Coalition Government Expects 435 Seats, While 272 Are RHINELAND MAY Conceded to the Opposition-Women Have Taken a Great Part in the Electioneering - Christabol Pankhurst Promises Great Things If Women Rule.

London, Dec. 14.—(Canadian Press.)
—Bailoting for the election of parliament members is in progress throughout Great Britain today. Indications are that Premier Lloyd George will control a safe majority. The Daily Express estimates that his Government will win 435 seats (the Unionists 210 and the Liberals 125), while the Opposition parties, including Labor, will secure 272, giving the prime minister a majority of 163.

Women have been active in the electioneering. There is intense rivalry between Mrs. Lloyd George and Mrs. McKenna, wife of the former chancellor of the exchequer, who is a staunch supporter of former Premier Asquith. Supporters of Premier Lloyd George have conducted a vigorous campaign in South Wales, violently attacking McKenna in reply, criticizing the prime minister.

Miss Elizabeth Asquith admitted in some of her speeches that the electors sometimes made candid remarks about her father, but, she added, "he does not mind." Bonar Law's daughter at Glasgow also took part in the campaign.

Miss Christabel Pankhurst, the noted suffragette, promised the voters that when the women's regime prevails in parliament every house, no matter down small, will be lighted, heated and served by electricity.





The treaty with Ukraine was signed after wearlsome negotiations, he says. It became clear that Russia could not, by merely ceasing hostilities, obtain peace. At this time Gen. Hoffman of the German army advocated a cancellation of the armistice, according to Count Czernin, but Austria-Hungary declared she would take no part in this action.

Count Czernin descriked the negotiations leading up to the breaty of Bucharest, in which he says Hungarian opposition to peace by compromise dominated because of conflicting claims between Germany and Hungary.

Hungary wanted the frontiers so altered that a repetition of the invasion of 1916 would be prevented. Count Czernin says. "This meant the ceding to Hungary of Rumania's valuable oil districts, which was not welcomed by the German military party, with its greed in economic matters. Germany's plan was to secure economic privileges which would amount to an indemnity. The plan was to torce Rumania to cede to Germany her oil lands, railways, ports and state domains, and submit to permanent financial control. 





"To be a good sportsman means, not to boast before you play the game. It took us a long time to find out what Britain was really doing. We asked, what is the British fleet doing? We expected it to go ashore, and anticipated the tank movement. Britain went on, guarding the seven seas, bringing her hosts from every quarter of the world, helping to finance all her allies, organ-

izing an army out of nothing. "When the game is over, the good sportsman carries himself like a gentleman and a sportsman. It is a hard thing to do when you have been playing with people who have been playing a yellow game, and who have no idea of what sportsmanship is. Do you envy those Germans who the other day brought the submarines to Harwich? You can imagine that if they had played the game and played it hard, and played it like good sportsmen, but had lost, you can imagine the magnanimity with which the British would have treated them.

"But this you observe, that those Germans came into Harwich amid silence. There was no cordiality; there could be no respect for a foe like that. But at the same time the good sportsmen respected themselves too much to take advantage of men like that."







Eat "Flu" Germs And Yet Fail To Show Symptoms

BOSTON, Dec. 13.—Experiments undertaken by the navy department at the navy public health service hospital on Gallupus Island to ascertain the cause and spread of influenza have had merely negative results, according to a report given out today.

One hundred volunteers who have been under observation for several weeks have had influenza germs placed in their nostrils and throats and have eaten them with their food, and some have been inoculated with serums, but no cases of the disease have developed thus far. Increased appetite and more vigorous health have been the only noticeable results of the experiment, according to the physicians. The tests will be continued.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 13.—For the first time in the west, if not in Canada, a soldier has been sentenced to life imprisonment for desertion.

Pte. Dumytro Gelenzyn (No. 5343978) is the man. He is now serving his term at Stony Mountain Penitentiary, it was learned today. He was sent there upon the conclusion of the court-martial, but it was only Thursday that his sentence was officially confirmed by the Ottawa authorities.

GERMANY HAS RECALLED AMBASSADOR TO SPAIN

MADRID, Thursday, Dec. 12—By the Associated Press.—Prince Max von Ratiboret Corvey, German ambassador to Spain, has been recalled to Berlin, according to the newspaper El Sol.

