

June, 1892.

The Ministerial Session of the London Conference of the Methodist Church commenced in the First Methodist Church (St. George Street), in the city of St. Thomas, on Wednesday, June 1st, 1892, at 9 a.m. Rev. B. Clement, President of Conference, being in the chair, and Rev. W. W. Edwards, Secretary of Conference, and Rev. W. J. Ford, LL.B., Assistant Secretary, in their places to record the proceedings.

### JOHN CARPENTER TUFFORD.

John Carpenter Tufford was born in Grimsby Township, on November 23rd, 1817, and died at Glencolin, near Springfield, Ont., on January 25th, 1892. His father's family moved to near the village of Acton, where Brother Tufford, when quite young, was converted. He joined the late Methodist Episcopal Conference in 1845, and was ordained elder at the Kilworth Conference. He was married to his now bereaved companion, Catherine J. Yokom, on June 6th, 1849. He travelled the following circuits: Georgetown, twice; Nelson, Morpeth, Hamilton, Oakland, Welland, Canboro', London City, Ingersol, Malahide and Walsingham.

For a number of years he was seriously afflicted with asthma, and on leaving the Walsingham work, he was placed on the Superannuated Preachers' list. For the last few years his health failed rapidly, and about three years ago he had a slight stroke of paralysis, which left him quite helpless, his strength decreasing until near the end, when la grippe seized him, and his life soon closed. He leaves a widow—who for so long waited patiently on her suffering companion—and five sons. For years Brother Tufford was a wreck, both in body and mind, compared with former years. In his strong days he was an acceptable preacher, and did good effective work. He has gone to his rest. His funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Thomas Cullen, when he was buried in the Dunboyne Cemetery, to await the resurrection morn.

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### JOHN K. WILLISTON.

John K. Williston was born in the province of Quebec, near the village of St. Andrews, in the Seigniory of Argenteiul, May 28th, 1808. He moved with his parents to Ontario about the year 1820, and settled near where the town of Dreaden now stands. Here he grew up in a state of entire spiritual carelessness. He says of himself: "I was not trained to any religious faith, and lived until my eighteenth year without God in the world. Then, by the direct agency of the Holy Spirit, I was convinced of sin and the need of salvation. I clearly saw if I died as I was I should be lost eternally; and I decided it was better for me to give myself to God, and thus be prepared to live with Him in heaven. I at once sought God and found comfort. I asked God what church I ought to join, and I think He led me to the Methodist Church. After uniting with the Church, I was encouraged for the first time to publicly declare that I had found salvation." He was received on trial on the Thames circuit by a local preacher, who, it appears, was in charge of the circuit during the temporary absence of the Superintendent. This was in 1825. In 1826, he was received into full membership by Rev. E. Stoney, Superintendent of the Thames circuit that year. He received his first license as an exhorter in 1829, from Rev. Richard Phelps. In February, 1830, he was married to Miss Sophia Dolson, of Raleigh, but the union did not continue long, as she died in February, 1832. In the following May he was employed as a Chairman's supply on the Ancaster circuit, where he remained only until the next Conference, when he was sent to London, which was virtually his first circuit. At the Conference of 1833 he was received on trial, and in 1837, having satisfactorily completed his probation he was admitted into full connexion and ordained. He was married a second time, in August 1837, to Miss Eleanor Morden, of Westminster, with whom he lived most happily until October, 1872, when she was removed to the better world.

Brother Williston was in the active work of the ministry thirty-three years, and was stationed on the following circuits: London, Nelson, Yonge Street, Westminster, St. Thomas, Howard, Gosfield, twice, Goderich, Thames, Malahide, Chippawa, Saugeen, twice; St. Clair, Strathroy, Walpole Island and Napier. He was superannuated in 1865 on account of physical weakness, and settled in Strathroy, where he made his home until his death. Here his third marriage took place, he being united in matrimony to Mrs. Martha Davison, of Strathroy, in October 1873, who died in May, 1889, a little more than two years previous to his own death. He had one child by his first wife, a son; and two by his second wife, a son and daughter; but only one survives, the daughter, who has been for years the noble and devoted wife of Rev. John Neelands.

Brother Williston had much in his favor as a minister of Christ. He was a man of attractive personal appearance, and was a preacher of more than ordinary ability. He possessed a clear, easy, natural method of presenting his thoughts; and so, without noticeable effort, held the undivided attention of his audiences. He loved the Bible; and, being deeply versed in its spiritual truths, his sermons were richly evangelical, and were therefore of great value to the people of God. His manner out of the pulpit was cheerful, simple, frank and winsome, thus enabling him to make numerous and warm friends wherever he was stationed. In Strathroy, where he spent so many years in retirement, he was respected, honored and beloved by the whole community. His years of superannuation were not by any means spent in idleness. He preached when his strength permitted, willingly and most acceptably in Strathroy and adjoining circuits, and wherever needed to supply a vacancy. Besides, he led a large class, and in every possible way labored for the Master, according to his ability. As he grew older he matured in spiritual knowledge and power. The passing years did not wither him into fruitlessness, but ripened him into a truer and more beautiful manhood. His character took on more and more the likeness of Christ, and his experience grew brighter as he neared the eternal light.

The Superintendents of Brother Williston ever found in him a true friend and one who stood by them and church enterprises with a loyal heart. The last two years of his life were spent with his daughter, Mrs. Neelands, in Watford, and were years of great suffering, which was borne with Christian resignation. His own written words will best exhibit his devout spirit at this time. "And now I am nearing the end I can say with Wesley, I, the chief of sinners am, but Jesus died for me.' I feel, indeed. He died for me, and that in His precious blood shed on C-lvary I can wash my spotted soul from sins of deepest dye." His last sermon, founded on 2 Timothy iv. 6, 7, 8, preached at Bethel Church, Brooke circuit, in great physical weakness, produced a deep and lasting impression on the congregation. The end came slowly. For weeks he seemed to be just skirting the eternal shore. His room during the time was to visitors like the border land of heaven. He was ever bright, cheerful, fond of conversing on religious topics, and delighted in prayer. With great fervency he would say, "I am nothing, have done nothing all my life to merit salvation; I can only trust in Jesus." He felt no fear of death. He said, "My work is done, my worldly business all settled, now I am ready," and often repeated these words, "I have no fear of dying; I long to get away." With a tone that thrilled all the room he exclaimed one day, "When I get free how I will fly to the arms of my Saviour." When conversing about divine things he often seemed lost in a rapture of delight. The end came in the early morning of August 27th, 1891. His last sentence was, "Sing myself away to everlasting bliss." While those around were singing "My Heavenly Home is Bright and Fair," he raised his hands heavenward, then they gradually fell. This was his last moment. The spirit seemed to be fluttering in the bodily prison, and a sorrowing friend asked, "Father, do you still feel Jesus precious?" "I do," came from his trembling lips, and he was gone, for God teok him.

"Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last."

The same day, about noon, after a short service conducted by Rev. A. G. Harris, in the house of Rev. J. Neelands, where he died, his remains were conveyed to Strathroy, his home for so many years. On Saturday, August 29th, a short funeral service was conducted at the house by Rev. B. Clement, President of the Conference, assisted by Rev. James Graham, of Strathroy, and others; and then he was borne to the Strathroy Cemetery, followed by a large number of sorrowing friends. Six of his ministerial brethren acted as pall-bearers. The following Sabbath a memorial service was held in the Front Street Methodist Church, Strathroy, when the Rev. James Graham preached an eloquent sermon from the words, "For me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." The church was appropriately draped, and completely filled. "On the next Sabbath evening a memorial service was held in the Watford Methodist Church, which was suitably draped, and filled with a sympathizing congregation. Rev. A. G. Harris, who was much with him during his last sickness, preached from Genesis xxv. 8: "Then Abraham gave up the Ghost, and died in a good old age, and full of years; and was gathered to his people."

### ANDREW MILLIKEN.

Andrew Milliken was born in Ireland, and emigrated to Canada West about 1850, and was converted during revival meetings held in Toronto by that eminent man of God, the late Rev. James Caughey. The conversion was evidently genuine, and immediately he threw himself into the work of soul-saving. He was received on trial in the Wesleyan Methodist Conference in 1866, and was ordained the next year for special purposes, and remained on his first field

for three years. In 1860, at the Conference held in Kingston, he was received into full connexion. He was a man of one work, giving himself wholly to it. God abundantly owned his labors, and many were converted through his instrumentality, who have risen to prominent positions in the Church and ministry. In camp-meetings and revivals our Brother Milliken was in his element. He delighted and excelled in prayer, and sometimes when so engaged he seemed oblivious to his surroundings. He was a good singer, and loved the songs of Zion; powerful and spiritual in exhortation, eminently charitable; a good man. For thirty years no difficulty was experienced in stationing so diligent and successful a worker in our Lord's vineyard. Increasing physical infirmities compelled his retirement from the active work in 1886. He faithfully attended the means of grace as long as he was able. At the closing session of the Conference of 1891, a telegram was received announcing to his brethren the intelligence of his removal from the work and trials of earth to the triumphs and rewards of heaven.

#### BENJAMIN LAWRENCE.

The subject of this memorial sketch was born in the county of Oxford, Ont., in the year 1810. When five years of age he lost his mother by death, and shortly after his father removed to the state of Ohio, where he resided till Benjamin was twenty-one years old. Then the latter returned to Canada and settled in the township of Burford. In the year 1833, he was married to Miss Jane Bennett, who survives, "in age and feebleness extreme," to mourn the separation and anticipate a speedy reunion in the better world above. Eight children, four sons and four daughters, were the fruit of this marriage. All the daughters and two of the sons have preceded the father to the home above, and now have sweet reunion in the mansions of the Divine Father's House. Two of the sons, Jamin, of Dresden, and Jonas C., of Florence, Ont., are active, intelligent and useful members of our Church. At twenty-four years of age, the subject of this obituary notice was converted to God under the joint ministry of Revs. B. Markle and B. Brown, on the old Beverley circuit, within the bounds of which he was then residing. He was soon after appointed classleader, and then local preacher. Nine months after being licensed as a local preacher, he was recommended to the travelling ministry of the late Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1841 he was appointed to the old London circuit, and labored subsequently on the following circuits and missions: Howard, London (a second time), Southwold, Canboro', Garafraxa, Orangeville, Georgetown, Thames, Newbury, Howard (a second time), Dover and Wallaceburg. On the last named charge he suffered from a severe attack of typhoid fever, from the effects of which he never recovered, and which rendered it necessary for him to effects of which he never recovered, and which rendered it necessary for him to take a superannuated relation in the year 1862. After this he took up his residence in the village of Newbury, in which he resided till the day of his lamented decease. Brother Lawrence was "a good man and full of the Holy Spirit." He was an earnest and useful preacher, a most sympathetic and faithful pastor; a very successful evangelist and revivalist. He was especially powerful in prayer and exhortation. Though so much of his time was spent in holding revival protracted services, yet he was remarkably diligent in visiting his flock and the people among whom he labored, especially the sick and the poor. In the earlier years of his ministry, his fields of labor were very large and extensive, and could be travelled only on horse-back, and sometimes only on foot. In prosecuting his work he suffered many hardships and great privations, and was exposed at times to perils in the wilderness. More than once he passed the whole night in the woods, without food or shelter, kept from slumber by the whole night in the woods, without food or shelter, kept from sunder by the discordant music of the howling wolves. But there were glorious compensations even then. Multitudes became seals of his ministry. The common people heard him gladly. They gladly shared with him their humble fare, and welcomed him under their rude but friendly roofs. Many useful Christians and

