

Spraying apples: Four or five sprayings are necessary, depending on the season and how badly the orchard is infested with insects and disease.

First spray: Apply just after leaf-buds burst but before blossoms open. Use either Bordeaux mixture 4-4-50, or commercial lime-sulphur testing 32 degrees or 33 degrees Baume diluted 1 to 40. Add two pounds of lead-arsenate to each fifty gallons of the spray mixture. This spray is for control of scab, curculio and cankerworm.

## **HUNDRED MILLION POUNDS DAMAGE DONE** BY FLOODING COAL MINES

Resumption of Pumping Has Stopped Further Damage and Saved the Mines—Owners and Miners to Meet With View to Settlement—Men's Demand for National Pool Cannot be Granted by Government.

London, April 10.—There has been general resumption of pumping in the coal mines in nesponse to the Minere Federation's telegram to all its branches, particularly in Scotland and South Wales, where flooding was most serious.

Fifeshire pumpmen, however, refused to return to work themselves, nor would they permit volunteers to man the pumps, on the ground that the telegram was "vague."

In the district thirty-eight pits, employing 13,000 underground workers in addition to surface men, are flooded. Five have been completely abandoned, and several others are so flooded that operations could not be resumed for months.

Damage already caused by flooding is estimated at £100,000,000.





Control the Potato Scab. commercial formalin to 15 gallons of water. A couple of barrels with plugs in the sides near the bottom can be used to advantage in treating the seed. The potatoes can be placed directly in the solution or first put in crates or coarse sacks and then immersed.

mersed.

After treatment spread the potatoes out on a clean floor or on the grass to dry. Wash all crates, bags, etc., which are used in handling the potatoes with the formalin solution. The same formalin solution can be used to treat successive lots of potatoes. Fifteen gallons is sufficient to treat from 20 to 25 bushels if ordinary precautions are taken not to waste too much of the fluid as each lot of tubers is dipped. If the potatoes are not all treated the same day it is advisable to make up fresh formalin for each day's work.

Corrosive sublimate (mercuric chloride) can be used also to treat potatoes to prevent scab. Soak the uncut tubers for three hours in a solution of two ounces of corrosive subliments to 25 sulpage of water. Corrosive subliments of 25 sulpage of water. Corrosive After treatment spread the pota-

If possible plant the treated seed potatoes on clean soil, that is soil that has not produced a crop of scabby potatoes. Practice a rotation of crops. If scab is very bad it is not advisable to plant potatoes on the same land oftener than once in five years. Heavy applications of barnyard manure should not be made to the potato crop, but if necessary given at some other point in the rotation. Plant potatoes after clover soil possible. Avoid alkail fertilizers such as lime and wood ashes.—Prof. J. E. Howitt, O. A. College, Guelph.

Planting the Cultivated Crops. To ensure good crops of carrots, mangles, sugar beets, potatoes and corn, the land should be well prepared and seed should be secured of the highest quality. Station-to-Station service should be used when you are willing to talk to ANYONE at a distant telephone that is, when you do not need to get a particular person on the line.

Station-to-Station service is not only

cheaper, but more rapid and accurate than Person-to-Person service. On Station-to-Station service the call can be completed as soon as the distant telephone is answered, while on a Person-to-Person call the particular party wanted must be located and summoned to the telephone. The charge for a Station-to-Station

call cannot be reversed - that is, it cannot be charged to the telephone called, for in that case the telephone operator would have to locate a particular person to approve the charge, which would make it a Person-to-Person call.

## Person-to-Person Service

When you make a call specifying that conversation is desired with a particular person at a given number, Person-to-Person service is used.

An APPOINTMENT CALL rate, which is about 50 per cent higher than the station-to-station rate, is quoted for service when an appointment is made by the calling party to talk at a particular When a person who does not have a telephone is called over long distance and a messenger must be sent to summon the party to the telephone, the MESSEN-GER CALL rate, which is about 50 per cent higher than the station-to-station

rate, is charged, and to this is added the necessary messenger charges.

The Report Charge When you place a call for a particular person or persons and for any reason they cannot be reached the same day at the make a call and you are not ready to talk when the other person is ready with-in an hour, a REPORT CHARGE is made.
