LUMBER SHIPMENTS.

Shipped More
19,790 Feet

THIS SEASON.

Over Five Million Shipped
From Campbellton Other
Shipments.

The statement of the shipments of spruce, pine and fir, etc., etc., from this port during 1904 season by P. E. Neale of Chatham, through Frank Harrison & Co., Liverpool, Eng., shows a cargo of 28,532,263 superficial feet shipped from Miramichi in sixteen steamers, and nine sailing vessels of 29,032 tonnage.

From Campbellton Mr. Neale shipped 5,095,031 feet in two steamers and two sailing vessels of 4,133 total tonnage; from Dalhousie, 4,027,710 feet in two steamers and two sailing vessels of 3,636 total tonnage; from Bathurst 843,074 feet in the bark Aljura, of 4,039 tonnage and from Bay Chaleur, 3,640,716 feet in five sailing vessels of total tonnage of 4,160.

Mr. Neale's shipments were to many British ports and totalled 52,189,794 feet or 23,358 St. Petersburg standards for the season.

NO OPPOSITION.

Conservatives of Westmorland Decide not to Oppose
Hon Mr. Sweeney.

Moncton, N. B. Dec 19—Between forty and fifty representatives from different parts of the county attended the Westmorland Conservative Association's annual meeting in the W. C. T. U. hall this afternoon. F. W. Sumner occupied the chair, with F. A. Harrison as secretary. It was decided not to oppose the Hon F. J. Sweeney's election.

The question of nominating a candidate to oppose Hon F. J. Sweeney was considered, after the association had finished the regular business. After a number had given views on the situation, it was decided that it was not in the best interests of the party to put forth a conservative candidate in opposition to Mr. Sweeney. A few present wanted a contest, but a large majority felt it was not desirable.

JAPS IMPATIENT

Send Strong Squadron To Meet Baltic Fleet

BRITISH VESSEL SEIZED

Was Carrying a Cargo of Kerosene Oil to Vladivostok

London, Dec 20 The Daily Mail's correspondent at Hong Kong says he has learned on trustworthy authority that a powerful Japanese squadron of battleships and armoured cruisers is proceeding south accompanied by fifteen colliers and transports to attack the Russian Baltic squadron.

According to the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, it is reported that a Japanese squadron of eight warships and fifteen transports is going south to meet the Russian squadron.

200,000 MORE RUSSIANS TO THE FAR EAST.

St Petersburg, Dec 25—Mobilization of the reserves has been announced in seven military districts. This is the third and most extensive mobilization of the war and will add about 200,000 men to the army in the far east. It is thought the whole force can be placed in the field by spring, when the problems of food and fuel will be easier met and the transportation of the troops will create less strain upon the trans-Siberian railway. It will bring General Kuropatkin's effective force, roughly estimated to 680,000.

St. Petersburg, Dec 20—The English reports that Russian agents are trying to suborn witnesses belonging to the Hull fishing fleet in connection with the North Sea incident, arouses great indignation here, they being regarded as a willful misrepresentation of fact, Russia openly offered a reward for information throwing light on the subject.

Nagasaki, Dec 21—The British steamer Nigretia, which was seized by the Japanese cruiser Tsuchino off Utsunomiya yesterday, has arrived at Saigo, for trial before the prize court. The Nigretia was proceeding to Vladivostok with a cargo of kerosene. It is said the crew refused to leave Shanghai, but were compelled to do so by the consul, who held that her cargo was not contraband owing to the fact that the port of Vladivostok is not being blockaded.

Business Increasing.

They expect to move in during the month of January.

The Branch is being managed by Mr. T. H. Cochrane who also calls upon the trade in the neighbouring towns. The shipping of goods is under the care of C. H. Cochrane, the manager's brother.

THOUSAND POUNDS THE NEW BOAT

This is the Weight of the Trout Brought to Bathurst Last Week.

TERMINAL FACILITIES

The Company Have Completed Arrangements with Govt re Terminal

The Advocate learns that three men brought a thousand pounds of lake trout out to Bathurst last week and that they were sold in the town. The policy of the Dominion government to license the catching of trout in the inland lakes of New Brunswick is not one that commends itself to the sportsmen of the province. These lakes will be very valuable property in the course of a few years; in fact they are very valuable now, but if they are depleted in this manner they will very soon be in the same condition as hundreds of lakes and ponds in the states of New Hampshire and Vermont.

