# HARRIMAN LETTER ANGERS ROOSEVELT

# Statement That President Asked Him to Raise \$200,000 Corruption Fund

Teddy Issues a 4,000 Word Statement Declaring Charge False, and Declares Railway Czar is a Menace to the Country---Quotes His Assertion of His Ability to Buy Legislatures, Congress or Judiciary if He Wanted Them.

This is just in line with the tremendous arraignment of him by Roosevelt in concluding one of his letters to Representative Sherman, in which he wrote:

"Far more important are the additional remarks he made to you, as you inform, when you asked him if he thought triumphant over the Republican party. You inform me that he told you that he did not care in the least, because these people were crooks and he could buy them—that whenever he wanted legislation from a state legislature he could buy them—that whenever he wanted legislation from a state legislature he could buy the indiciary. 




