


GERMAN COURSE. 1st Year,—Tiark's German Grammar, Heydenrich's German Reader. 2nd Year,—Tiark's Grammar, Adler's Progressive Reader. 3rd Year,—Adler's Handbook of German Literature, History of German Literature. 4th Year,—Schiller, (Marie Stuart,) Goethe, (Iphigenie,) History of German Literature.

ITALIAN. Elementary Course:—Fontana's Italian Grammar, Graglia's Italian Dictionary, Silvio Pellico, Italian Conversations. For full course, application may be made to teacher.

These Courses will correspond to the Collegiate, and either of these languages will be considered as equivalent for the Latin.



# REMARKS ON COURSE OF STUDY

### PENMANSHIP.

Daily exercises in Penmanship are required, until good execution is attained.

# READING AND SPELLING.

Particular attention is given to perfecting students in these branches.

### COMPOSITION.

Composition is made a specialty, and will be required throughout the entire course, in forms varying with the advancement of the Student. At the proper stage it will be connected with the principles and practice

#### MUSIC.

Prominence is given to Vocal Music, in which the Students receive instruction.

It is designed to afford the best facilities in the departments both of Vocal and Instrumental Music. The selection of Music will be under constant supervision, and only that will be allowed which is conducive to the oultivation of the most pure and elevated taste, as well as the most rapid progress of the pupil in the acquisition of this delightful accom-

Beyond this general training, those who desire it are instructed in select classes, and in private lessons.

An accomplished teacher will instruct in this beautiful art, if required.

### MISCELLANY.

#### LECTURES.

Frequent informal Lectures will be given upon topics connected with health, manners, etc.

Courses of Lectures will be delivered on Chemistry, Natural Philosophy, History and Æsthetics.

#### LIBRARY

The Institution is furnished with a Library of nearly five hundred newly-selected volumes of general reading and for reference, also a Reading-Room.

A Cabinet of Geological and Botanical Specimens, and of Historical and General Curiosities and Illustrations of Natural History has been commenced, and will be carried on as rapidly as circumstances will allow. More than a thousand Geological Specimens are in the Cabinet, containing an assortment of the fossils of all the strata, both of this Continent and of Europe. Additions are constantly being made to this collection under the supervision of Prof. Wright. Contributions and exchanges are invited.

#### APPARATUS, MAPS, Etc.

The Institution is furnished with a fine set of Maps, Globes, Physiological Charts, a Microscope, and Philosophical and Chemical Apparatus.

#### LITERARY SOCIETY.

"As ye sow so shall ye reap."

This Society, called the "Reapers," is confined to students of the third and fourth years, and is presided over by a member of the Faculty. Its object is Literary Improvement. Weekly meetings are held, at which original articles, and selections from the best authors are read, varied with music, etc.

Its paper is called the "Sheaf," and is read at stated times during the year, before a select audience.

#### MERIT ROLL.

A record of standings, literary and moral, is daily kept; and cards corresponding to this record are given to the Students weekly, and should

be transmitted to parents for their information. An Honor Card is received by pupils entitled to it, at the end of each term.

# HONORS OF THE INSTITUTION.

Two courses of study have been established, a Classical and an English; and Diplomas will be given to those who have satisfactorily completed either of them. The title of M.L.A., or Mistress of Liberal Arts, is given to the former, and M.E.L., or Mistress of English Literature, to the latter. Certificates may be had by those who have passed examinations in a partial course.

A good moral standing is necessary in order to obtain either Certificate or Diploma.

### BOARDING, Etc.

The Institution, as a home, is designed to be the abode of comfort and pleasant associations.

Rooms are carpeted and furnished throughout, so that the pupil requires nothing in addition. Napkins are not provided.

The provision for the table is wholesome and abundant.

### GOVERNMENT.

It is intended that the government of the Institution shall be firm without being arbitrary; that it shall be founded upon confidence in the pupils, and that its tendency shall be to teach them self-control, obedience to principles, and a conscientious regard for right.

No young lady will be allowed to retain her connection with the school whose example tends to encourage indolence or insubordination, or whose influence is in other respects injurious.

Very little jewellery or spending money should be at her disposal.

