





FRANCE WAS EASY

Change in Government Offered Opportunity to Press for Fresh Concessions.

London, March 19.-If newspaper reports could be accepted as an infallible the world would have been compelled to believe last week that the has existed. What has happened has been merely this: The fall of the French cabinet came unexpectedly to all concerned at a moment when Germany, for reasons which were fully described in this correspondence a week ago, has decided to moderate her demands to whatever extent neces-

sary for a general agreement. It was but natural that she should seize the opportunity given by a change in the French Government to press the new regime, for fresh concessions. An advantage gained in this matter would not only be a direct gain, but would serve also to disguise the fact that Germany was really yielding to force majumre.

The attempt has now been made, and it failed completely. The determined stand made by France is even less significant than the attitude assumed by Great Britain. The British Government has made it clear that it is even more uncompromising in its treatment of Germany than France herself. It may be said, in fact, upon the highest authority that the anti-German policy of the Liberal Government is to be even stronger than its Unionist predecessors. One is even led to suspect that it may assume a ceraggressiveness which threaten serious consequence.

The reasons for this are fairly obvious. It is strongly the opinion of most British statesmen of both parties tially anti-British, and that the general German policy would lead almost inevitably to a rupture with this country at some future stage of its development.

It has been determined to interpose a decisive, permanent check to the German plans whenever they encroach in any degree upon British interests, It is believed that by taking a firm stand now on the Kaiser's ambitions they can be thwarted without any breach of the peace. Such at all events is to be the British policy.

The position which has been taken by Great Britain is fully understood by the other great powers and in Berlin itself. What its effect will be only one man knows. The rest of the world can hardly expect at this moment to read the mind of Emperor William.





Its holding of the championship has not been of the longest, but no one will question its strenuosity. It has repeatedly tackled the very best in the east and the west, and has generally come out with flying colors. It will be many moons before a combination shall appear to outshine Pulford, Westwick, McGee and the Smiths, when at their best. The Wanderers if they stick together should be better than ever next year, and a series between them and the Kenora Thistles next midwinter would be worth going miles to see.

But if a young man is quick, active, likes baseball, has a good brain, a clear eye and steady nerves, he can average \$1,800 a year for perhaps ten years—his salary ranging from \$500 to \$5,000 a season, and the number of season. sons he plays depends entirely upon his individual ability. Also, the number of years he gets the top salary depends on his individual ability.

The first requisite for a good ball player is ability to think quickly. The quick thinker usually is cool-headed in all emergencies, and by his rapid thinking he can cover up a multitude of sins of the hands and feet.

The young man trying to break into professional baseball ought to aim as high as possible and try to start in the highest grade league he can reach. The player who can make good in the Central League can make good in the National or American if he has grit and courage. The things that he lacks he will learn by watching the veterans play, and he can learn as much on the bench in the big league as he can learn playing in one of the minors.

The nerve that is required to play in one league is the same as is needed in the larger one, and it is just as easy to play in the big leagues as it is to play in a fast semi-professional team. If a man has the nerve, can field well, is fast, and has a clear head, he will do as well to start in the National League as to start in the Eastern If he is born a minor leaguer he will learn it soon enough.


