



### SESSION REPORT.

During the year 157 members have been added to the roll, and 142 removed, leaving a net increase of 15 members. The number now on the roll is 695. 33 children and 1 adult have been baptized. We are unable to report a large increase of members, for, although the number added during the year is only 11 less than the average of the two preceeding years, the number removed is very much larger.

While we cannot therefore record a large growth in numbers, the reports to be submitted to you, especially that of the Missionary Association, afford encouraging evidence of agrowth "in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord" who said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

Each department of the Congregation will report for itself. These reports a ford a more complete record of means employed and work accomplished, than we could set forth in a general report.

It becomes us however to gratefully recognize the goodness of God in continuing to us the many privileges we have enjoyed, and for the harmony and peace which have prevailed all of which call for renewed earnestness, greater devotion, and more zeal in His cause, who is the Author and Giver of al, our blessings.

At this the close of our second year we have to report a membership of 47. Eleven new members have been added during the year and eight have disjoined, mostly from removing to distant parts of the city.

Ten meetings have been held during the year, with an

average attendance of 14.

Literature bearing on mission work has been read at the meetings, which gives a better knowledge of the condition of the heathen and the difficulties the missionaries have often to contend with, and thus the interest has been deepened.

A quantity of clothing was again sent to the North-West Indians, last September, from the Auxiliary and other members of the congregation. The missionaries find that by making the body comfortable they can easier gain attention to the story of the Cross

The Month'n Letter Leaflet—being letters from the different mission fields—has been more widely circulated this year among the ladies of the congregation, and "Pence Jugs" were distributed among the members of the Sabbath School, to encourage the young in giving to missions.

We would like to have more of the ladies and especially the young, join in the work of our Society, as we feel sure they would be interested in it and feel they were being blessed themselves, while seeking blessing for those who sit in darkness.

### MANAGERS' REPORT.

In presenting their report for 1888, your Board would with gratitude acknowledge the guiding hand of the Great Head of the Church, for the success which has attended our labors dur-

ing the past year.

From the Treasurer's report you will see that the offerings by envelopes for 1888 have been \$3,522.72, and for 1887 were \$3,136.85, by open collection for 1888 have been \$1,026.48, and for 1887 were \$1,025.41. Total contributions for 1888 have been \$4,549.20, and for 1887 were \$4,162.26, an increase of \$386.94. During 1888 we have had an average of \$55.83, against \$80.04 for 1887, and increase of \$5.79 per Sabbath.

The current expenses for 1888, including interest, have been \$5,244.19, an average per Sabbath of \$98.94, thus showing

a deficit of \$13.11 per Sabbath.

We have only paid to the Treasurer of Building Fund, towards interest, \$860 instead of \$1,508.67, being a deficit of \$548.67, which amount had to be made good from the subscriptions to the Building Fund.

We would call your special attention to the following items to be provided for during 1889 in addition to ordinary expenses, viz: Total floating debt of \$2,656.37, as per financial statement, and \$,000 due on the mortgage of the Star Life Association. We would therefore strongly impress upon subscrib rs to be Building Fund, the necessity of paying up their subscriptions at as early a date s possible.

In regard to our weekly contributions by envelope, there are, out of a membership o 695 only 250 who use this, the recognized system of the congregation, hence, as we lose a goodly sum by irregular contributions, we hope that many more will adopt this method, as we believe it has a great tendency to regularity.


