of Government. Amongst which was the retirement of J. S. Thompson, Esq., from the Office of Queen's Printer.

March 15th.—A great Public Meeting of the Liberals of the capital took place at Masonic Hall, to give an expression of opinion upon the retiring Executive Councillors—Messrs. Joseph Howe, James B. Uniacke, and James McNab. Resolutions were passed approving of their course of Policy, &c. 20th.—A fire occurred in Albermarle Street, by which seven tenements were destroyed. 21st.—Mr. Benjamin, Member for Horton—whose election was set aside by a Committee of the House of Assembly—ran his election over again—when he was again elected by a majority of 20. 23rd.—A soldier, named Alexander, committed Suicide, at Sambro, by hanging himself.

April 19th.—His Excellency the Lieut. Governor prorogued the Provincial Legislature, which had been in Session ten weeks and two days. 20th.—A Libel Suit was brought in the Supreme Court against J. H. Crosskill, Editor and Proprietor of the Halifax Morning Post, by Mr. Hutchinson, Windsor Road. The action was founded upon an editorial article in the Post of June 1st, 1841, in which the Plaintiff and his Brother were represented as Highwaymen, and were charged with committing an outrage upon the person of a gentleman belonging to this City.—Verdict of £100 damages against the Defendant.

vernor, Collector of Excise, in place of Joseph Howe, Esq., resigned. Mr. Howe resumed the editorial charge of the *Novascotian*, after an intermission of thirty months. 23rd.—A new Alarm Bell was presented by the Sun Fire Company to the Mayor of Halifax, for the use of the City. 25th.—The first intelligence was brought to Halifax of the loss (at Country Harbour) of the Ship *Saladin*, from Valparaiso, with a cargo of Guano, Copper, &c. From the suspicious circumstances connected with her wreck, and other causes, H. M. S. Fair Rosamond was despatched to the scene of the disaster. 21st.—A Gold Snuff Box was presented to Jas. B. Uniacke, Esq., by a number of the citizens of the metropolis, as a memento of their esteem, and in consideration of his valuable services to the Liberal party, in the Legislature and elsewhere.

June 3rd.—H. M. S. Fair Rosamond arrived from the wreck of the "Saladin," bringing the crew of that vessel, specie, &c. The crew were put in Jail, and the specie in the vaults of the Bank of Nova Scotia. 8th.—An extraordinary degree of excitement was created in the city, from the confession of two of the *Saladin* crew confined in prison, by which it appeared, that the Captain (McKenzie), first and second Mates, and three seamen were murdered. The ship was then taken possession of by the pirates, headed by Captain Fielding, (passenger,) who was the chief instigator of the plot—and after his hellish design was accomplished, the accomplices conceiving they were in danger from his treachery, seized him, tied his neck and heels together, and threw him alive into the sea, and then treated his son, who was with him, (aged 15 years), in the same manner. The object of the Pirates was to get possession of the money on board, take the vessel to some secluded spot, scuttle her, and divide the booty amongst themselves.—But their purpose was frustrated by the wreck of the ship—and the unlawful prize was unexpectedly wrested from their grasp, which disappointed them of the enjoyment of the treasure, after the sacrifice of so many lives to secure it. The names of the Pirates were Jones, Johnston, Anderson, Hazelton, (an assumed name), Carr and Galloway; the two latter were the least implicated in the matter, and they gave the first testimony in the tragical affair. 16th.—Mr. Richard Nugent was liberated from jail, having served five out of twelve months' imprisonment for an alleged Libel. 18th.—A Coroner's Jury summoned in the case of Ellen Murphy, who, it was alleged, had been poisoned returned a verdict of *Felo de se*. Five days were occupied in the investigation. 24.—An extra session of the House of Assembly was called by the Lieutenant Governor and Council, to meet on the 20th July following, for the special purpose of considering how far the interests of Nova Scotia proper had been promoted by—as well as the legality of—the annexation of the Island of Cape Breton to this Province in 1820.

July 18th.—The trial of the *Saladin's* crew for Piracy and Murder took place in the Supreme Court, Halifax, before Vice Admiral Sir Charles Adam, the Chief Justice, and Justices Bliss, Hill, and Halliburton. The Jury who tried the Prisoners—were Joseph Whyte (Foreman), Andrew Downs, Stephen H. Harrington, Charles Naylor, George Bolton, John Nugent, Henry T. Wright, John Uhlman, J. G. Ross, John H. After a patient hearing of the case, a Verdict of *Guilty*, was brought in against Hazelton, Jones, Anderson, and Trevaskis, *alias* Johnston. 19th.—Carr and Galloway, the Cook and Steward of the *Saladin*, were tried for the Murder of Captain Fielding, and a Verdict of *Not Guilty*, brought in by the Jury. Sentence of Death, was pronounced by the Court against the four prisoners found Guilty of Piracy and Murder on board the *Saladin*. 20th.—The Summer Session of the Provincial Legislature—being an extra Sitting—was opened by the Lieutenant Governor, Viscount Falkland. 22d.—The first movement made to establish a Company for supplying the City with Water. 30th.—The four “*Saladin Pirates*,” Jones, Hazelton, Anderson, and Trevaskis, were executed on the City common, in the presence of a large assemblage of spectators.

August 15th.—The old Burial Grounds of the City were closed against future interments, and the new Cemetery on the common opened. 31st.—The Halifax Hotel built at a cost of £20,000, was sold by Public auction, for £5,100. The Hon. H. H. Cogswell becoming the purchaser.

September 9th.—A singular phenomena appeared in the Heavens; the Moon and a bright particular Star appeared distinct to the naked eye at mid-day. 15th.—A Deputation of Ministers from the Church of Scotland—arrived in the R. M. Steamer *Britannia*, from Great Britain.

October 25th.—The Corner Stone of the Garrison Church in Brunswick Street—laid by Sir Jeremiah Dickson, with great ceremony.

November 1st.—A Public Meeting was held at the City Court House, to take into consideration the erection of a Lunatic Asylum. Resolutions favorable to the object were passed—subscriptions raised—and the Mayor, (the Hon. Hugh Bell) tendered his year's salary £300 towards the Subscription. 21st.—The Hon. Edmund Murray Dodd, appointed H. M. Solicitor General for the Province of Nova Scotia.

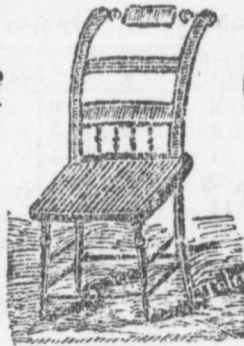
