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The Crops.—Several of our subscribers who are good farmers, assure us that they have seldom known the crops to look better than they now do—the wheat particularly, looks very promising. Notwithstanding the lateness of the spring and the unequal weather, large crops are put in. We are informed by Capt. Samuel McFarlane, who resides at the Rolling Dam, St. Patrick, that he has sowed and planted about 17 acres of his farm with the following:

10 bushels of Wheat, 40 do Oats,
3 do Pease, 2 do Barley,
50 do cut seed Potatoes, all of which look well.

Wednesday last being the "Fast Day," all business was suspended. Religious services were held in the Churches.

The Bermuda Herald says:—We understand that the West India Steamers are to come direct from England here—and that the Government have given notice that the services of the Mailboats between Halifax and this Island will not be longer required.

DEPUTATION FROM CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.—The Rev. J. C. Fowler, of Ratho, Presbytery of Edinburgh; the Rev. Robert Stevenson, of Dalry, Ayrshire; and the Rev. Simon Mackintosh, of Aberdeen, arrived in the Cambria at Halifax.

The Rev. Andrew Halket, late of St. John, has been presented by the Queen, to the Church and Parish of Brechin, in the Shire of Angus.

Emigrants in Canada.—The Quebec correspondent of the Montreal Herald gives a frightful picture of the condition of the Emigrants who are daily arriving from Ireland at Quebec. On the 10th there were 35 vessels with passengers at quarantine, at Grosse Isle, and 15 between Grosse Isle and Quebec.

Novo Scotia.—We understand, (says the Nova Scotia) that the elections are to come off on the 5th August—the Thursday previous will be the day of nomination.

New Orleans papers of the 9th inst. gave accounts of a dreadful explosion on board the Steamer Eda on the Ouchira river—twenty five persons killed and eight wounded.

FIRE.—Between 2 and 3 o'clock yesterday morning, a fire broke out in the Steam Mills belonging to Messrs. Ansley & Lake King's Square, which, together with the Tannery, &c., were entirely consumed. The flames also spread to the Candle Manufactory of Mr. Asa Blaske, and the dwelling of Mr. Smith, both of which were consumed. The dwelling house of Mr. Thomas Taylor had a narrow escape, being considerably injured. Little or no water was to be had the time the fire originated, otherwise it might have been confined to the building in which it originated. We learn that Messrs. Ansley were partially insured.

The fire is supposed to have originated accidentally, and this additional warning should cause our Clergy to prohibit the erection of Steam Mills within the limits of the City.—*Nova Scotia* 17th.

HURRICANE ON THE MALABAR COAST.—Bombay May 1.—A hurricane of unusual violence has been experienced all along the Malabar coast, which hundreds of native vessels are said to have been wrecked. The Bombay steam Navigation Company's vessel Victoria has suffered very great damage, and the most serious apprehensions are entertained that H. C. steamer Scosotis may have perished at sea, she not having been heard of since her departure from Aden on the 3rd of April.

WRECK.—The ship Ceylon, Crisp, of and for St. John, from Liverpool, via New York, with 250 tons of coal, went ashore on Thursday night, 10 instant, near Moosepeca Head, (State of Maine,) and bilged—crew and materials saved.