Carelessness and the possibility of dishonesty in servants, etc., make it proper that all funds should be deposited with the officer appointed for that purpose.

#### STUDENTS' CORRESPONDENCE.

Students are allowed to correspond with the home circle without any supervision; but correspondence beyond the home circle is not allowed without special permission, and letters not having this permission may be opened by the Principal or forwarded to the parents, as he may judge best.

Some Students have had too large a correspondence, occupying too much time, and diverting attention from school duties. This will, in future, be controlled.

as Candies, cakes, and eatables generally, sent from home, cause the receiver one or two day's sickness, and are a most pernicious kindness.

#### SESSION HOURS.

For recitation and study, from 15 minutes to 9 to 1.30 P.M. Study hours, 6.45 to 7.30 A.M.; 4.30 to 5.30 P.M.; and 7.30 to 8.30 P.M.

It is understood to be necessary that Day Students should spend at least two hours in study at home. Parents may be assured that something is wrong unless this is done.

Punctuality in the attendance of Day Students is of the utmost consequence. Tardiness results not only in loss to themselves, but is injurious to classes, and tends to general disorder. Tardiness and unexcused absence will stand against Deportment on the Cards. All excuses must be signed by the name of Parent or Guardian.

### VISITING AND RECEIVING VISITS.

STUDENTS' RECEPTION DAY.—Saturday afternoon.

All persons, except immediate relatives, wishing to visit Students, are expected to present a letter from Parents or Guardians, or to be otherwise suitably introduced. Visits without this preliminary must be declined.

Students are allowed, at proper times, to visit such families as the Parents or Guardians may name to the Governor or Principal, but not to remain out over night, or over the Sabbath, except at the house of some near relative. The last Friday or Saturday in each month is the time appropriated to these visits. Friends who are visited must call for the young ladies and return with them.

When Students visit friends in the city, they will not be allowed to go except in charge of some one fully responsible. They will not visit any but

the families, nor be allowed to visit from the house, to make calls, walk about the streets, or visit shops and stores. Where this rule is violated Students cannot be allowed to visit.

Young ladies are not allowed to receive invitations until they have been submitted to the Principal or Governor.

It is hoped that persons entitled to call upon Students will adapt themselves to the hours of the Institution. Officers would not like to disoblige, but must refuse permission to Students to see their friends except in special

#### SHOPPING

It is desired that Students should be supplied, if possible, with all necessary things before leaving home. To provide, however, for necessities that may occur, Students will be permitted to do shopping once a quarter, always accompanied by a teacher.

### RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

Bible-class every Sunday evening under the care of the Governor, in addition to family worship and the usual religious exercises at the daily opening and close of the school.

Earnest efforts will be made to produce a strong conviction of the paramount importance of personal religion.

# ATTENDING DIFFERENT CHURCHES.

The Students attend those Churches selected for them by their Parents or Guardians; and all Students are required to attend on each Sabbath, unless excused.

If Students desire during the year to change their place of worship, permission will be given only under very unusual circumstances. If desired for any whim or subordinate reason, it will in no case be granted.

The religious opinions of Students will be carefully guarded.

#### CALENDAR.

The Collegiate year consists of four terms of ten weeks each, there being one term and a half before Christmas and two and a half after.

All charges to be paid in bankable funds, in advance for each term.

The total expenses are: For board, \$3 per week; 25 cents per week for washing done in the Institution; dresses extra, according to work; to which add the Tuition in the branches to be studied. For the academic year, for the Preparatory department, with board and washing, including music, the amount will be \$194; Academic, \$198. Without music or other extras, Preparatory will be \$154. The expenses are, of course, graduated according to the number of extra studies taken during the year. The Fee for the Diploma is \$5. Students on entering should be provided with about \$5, to pay for Text Books, Music Books, etc. Meals taken to Students' rooms are charged extra. Collegiate price will be charged when a Student takes Latin. Students taking lessons of the Professor of Music will be charged \$10 per term.

#5 Twenty per cent. discount is made to daughters of Clergymen of all denominations.

