A DOUBTFUL EXPERIMENT. LL people will be disposed to agree with the theory that men who are temporarily absent from home on centuries: their country's business, whether in the performance of civil or military duties, should be given opportunity to vote at elections. And not simply for Dominion elections, but provincial and municipal as well. The only question is: Can a practicable scheme be devised for this purpose? Many things are quite proper in theory: but the difficulty is to carry them into practice. Viewed from this standpoint, how does the Government measure to allow soldiers to vote mee the legitimate requirements?

Certain conditions and limitations should be taken for granted. The franchise should be the same: the same care should be taken to secure an honest vote: the ballot should be as well safeguarded, and the punishment for offenses should be as severe, and as thoroughly inflicted. This is not to say that all these conditions are perfectly secured at elections under ordinary circumstances, but they should be as well secured in the army vote as in the civilian vote; in the camp as well as in the constituency. Can that be done?

In the first place, as we understand the measure, the franchise is not necessarily the same. We require of the civilian voting at home that he shall be a British subject, 21 years of age, and resident for a certain length o time in the locality where he proposes to vote. It would appear that under the proposed act every soldier will have the vote, irrespective of any of these qualifications.

STIRRING UP TROUBLE.

Servian territory from Bulgaria may slip away without any serious results. At first it appeared dangerou as it looked as if it might lead to another general Balkan war. Later investigations, however, show that the Bulgarian Government was innocent of any complicity in the affair. The Government at Sofia declares that it can prove beyond any doubt that the raiders were Albanians, bribed, equipped and led by Austrian army officers, and disclaims all responsibility.

This is an entirely new version of the affair, but weight is given to it by cables from Rome, which assert that the masses of the Bulgarians are overwhelmingly opposed to any alliance with the Turk. The Bulgarian does not love the Servian but he loves the Turk less. Also it does not seem likely that Bulgaria desires at this time to have Roumania and Greece to fight and that is what would assuredly happen should Bulgaria war on Servia. The raid, however, shows that Germany through Austria is intriguing to drag the Balkans into another war. With Austria nearing the end, Berlin is getting desperate and an explosion that would involve Greece, Roumania, Bulgaria and Servia would at least postpone and make the more costly the inevitable triumph of the Allies.

CAIRNCROSS' [Canadian Press.] PETROGRAD, via London, April 9.-11:25 p.m.-The following Russian official statement regarding the fighting in the eastern theatre of the war was issued tonight: "On the front west of the Niemen River there have been actions of secondary importance.

"In the Carpathians our troops repulsed a number of German and Austrian counter-attacks and continued to progress. We now hold in our hands the whole of the principal chain extending for more than 110 versts (about 73 miles), from Reghetovo to Volossate with the exception of Hill 909, south of Voliamekhova. On April 7 we took 1,200 prisoners.

'In all other sectors of our front there is no marked change.'

Lake boats will be put into commission for the ocean trade, to carry war materials to the front.

Farmers are about to begin operation on the land, and authorities report that the soil in is excellent condition. Shortly the seed will be in the ground in area exceeding former records and the West will feel that the first great step has been taken under most satisfactory soil conditions. 