> Armistice Signing Cured 2,000 U.S. Men Suffering Shell Shock

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—More than 2,000 American soldiers in France suffering from shell-shock were cured by news of the signing of the armistice, Surgeon-General Ireland told the Senate military committee. Out of 2,500 shell-shock patients, the general said, all except about 300 were well almost immediately.


U. S. Producing New Poisonous Vapor in Unheard-Of Quantities.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.-Details America's "enormous preparations" to overwhelm the German armies with poison gas were made public today by the New York section of the American Chemical Society.

Asserting that in May, 1917, the production of gas masks was started by a group of five volunteers, Col. Bradley Dewey, commanding officers of the gas defence, declared that up to the time the truce was signed there had been produced 5,000,000 masks, 3,000,000 extra canisters, 500,000 horse masks, and large quantities of mustarit gas suits, gloves, ointments and antidotes. The production of gas masks when hostilities ceased, he added, had reached 40,000 a day. The 1919 model, he said, showed a revolution in design America's "enormous preparations" to he said, showed a revolution in design overcoming all discomforts of earlier patterns and adding tenfold efficiency. Col. W. H. Walker, commanding the Edgewood Arsenal, said that on No vember 11, "we had all the facilitie vember 11, "we had all the facilities for producing mustard gas at the rate of 100 tons a day, to say nothing of our resources for deluging our enemies with chlorine, phosgene, cholorophin, and numerous other vapors previously unknown to them. He added that "there never was a day when the production of materials did not exceed the ability to utilize it."






of Terror Passes-Police Return.

MEN READY TO ARBITRATE

Damages Estimated at \$300. 000 Done by Riotous Mobs.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

MONTREAL, Dec. 13.—The strike is over. As suddenly as it commenced, the walkout of the police, firemen, engineers and incineration employees of Montreal terminated tonight. Early in the evening there had been rumors of contemplated attacks by rioters on the central fire stations, and extra detachments of military police were hurried there. Two hundred soldiers were also sent to guard the aqueduct as a result of discovery of a plot to cut off the city's water supply. [Special to The Advertiser.]

The streets were filled with excited people. The air was filled with rumors. Everybody talked of Bolshevism. Storekeepers who remained on duty all last night prepared to do the same tonight, and in the east and outlying districts, where light was bad, terror reigned amongst the smaller shopkeepers. battles. ous private citizens. Absolute anarchy prevailed from the time darkness fell. Fires broke out and were allowed to burn, the mob in many cases absolutely prohibiting amateur firemen from responding to alarms. Over ninety alarms, mostly false, were turned in. Outlying and badly-lighted districts naturally suffered most. In the east end, the haunts of the underworld, thieves were busy looting, and one store alone was robbed of \$35,000 worth of goods.

At a meeting of the aldermen this afternoon it was resolved on a majority of 17—or what practically amounts to a two-thirds vote, as is required by the city bylaw to be of effect—that the salaries of Director of Public Safety Joseph Tremblay and his assistant. Arthur Mann, be struck off the city's budget. These are the heads of the police force for whose dismissal the strikers are calling. If the aldermen can control a similar majority at the meeting of the city council on Monday the motion will go into effect.

Director of Public Safety Tremblay and his assistant, former Fire Chief Mann, were seen to leave the central station as the firemen re-entered it. The supposition is that their resignations, which, along with that of Chief Mann, who would have been handed in, or, that they have been suspended. This, if true, will work a particular hardship on Chief Mann, who would have been 20 years in the service in a few months and entitled to a good pension. He is a born fireman, born in a fire station, son of a fireman, and grandson of a fire chief, and until this strike happened was regarded as the idol of the men, as he has been to the citizen the beau ideal of a courageous fire fighter. He is a Freemason, and that is supposed to be part of the grievances held against him in a certain quarter.

Poland and Ukraine both claim the strip of land around Lemberg and several bloody battles have been fought near there. The Czecho-Slovaks claim that the territory in the region of Presberg is inhabited mainly by Slovaks and, therefore, belongs to them. The Hungarians are resisting and several battles have been fought. The Czecho-Slavs have formally declared war upon Hungary. The Cossacks, who live east of the Ukraine, are in sympath y with a united federalized republic of Russia. The Ukrainians favor Independence and the two have had some severe battles. The Cossacks are probably identified with the unionist forces which captured Kieff. man Government on July 10, 1914, informed about 130 German civilian em ployees at a conference in Berlin that Capt.