#### ADMISSION OF STUDENTS.

Pupils are admitted at any time, and are charged for their board in proportion to the time of their connection with the School, except at the close of the Session. No deduction will be made for absence during term. It is earnestly desired that Students should be present at the organization of the School, both at the beginning of the year and after the Christmas Holidays. No change in the classes can be made to accommodate those who are tardy in

their return after the holidays. Tuition is received only for the term or half term. Pupils from a distance are required to board in the Institution, except in the case of those who have near relatives in town.

Whenever a pupil is entered in College, the Faculty consider that an implied contract is made between themselves and the patron, by which the latter is as much bound to continue the pupil in College until the close of the Term, as the Faculty are bound to instruct her for that time. Those who take away their daughters for a few days, without weighty reasons for such absence, not only impair the scholarship of their daughters, but impose unnecessary trouble upon the Faculty, and introduce a restlessness in the minds of all, very unfavorable to study.

#### LEAVING THE COLLEGE.

It is requested that definite and particular arrangements be made by Parents and Guardians, and indicated to the Governor of the Institution, respecting the leaving of Students at the close of the term, the time of their leaving, and the company with whom they shall leave.

All payments of money due the College, must be made before the Student leaves.

Notice of half a term must be given to the Governor before the removal of a Student.

#### CORRESPONDENCE.

Letters respecting any of the departments of Instruction, the admission or dismission of Students, their studies, etc., should be addressed to the Principal, Rev. Dr. Rice, directly, and not through the Student. Letters pertaining to the finances of the College, and applications for Circulars, to the Financial Secretary, Rev. W. P. WRIGHT, M.A., B.D.



#### OBJECT.

THE DUNDAS WESLEYAN INSTITUTE is a Boarding School where a liberal education may be obtained, and a thorough intellectual training pursued, amidst all possible safeguards against the abounding temptations to immorality to which youth are exposed. The first care is moral safety—to implant correct guiding principles, a prime object.

The Institute is designed to meet the wishes of those who desire only a thorough English Education; also to prepare young men for Mercantile pursuits; or for admission to the Universities, or to the schools of Law or Medicine.

For admission, no standard has been established,—either of age or attainments.

#### COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The Course of Instruction embraces the English, French, German, Spanish, Italian, Latin and Greek Languages, History, Geography, Penmanship, Composition, Book-keeping, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry, Chemistry, Natural Philosophy, Physiology, Zoology, Geology, Music—Vocal and Instrumental,—everything necessary to a complete Classical, Commercial, or Scientific Education.

Constant and close attention is given to secure thoroughness and accuracy in English. All the students are persistently drilled in English Grammar, and in Reading, Spelling, and Pronunciation, according to English standards.

All pupils are required to participate in exercises in Composition and Elocution.

#### DOMESTIC DEPARTMENT.

The Dormitories are designed for two occupants, are of ample dimensions, and neatly and sufficiently furnished. The best judgment of the Principal will be given to the mating of the boarders, and to their general comfort. Three of the masters reside in the Institute, and assist each other in superintending the conduct and studies of the pupils. The evening study-hours of the junior boys, who need most assistance, and of such senior boys as are not disposed to diligence, will be spent in the presence of one or more of the masters.

All Students will be required to attend morning and evening prayers; and the boarders, morning and evening service at the churches parents may designate, besides the Principal's Bible Class on Sabbath afternoon.

#### BUILDINGS, GROUNDS, Etc.

The Institute stands in the midst of high, undulating grounds, ten and a half acres in extent, within the picturesque town of Dundas, on the Great Western Railway, five miles from the city of Hamilton. The location cannot be surpassed for beauty, healthfulness and convenience.

The buildings are of white brick and of fine appearance; the rooms are commodious, well lighted and ventilated: and the whole heated by hot water, contributing vastly to cleanliness and comfort, and affording almost absolute security against fire.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

A careful record of each students' scholarship and deportment will be kept, which may be obtained by parents on application.

It is highly desirable that pupils be in attendance promptly on the first day of the Session.

Each article of clothing must be distinctly marked with the owner's name in order to identification.

Smoking, drinking strong drink, card playing, and novel reading are strictly forbidden all pupils during attendance at the Institute.

The first half-year of the Institute's existence is now past. The attendance was good. Forty-six names were entered on the roll. The application and progress of the students were, on the whole, satisfactory. A good beginning has been made. The prospects for the next term are very encouraging.