TOTAL GAME RECEIPTS

Mr. W. P. Flewelling, deputy surveyor general for New Brunswick, to-day gave out the figures for the game receipts for the past open season.

In the year of 1902 the amount received for hunting licenses was \$10,855.95. For 1903 the sale of licenses netted \$16,150.57. During the past season the sale of game licenses amounted to \$16,216.93.

The latter amount is the largest yet received here and is an increase of \$6,360.58 in two years or \$65.98 over 1903.

These figures prove that New Brunswick made an excellent showing, as the past season has been considered an off year, on account of the St. Louis Fair, federal elections in Canada and presidential elections in the United States.

YOUTHFUL BURGLARS

St. John, Dec 21.—Herbert and David Killfoyle, aged 9 and 10, the two boys who were arrested on charge of stealing boots from an I. C. R. freight car, and who confessed the looting the empty McBratney house, was sentenced to-day to four years in the Reformatory. Their two accomplices, Kemp and Morris, were held under suspended sentence.

CHRISTMAS.

Christmas—like any other day—is what we make it. Both Talking on recites a story illustrative of that truth. One Christmas day a half a dozen men found themselves whirling across the continent on a fast train. There was little in the aspect of things to suggest cheerfulness. The men occupied the smoker of a sleeper and smoked and dozed by turns. Night drew on. A man moved by the utter cheerlessness of things ventured the query: "What's become of Christmas? His companions roused themselves a bit. The question suggested a subject well nigh forgotten. The hubbub of voices issued from the smoker. The travellers one by one entered into the Christmas spirit. Stories of other Christmases were related. At length glasses clinked and merry songs and salutes echoed through the car. The men became intoxicated with the Christmas spirit. It was late when they left their berths the next morning but it was with memories of a merry, merry night. As one expressed it: "I expect last night was one of the best Christmases we ever put in." In spite of their gloomy surroundings and limited opportunities this little band of he pulledman smoker met the requirements of a Christmas Day in a manner which many, more fortunately situated would do well to copy. It is not the abundance of presents and the variety of eatables which make the true Christmas. The purity of the day should not be sullied by an ostentatious display of fine things—the signs and symbols of predatory wealth. It is a mistake to suppose that the best Christmas is the one marked by the most bountiful display of worldly things. The child with only a tin whistle to toot furnishes a truer representation of the Christmas ideal. Universally intrenched in custom and usage Christmas day above all others should serve to remind the world of the religion of Christ. And as the diffusion of happiness is an elementary principle of that religion the world should be immeasurably benefited by a general observance of Christmas day. Kind words and deeds should mark the season and the day. Let the glory and supremacy which surrounds rank and station be magnified by the glory and supremacy of sympathy and generosity. Let joy reign not only in your own heart and home but in the hearts and homes of others, to the end that no man shall point a gaunt finger at an empty stomach and murmur—This day is not for me. Let those to whom fate has kindly dealt go to the door of the afflicted, and fate will again yield the way. Christmas Day should remind us all of the existence of one great brotherhood—The brotherhood of man, and should not supply instances of man's inhumanity to a brother. These reflections may be regarded as too serious for this season of the year but a Christmas cannot be truly observed without reference to them and profiting by them in turn.

And it looks as though Mrs. Chadwick and Tom W. Lawson were good for another Christmas.

MR. RUSSELL'S GREATNESS.

The reporters, it is said, go to Belgium, might find some other big enterprise that I am interested in, for the purpose of hours of overworking the government.

Thus does one Mr. Russell, of Montreal, supply the energetic newspaper reporter with a kindly tip. Truly Mr. Russell is bracing himself. He goes on to inform the newspaper fraternity and incidentally the public that he is endeavoring to "persuade" Belgian capitalists to invest their capital in the pulp and paper industry in Canada. Oh, dear? The life of all communities depends on some particular industry. Children grow up in an atmosphere where it is the theme of their breakfast talk, and in some way related to their program of social recreation. For men it is the "shop talk" of all conversation, the pride of Sunday service, the matrix of political interest, the text for agricultural propaganda. For women it is the function dominating the prosperity of the household and the possibilities of the pantry and the wardrobe. Thus it becomes the inspiration of art. There fore let us bow low before Mr. Russell. He is about to add to our great industries and give us something to be proud of in the line of pulp and paper. Mr. Russell is indeed a great man. How cleverly he has outwitted the reporters!

