# WRECKED NEAR QUACO

The schooners were sailed by brothers—Captains Patrick and John George, both of Parrsboro. The accident to the Wood Bros. occurred on Saturday afternoon about 3 o'clook and but for the heroic rescue of Lighthouse Keeper Charles Brown and Lorseno Bradshaw, the captain and crew would have been lost with the boat.

Collins of Boston, the other member of the crew, was the last to attempt to make the shore, but he was not so successful as the others. It was his duty to untie the rope, and through a mishap he went under and was going down the last time when he was rescued. Though much exhausted, all the men were taken immediately to the lighthouse, where through the kindness of Mr. Brown they were furnished with dry clothing and soon all had recovered.





# OPIUM CONFERENCE OPENS AT SHANGHAI

All the Leading Nations are Represented.

Many Measures Have Already Been Taken to Reduce Trade and Conference Will Continue Work.

invited the interested countries to confer on the opium evil and to send representatives to meet in Shanghai. No international action respecting opium had occurred in China since the period of the "opium war" 1834 to 1840, except references to opium and morphia embodied in commercial treaties with China. In the history of China's foreign relations, the subject had dropped out of special notice for sixty-four years, when in September, 1906, China issued an imperial decree against opium. Six months later the Chinese authorities began suppression. The opium dens were in the cities of Fuchow, Pekin, Shanghai (native city) Wuhu and Canton. A flood of anti-opium edicts followed which is still goin on. The action of China met with sympathy in Great Britain where the House of Commons has supported a running debate on the subject.

COMMITTED SUICIDE

A. Blomthal, a Native of Germany, Hanged Himself When Two Days Out

From Liverpool.

The Lake Erie which arrived this morning from Liverpool was the scene

of a tragedy when the vessel was two days out at sea. A man named A. Blomthal who was employed as an interpreter on board the ship committed suicide on the 20th by hanging himself. No cause could be attributed for the deed as the man seemed in the best of spirits when he was last seen at night.

There was no intimation of anything of the sort until his body was found suspended from a beam. Life was then entirely extinct. The deceased was a native of Germany and was a man of middle age.