### WILLIAM JAMES LITTLE.

Our chastened sorrow is again mingled with the joy of Christian hope, as we are called upon once more to chronicle the departure of another brother beloved. Brother Little was born at Woodstock, but spent most of his youthful days in the town of Milton. While a boy he was brought under gracious Methodist influences and soundly converted to God. The genuineness of the change which he then experienced attested itself more and more as the currents of Divine influence and of holy associations bore him along. Visible in many ways, yet was this especially seen in his early delight in the Methodist class-meeting, and in his consecrated earnestness as a worker among the young. In his young manhood Divine Providence so ordered his lot that he crossed the ocean to England, and during his sojourn there of about two years, he was privileged to receive valuable academical instruction. On his return to Canada, by the voice of the Church, concurrently with the voice of the Holy Spirit in his own soul, he acknowledged and obeyed a divine call to the work of the Christian ministry. His ministerial probation was commenced at Stoney Creek, and subsequently he was stationed at Ancaster. Ridgetown, Cainsville, Pelee Island, Courtwright, Oil City, and London (Hamilton Road). His ordination and reception into full connexion took place at St. Catharines in 1883. It is not too much to say that as a preacher, Brother Little was gifted above the average. There was a manifest system and solidity in all he said and did. He carried himself everywhere and always with the view of a thoughtful and holy minister of Christ. As a pastor he was assiduous, tender and faithful. His fidelity to trust reposed in him was seen to the last, and particularly in his carrying on the work committed to him, while declining rapidly in health, until within five weeks of his translation. Some features of his last illness were of a painful character, though not long protracted. Before leaving the parsonage for the hospit-l, in anticipation of a surgical operation, he said, "I am being plucked here to be planted over yonder." He passed away on the 10th day of March, 1892, in the thirty-fifth year of his age, and the thirteenth of his ministry. His remains were interred at Milton, where the funeral services were conducted by Rev. George Boyd, Chairman of the London District, assisted by Rev. J. Our dear brother has left behind a devoted wife and precious child, for whose welfare we bespeak the earnest prayers of all. Brother Little was held in high esteem by all who knew him, and especially by the brethren in the ministry, as was most feelingly testified at the memorial service which was held in the Hamilton Road Church. This comparatively early termination of a career as hopeful and so full of promise, voices to each of us yet once again the admonition of our Lord Jesus, "Be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh."

#### CHURCH PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

#### REPORT No. 1.

The Church Property Committee met at the call of the convener, and on motion Rev. W. Hayhurst was elected Chairman, and Rev. W. H. Butt, Secretary. It was recommended:

1. That the trustees of the lot on which Bethel church stood, Sylvan

circuit, have permission to sell.

2. That permission be given to sell Providence church, Port Stanley

circuit, and apply proceeds toward Dexter church.

3. That permission be given to sell the old church property in Amherstburg, viz., the church, the lot on which it stands, and the lot on which the old parsonage stands, and the old parsonage, proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of the town's proportion of the new parsonage dett, the balance, if any, to be applied to the new church debt.

4. That permission be given to sell the old church property, Malden, Amherstburg circuit, viz., lot, church, contents and shed, proceeds to be

applied toward the new church now in course of erection.

5. That permission be given to sell Bloomfield church and shed, near Chatham, and that proceeds be applied toward the erection of a new parsonage in connection with the Victoria Avenue church, Chatham.

6. That in the opinion of this Committee, Conference should discourage the incurring of debts, by any parties whatever, for church purposes, without due regard to the requirements of the Church Discipline in reference thereto.

Resolved,—That we hereby approve of the ten resolutions adopted by the Provincial Prison Reform Conference held in Toronto on November 27th, 1891; that the same be commended to the favorable consideration of our legislators, both Dominion and Provincial, and that a copy of this resolution, signed by the President and Secretary of the Conference, be sent to the Corresponding Secretary of the Prisoners' Aid Association, to be forwarded to the Hon. Sir J. S. D. Thompson, Minister of Justice, and to the Hon. Sir Oliver Mowat, Attorney-General for the Province of Ontario.

3. Respecting the financial difficulties of the trustees of the St. Lawrence Central Camp-ground, we recommend the Conference to call the attention of each Superintendent of a circuit to the gravity of the situation, and the importance of making an earnest effort to relieve the oppressed trustees; that each Superintendent be left free to use his own judgment as to the course he will pursue to aid the cause, and that the result be reported to the Financial Secretary at the next Financial District Meeting.

#### COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee, with feelings of deep gratitude to the Giver of all Grace, who maketh manifest the savour of his knowledge by us in every place, beg leave to report:—

1. That the labors of God's servants on the various fields of toil, in pulpit and pastoral departments, have been abundantly blessed of God, and this, with a hearty co-operation of a consecrated laity, has brought

and this, with a hearty co-operation of a consecrated laity, has brought forth precious and, we trust, abiding fruit.

2. While we would like to report a larger increase in the membership of the Church, we must not forget that while we report only a net increase

of the Church, we must not forget that while we report only a net increase of 237, an indication of the Divine manifestation is better seen in the fact that 1,790 have been received on trial.

3. We think that more care should be taken by our ministers in the reception of members on trial and into full connection, and that the form in our Discipline should be adhered to.

4. We would urge upon the attention of our people the subject of family religion, as we fear sometimes that so many meetings deprive our young people of engaging in home duties which will develop into a strong, robust, Christian character, which can only be secured by study, meditation and prayer.

5. We are glad to note the increased interest that is taken at the present time in gathering in the young people into our Church, but we would earnestly urge our ministers and people to try to bridge over the chasm that seems to exist between the weekly meetings of the older and younger members of the Church, and we believe that in all our churches we need the blending of the two in order to give help and strength to the weak

6. We are grateful for the improved character and wider circulation of our Church and Sunday School periodicals. These exert a stimulating and

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ulation of ating and protective influence in the homes and communities where they circulate, but there are still many which they do not reach, and meanwhile there is serious cause for alarm in the extent to which pernicious, sensational fiction, and works of sceptical philosophy, and science falsely so called, are being read. It ought to be our endeavor to purify our homes from this insidious moral poison, and to fill its place with such instructive reading as will be suitable to youthful tastes and needs. And mostly our own periodicals, and the literature supplied by our own publishing house, offer the needful antidote; and we need to keep these in every family to per petuate the attachment of our young people to the Church and faith of the fathers.

7. We look with disfavor on what seems to us the growing tendency among our people to depend upon special agencies, other than the ordinary, for revival work; and while we rejoice over the success that has attended the efforts of evangelistic workers, we urge upon the members of our Church the importance of holding up the hands of their pastors, and taking hold with them in the work of winning souls for the Master.

