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## INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

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### NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

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The Nineteenth Annual Meeting was held at the Home, 21 St. Mary Street, on Friday, 26th of October. Mayor Kennedy acted as Chairman. Among others, were present: Mr. Justice Osler, Rev. Canon Sweeny, J. K. Macdonald, Judge Rose, Mr. Percival Ridout. The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Canon Sweeny. The Acting Secretary, Mrs. A. E. Williamson, read the Managers' Report, the adoption of which was moved by Mr. J. K. Macdonald. The Treasurer's statement was presented by the Treasurer, Mrs. Boulton. Short addresses were made by some of the gentlemen present, and the meeting adjourned to partake of refreshments provided for their guests by the Managers, also to thoroughly inspect the Home, the general arrangement of which was highly praised by the many interested visitors.

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### MANAGER'S REPORT.

In last year's report one paragraph reads, "those years in the life of an Institution are blessed, which have little to report." The Managers of this Home ought, this year, to feel themselves in this unusual position, for ours has been, in many respects, an eventful year. We thank God no epidemic has visited our Home, and no unusual mortality

has been our lot. Yet, there is always a sad strain underlying even our brightest record, there remains an ever present realization of how much there is to be done for suffering humanity, and the consciousness of how far removed from fulfilment are many of the hopes with which the Managers of this Home began their nineteenth year.

Nineteen years ago, twenty-five philanthropic women of this city banded themselves together, with the avowed object of founding a Home where destitute infants under two years of age could be sheltered from the cruel charity of the streets, the baby farm, and cold hearted neglect. There are some of these Managers present to-day, and through many trials, much discouragement, and ever present difficulties they, with their fellow Managers, doubtless feel a thrill of thankful joy, that in these nineteen years they have, under God, been instrumental in rescuing from want and misery 2,659 infants and 367 mothers. Surely these facts must speak for themselves, when we plead the cause of our helpless inmates, and yet, as the Secretary has yearly to report, there is no charity so aspersed, no benevolent enterprise so painfully misunderstood as this, our Infants' Home. At all our meetings we, as Managers, together pray, "that God would bless and prosper our humble endeavour to save both mothers and children." This first aspect of our work is greatly overshadowed by the dominating name of the Infants' Home, and is far from being understood by even the friends of the Home. Early in the history of this Institution, it was found that the preservation of infant life greatly depended upon the mother's care; the children fed on artificial food were reared with difficulty, and the conclusion was soon arrived at, that in all cases when at all possible, the mother must enter the Home with her child. Therefore, for

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a longer or shorter period, as the necessities of the case may demand, we keep the mother with her child, and although, as with all benevolent work for others, there is much disappointment, yet, looking back in our records, we find many touching instances of grateful appreciation of the benefits of the Home. From a letter recently received, I quote as follows: "I feel dreadful lonesome and homesick for the Infants' Home. Some of the nurses might laugh at me, but it is true, and I never can feel grateful enough for the kindness shown to myself and my little girl while we were there." Many similar letters are received, far counterbalancing those which fail to express any gratitude for the shelter and protection afforded by our Home. The public, as a rule, class all institution work together, and, possibly, in the minds of many, an Infants' Home conveys the idea of a large number of babies massed together under the charge of one, or possibly two nurses. The rule of our Home is, that when possible, the mother must enter with her child, and then if pronounced by the physician physically fitted to undertake the duty, is given the charge of one infant beside her own. The work of an Infants' Home is so widely different from that of an institution where the children can attend to themselves in even a small degree, that a large number of nurses must of necessity be provided. These attendants, as it were, to our infant household are not taken into consideration by the public in a hasty review of the work of the Home, but do in reality embrace a very large proportion of the expense, anxiety, and care undertaken by the Managers in the carrying on of their self-imposed duties. Of necessity, we must admit all conforming to our standard, who desire admission, and a glance through the minutes of our meetings during the past year, give sketches of sorrow

and sadness such as we would fain believe of rare rather than of frequent occurrence. Take entries such as the following:—

Mrs. W. returned with husband and two little boys from Chicago; no work there, no work in Toronto. The wife could get work if the Home would take her boys, admitted.

Mrs. M., deserted by husband, baby two months old, admitted.

J. M., orphan girl of sixteen, parents and grandparents were of lowest type, admitted with infant.

Dr. P. asks admission of infant six days' old: mother dead, father labouring man, four other small children, baby taken and placed in Mulock cot.

Mrs. H. asks that two children be admitted: father day labourer, mother dying in the hospital, both children admitted and infant placed in Maurice Mason cot.

