I ate a good breakfast after that with my head over the railing, and if the fishes ever had a square meal, I gave them the best that Kanada could produce on board the old ship Takada. Since then the weather has been beautiful and I have felt fine. The la grippe has left me and L feel quite fit again to carry on the good work.

We are right in the danger zone now and our old chief officer told us tonight that we were sailing over a regular cemetery. but I think the cruiser will land us safely in London, where we are bound for and hope to land Saturday sometime. We are expesting about twelve or fifteen submarine destroyers tonight to escort us in to old Blighty, also a squadron of sea planes will fly out to meet us about Saturday morning. We have to carry our life belts wherever we go all the time and sleep with our clothes on from last night until we get there, so its not so much fun after all. The boat is all in darkness from the outside at night and all the boats are camouflaged.

(Thursday night.) We are having quite a lot of enjoyment today watching over our young navv of submarine destroyers patrol the waters on all sides. Our destroyers came / up last night about 12 o'clock but they had just got a wireless report that submarines were lying; in wait for us, so they were away hunting subs all night and returned at 7 o'clock this morning with the news that they had sunk a submarine at 5 o'clock so that wasn't to bad for one night's work. We on board are just beginning to realize that a war is on. In Canada we hardly knew it at all. It is wonderful to watch our little destroyers on the go all the time at a speed of 40 miles an hour first one way then another.

(Friday night.) I awakened this morning and fully realized that a war is really going on over here. Seaplanes surround us like cows surround a hay stack. Dirigibles that look just like big tin cigar were floating all around us looking for subs. It was hard for me to believe my own eyes at first but we could see the south coast of England channel all day. There was some excitement this afternoon about 3 o'clock. I was standing out on



PROSPECTS FOR INCREASED SUBSIDY

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—Increased Federal subsidies for the Maritime Provinces are in prospect as a result of yesterday's continued conference of the Federal and provincial ministers.

The governments of the prairie provinces, while 'insisting on their own special case for the turning over of the Federal domain in the west to them with the retention of all their present subsidies are understood to be ready also to support the claim put forward by Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island for considerably increased subsidies.

The westerners, however, are not inclined to support the contention of Ontario and Quebec for pro rata subsidizing increases.

The Maritime Provinces are believed to be the most deserving and needy ones, with limited sources of income, while ontario and Quebec, with vast crown domains, mineral resources, etc., are now able to make both ends meet without neglecting necessary probable that the Federal government will concur in this view. Thus the west will get the lands at the same time retain the subsidies originally given in lieu of lands while a million or so increased subsidies will be given to the Maritime Provinces.

Resumption of Red Cross Work

The following communication has been sent out the various Red Cross Societies by Lady Tilley the provincial organizing president:

Since the signing of the Armistice and the cessation of hostalities, Red Cross Societies hroughout the country have naturally been anxious to know what form their work should take during the coming months.

The answer to this question comes in the urgent call for clothing for the repatriated refugees in all the countries which until now have suffered from the German occupation.

Col. Blaylock, the UR.C.S. Commissioner overseas has cabled to Toronto Headquarters most earnestly requesting that supplies be forwarded for these people, as it is extremely difficult to procure the suitadle clothing in England or France where it is

both scarce and high. The appeal was immediately taken up by Headquarters, and the emergency committee at once commenced to prepare patterns and samples of clothing required.

New Brunswick has been asked to undertake the making of garments for the serbians, as it was telt that matters would be simplified if our efforts were confined to one country. Pattern and sample garments have been and is just recovering from in- these to send to our Branches and these will be forwarded as soon as available.

Materials needed will be nearly the same as those required for the regular work, flannelette, heavy unbleached or factory cotton and serge or woolen material of some kind.