8. We would recommend the importance of arranging on our Districts for the holding of Leaders' Conventions, to discuss the need of the classmeeting, and if possible, arouse a deeper interest in the attendance; also that in all our churches, as far as possible, arrangements be made for separate rooms for the holding of class-meetings.

9. We would record with profound thankfulness the success that has attended the efforts of the Women's Missionary Society, and would earnestly recommend it to the favorable consideration and support of the

#### TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee desire to express thanks to God for the success of the Temperance work throughout this and other lands, and for what we believe to be a growing sentiment in behalf of Prohibition in the Dominion of Canada. The Methodist Church would be recreant to the trust reposed in her if this question were not a prominent factor in her work.

Your Committee beg to submit to the Conference for its adoption the

following :-

1. The adoption in all our municipalities of the local option legislation now available in this Province, by which the liquor traffic may be outlawed within their territorial limits.

When it is deemed impracticable to submit the local option law, that our people be urged to do all in their power to see that the law now in force be carried out.

3. We hope our people will recognize the law recently enacted regarding the sale of tobacco and cigars to minors, and we think our ministers should bring the matter prominently before our congregations.

4. Your Committee recommend the selection of Prohibition candidates for parliamentary and municipal honors. We strongly deprecate the weakness manifested by many of our Church members and Temperance

organizations in their failure to nominate and support men at the polls known to be true to the interests of this cause.

We very heartily recognize the services rendered to the cause of Temperance by our connexional papers, and we believe that even increased

attention would be acceptable to our people.

6. We think it would also serve a good purpose if the Conference Temperance meeting were to be held on an evening when the laymen from the various Circuits would be present, rather than before the Conference sessions begin. We would also suggest that a collection be taken at the meeting in behalf of Temperance work.

7. We believe the country is ripe for Prohibition, and would recommend that the Conference hereby respectfully renew its demand upon our representatives in the parliaments of the Province and Dominion for a total prohibitory liquor law, and express its conviction that the Temperance electorate would loyally sustain the Government or party that would enact and righteously enforce such a law.

8. Your Committee further request that this Conference appoint four delegates to attend the meeting of the Dominion Alliance, which will be held in Montreal in September next, and that Rev. T. R. McNair, Rev. Geo. Boyd, T. McCormick, Esq., and T. Hayne, Esq., be the said delegation.

9. That Rev. C. T. Scott, B.A., be the Treasurer of funds devoted to Temperance work.

10. We also recommend that each minister be requested to read the Report of the Temperance Committee to their congregations.

#### SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

It is with great satisfaction that your Committee note the advanced state of public opinion in our Province with respect to the Sabbath, and the growing interest that is being taken in its proper observance. On all sides, Churches, Associations, Conventions, Synods and Assemblies, are pronouncing upon its value and sacredness, and are insisting upon its strict observance as essential to the temporal and spiritual well-being of our country. As a result, our Sabbath in Ontario is among the best, if not the best, observed in the world, and we feel assured that, if we do not prove recreant to our privileges, but hallow the Sabbath and make it a delight, the Lord our God will still bless us as a people.

But though we speak thus we would not hide from ourselves the fact that there is yet much Sabbath descration in our country, and, rejoicing as we do in the blessedness of rest, we desire to honor God by delivering our protest against every form of Sabbath descration, and to let the world know that we intend to do all we can, as a united body, in harmony with other branches of the Christian Church, to keep the Sabbath law in its purity.

We are utterly opposed as a Church to the course pursued by any railway company in the unnecessary conveyance of freight, the running of regular passenger trains from intermediate stations, and especially the running of what are termed excursion trains, on the Lord's day. action shoul principles is secure this obtain the e throughout operative to to divine en nations of t in His sight Your Cor

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ny railning of lly the Your Committee are of the opinion that not only religious but legislative action should be taken to secure the observance of the Sabbath, on the principles laid down in the only rule of action—God's word; and to secure this we desire to record our determination to do our utmost to obtain the enactment of such laws, and the provision for their enforcement throughout the Dominion of Canada as will render such laws successfully operative to raise the national sense of rectitude to a standard of obedience to divine enactments as will cause Canada to be respected among the nations of the earth, as a nation fearing God and working righteousness in His sight.

Your Committee would suggest the propriety of this Conference requesting each minister to make frequent reference during the year to the great evil to the individual and to the nation of Sabbath desecration; warning the congregations against the sinfulness of unnecessary labor, and also pointing out the many forms of Sabbath breaking, so popular as to be likely to be overlooked unless attention be called to them; such as driving for pleasure, Sunday visiting, secular conversation in the home circle on the Sabbath day; for instance, making business arrangements at the church door after service, making purely worldly announcements from the pulpit, or such as do not tend to the glory of God, neglect of reading and meditating on the Scriptures on God's day, and substituting some periodical or paper; attending to dress more than to devotion, neglecting the sanctuary and the fellowship of Church communion, making the Sabbath a day of feasting, and, by idleness as well as by overwork, desecrating and dishonoring the day the Lord God Almighty blessed.

Your Committee would also suggest the propriety of the Conference passing a special resolution, urging our Dominion and Provincial Governments to use every legitimate and proper effort to secure the closing of the Canadian department of the World's Fair on the Sabbath day, and to forward a copy of the same to the proper authorities in connection with

these respective Governments.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee hope the decrease in so many particulars is due to the imperfections of the individual reports, and not to any real want of efficiency in our school work.

The periodicals published by our Book Room are not sufficiently patronized. Probably because some other publishing houses advertise their papers, etc., as being very cheap, and thereby deceive our people. We venture to assert that when the quality of the matter contained in our publications, and their typography, are taken into account, cheaper papers are not published on the continent.

Temperance work, as indicated by the numbers reported as having signed the total abstinence pledge, is not pressed energetically. We most strongly urge increased efforts in this particular.

With gratitude we notice the marked increase in the missionary and other contributions of our schools.

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Looking to the better equipment of our schools, your Committee would urge the introduction of normal classes wherever practicable. The best talent in our Church should be in our Sunday Schools, and constant effort. should be made to lead all the children to a personal enjoyment of salvation. More efficiency, we think, could be secured if greater care were exercised in securing proper class-room accommodation.