Extracts such as these cause visions of untold sin and misery to rise before us, and when one month's record of deaths reads: *John*, three weeks old, dying when admitted; *Iza*, dying, when admitted, from exposure; *Florence*, dying when admitted; *Edna*, dying from Tuberculosis; can you marvel that the managers of the Home plead for these poor infants.

Year after year the Annual Meeting of this Home is held, to the visitor the report of the Home reads just the same, and yet, most sorrowful though it is, the record of twelve months is of a new set of inmates for each year. Over and over again do we hear persons, wise in their theoretical knowledge, say, "your Home encourages crime, it should not exist," the weary collector of funds may next hear said, "I do not intend giving to your Home again, your rules are too strict, your doors should be open to all." Strong in the

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conviction that it is wisest to attempt only a certain class of rescue work, the Managers have borne much misrepresentation in silence, but would in this report reiterate the objects of their Home, for each year bringing changes among our former friends, it is advisable for the welfare of the Institution that some points should be clearly defined. It has been said to us, "your Home receives a grant from the city, why, then, do you not take in all foundlings free of cost to the city?" Each charitable institution receives a certain grant from the public funds, which funds we imagine are derived from the taxation of the individual householder, the Infants' Home receives \$1,000, not a wildly extravagant grant for a Home taking in yearly from 180 to 200 inmates. Now, a foundling is a helpless infant, whom either from hard necessity or cruel indifference has been forsaken, and the Managers believe that to make this refuge a foundling asylum, would be a decided injury to the community, therefore, to guard against the possibility, they decided only to admit deserted children on order of the Mayor, the charge to be \$5 per month, this sum to include clothing and medical attendance.

Before the advent of the Infants' Home these foundling children were boarded out to a very low class of women, and there were no means by which the corporation could ascertain whether their foundling children were properly cared for or not. The city, therefore, naturally found it more convenient to have these waifs placed together in a Home under proper supervision, the Infants' Home Managers usually adopting these children into families, thereby relieving the city of the burden of their support. Even though, through the persistent efforts of the Managers, women desirous of taking more than one child to board, are

now by law obliged to procure a license, and to permit their houses to be open to police inspection, there remain numbers of people who will take one child on the payment of a sum of money in advance. When the money for the second month is not forthcoming, these people apply to the Infants' Home to admit the child. Now, if we, without question, took in children so offered, such action would be clearly wrong, because we should be allowing that woman to run a perfectly safe risk, should the mother not reappear; also, there would be great danger of encouraging the many forlorn and deserted mothers to thus desert their children.

The Managers also endeavour, in all possible ways, to guard against any possibility of children being taken from their homes, or in any way to destroy the natural home life. Such are, in brief, the motives of the Infants' Home Managers, and the results have, as a whole, proved satisfactory. The very low standard of morality, the utter want of training shown by many of the young girls who come to us from the city and country, is calculated to make a thoughtful mind pause, to ask why these things are so. The absence of home life, and the laxity of parental control, are all agencies working for evil in our midst; but in a report of an Infants' Home, this is an aspect of life probably not within our province to consider.

In last year's report the Secretary reported the lack of employment for labouring men, as one great reason for the number of deserted wives, and the half-starved and puny infants admitted to our Home. This year we have to report but little, if any improvement in this respect, but owing to the opening of Shelters for Women and Infants by the Salvation Army, where the restraints are of a lax descrip-

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tion, we find a growing disinclination on the part of the needy ones to tread the narrow way.

We spoke last year of the introduction of a specially trained nurse to take the oversight of the Infirmary and the general health of the children. We are very pleased to record that Nurse Young has been of great assistance to the Home in this important work. A large number of infants registered on their entry as looking "most wretched, apparently dying," are now fat, healthy children. During the past year we have had four tiny creatures brought to the Home, motherless from their birth,—two of them are now strong and well.

Two of our foundlings are here to-day, showing the value of the Home as a life-saving Institution. One was brought to the Home not an hour after the close of our last Annual Meeting; the other was left on a doorstep last November, pinned up in a "bit of flannel." Instances can be multiplied such as these, showing the great value of our Home as a shelter and protection for infants and mothers. These most helpless of creatures are, in the haste and rush of life, so apt to go to the wall, and the mortality of our infant population is largely due to absolute ignorance and neglect. Milk, which should be their natural food for two years or more of their lives, is, to quote from last year's report, "an impossible luxury," and yet how essential it is to the proper development of the sound mind, and healthy body, which should be the natural heritage of the native born child of this great and magnificent country.

