YOUNG MAN WAS FATALLY HURT

**Adelore Normand Instantly Killed at
Guimond's Mill Tuesday
Evening.**

ANOTHER MAN INJURED

A sad fatality took place at Guimond's mill about seventeen miles from Campbellton Tuesday evening, whereby Adelore Normand lost his life and a companion was slightly injured.

Tuesday evening, after the day's work in the mill was done Normand and a helper were making some repairs to a belt. In putting it on Normand was caught in a revolving shaft and before the machinery could be stopped his life was crushed out. Almost every particle of clothing was torn from his body. His back was

broken and several other terrible injuries inflicted, so that death is believed to have been almost instantaneous. The accident occurred so suddenly that a man named Guimond, standing near, was struck by the heels of Normand, as he was being revolved around with the shafting. Normand's remains were brought to town and after being prepared for burial by Undertaker Graham, were forwarded to his home at L'Esperance, Quebec.

ST ANDREW'S CHURCH
HAS NARROW ESCAPE
Fire Discovered in Building
Last Evening at Five
O'clock.
LITTLE DAMAGE

At about five o'clock last evening an alarm of fire was sounded for a brick blaze in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. The fire was extinguished with comparatively little damage to the building.

Driver McKee of the Fire Department notified a spark issuing from the building and sounded the alarm, and very promptly the fire company and three streams into the building. The fire was all in the roof, having evidently caught on the outside, and fanned by a brisk north west wind burned through and caught on the inside. It was burning quite lively when the first fireman arrived at the spot, but soon was subdued.

In fighting this fire the controllable nozzles were used and showed up in the style. After the fire was under control the water was turned off and only played on the fire where it could do the most good. Most of the damage is from water. The fire pipe organ is undamaged. It was covered with canvas to protect it from moisture. The loss is fully covered by insurance.

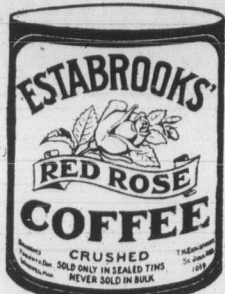

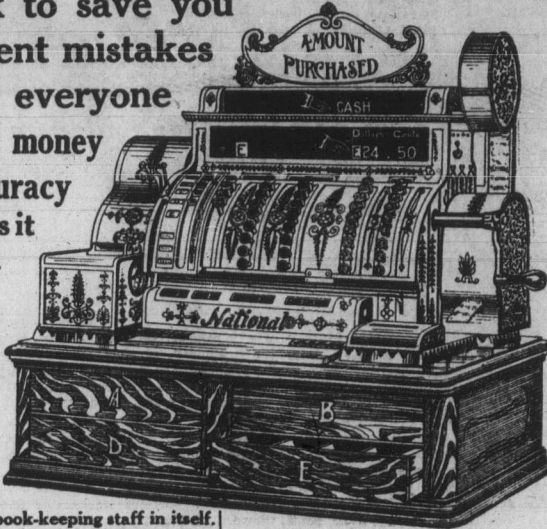

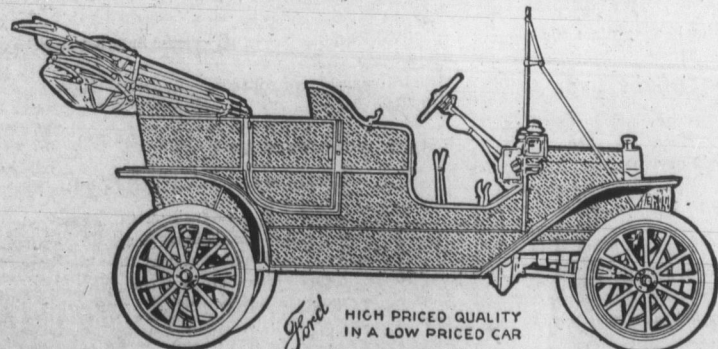

COUNCIL ORGANIZATION

The striking of the standing committee of the Town Council at its first meeting shows that special care was given to the selection of members for each committee, taking into consideration their knowledge of the several departments placed in their charge.

For the past year the police department had received such severe criticism from the ratepayers that it was thought best to place three of the new members in charge, and give them a free hand to take whatever action they might deem necessary to meet the wishes of the electors.

On the Finance Committee Coun. Miller is again chairman. Those who have followed the work of the Council since Coun. Miller has been Finance Minister will agree with the Council that he keeps a tight grip on the finances of the town, and the showing for the past two years.

On the Public Works Committee Coun. McDonald is again in charge. This section may not please the editor of the Tribune, we believe that Coun. McDonald is the right man for the job. Some important work remains to be done in this department, and it could not be placed in better hands.