We would strongly urge our ministers and Sunday School Superintendents to pay greater attention to the introduction and maintenance of the

study of our Catechisms in all our schools. Your Committee would recommend the reading of this report in all our

churches in connection with the Pastoral address.

#### COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO CONSIDER THE REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE TREASURER OF THE SUPER-ANNUATION FUND.

Your Committee met according to announcement, and elected Rev. Wm. Hayhurst Chairman, and Rev. J. Philp, B.D., Secretary. After careful consideration of the various deficiencies reported, the following recommendations and resolutions were adopted:—

1. That the unpaid deficiencies of last year (1891), be recommitted to the Districts and Circuits concerned, with the hope that the brethren will

be able to arrange for early payment.

2. That the amount of the deficiency for the London District be paid into the hands of the Conference Treasurer, to the credit of Dundas Centre Circuit. It is also recommended that in the readjustment of appropriations respect be paid only to such cases as are exceptional.

3. That whereas the brethren representing the deficient Circuits on the Exeter District have failed to appear before the Committee, their cases are referred to the Conference for consideration.

4. That the case of South Dawn, on the Chatham District, be considered exceptional, and that no action be recommended.

5. That whereas Rev. M. Griffin has forwarded the balance of the original assessment of the Thamesville Circuit, he be not held responsible for the balance of the reported deficit.

6. That whereas Wyoming, Oil Springs and Dawn balances have been

secured, no further action be deemed necessary.

7. That a farther effort be made by the pastor of the Brigden Circuit to secure the amount yet due from that field.

8. That we regret very much the fact that the Corunna Circuit has failed to pay their appropriation to the Superannuation Fund, and we would most earnestly urge upon the officials and members of the Circuit the desirability of co-operating with their minister in raising the amount of their deficiency.

9. That the names of probationers be placed in the Minutes according to their standing when they have paid the amounts due to the Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

10. That the Treasurer's Report include all amounts paid up to the time of the presentation of this report.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

The Annual Meeting of the Board of Examiners of the London Conference was held in the Methodist Church, Ridgetown, on the 20th and 21st days of April, 1892.

Seven men wrote on the Course of Study for probationers, five wrote on the Preliminary Course of Study, and one wrote on the Preliminary and First Year's Course.

Two candidates presented Second Class Certificates from the Provincial Educational Department, which were accepted by the Board in lieu of the English branches in the Preliminary Course covered by them.

One candidate (Samuel McVitty,) presented a statement from the Belfast District of the Irish Conference, signed Wesley Guard, Secretary, showing that he had successfully passed his examination on the Preliminary Course for the Ministry in that Conference, taking a standing of 58,7 per cent. on the written, and 90 per cent. on the oral examination. The Board accepted this examination in lieu of an examination on our Preliminary Course.

Two candidates failed to reach the required standard. One candidate completed the Preliminary Course, taking a Second Class Certificate, and two deferred their examination in Greek, receiving records of standing on the remainder of the Course equal to a Second Class Certificate.

Three men completed the Course for probationers in their respective years, taking—one a Third Class, and two Second Class Certificates. Four probationers deferred their examination in Greek, taking a record of standing on the remainder of the Course equal two Third Class and two Second Class Certificates.

One probationer (T. H. Down) took part of his examination from the Board, and the remainder from Victoria College.

The Board recommend that the request of Dr. Pascoe, to be relieved

from further work on the Examining Board, be granted. A very interesting public meeting was held on the evening of Thursday, April 21st, at which the President of the Conference presided. Appropriate addresses were delivered by Revs. Wm. Quance and J. W.

Annis, M.A., and certificates were presented to the successful candidates. It was resolved that the Board meet next year in Queen's Avenue Church, London.

#### THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

## OF THE LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

Beloved Brethren,—While "giving all diligence to write unto you of our common salvation," we are "constrained to write unto you exhorting you to contend earnestly" for the services of the sanctuary as well as "for the faith which was once for all delivered unto the saints." We have found a tendency among our people to neglect a means of grace that has proven itself to be the life and glory of Methodism. We refer to the class-meeting. We cannot abandon this means and retain our strength.

We may have Methodists, but not Methodism without it.

1st. We need the class-meeting as an enquiry meeting. In this Methodism originated. In the latter part of 1739 eight or ten persons, who appeared to be deeply convicted of sin and earnestly groaning for redemption, came to Mr. Wesley in London. They desired that he would pray with them and show them how to flee from the wrath to come. That he might better compass the work, he appointed a day when all might come together. To those who came he gave such advice as he deemed most needful for them, and prayed with them according to their several necessities. This was the rise of the United Societies. An enquiry meeting pure and simple. Methodism is, or ought to be, a continued revival. We "have nothing to do but to save souls." In our efforts to lead men to a better life we must have this enquiry meeting so that an anxious soul desiring to flee from the wrath to come may know where he can obtain the word of exhortation, and find friends who will watch over him in love, and assist him in working out his salvation. If we neglect it many a precious soul

"Not far from the goal
Will wander away into darkness and hate.
And miss it forever—the pearly gate."

2nd. We need the class-meeting as a source of strength to young Christians. Paul had his eye on such a means of grace as this when he wrote: "Warn them that are unruly, comfort the feeble minded, support the weak, be patient toward all." The North British Review has said: "The class-meeting is at present a great means of strengthening and holding the convert, and a great support and comfort to a large class of minds." A Congregational minister in Massachusetts, discouraged with the lack of spiritual life and vigor among the new converts of his church, asked his Methodist brother minister how he succeeded so well. The Methodist minister referred to the class-meeting and explained its working. The Congregational pastor replied: "Such a meeting must have a most bene-

ficial influence both on old Christians and young converts. It is just what we need." We know this, brethren, that the young converts who

regularly attend the class-meeting never decline.