One great factor in the prevalent mortality among these infants is due to the so-called boarding houses, advertised for special purposes. These are numerous on every side, and wrong-doing and concealment of the result are unhappily

aided by these means, and the value of infant life is considered—not at all.

In 1880 our Annual Report says, "Many of our infants have been brought to the Home by the police, rescued from the baby farming establishments which abound in the city."

We hoped that the long continued crusade waged by our Managers against this baby farming, which culminated in 1887 by the passing of an Act regulating the taking in of infants to nurse, would have put a check upon this infamous traffic; but recent paragraphs in the daily papers show that great laxity must prevail in some quarter, or these baby farms could not exist in the large numbers they undoubtedly do. We are by no means singular in our statement of the melancholy facts. English charitable societies all unite in reporting this form of depravity fearfully on the increase. Baby farms abound in England, and this evil has been truly spoken of as a "spreading sore."

Very possibly readers of this report may consider there is no need to throw these side-lights, as they may be termed, upon the work we, as Managers of an Infants' Home, endeavour to accomplish; but in these days of many Homes, when sharply scrutinizing eyes are turned hither and thither, seeking where expenses may be lessened, and some charity curtailed in its grant, it is most necessary for the Managers of this Home to strictly adhere to the high standard which, during these nineteen years, it has been their anxious wish to uphold.

In our minute book of the past year, the item constantly appears, "the Treasurer reported the funds very low," and we naturally can but expect that our collections would share in the general depression of the times. This must always be an expensive house to maintain; this year 120 helpless

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children and 55 mother nurses have had to be well and carefully fed, and all to be clothed. This all means constant and anxious thought. As usual, the last item has been largely cared for by our Work-room Committee, who, on marvellously small expenditure, contrive to turn out many garments and to provide the necessary linen for our many cots, cradles and larger beds. We owe to our Work-room ladies and their steadfast helpers most sincere and loving thanks.

Last year we reported that we had but one cot endowed by the payment of \$1,000, and known as the "Maurice Mason;" this year we report our second so endowed, to be known as the "Lady Macpherson Cot," given to the Home by the two sons and five daughters of the late lamented Lady Macpherson, who, as Mrs. Macpherson, was one of the first Managers of the Home, and whose signature appears on the original Charter of Incorporation. Our "Little Maids' Cot," and the "Mulock Cot," are kept up by the kindly donation of \$50 yearly to each.

It is difficult in a report to express in a satisfactory manner the gratitude felt by the Managers towards the Medical Staff of this Home. Consulting Physicians have been ready to attend when called upon to do so, and our Acting Physicians have proved themselves upon all occasions our warm and sympathizing supporters. Dr. McArthur, appointed last year upon our staff, has, by absence from the city, been superseded by Dr. Machell, whose well-known skill in the treatment of children renders his acceptance of a position on the Medical Staff a most fortunate circumstance for the little inmates of our Home.

To the Clergy of St. Luke's Church, and to the Rev. J. Pearson, of Holy Trinity, we owe much gratitude for their steady kindness in keeping up our Sunday Services, and to

the ladies who so faithfully teach the Bible Classes for the women, we would repeat our heartfelt thanks.

This report has already exceeded its limits, and in conclusion, we may say that each aspect of the work assumed by the Managers of the Home is of vital importance, whether in the preservation of infant life, or the encouragement to the erring to go and "sin no more," or the aid given to the half-starved, and over-worked wife in her struggle to obtain for her family the bare necessaries of life. We, therefore, entreat our friends to come forward with help which they can give in monetary offerings, and in loving, sympathizing, heartfelt interest in our work. *Help* which would enable us to add to our usefulness, by the building of a wing which would then permit us to keep our older boys and girls until of an age more fitted to cope with the elder children of the institutions where they must now of necessity be taken in. *Help* which would enable us to provide for a still larger number of deserted mothers, the half-starved infants, and for those to whom the lesson of the little waif applies; such as is inscribed upon the cover of our last year's report. "I took a little, forsaken baby in my arms the other day, and I looked down into the beautiful blue eyes. Its father had left it, and its mother had given it up, so it was only God's child, and there was a meaning to me in the words I had never seen before, 'The Father of the Fatherless.' Only think what a difference it would make, if we could only realize this truth, 'Ye do it unto me.'"

