Asked if he had any communication to make to the party, Lenoir replied: "At the moment of death I repeat what I have always vainly asked—to be confronted with Joseph Calliaux." (Joseph Caillaux, former premier of France, is now under arrest in a hospital near Paris under charges similar to that upon which Lenoir was controlled. to that upon which Lenoir was con

### **GERMANY DECIDES** TO NULLIFY CLAUSE Allies' Demand Meets With

Compliance by Germans.

Berlin, Thursday, Sept. 18.—The committee for foreign affairs of the national assembly has decided, according to the Tageblatt, to nullify Article 61 of the constitution, by which Austria would be given representation in the German Reichstag. Curt von Lersner, head of the German delegation at Versailles, has been instructed to inform the Entente powers that the demand of the peace conference relative to Article 61 will be complied with.

THE LARGER PROBLEM. . If the industrial conference at Ottawa adjourns without discussing and reaching conhours of labor, proper working conditions, and the arrangement of a common meeting ground for employer and employee where differences of all kinds may be amicably adjusted, are important subjects, a sympathetic understanding gree of harmony along industrial lines.

But it will not be enough for labor and consumers of the product of labor and capital. labor nor capital will progress, and to protect their interests the industrial welfare of the country as a unit must be considered. Capital can easily increase wages, shorten the workday and provide ideal working conditions at the expense of increased price for the product will be the gainer? The man who gets the increased wage will be obliged to pay the additional dollar or two for his own product, and the man who gets no increased wage will not falling off there will be less employment for labor. True, this condition might be alleviated to some extent by the standardization of wages, salaries and hours of labor for all classes of work, but even such a radical and altogether improbable move as this would touch only one phase of the situation.

Unless some means is found of paying this debt neither labor nor capital, nor anyone else in Canada will experience permanent prosperity. This is one big question which the industrial conference should consider. Obviously there are two ways of solving the problem. One is by underselling the United States both in her own and other markets, and the other is by ceasing purchases in the States and raising, by means of taxes or otherwise, the money necessary to nay the debts. To undersell the States labor and capital must agree upon a scale of wages and production that will make the unit cost lower than the unit cost in the neighboring country; either wages must be lower or production become more intensive. At the present time, by reason of the extensive production in the States the unit cost is lower there than in England or Canada,

If Canada could reduce her imports from the States to a minimum she could do so best by entering into some arrangement by which the resources of the entire British Empire would be pooled, with the object of increasing the production and trade of the empire as a unit. A movement to bring this about has already been inaugurated in England by the organization of the Britannic Industrial Alifance. It would be a very radical step for Canof the States, but it may yet become necessary. ways way down east It would mean that Canada would be obliged to change the entire trend of trade and possibly empire. ### RAPID SHIP REPAIRS.

Particulars are now available of some extraordinarily rapid repairs carried out by British shipbuilders after naval actions. H. M. S. Lion, Admiral flagship, was seriously damaged in the Dogger Bank fight, and about 1,500 square feet plating had to be repaired under water. Four coffer dams were built, lowered into the water in position and attached to the ship's side by bridles, and drawn tight; they were then pumped dry. A fortnight was occupied in blasting away about 150 tons of concrete which had been used to fill in the damaged portions of the hull, and the entire repairs were completed in seven weeks. H. M. S. igh, a super-dreadnought, badly injured by a tornedo in the Jutland battle, was repaired in six weeks although many experts who saw the damage short a period. [Canadian Recontruction Press Service.] Taking the average wage at \$3 per day, strikes of industrial disputes from January 1, 1901, to June the period, involving 620,235 employees, and there time loss of no less than 14,937,229 working days. Between January 1 and June 30, 1919, there were 189 disputes, involving 105,026 employees, and a loss of 2,118,379 working days. The women of New York are not going to allow the profiteer to escape by the smallest loophole. They are out after him, 50,000 strong, with all their plans made as to the best mode of attack.

And this is the way they are going about it. The various women's organizations interested in this campaign have been assigned certain districts as their field of endeavor. Each individual woman is armed with a postal card on which the various food commodities are listed. It is her duty to make a canvass of the stores allotted to her. She goes as a shopper, pricing the goods. These are then noted down on the card list, which is forwarded to the central fair price committee. If the prices of certain commodities on all the cards are higher than what is considered a fair price by the committee, an appeal is to be made to the food controller. If some merchants appear to be making too large a profit, while others stick to the fair price, this is also noted, and those merchants are reported to the food controller.





**GOVERNMENT ADOPTS** NEW METHOD' FOR CLOSING OFF DEBATES

Apply It in Case of Bill To Amend Election Act.

CAMOUFLAGED CLOSURE

Measure Unpopular With the Tories Shelved by Means of Adjournment.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
OTTAWA. Sept. 18.—The Tory Government was the inventor of closure and gag in the House of Commons. Tonight it resorted to a new method for the closing off of debate. The justification for the calling of the present session, which will cost the country a cool million or more, is hard to find, unless it be that the Government desires to placate some of its followers who have been showing signs of rebellion by granting them an extra sessional indemnity of \$2,500.

Whatever the reason may have been, however, it was to be expected that the Government would give its best attention to the few matters before the House, and permit of proper dehate upon them. This afternoon S. W. Jacobs of the Georges Etienne Cartier division of Montreal brought up for second reading his bill, to amend the election act. The purpose of this bill is to declare a holiday on polling days, to abolish dual representation and to make it compulsory to hold by-elections within 60 days after vacancies occur.

Long Overdue.
