

"The pastor should expect from his church: (a) A stewardship of thought. He should show forth the manifold grace of God. His thinking should not only include the local interests, but imperial concept of God's Kingdom, (b) A stewardship of speech. Our powers of speech not our own. We are stewards and as such we are ministers. Our ordinary conversation should be for the glory of God should be clean dignified and used within as well as outside the church. (c) A stewardship of time. We must account to God for our time. We must think of time not in years, but in moments. How shall this time be used. We should expect the church to give the whole of the Lord's day to his work. Expect that members should

work. Expect that members should be at church. A part of each day alone with God, a part of each day when the family should be with God, a proportionate part of day to do some special work for God, (d) A steward-ship of our talents. These powers whether one or many are entrusted to us for use. (e) A Stewardship of possessions. If a man is a Christian not only does he belong to God, but all that he possesses. If a man owns a slave, not only does he possess the slave, but the slave's hut, the slave's garden is his also. In this stewardship of possessions Jesus gave no definite ruler, but He laid down principle by which to guide His children." Rev. W. R. Robinson spoke on "The Stewardship of the church, resocial problems." While this topic touches intemperance, social impurity, amusements and responsibility, the speaker laid special stress on the responsibility of the home. The home preceded the organization of the church, and the parent before the pastor. No one ought to be more confidential with the child than the parents. No organization should usurp the place of the home. With many instances the speaker illustrated that a larger percentage of the unfortunates of life came from the rural communities; that this downfall was due to ignorance, to intemperance, to lack of parental control and instruction."

This splendid address was followed by an illustrated lecture by Rev. P. R. Hayward, on Baptist stewards in mission fields. The illustrations touched that part of India where for ninety years the Baptists of England and America have been spending men and money and where among 4.500,000 a good work is carried on.

The atternoon session was well attended, and was full of interest. A discussion on "Methods of Denominational Finance," was opened by Rev. J. C. Goeline, who showed the necessity of educational work being done in this matter. The people should be led to see the stewardship of wealth and of their responsibility to the unchristran world. The speaker further said there was no "Gol-