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*From the Report of 1889 appended to this year's Report, to show how highly the system pursued by the Infants' Home authorities was, and is still, regarded by the authorized Inspectors of Public Charities:—*

Last winter a petition for increased aid was presented to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, which was partially successful, resulting in an increased grant for the "Mother Nurses," which is a gratifying recognition of the beneficial effect of admitting them with their infants. In connection with this subject the Managers wish to draw attention to the following remarks of Dr. Cassidy in his report of the Special Committee of the Provincial Board of Health, on the advisability of taking precautions to prevent infanticide. He says: "The Toronto Infants' Home has been successful in reducing the mortality among children of this class, in consequence of the wise system of nursing adopted there. The Committee, moreover, found that the system of nursing infants followed at the Infants' Home was scientifically correct, and fairly successful, if measured by the results." This is a public acknowledgment very encouraging to the Managers, this Home being the pioneer of the nursing system in Canada.

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MEDICAL REPORT.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—Following is the report of the Medical Staff of the Infants' Home and Infirmary for the year ending September 30th, 1894 :—

At the beginning of the year there were 33 children in the Home. Ninety-one (91) more were admitted during the year, making a total of 124. Of these, there were removed by death, 33, being a death rate of a little over 27 per cent. This comparatively high death rate may be accounted for by the fact that amongst the admissions were the usual number of poor little mortals who were hopelessly condemned before entering our portals, and for whom kind nursing and good treatment were of no avail, further than to make their last days more comfortable than they would otherwise have been.

It is with great pleasure we are able to say that during the year the Home has been almost entirely free from those infectious diseases of which last year's report said "we have had an unusually large amount amongst us," and which have from time to time caused such sad havoc in our ranks. Those referred to were diphtheria, measles, whooping-cough and typhoid fever. None of them have had a foothold amongst us this year, but our old enemies, consumption, marasmus and diarrhoea, have held high carnival, they being responsible for 20 out of the 33 deaths reported.

Last year's report stated that the highest mortality was during April, and the lowest in July. This year July lost the good reputation with which it was credited last year,

having had 10 deaths or nearly one-third of those reported. May, June, July and August are responsible for 25 out of the 33 deaths, while January, February and March have an excellent record, no deaths having taken place during these months.

Eighteen out of the 33 children who died were in the Home only on an average of 17 days. This would bear out the statement above made as to the hopelessness of such cases.

The health of the nurses has been good during the year, none having been laid up with any serious disease.

We believe the Home to be now in a good sanitary condition and comfortable in every respect for the inmates.

We are pleased to be able to state that the vacancy in the staff, caused by Dr. McArthur having left the city, has been filled by Dr. Machell, who commenced duty on the first of August.

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## CONSTITUTION

### OF THE TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary."

II.

The object of the Home shall be to receive and tenderly care for destitute infants under two years of age.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money, their babies shall be admitted free.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Committee of thirty ladies, assisted by an Advisory Committee of three gentlemen, and the Committee shall elect annually their Presiding Officers and a Treasurer and Secretary out of their number.

V.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society, provided one month's notice shall be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten Managers, including three officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the "Advisory Committee."

VI.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at the Annual Meeting to act as an Advisory Committee. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance,—especially in the investment of funds.

VII.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, etc.

VIII.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.

## BY-LAWS.

## I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the matron and nurses.

## II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings; summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the condition, progress, and prospects of the Home.

## III.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution; deposit the same in a chartered bank in the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditure, and pay out money on the order of the Committee.

## IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. No child or wet-nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.

## V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet-nurses as possible, each nurse to be entrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the board may determine.

## VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

## RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

## I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a. m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

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II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the officers.

The following order shall be observed:—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the managers, to be signed by the President.

IV.

A Committee of five shall meet every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock, consisting of the President (or Vice-President), Treasurer, and Secretary, the Visitor of the previous week, and the Visitor of the current week, when the said Visitor shall report her experience. The Committee shall be called the Committee of Admission and Investigation, and every application for admission, both of children and nurses, shall be referred to them. This Committee shall arrange about the adoption of children from the Home, and shall report to the General Committee once a month. On these occasions three shall form a quorum. A Visitor shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, each Manager taking his duty in turn. The Visitor shall ascertain from the Lady Superintendent all about the health of the children, and the conduct of the nurses, and shall report the same to the Weekly Committee.

V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The Manager having the floor shall address herself to the chair.

### RULES FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN.

Application for the admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary street, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission. Children from outside municipalities double fee.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

### RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services to the Institution for as long as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and infant, and before any woman is permitted to leave the Home the particulars of her case shall be laid before the Board by the Superintendent.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the lady Managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the Visiting Physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, etc., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.

No unmarried woman admitted, except with her firstborn.

### PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is deemed satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection from such children as are deserted and dependent on charity, and not visited by parents or friends.