According to a Mr. Perkins, St. John wants a new set of license commissioners, a better class of aldermen and church members, a new liquor license inspector, a new attorney general, a better class of bar tenders and new policemen. We have heard of St. John wanting things before so do not attach much importance to these latest demands.

INCREASE IN CRIMINALS.

The report of criminal statistics for the year 1904 has been issued and shows that the number of charges in 1904 for indictable offences were 1,083 more than in 1902, in which latter year the number was 248 more than in 1901. The figures are 1903, 9,623; 1902, 8,539; 1901, 8,291; 1900, 8,418; and 1899, 3,170. The convictions in 1903 numbered 6,521 or 801 more than in 1902. The percentage of convictions to charges is: 1903, 67.77 per cent; 1902, 66.22 per cent; 1901, 68 per cent; 1900, 68.51 per cent; and 1899, 69.22 per cent. Pray, what accounts for the marvellous increase in the number of indictable offences in 1903 over that of the previous year. This is a question that must be reckoned with by our criminalists—if we have any. The increase of 1903 leads us to wonder what the increase in 1904 will be. You know this is election year.

RATHER UNUSUAL.

"Who is running the city? An alderman wants to know whether it is Peter Clinch or the council."

The Moncton Times employs the above words in a headline over an account of a city council meeting. It seems to us that if Moncton is run by either Peter Clinch or the Council, it must be a rather extraordinary city.

NINE LIVES LOST

By The Burning Of A Steamer.

IN LONG ISLAND SOUND.

Steamer Glen Island Burned to the Water's Edge. Passengers Rescued.

New York, Dec 17.—Nine persons, including two passengers, lost their lives to-day in the burning of the steamer Glen Island, bound from New York to New Haven. The steamer drifted aground on Captain's Island, in Long Island Sound, and was burned to the water's edge.

The vessel left her pier in North river at 9 o'clock last night with ten or twelve passengers and a heavy cargo. The fire was discovered before midnight off Execution Point, on the Sound.

How it started is not known, but suddenly the whole vessel seemed to become filled with smoke and the electric lights were extinguished. Boats were hurriedly lowered, and all but two passengers and seven members of the crew escaped. One of the lost passengers was a man and the other a woman, residents of New York, whose names have not yet been learned.

A tug which sighted the Glen Island after dark dashed to the scene and picked up the passengers and crew from the small boats. They were placed aboard the steamer Erastus Corning, and brought back to New York. The Glen Island belonged to the Starin Transportation Line.

The Glen Island was running up the Sound at her usual speed, when the fire was discovered. It is believed to have started in a dynamo located below and near the centre of the vessel. The passengers were nearly all in their berths when the vessel suddenly became filled with stifling smoke and the lights went out. Captain McAllister sent men through the cabin and the passengers were quickly aroused. Owing to the fact that considerable ice was banking along the shore, it was not possible to reach safety in that direction, and the vessel drifted towards Captain's Island. Efforts to check the spread of the flames were without avail, and the lifeboats were prepared. With life belts about them the passengers were quickly transferred to small boats. Eight persons got into one and fifteen into another. So heavily laden was the second boat that it threatened every moment to capsize. The lifeboats hung about the burning steamer in the hope of picking up some of the missing, and in a few minutes the tug Bully appeared, towing some barges. The tow line was instantly cut and the tug ran as close as possible to the burning steamer, but none of the missing passengers or crew were seen. The people in the boats were taken aboard and later transferred to the Steamer Erastus Corning, and arrived in this city shortly before 7 o'clock this morning. Beyond their having suffered severely from the cold and nervous shock, none were injured. The Glen Island, which was commanded by Captain McAllister, who was the last person to leave the wreck, was constructed from the ruins of the City of Richmond. The latter, curiously enough, also was burned after having been rebuilt the steamer was christened William C. Egerton, and later renamed Glen Island.

FISH CULTURE.

An Interesting Letter on the Subject to the St. John Globe.

Sussex, Nov 19th 1904

To the Editor of the Globe

Sir,—In your weekly issue of the 18th Nov. is a short article on the salmon pond in Carleton and the operations connected with it the past season. We are informed that 1,022 fish were caught in weirs and conveyed to this pond at a cost of \$2 each. We learn that this gathering of parent fish, on their way to their spawning grounds in the St. John and Tobique, goes on from the latter part of May to the middle of August, during which interval the run of salmon in the St. John continues. We are told that 4,400,000 im-pregnated ova were forced from these parent fish and are to be distributed as follows: 1,500,000 to the Gaspe hatchery in Quebec, 950,000 to the Bedford hatchery at Halifax; 1,000,000 to the Margaree hatchery, in Cape Breton; 1,200,000 to the Miramichi hatchery at Newcastle, and 1,000,000 to the St. John hatchery at Grand Falls.