3rd. The class-meeting is necessary for the communion of saints. believe in the communion of saints if we belong to their company. "No man liveth unto himself, and no man dieth unto himself." God meant for nothing to be isolated. His ultimate atoms stay not alone. His trees grow in forests. His fish go in schools. His birds fly in flocks and His animals are largely gregarious. Humanity naturally coalesces. We bear the likeness of the divine disposition to communion. Shortly after John Wesley's conversion he became so anxious for the fellowship of experienced Christians that he journeyed to Germany to associate and fellowship with the followers of Count Zinzendorf. He could not live a spiritual recluse. The same desire led Dr. Chalmers to form a very close spiritual intimacy with Mr. J. Anderson. After enjoying his fellowship for a time he advocated such communion with the zeal of a Christian and the skill of a philosopher. We all have grateful memories of the consolations and inspirations that have come to us in the class-meeting, and to such communion of saints did Paul refer when writing: "Not forsaking the assembling of yourselves together as the manner of some is, but exhorting one another, and so much the more as ye see the day approaching."

4th. We need it as a school from which shall go out workers seeking the souls of men. It has been the nursery of Methodist revival power,

and from live class-meetings go our people exclaiming:

"The love of Christ doth me constrain To seek the wandering souls of men."

The Presbyterian Banner has said: "In the system of Methodist agencies for aggressive work the class-meeting undoubtedly stands next in importance to itinerant preaching of the gospel." Bishop Simpson said that "Methodism would not have accomplished one-tenth as much with-

out it as it has accomplished."

5th. It has developed a noble class of workers, "men of whom the world was not worthy." The celebrated Moses Stuart once accompanied a friend to a class-meeting. The leader was a plain man, but well qualified for his office He led his class as usual and had a word for the Doctor as well as for others. On being informed who the leader was, he was astonished that a man in such humble circumstances was so mighty in the Scripture, and so facile in dealing with the cases of conscience brought before him. He exclaimed: "Now I know why your people are generally so much more experienced in the things of God and more zealous than other Christians. The secret is found in the class-meeting." Where but in this means of grace are manifested and developed the gifts and graces of our local preachers, candidates for the ministry and ordained ministers and missionaries as well. Doubtless most of them must say what Dr. Adam Clarke once said: "Had it not been for the class-meetings, under God, I fear that I should never have been a Christian; and I am sure that I should never have been a preacher."

6th. We need the class-meeting to enable our ministers to become acquainted with the spiritual condition and needs of our people. Charles

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H. Spurgeon has left this testimony: "We, as Baptists, have a missing link. The people come and hear me and so get my thoughts, but I have no means of getting theirs. This missing link," said he, "is found in Meth-

odism. It is the class-meeting."

7th. We need the class-meeting for the necessary oversight of our people. With the many duties and changes of the Methodist minister it is impossible for him to give the needful watch-care. We must have sub-pastors who will watch over as many as may be placed under their care, and who will report from time to time special cases for the attention and assistance of the pastor.

8th. It is eminently Scriptural in its origin and purpose. Does the psalmist speak of the general assembly or "great congregation" where he preached righteousness? He also refers to the gatherings of the faithful, the assembly or congregation of the saints. To such meetings for religious

fellowship we find frequent allusions in apostolic times.

Does the class-meeting lead to self-examination? "Examine yourselves that ye be in the faith." "Look to yourselves that we lose not the things that we have wrought," Does the class-meeting encourage confession? Listen: "Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another that ye may be healed." Is relation of experience a part of the exercises? "Come and hear, all ye that fear God, and I will declare unto you what He hath done for my soul." Is the class for comfort and editication? "Wherefore comfort yourselves together and edify one another, even as also ye do." "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom, teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs." Is it for the fellowship of the saints? "Then they that feared the Lord spake often one to another; and the Lord hearkened and heard it." Does it establish a sympathy between the members? "And whether one member suffer, all the members suffer with it." Does it encourage and furnish unto good works? "This is a faithful saying, and these things I will that thou affirm constantly, that they which have believed in God might be careful to maintain good works. These things are good and profitable unto men."

The class-meeting is indeed the "germ cell" of the Church, "the living nerve," the strength of Methodism. It is the duty of us all to say, with the Ecumenical Council of 1891, "Let us revive and maintain the class-meeting, and rest not till all attend it with all practicable regularity."

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# FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF TREASURERS OF CONNEXIONAL FUNDS.

#### SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the General Treasurers for the Year ending July 31st, 1891, as adopted by the Board.

We beg herewith to submit the Annual Statement of the Superannuation Fund:

The affairs of the Fund occupied the earnest consideration of the General Conference, which body appointed a commission, consisting of ministers and laymen, representing different shades of opinion, to take the whole question into consideration, and report to the next General Conference.

The commission has met, and appointed sub-committees to collect information from a great variety of sources, and present it in tabulated form. Important beneficial results may be expected from the thorough and impartial examination of the whole question.

The amount raised from Circuits has exceeded that of the previous year by \$1,862.04. It is, however, just to state that a small portion of this increase arises from back payments on account of former years. The Interest Account is also in advance of the former year, \$1,249.37, and the Book Room has added \$200 to the grant of the preceding year, making the yearly grant now \$6,500.

We have received in legacies this year \$6,437.25, which sum embraces the half of the legacy of the late William Gooderham. There appears to be a praiseworthy disposition on the part of our people to remember this Fund in the final distribution of their property.

We are, however, still under the necessity of expressing our regret that there are a few Circuits that have failed to pay their apportionments in full, to the great embarrassment of the ministers laboring on them, and to the great injury of the Church. The aggregate amount is not comparatively very large, but the example is bad and it is not just to those Conferences and Circuits that are loyal to the laws of the Church.

The new claims this year are exceptionally large, and amount to \$9,630, while expired claims are only \$5,848, leaving a balance of \$3,782, less \$382, being the difference between the debt of the last year and the present one, or \$3,400 to be provided for, the entire claims for the year being \$87,084. The estimated income of the Fund will be about \$85,334, so far as we can at present ascertain. The Treasurers did not, however, feel at liberty to increase the percentage on the assessable income.

#### REPORT OF VICTORIA COLLEGE, COBOURG.

SYNOPSIS OF THE ANNUAL REPORTS OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

Students-In Arts, 192; in Theology, Cobourg, 79; in Theology, Albert, 32; Medicine, 40; Law, 9; total, deducting double enrolment, 292.