Coun. Mowat, who has been doing such good work as chairman of the Electric Light Department has been chosen to look after the interests of the citizens in the management of this important work. In the electric light department Campbellton has an asset which means not a little to the ratepayers. Not only does the current revenue pay all operating expenses and renewals and extensions, but each year a handsome surplus is shown, that of last year being over \$2,000 for nine months, while in the eleven years in which the plant has been in operation, the surplus has amounted to over \$10,000, and the cost

has been exceptionally favorable to such a rapidly growing town as Campbellton. During this time a revolution has taken place in the office system under the charge of Coun. Miller's department. While two years ago things were run with very little system, today under the management of Coun. Clerk Reid a most thorough and up to date system has been installed and is in successful operation.

Coun. Richards is again in charge of Public Properties and Streets. In this department the chairman has in the past, spent much time and no doubt this year will see undertaken some much needed work.

Coun. McDonald has been promoted to the chairmanship of the Water and Sewerage Committee. While this section may not please the editor of the Tribune, we believe that Coun. McDonald is the right man for the job. Some important work remains to be done in this department, and it could not be placed in better hands.

STREET IMPROVEMENT

The most important question before the new council today is the needed improvement to Water Street. From the peculiar soil formation of this thoroughfare the usual treatment of successive coats of gravel is of no permanent use. The heavy traffic cuts it up and after every rain the roadbed is a mass of mud, through which it is impossible for teams to haul a full load.

The loss of time each year (which now represents money) to the merchants and manufacturers through not being able to haul full loads, would, in a very short time, pay for the improvements.

Engineer Black has been giving the matter much study and although he has not made a public statement, we believe that he favors macadam.

Macadam, when properly put down, makes a very serviceable road, and under Engineer Black's direction, no doubt a great improvement to Water Street could be wrought.

We trust that the New Public Properties and Streets Committee will lose no time in getting to work on this much needed improvement.

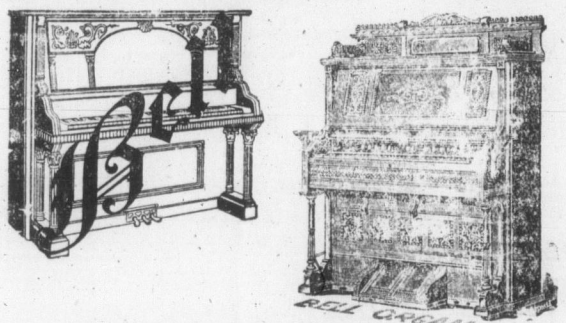

And whereas, the best judgment of this Municipality is that it will be very greatly in the interests of the Province that some of the main highways of the Province leading between principal centres should be taken out of the hands of the local authorities and placed under the control of some central authority, such as a Provincial Highway Board to be constituted by the Government in order that competent engineers with special qualifications for the construction and maintenance of good roads should give their whole time to this work, and should be provided with ample funds by the issue of bonds or otherwise, for the construction of trunk roads or provincial roads, which will be of a permanent nature, and equal to the best continental roads or state roads to be found in the republic south of us, believing that such a course would be by the increased values of the real estate in the vicinity of these roads, as well as the increased population which would naturally follow, more than repay the people of the Province for any liability, which may be incurred in the construction of such roads; and believing that such a policy is of vital importance in our Province at the present time, and would have a stimulating effect by increasing our population and by making our Province a more attractive place to live in, and thereby capture a share of the immigration which is flowing to our shores. Therefore Resolved: That in the opinion of this Municipality the time is opportune for the Provincial Government to inaugurate a system of Provincial Roads between important centres in the Province of New Brunswick, and if necessary to borrow money for the purpose of carrying into effect such a system.—Carried.

That the manager of the Royal Bank of Canada here refused to make a loan because this Council does not apply to the Local Legislature, authorizing said loan, and that both the manager of the Bank of New Brunswick and the manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia expressed their willingness to give the loan immediately on a demand note, and that they would wire to that effect to this Council the conditions they would give it on.

Moved by Councillor Arseneault, seconded by Councillor McBeath That John J. Arseneault, D. C. Firth and Claude Brown be appointed valuers for this County.—Carried.

Moved by Councillor Mawhinney, seconded by Councillor Copeland That this Council will allow Councillor Mawhinney's objection to the appointment of valuers at this session, his objection being that this Council has no jurisdiction nor power to appoint

That the said sum after being borrowed be deposited in the Bank, and drawn upon from time to time as required and applied to the payment of current demands upon the Municipality, until such time as the ordinary revenue receipts by the Secretary Treasurer during the current year shall be sufficient to pay all moneys borrowed or overdrawn under this resolution and the Secretary Treasurer be authorized to furnish to whom it may concern a certified copy of this resolution with the County seal affixed.—Carried.

The Finance Committee further reports that the Bank of Nova Scotia agrees to advance the four thousand dollars to this Municipality at the rate of five per cent. per annum, and all payments made to be endorsed on the back of the note with date of same, and no interest to be charged on amounts paid after date of payment. The Bank of New Brunswick wires as follows: Can grant county loan to four thousand dollars at five per cent. against resolution. Suggest overdraft rather than demand note.

The Secretary Treasurer ordered to notify the Bank of New Brunswick that funds have been arranged for elsewhere.