From this it appears that the St. John river, upon which the counties of St. John, Kings, Queens, Sunbury, York, Carleton, and Victoria are dependent for their supply of salmon, is being annually despoiled to furnish Quebec, Nova Scotia and northern New Brunswick with salmon. Can you or any of your well-informed readers give a rational reason why our only salmon river should be thus robbed for the benefit of localities which have rivers better stocked than the only one we have left.

In the immediate vicinity of the Gaspe hatchery, of the Bedford hatchery, of the Margaree hatchery and of the Newcastle hatchery, are rivers well supplied with salmon, while the St. John is the only river in Southern New Brunswick to which this fish still resorts in any considerable numbers. Its stock is diminishing annually because the fish are not allowed to reach their spawning places. And yet distant hatcheries outside the province, get the lion's share of all the ova furnished from the harbor of St. John. Nova Scotia gets 1,950,000; Quebec, 1,150,000; Miramichi, 1,200,000, leaving only 1,000,000 for the Grand Falls hatchery, which needs all the ova the St. John fish can produce if artificial culture is expected to keep up its rapidly diminishing stock.

In northern New Brunswick the Richibucto, the Miramichi, the Nepisiguit, the Jacques, the Charlo and the Restigouche are all well stocked with salmon. The Newcastle hatchery is located on the southwest branch of the Miramichi, and has the whole stretch of that fine salmon stream as well as of the northwest branch equally well stocked, from which to obtain parent fish. The Res-

tigouche river, with its great tributaries, the Matapedia, the Upsalquitch, the Patapedia and the Kedgwick, is the best stocked salmon river in Eastern Canada. On the main river is the largest and best equipped hatchery in New Brunswick. The facilities for procuring parent fish are equal if not superior, to those in the St. John harbor, while the pond, confining them until the ova are ripe, is infinitely superior to the Carleton pond, and yet the whole output of this great hatchery is placed in the Restigouche and its tributaries for the benefit of the millionaires riparians comprising the "Restigouche Salmon Club," while the St. John is despoiled for the benefit of Quebec, Nova Scotia and northern New Brunswick!

From the report of the commissioner and general inspector of fisheries for 1903 we learn that last 7,000,000 ova were procured in St. John harbor and distributed among the hatcheries of Quebec, Nova Scotia, Miramichi, Restigouche, Grand Falls, Ottawa and Magog. What influence brings this about despite the protests of New Brunswick members of parliament?

While clear running fresh water is necessary for the healthy development of the salmon's ova, as is shown by the fish when left to follow their instinct, which all the world over, impels them to reach the head waters of their native rivers, we are told concerning the salt water pond in which the harbor fish are confined for six months amidst the sewage of the town; that "There can be no more perfect place for the capture and retention of the stock fish than at the Carleton and if the present pond should be used for a dry dock, which seems likely to be the case, I would advise action to be taken at once, with the view of preparing another pond to be utilized in the spring, as no doubt many of the hatcheries will always be dependent upon the Carleton pond for a supply of ova."

From this we may infer that the St. John is in future to supply northern New Brunswick, Quebec, Nova Scotia, Ottawa and Magog with salmon ova, while the better stocked rivers of these places are to be left unspoiled. We can only hope that Messrs Daniel, Stockton, Fowler, Wilmut, Crockett, Carvell and Costigan will do their duty to their constituents and see that the only source of our salmon supply is not exploited for the benefit of other constituencies whose rivers are now better stocked than our own remaining one in southern New Brunswick.

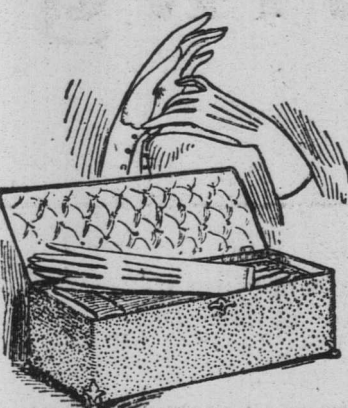