#### Graduates.

B.A., 24; B.Sc., 5; B.D., 5; M.A., 6; M.D., 42; C.M., 1; D.D., 2; LL.D., 10; total, 95.

Since the University charter was granted, 642 B.A. degrees have been conferred; 599 of these graduates are still living. About 1,100 havematriculated in Arts during that time.

#### PRESENT EQUIPMENT AND OUTLOOK.

Building free from debt, costing, with furniture, about \$220,000; Endowment secured, \$250,000. Staff-Professors in Arts, 8; Professors. in Theology, 3; University Professors, 13; total staff available for the work of the new Victoria, 24. Library, about 6,000 volumes. University library, 25,000 volumes.

It is hoped that for the students of Victoria, at least one hundred and fifty weekly lectures will be available in Arts, and fifty in Theology.

#### Income and Expenditure.

Total income, 1891-92, \$22,921.19; current expenditure, \$23,383.71; deficit, \$462.52.

Special Additional Expenditures.

Faraday Hall, refund and costs, \$20,011.40; Interest on old debt, \$5,503.16.

#### ALBERT COLLEGE.

To the London Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN, -The present College year, 1891-92, has been, under the blessing of God, one of prosperity and advancementin connection with Albert College. 220 students have enrolled during the year. We are again able to report an increase in attendance upon that of any preceding year. There has been a steady growth from 125students in 1885-86 to 220 in 1891-92, so that in seven years the attendance has been nearly doubled. In that time the College building has been considerably enlarged, and yet there is an almost imperative need for largely increased accommodation. The College still maintains the highest efficiency in its class work. The large number of successful candidates in Departmental and University examinations is a source of great satisfaction to the Principal and Faculty.

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There are 43 matriculants in preparation-25 seniors and 18 juniors. A large number of young men, who passed Junior Matriculation at a High School or Collegiate Institute, have come to "Albert" for their first year's work in Arts, in preference to going to the University.

Surely no higher compliment could be paid to the thoroughness and efficiency of the work done. It is becoming more widely known that Albert College offers unequalled advantages for Conference preliminary students, and every year finds a large class in attendance for that work. Over 20 persons wrote at the College this examination in April last.

Special classes are formed in theology, and every attention is given to Conference students. The College also offers very superior advantages in Elocution at a very moderate cost, so that students contemplating the

ministry are afforded every possible help.

It is the desire of the Principal that attention should be called to the fact that Albert College can and does compete successfully with the best equipped Collegiate Institute in the preparation of candidates for the Primary and Junior Leaving Examinations, or for what was known as Second and Third Class Teachers' Certificates.

The College sends up annually a number of candidates for these examinations, and has been successful in passing an exceptionally large percentage of its candidates. When parents must send their children from home for this work, by all means send them to Albert College.

Many of our Methodist people pass by their own institution and send their sons for a business education to ordinary commercial colleges. The consequence is they pay more to get a vastly inferior business education than though they sent them to their own denominational schools. Albert College affords every facility for a thorough, practical business education that the best equipped commercial college does, and besides offers the very best opportunity to secure a solid English education. Many of the graduates of Albert College are filling lucrative positions as accountants.

The Departments of Music and Fine Arts are doing excellent work, and no effort will be spared to make them thoroughly efficient.

The College has always been foremost in the missionary zeal of its stu-

dents.

Mr. F. J. Livingstone, whom the students purpose sending as a missionary to Africa, has recently graduated as B.A. at Victoria University. He purposes spending a couple of years in the study of medicine, when the students hope to have one of their own number in the foreign field. The students have already raised over \$700 and are busily engaged in raising funds for that purpose.

We gladly recognize the practical aid given to Albert College, by both the ministry and laity of the Church, and to this a large measure of the

success of the College may be attributed.

We render thanksgiving to God for the great prosperity he has vouchsafed to us in our work, and we earnestly labor and pray that Albert College may not only be a high-class academy but may be the spiritual birth-place of many souls. We earnestly covet the students for Christ.

We still ask for your hearty co-operation.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—We ask for a few minutes of your attention, because we believe that a Methodist Conference will always be interested in the institutions planted by the zeal and devotion of the men who have handed down to us the Methodism that we have, and whose intelligence, patriotism and Christian fidelity have done so much in shaping

the civilization of our fair Dominion.

Thirty-two years ago the Wesleyan Ladies' College of Hamilton was founded through the efforts of Drs. Ryerson, Rice, Wood, Douglas, Nelles, Stinson and Rose; and of those princely laymen, Edward Jackson, Dennis Moore, Edward Gurney, A. McCallum and others. Canadian Methodism has produced no names more historic than these. Of the original ministerial brethren but one remains—the old man eloquent—when he speaks, the country listens; may he long be spared to the Church and the country. The College still carries the old name "Wesleyan," almost if not altogether the only institution in Ontario that bears that name. It is still doing the work for which it was established, and in its equipment and instruction, both in quantity and quality, it is fully abreast of the most advanced requirement of the times. No institution in the land has a grander record. In its halls have been educated thousands of young ladies. Its graduates, exclusive of those in Music and Art, number more than The curriculum for graduation is an excellent outline of a liberal We have no hesitation in saying that a lady who graduates, taking also the Music and Art usually taken by our graduates, is better prepared to direct and adorn our homes and society than one who has secured even the University B.A., without those refining studies. Pupils may either take our regular course or pursue a course selected by themselves or their parents, and, if they cannot afford the time for graduation, even a year spent amid the influences of the old "Wesleyan" would be of incalculable value all through life. The College points with pride to the fact that no accident or mishap of any kind has ever befallen any pupil while in attendance. Over 140 pupils have registered this year. The

graduating class is a large one.

The work in the College is all conducted on Christian lines, but thoroughly non-sectarian. Our teaching force are fellow-workers with this Conference, and all similar bodies. No lady can graduate without an intelligent idea of Biblical History. Christian evidences are very fully

presented and studied

That the College is kept fully abreast of the times may be inferred from the fact that four members of our large Faculty have University diplomas, and three of them are honor men. All the examination papers of our

College course are prepared and valued by University men.

The Conservatory of Music has, as Director, Mr. C. L. M. Harris, Mus. Bac, a Bachelor of Music, who, at his University examinations stood in the first rank. He is a most successful teacher. #### REPORT OF ALMA COLLEGE.

To the Members of London Conference of the Methodist Church.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN, -We are glad to report another year of prosperous school work in Alma College. Through a benign Providence the health of students and teachers has been preserved, and a year of earnest toil has been crowned with success. We are glad to announce increased attendance-growth being manifest in nearly every department; also a satisfactory discipline in the school, and an earnest devotion to study on the part of students generally. The religious interests of the school are conserved by several weekly prayer services, Bible classes, and by monthly Missionary meetings. A flourishing Y. W. C. Association is doing good work. The majority of students attend the voluntary religious services, and most of the Methodist students attend class meetings regularly.

The enrolment has reached 195 and the general average of attendance has been the best in the history of the school. The various denominations continue to patronise the College, the Methodist Church furnishing about one-half the total enrolment. The students were enrolled in departments as follows: Literary courses, 121; Piano courses, 125; Fine Art, 60: Elocution, 50; Commercial, 25. 27 students from the United States were enrolled, representing New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Illinois, Montana, Mississippi and Ohio. Manitoba, the N.-W. Territories and British

Columbia were also represented in the list of students.

The graduating class numbers 15, and is one well fitted to reflect honor on the institution. Two complete this year the full Literary course, five the Piano course, five the Fine Art course, and one the Commercial.

The success of our graduates in obtaining high collegiate appointments on leaving us is very gratifying to the College. During the past year, three graduates of Alma College have been elected to high and lucrative

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collegiate positions, including a professorship in music in the State Normal School, Montgomery, Ala. The Board management have had in earnest consideration for some time the relief of the College from its present encumbrance of debt. The Federation scheme, however, has delayed with our concurrence an appeal to the Church up to the present. We are glad to report that joint counsel has been taken by the College authorities and the Rev. Dr. Potts, Secretary of Education, and negotations have passed between the College authorities and the Conference Special Committee, with a view to opening the territory of the Western Conferences to an appeal for the removal of the debt upon Alma College, as soon as the canvass for Federation shall have been completed.

In view of the importance and pressing nature of this work, we beg to ask for the appointment of a special Conference Committee to consider and report upon the best plan of action in the case. We hope for the most active sympathy and co-operation in the appeal about to be made. Alma College has done good work during the eleven years of her history though impeded by debt. Liberated from debt the institution will be able to render grander service to Church and country.

You will be glad to learn that an appeal to St. Thomas this last winter, in behalf of the Relief Fund has reached nearly \$4,000, although but a

part of the city has been canvassed.

We beg to thank the Conference for the appointments heretofore made of representatives on the Board of Management, and ask for the election of a representative for the present Conference year.

#### REPORT OF THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE.

We, the Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, take plea-

sure in presenting our Eighteenth Annual Report.

We are gratified to be able to state that the past Collegiate year has been one of marked success, not only in the increasing number of students in daily attendance, but in the very successful educational work accomplished.

For some years a large degree of success has been achieved in the ordinary departments of college work, and in preparing candidates for Third and Second Class Teachers' Certificates, also University matriculation. Last year three students passed very creditably the First Class Teachers' Examination, and two graduates entered Victoria University at the Junior Year. In the recently published class lists, one of them took first-class honors in five subjects, and second-class honors in one, practically standing at the head of the University class; the other was almost equally successful in winning distinction.

It is our intention to carry our graduates through the work of the Freshman and Sophomore years of any Canadian University, and in two or three years to provide for a full University course with honors, at least in Modern Languages. It will then be the privilege of all aspiring students attending our College to enjoy high scholastic advantages coupled with the most desirable social and religious influences. Many a university graduate has felt the want of just such excellent social culture and home training as the College can so readily impart.

The staff in the Literary Department has been materially strengthened by the engagement of W. J. Greenwood, Esq., B.A., Prince of Wales Gold Medallist of Victoria University, and a teacher of several years' experience, thereby giving us five university graduates, all No. 1 specialists, besides others holding First Class Provincial Certificates.

The efficiency of our Musical Department has been shown not only in examinations upon the Theory of Music, but in high-class concerts given in the city of Toronto and elsewhere, before the most critical audiences. The reports of the daily papers have been highly commendatory.

Our Fine Art Department under the direction of the ablest Canadian artist, is unsurpassed in any similar institution.

The Election and Commercial Departments stand in the same high

rank of efficiency.

The magnificent buildings and equipment now possessed by the College are inadequate to its present purposes and requirements, and it is intended to erect additional buildings, and thereby extend its sphere of activity and usefulness.

We commend our project to the favorable consideration of all friends of the higher education of women.

We desire to return thanks to the members of the Conference for continued confidence and support, and promise to do all in our power to prove worthy of them.

The Conference Sunday School and Epworth League Anniversary was held in the St. George Street Church, on the evening of Wednesday, June 1st, commencing at 8 o'clock, Rev. B. Clement, President, in the chair. The Methodist Sunday Schools of the city were present and occupied the centre pews of the church. The singing was led by the choir. After the usual opening exercises, suitable addresses were delivered by Revs. E. E. Scott and G. W. Henderson.

#### MISSIONARY.

The Conference Missionary Anniversary was held in the First Methodist Church on Thursday evening, June 2nd, the President, Rev. J. G. Scott, in the chair. Admirable and appropriate addresses were delivered to a large and appreciative audience by Rev. R. Millyard, T. Hayne, Esq., and Rev. Wm. Quance.

#### RECEPTION SERVICE.

A special session of the Conference was held on Friday evening, June 3rd, for the purpose of receiving into full connexion the young men who had successfully completed their probation. The Conference assembled at 8 o'clock p.m., the President in the chair. After singing, Rev. Dr. Sanderson led in prayer. The Secretary read the names of those who had been duly recommended to be received into full connexion and ordained, as follows: John Morrison, Daniel Edward Martin, Charles Prest Wells, B.A., Thomas Henry Down. The candidates gave brief statements concerning their conversion and call to ministry. It was moved by Rev. C. E. McIntyre, seconded by Rev. B. Clement, and

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
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
